FROM BOER LAND.

News From the Seat of War With Rumors of Considerable Fighting.

LONDON, Oct. 20.—The War Office this afternoon issued the following bulletin: "No news of importance has been received from Natal today. The Cavalry attached to our forces at Ladysmith and Dundee are engaged. Steps have been taken to secure Pietermaritzburg and Durban against raids on the western frontier.

There is no recent reliable communication from Kimberley or Mafeking, both places being cut off from railway and telegraph communication.

Almost everything is now in readiness for the departure of troops from Southampton tomorrow, when five transports, each carrying 1,000 men, with officers, will start for South Africa. The first will sail at 1:30 p. m. the others following at intervals of half an hour.

The "Daily Mail's" Cape Town correspondent says that a refugee who has reached Grahamstown from the Rand, states that a train arrived at Johannesburg on Monday from Klarksdorp with 300 wounded Burgers. Every available conveyance, the dispatch says, was called into requisition to take the wounded men to the hospital. The "Daily Mail" suggests that these wounded were from Mafeking.

The Cape Town correspondent of the "Daily Mail" telegraphing at 10:30 on Thursday night, says: "Vryburg surrendered on Sunday." Tonight's dispatches from Kurtman, 90 miles west by south of Vryburg, state that the police having withdrawn from Vryburg, the town was surrendered to the Boers, the inhabitants fleeing in all directions, mostly toward Kurtman. When the police withdrew the Cape Boers notified the fact to the enemy, thus inviting them to take possession. There was a fearful panic. The British are wildly indignant at this scuttling."

Advices from Cape Town, dated yesterday, say that the Governor of the Colony, Sir Alfred Milner, has issued a proclamation prohibiting the importation of all explosives.

According to private information received from Bloemfontein, capital of the Orange Free State, President Krueger telegraphed an account to President Steyn of the affair at Kraaipan, where the Boers derailed and bombarded the British armored train, capturing Captain Nesbit's party. Mr. Krueger said that Captain Nesbit and seven men were seriously wounded, that one man was killed and that all the prisoners were well. According to the same advices a Dutch farmer living in one of the border towns has received a letter from a friend in the Transvaal, referring to the Mafeking affair as a "bad business."

A despatch from Pretoria asserts that the Government of the Transvaal has cabled to Mr. Joseph Benjamin Robinson, the millionaire gold-mine owner, and Chairman of the Robinson South African Banking Company, who is now in London, to return to Johannesburg, on pain of the confiscation of his property. Mr. Robinson characterizes the alleged threat as ridiculous. He says that he is a British subject; that the Transvaal Government has no right to demand his return, and that his property has not been and cannot be confiscated.

The Pietermaritzburg correspondent of the "Daily Mail," in a despatch dated Thursday, says: "The brunt of the fighting at Bester's station yesterday was sustained by the patrols. The fighting was brisk. The Boers numbered 2,000. The volunteers at one moment were in great peril, being nearly cut off, but the officers handled their men splendidly and the Maxims effectively stopped the Boer rushes. The

Boer shooting was wretched. The Volunteers lost their kit and altogether the experience was a pretty trying one. Our men were in the saddle three days and two nights with hardly a rest. Basuto natives were fighting with the Boers. It is reported that sixteen Boers were killed. Lieutenant Galloway, who is reported missing, is the eldest son of Sir H. H. Galloway, Chief Justice of Natal. He is supposed to be in hiding, and searching parties have been sent out to try and find him.

The "Mail's" Cape Town correspondent says: "It is rumored here that news has reached Deear Junction that the Boers attacked Mafeking in force but were repulsed. The defenders, seeing the enemy retreating, pursued them for some time. Then a feint was made and they commenced to retire on the town, allowing themselves to be driven in by the Boers who, eager to retrieve their position, again advanced to the attack and were drawn over the Lyddite mines, laid for the defense of the town. It is reported that 1,500 were killed by the explosion."

THE NEW MINISTER.

The acceptance by Mr. Alexander Young of the position of Minister of the Interior, at this crisis of Hawaiian affairs, is a tactful expression of patriotic interest in a country which has been his foster mother to fortune. It is a graceful and grateful recognition of the fact that a true citizen should ever be ready at the call of public duty to cheerfully respond, even at the sacrifice of personal comfort and at the cost of much inconvenience to self.

Mr. Dole and the country are to be heartily congratulated upon this accession of strength to this very weak Cabinet. Mr. Young is the architect of his own fortune honestly earned by hard work, perseverance and considerable business acumen, and common sense, and no small aptitude in judgment of character of his fellow men. We think that the people as a whole—exclusive of a certain political ring of nonentities—are famously satisfied with the appointment.

We should have been better pleased, perhaps, had Major J. A. Hassinger received the position as a substantial and honorable reward for many long years of fidelity in the public service, but if he will remain as chief of the office, public interests will not continue to retrograde under the new head of the Department. Scotch shrewdness, with strength of mind and will power, a capital backbone and a liberal—conservatism of views will materially aid Hawaii and the United States just now.

We shall expect to see Mr. Young's good common sense brought to bear upon the extraordinary rapidity and lethargy of policy that has recently been so marked in the Dolean-Coopersque mal-administration. He, at any rate, has a strong and inherent conception of the distinction between propriety and inpropriety, and between the inane folly of Kindergarten politicians and manly statesmanship.

It is not very likely that he will, in Cabinet, counsel or endorse any action that will tend to embarrass the desire of the Washington Executive to do full justice to the people of this country, or endeavor to teach his grandfather Uncle Sam "how to suck eggs," as our venerable looking—if not venerated—revolutionary president has been so much of late in the habit of attempting.

As a plain spoken and shrewd business man, unaccustomed to use public office for private ends, and being footloose from entangling business interests, much will be expected from the new Minister, and we believe that he will make a good record for himself and for the country. He will at any rate—as he deserves—have fair play from our wing of the political opponents to the most worthless Government that has ever been foisted upon these Islands. To give it its just due it may be termed a Government of hypocritical cantanism from first to last, and the happiest men are those who have left it by death or otherwise, for it has disappointed its friends and overjoyed its foes by its follies.

WAIALUA AGAIN.

The Advertiser's editorial of this morning, inspired if not written by Mr. Thurston, would not be a misleading one if, where the word "company" is used, where liability for the oversale of shares is intended to be shown, the names of B. F. Dillingham and Castle & Cooke were substituted. The subscription lists opened at the office of Castle & Cooke, unless they have been lost, will show that Dillingham and Castle & Cooke agreed to deliver the shares to the Honolulu subscribers.

In his remarks at the Waialua Agricultural Company's meeting Mr. A. B. Wood, who represented some five hundred paid up and three thousand assessable shares of the company, said that he was convinced that, sooner or later, the capital of the company would have to be increased, and for that reason he would withdraw opposition to the resolution to increase it at this time. He did not touch upon the pith of the matter, possibly for some reason he did not care to divulge, which is, that it makes all the difference in the world who the shares are to be issued to.

Many of the shareholders in Waialua purchased at figures ranging from one hundred and fifty to two hundred dollars, and they are most certainly deeply interested in receiving their proportion of the new shares, in order that the cost of their holdings may be averaged down. If the present shareholders stand firmly for a pro rata distribution they will assuredly receive their proportion of any new issue.

Mr. Hatch, who it must be remembered is Mr. Dillingham's attorney, made an assertion in regard to the liability of the Waialua Company in the suit brought by Colonel Soper to compel Mr. Dillingham to specifically perform his agreement to deliver ten thousand shares of the stock of the company, that has been disputed by lawyers of good reputation for ability. The assertion was that the company was liable to Mr. Soper and his San Francisco subscribers for the shares. Such a statement, from such a source, undoubtedly influenced some shareholders to consider the terms of the resolution.

The fact is, so good lawyers say, that Col. Soper looks to Mr. Dillingham for a specific performance of his agreement to deliver the shares, and in the suit the company was joined to prevent its officers from transferring shares while the suit was pending. The fact remains, stubbornly, that Mr. Dillingham and Castle & Cooke opened identical lists for subscribers to the stock of the company they were floating; for their convenience calling one Mr. Dillingham's and the other Castle & Cooke's; but both parties are responsible for delivery of the shares subscribed for on either or both lists.

The right way to settle the disputed question is for Mr. Dillingham to appeal from Judge Perry's decision to the Supreme Court and await the result of appeal before taking other action.

If Mr. Dillingham refuses to perfect an appeal to the Supreme Court and persists in his present purpose, then let the subscribers to the stock make up a fund for defense of their rights, agreeing to contribute say one dollar a share of their holdings, and employ counsel to bring an action against Mr. Dillingham and Castle & Cooke for delivery of the shares subscribed for, and ask for an injunction to stop any action of the company's officers towards a new issue.

The statement made by the company's manager shows that no serious harm can come to the company by a delay of six months, or even a year, of litigation, if so long a time is required. Then let the small holders make a stand against the onslaught of the multi-millionaires—or, stop kicking.

THE YACHT RACE.

The Columbia Wins the Cup.
NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—Had the wind held today the Columbia-Shamrock series for the America Cup would have ended in three straight heats for the defender, and the Irish cup challenger would have sailed home without the trophy. When the race was declared off about ten minutes before the expiration of the time limit, the Columbia was leading by about three miles. She was then four miles from the finish. Had the race ended, the challenger would have been beaten by at least twenty minutes.

Sir Thomas' hard luck continued to follow him. His boat was very badly handled today in spite of the regulation talent aboard of her. The two English captains and the Captain of the Emperor William's yacht Meteor failed to get her over the line before the handicap cup was fired,

and she went into the race penalised by two seconds on that account. The additional ballast put into her yesterday also seems to have been a blunder on the part of her managers, as it has increased the size of the body to be forced through the water, and in the light air that prevailed today, retarded, instead of increased her speed. The yachts will race again tomorrow, and, even if the Columbia wins, there is a possibility that two more races will be sailed. A suggestion to this effect has been made and Sir Thomas appears anxious that it should be carried out. He has been greatly disappointed in the showing his boat has made, but believes that she might do better over a triangular course in a heavier wind, and has said in so many words that he would be very pleased to sail two more races.

Reports state that on the next day's race the Columbia defeated the Shamrock in a stiff breeze.
