



There will be a meeting of the Pacific Tennis Club at the club house, Palace Square, at 5 p. m. tomorrow for the transaction of important business.


Owing to the breaking of the donkeywinch on the Keaubou this morning that boat will not get away before tomorrow for Hanamaula and Abukipi.
