SIMPLY MARKING TIME

London, Sept. 25.—Another week has opened with the Transvaal situation marking time.

No news has yet been received of the delivery at Pretoria of the last British dispatch. The next big news will be the decision arrived at by the Rand, of the Orange Free State, whose secret deliberation is expected to close tomorrow and it will come as a great surprise if the Rand does not decide to link arms with the Transvaal.

Neither the Jingos nor the anti-war party are very proud of yesterday's affair on Trafalgar Square which proved nothing except that a mob is always "jingo."

A telegram received from Calcutta announces the departure of the transport *Schidhans* for South Africa and the last transport for the Cape leaves India tomorrow.

YACHT DEWEY ADRIFT.

Johnson's yacht *Dewey* got adrift yesterday and was far out in the channel when spied by Chas. Reynolds and Albert Johnson. These two boys were joined by H. M. Dow's sons and the quartet went to the rescue, bringing the *Dewey* back to a safe anchorage in the harbor. Chas. Reynolds and Albert Johnson were each presented with a silver dollar by the owner of the yacht.

T. W. Hobron Leaves.

T. W. Hobron left for San Francisco in the *Australia* yesterday. Before leaving, Mr. Hobron gave out the following to a BULLETIN reporter: "You may say that it is my intention to bring back with me from the Coast a very fast yacht—a boat that I calculate will beat anything in these waters. She may not be very large but she will have speed."

Went to Waialae.

The 750 men from the Transport *Tacoma* marched out to Waialae yesterday morning with band playing and banners flying. They camped out all night and returning to town this morning, went aboard ship to prepare for departure.

PASSENGERS ON THE GRANT

List of Those on Their Way to the Philippines.

Big Transport Excites Interest of All—McKinley and Roosevelt Received 26th Regiment in Plattsburg, N. Y.—Dr. Kellogg.

Many visitors were aboard the huge U. S. A. Transport *Grant* lying at the Oceanic dock, this morning. A great many of the boys are known to Honolulu people as in many cases they are re-enlisted men, and have passed this way before.

On the *Grant* there are 1249 men of the Twenty-sixth, the entire regiment; 332 recruits; 60 passengers, including officers and about 200 officers and men belonging to the ship, embracing all departments.

The Twenty-sixth Infantry was reviewed before starting on its long journey to the Philippines in Plattsburg, New York, by President McKinley and Governor Roosevelt. It is as fine a looking lot of men as ever passed through here.

The only casualty on the *Grant* during her trip from the Coast was the sudden death of Fireman Edward Stanley probably from a disease of the heart.

Dr. Kellogg is well known in Honolulu having formerly been connected with the local branch of the Battle Creek Sanitarium; he was in Manila during the Spanish war, was invalided home and is now returning again to the scene of hostilities.

Captain Baker is the Quartermaster in charge of the *Grant*; Doctor Spiller is the ship's surgeon.

The *Grant* is not without her mascot, having the usual small stowaway aboard.

WILL SOON CLOSE.

Navy and Pearl Harbor Lands

The United States tug boat *Iroquois*, Lieut. Pond commander, returned this morning after an absence since last Friday during which time stops were made at Lahaina, Maui, Kealahou Bay on the Kona coast and Hilo. Captain Merry, commandant of the Naval Station here, was the only passenger in the *Iroquois*. In fact, the tug boat went out at his orders, the idea being to make the circuit of the islands of Maui and Hawaii for the purpose of inspecting various places with an eye to sending information to the United States Government. Captain Merry was seen at his office this forenoon and, in response to questions asked by a BULLETIN reporter, gave out the following:

"No, the United States Government has no particular design so far in regard to harbors but information has been asked for by the authorities and for that reason alone I made the trip in the *Iroquois*."

"Neither Lahaina nor Kealahou can be recommended as places for harbors. A few hours' inspection proved that very conclusively."

"When you come to Hilo it is a different matter. With the building of a crescent shaped breakwater (a matter of very little trouble) a very fine harbor could be produced. This information will, of course, be sent forward."

"We remained in Hilo two days and the whole situation was studied carefully."

"As you know, my first intention was to go to Kauai, the Garden Isle, but this was changed. From what I saw on the coasts of Maui and Hawaii, a trip to Kauai will not be necessary."

"Now then as to harbor matters in general and Pearl Harbor in particular."

"You know that Pearl Harbor was conceded to the United States some time ago. Now that the flag of the United States flies over the islands, the appropriation of \$100,000 has been made for dredging."

"This appropriation still stands, but it is insufficient and the Navy Department has recommended that nothing be done until a situation on land is obtained."

"When Pearl Harbor was conceded, the concession was made without any land and that is just where the big plikiia comes in now."

"The land all along the water front is owned by private parties and, when it was sought by the United States Government to purchase some of this, the parties concerned held their possessions at such an exorbitant price that it was decided to allow the matter to drop for a while."

"However, something may be done in the near future. The Bureau of Equipment has recommended to the government that condemnation proceedings be instituted against some of the land already referred to."

"The law of Eminent Domain is very clear here and if the lands are condemned they will be valued according to the taxation of previous years. There will be rigid kicks and court proceedings of course. Nothing more is to be expected. That is all I have to say in regard to harbor matters."

"I might add that several people were invited to go in the *Iroquois* but, on account of that recently arrived malady termed in American slang 'cold feet,' none of these people showed up. The *Iroquois* made a very quick trip and was blessed with the delights of a smooth voyage."

GOVERNMENT LAND MATTERS.

A list of the land transactions by the government since the passage of the Newlands Resolution is now being prepared by the Interior Department. The work will take about two days yet to complete.

It is stated on the very best of authority that the list published in another afternoon paper a few days ago was totally misleading and unauthorized. The majority of the transactions named were made before the passage of the Newlands Resolution and, for that reason, have nothing whatever to do with the proclamation from President McKinley, received a short time ago.

In a Tight Place.

In the slip between the Irmgard and Sorenson wharves the Hospital ship *Relief* and U. S. A. Transport *Tacoma* are wedged.

How they ever got into their present tight predicament is the wonder of the water-front; not an inch of space is there between the docks and the vessels or between the vessels themselves. The *Relief* is expected to sail for Manila via Guam tomorrow and will have to solve the problem then.

MORTUARY RECORD.

The mortuary record of the Board of Health for the month ending September 30 shows a total of 79 deaths, 57 being male and 22 female. Of these 37 were Hawaiians, 12 Chinese, 11 Portuguese, 11 Japanese, 5 Americans, 1 Britisher and 2 of other nationalities.

The causes were as follows: Consumption 10; pneumonia 7; meningitis 5; peritonitis, enteritis, diarrhoea and bronchitis 4 each; drowning, fever, malaria fever and premature birth 3 each; accident, Bright's disease, convulsions, debility, remittent fever, heart disease, hemorrhage, 2 each; aneurism, beriberi, cancer, dermatitis, dysentery, enterocolitis, exhaustion, typhoid fever, gastritis, hernia, old age, paralysis, tumor, suffocation and ulcer of stomach 1 each.

In September of 1895 (cholera time) there were 112 deaths; in 1896, 43; in 1897, 53; in 1898, 56; and in 1899, 79. Death by wards were as follows: First ward 13, second, 17; third, 11, fourth, 19 and fifth, 19.

Annual death rate per 1000 for month, 27.08. Hawaiians, 38.61; Asiatics, 25.09; all others, 18.24.

PRINCE DAVID IN NEW YORK

He is a Guest at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel.

Favorably Received—Speaks of Hawaiian Affairs to World Correspondent—Visited the Queen in Washington.

New York, Sept. 18.—The World says: Prince David Kawanakoa of Hawaii, whose mother was a sister of Queen Liliuokalani and whose father was one of the powerful chiefs under the old regime in Hawaii, is at the Waldorf Astoria.

Prince David, as he has always been called in this country from the time he went to school in California, travels back and forth between the United States and his native islands rather frequently. He is the handsomest native of Hawaii, and he is an exquisite in his dress. Not long ago he gave a poi dinner in Washington, bringing the principal edibles all the way from Honolulu.

Washington, Sept. 17, special to the World.—Prince David Kawanakoa of Hawaii, nephew of Queen Liliuokalani and member of the royal family, has arrived here on his way to New York to see the great yacht race.

He will call on his aunt while here and make her acquainted with the political situation in the islands.

"The natives," he said to The World correspondent, "are anxiously awaiting the assumption of American authority. To change an established government is dangerous, and they realize it. Hawaii was well governed by the monarchy. Capital punishment was almost unknown. There were no thieves. The laws were universally obeyed. This situation has been changed under the republican government, although its record is not as deplorable as those of other countries."

"President Dole and his colleagues are autocrats. Although a few reforms have been instituted, they are not enterprising, and the islands have not been benefited. A majority of the people are opposed to the present government, and while not sure the United States will inaugurate one that is better, they will accept what is given and judge of its merits afterward."

Fogarty Objected.

In the Police Court this forenoon Fogarty appeared on the charge of obstructing and perverting the course of justice. Deputy Marshal Chillingworth asked for a nolle prosequi but Mr. Fogarty objected, saying his sister had been jerked off her wheel by a police officer. Judge Wilcox told the defendant that, in case he wanted to bring in a complaint later on he could do so.

Many Tax Cases.

Delinquent tax payers have been decidedly on the increase this year. It was announced by Judge Wilcox this forenoon that there are now 740 cases on his list that must be tried in the immediate future.

Anxious to Fight.

Tired of staying in Honolulu and anxious to go to the front to fight under the American flag in the Philippines as they had started out from home to do, some twenty men from the Artillery stationed here and Buena Vista hospital, left in the Transport *Sherman* for Manila today. Of course, it is very probable that the men will be court-martialed upon arrival but, even realizing this, they stated to friends that they were perfectly willing to take their chances.

The soldiers went about the matter in a deliberate way, borrowing the proper uniforms, walking aboard the transport and mingling with the rest of the soldiers. They said good-bye to friends and told them their intentions asking that nothing be said until after the departure of the transport.

BATTLESHIP KEARSARGE TRIAL.

Boston, Sept. 25.—The new battleship *Kearsarge* left her anchorage about four miles off Boston Light today for the trial course off Cape Ann, where she is to have her speed test today.

Rockport, Mass., Sept. 25.—The *Kearsarge* started on her official trial off this point today, crossed the line at 10:26:40. As the big battleship crossed the line under full headway, her bow pushed up an enormous volume of water, and great waves were thrown up astern by the screws. She made good speed, however, although the tide was against her and the wind nearly abeam.

Rockport, Mass., Sept. 25.—The *Kearsarge* crossed the finish line at 2:47:10, having taken four hours, twenty minutes, thirty seconds for the run.

An estimate, deducting thirty minutes for turning at Cape Porpoise shows that she exceeded 17 knots by a fraction.

Boxing Entertainment.

The Oceanic Athletic Club will give a grand boxing exhibition in their hall on Monday evening, Oct. 9, when a number of highly interesting events will be contested. Also, Hansen will have an eight-round bout with Will Smith, a recent arrival from Frisco; while Martin Deeny and Charley Lambert will indulge in a ten-round spar. In addition to several other attractions in the same line Sam Johnson and his pupils will perform on the horizontal bar. As the participants are mostly men of local fame a good and exciting program may be anticipated.

On Time as Usual.

The *Australia* got away for San Francisco at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, on time, not at 5:15 as stated in a morning paper. Herr Berger's Government band accompanied the alohas of friends of the departing with the usual choice selections.

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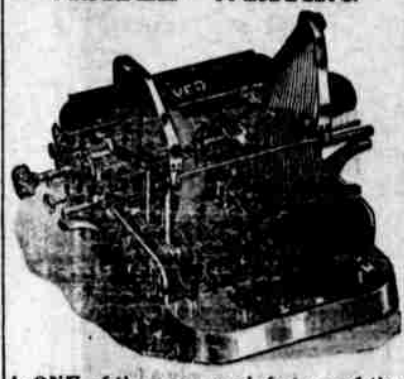

If, as the official organ intimates, the list of local candidates for the governorship is growing apace, we can begin to form some estimate of the long list of candidates from the mainland that will receive the consideration of the President.

Minister King is unquestionably right in holding that the agreements of sale made by the Hawaiian Government previous to July 7, 1898, will not be disturbed by the President's land order. The publication by a contemporary of a list of purchasers receiving guarantees of title previous to annexation, as among those subject to the order, simply shows the readiness of the organs to misrepresent the situation.

Should Hon. Sam Parker become a candidate for governor—and as an American citizen he certainly has that privilege—he is now receiving a foretaste of the treatment he and his people will receive from the official circle. "Hawaii for the Hawaiians" is the cry of this official circle, but immediately a Hawaiian trespasses on the official preserve, "the offices for ourselves," the official organ places the Hawaiian as corrupt, irresponsible and incapable.

HAWAIIANS AT PARIS.

Determination on the part of the business men to cooperate with the government in a creditable exhibit for Hawaii at the Paris Exposition is worthy every assistance the people can give. The funds appropriated by the Chamber of Commerce and Planters' Association will be ample to supply and properly display an exhibit fully representative of Hawaii's commercial and educational development.

In selecting the representatives who will have charge of this exhibit, it is to be hoped that those in whose hands the power rests will not forget that the native Hawaiian is a factor worthy of recognition. Not only is he worthy, but his social and financial position in the territory demands that he should be given more than passing consideration.

If he can be prevailed upon to accept the position, W. G. Irwin is the man of all others to act as Commissioner. No one has been more intimately associated with the material development of the territory or is better able to uphold the social dignity of the position. It is to be hoped however that some representative of the Hawaiian race may be named for the secretaryship.

The native Hawaiian citizen should be given a more dignified standing at Paris than is to be found in the "Hawaiian Village" which is simply a relic of the past and a very poor relic at that. Grass huts, poi eaters, hula dancers and kindred features of the side show serves only to misrepresent the Hawaiian of today and place him before the public, where he does not belong—on a footing with uncivilized aborigines of the South Seas.

Give the Hawaiian the representation to which he has a right.

LAND ORDER INFORMATION.

The first charge made by the organs of Hawaii's officials against the President's land order was that the Washington authorities had been "misinformed."

The publication of the Attorney General's opinion, reluctant publication on the part of the officials though it was, gives this charge

of misinformation, made simultaneously with the defense of the officials, a place as mighty interesting reading.

The "information" on which the Attorney General based his opinion was simply the fact that the Hawaiian Government contemplated selling public land. We do not believe the officials or their organs will attempt to deny that they did intend selling and had sold public land. Do the wise heads of Hawaii's officialdom consider that anything further was necessary to determine whether their disposal of land was in keeping with the letter or spirit of the Newlands Resolution?

To what extent our officials have overstepped their authority is brought out by the Attorney General's statement that he has "no hesitation" in advising that all land sales, leases or transfers by the Hawaiian Government "will be absolutely null and void." He also says "It is only necessary to refer to the language of the resolution and well understood principles of public law to reach the easy conclusion" that the public lands of Hawaii became the property of the United States on July 7, 1898 and can only be disposed of by special act of Congress.

We wish the "special agent" and "unofficial delegate" with many war records great joy in his efforts to establish the claim that the Washington Executive has been "misinformed."

No Lights

Many soldiers returning to the transports Sherman and Grant last night after the band concert at the Hawaiian Hotel, met with accidents that very fortunately did not prove serious. There were no lights on Fort street or the waterfront, nor anywhere in town for that matter, and many of the boys went sprawling on the sidewalk where considerable lumber was lying threatening life and limb.

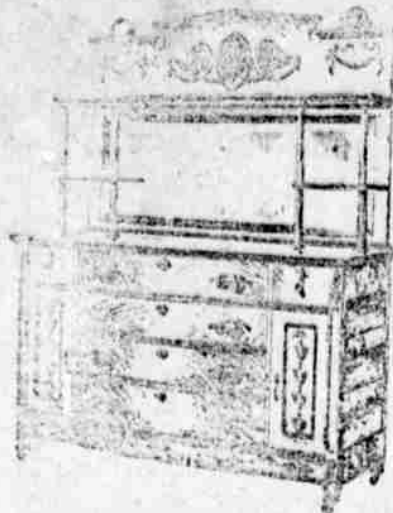

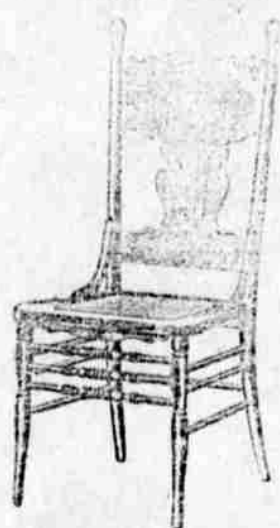
