Britons Recognize Valor of the Boers.

LONDON, Oct. 23.—The British victories in Natal following each other in quick succession, though accompanied by heavy losses on the side of the victors, bear striking testimony to the valor of the vanquished Boers. They appear to have fallen victims to the very plan on which they counted to drive the British to the sea. They have been beaten in detail by counter strokes carefully considered and brilliantly carried out in the fact of courageous opposition, which has done much to increase British respect for the burghers, whose splendid valor and determination, it is universally admitted, reached the highest level.

Fuller accounts of Saturday's battle at Elands Laagte emphasized the splendid gallantry exhibited on both sides, and the superiority of the British in a pitched battle, although the Boers fought with the greatest tenacity to the last, only yielding when further fighting was hopeless.

After the battle the Boers, dead and wounded among the rocks, who were numerous, were attended to as far as possible in the dark. General French thanked the troops on the field, especially mentioning Colonel Ian Hamilton's splendid handling of the infantry. The British bivouacked on the captured position Saturday night. Some estimates place the Boer losses at 500, but this is probably exaggerated.

Colonel Scott Chishelm, the only British officer killed, was formerly attached to the Ninth Lancers. He served with distinction in the Afghan war and organized the present Imperial Light Horse, a majority of whom are refugees from the Rand.

The death of General Viljoen is a severe blow to the burghers, and the death of General Kock and the capture of General Pretoria will handicap the further movements of this column.

According to advices from Durban, Natal, the Boers have entered Zululand, a large column advancing toward Meloth.

The best opinions do not credit the reports that the Boers are suing for peace, or that they are likely to yield at present, though they think they will probably retreat from their line of defenses to the mountain passes at Laings Nek and Drakenberg, where they have blocked the passes with great bowlders and masses of rock blown up on either side and where if they so desire, they will be able to hold out until the advance of Major General Sir Redvers Buller through the Orange Free State should compel them to leave the Natal side to meet in the invasion from the south.

The sensational rumors of the designs of foreign powers inimical to British interests meet with scant credence, though it is admitted it is difficult to explain the immense force on land which Great Britain is now mobilizing.

In Vienna it is reported that the British naval movements are due to a rumor that Russia, with the assent of France, is about to acquire from Spain Ceuta or some other naval station on the African coast. Elsewhere it is stated that the movements of the French Mediterranean fleet in the neighborhood of the Levant, where it could easily be joined by the Russian Black Sea fleet, via the Straits of the Dardanelles, is occasioning suspicion.

Lady Randolph Churchill and Mrs. Arthur Paget are organizing a fund among American ladies in England with the intention to completely equip a hospital ship for service on the South African coast at a cost of £8000. Lady Curzon and Mrs. Bradley-Martin have been invited to join the committee.

The Australians are much exercised at the reports that the Imperial Government has ordered canned meat in America, though the War Office had promised to conserve Australian interests. Those in the best positions to judge, however, predict that the packers of the United States will secure large orders, as the British colonies are unable to furnish a tithe of the quantity required if the campaign continues long.

What is believed to have been an attempt to wreck military trains bound from Pembroke Dock to Southampton was discovered yesterday evening. Five chains were placed on the track near Swansea. Two trains laden with troops passed soon after their discovery.

A BRILLIANT PERFORMANCE.

Sweet Singers Sing Said Pasha at the Opera House.

The good people of Hawaii have now a chance to hear and see something truly artistic in the line of operatic performances. The Boston Lyric Opera Company have made their first bow to a Honolulu audience, and it is to be hoped that the gifted members of the company were satisfied with the reception granted to them by the fashionable and critical people who filled every seat in the House and made the manager put out the sign "standing room only."

If the music loving people of Honolulu don't patronize the opera company they will not deserve to hear another bright song or clever acting or listen to sweet music and admire pretty girls, fine costumes and a *mise en scene* which would do credit to a first class theater in any country.

Said Pasha is a well-known operette. It was composed by Richard Strauss and the music is catching, and now perhaps even too "popular." The orchestra composed of two grand pianos, and a string orchestra in which Mr. Paul Egry, a musician of renown played first violin, was ably conducted by Mr. W. F. Glover who had with him Captain H. Berger and a local orchestra.

The merits of the members of the opera company are difficult to describe. It is far easier to go and hear for yourself than reading a criticism which does not do justice, however, flattering, to the talented singers.

Eugene Rogers has a basso voice which would secure him a place anywhere in the great theatres of the world. His part did not give him much chance to show his talent, but what he did proved him to be as clever as an actor as he is as a singer.

The heart of Honolulu went out to Miss Josephine Stanton, whose beautiful appearance and exquisitely cultivated voice made the audience call for *da capo*, after *da capo* and the young lady responded gracefully, her sweet voice vibrated through the house again and again to the delight of all.

Miss Maud Leekly possesses a very sweet voice of great range and superbly cultivated. She is perhaps the best singer in the company, and we anticipate a great pleasure when she appears in some of the grand operas to be produced.

Henry Hallam has a fine tenor voice and sang his part as Torano in excellent style as did Lovelle Rockwell, who took the part of Said Pasha and carried through the difficult character in a very clever manner. He was supported by A. G. Parmeley, who played Hassan Bey. It struck us that Mr. Parmeley's fine tenor is not suited for the role and we noticed that two songs were cut out from the opera. Hassan Bey is supposed to be a baritone while Mr. Parmeley is distinctly a high tenor.

The funny parts in the opera were taken by George Kunkel and John

Henderson and the two jolly artists kept the house laughing from beginning to end. Another fun-making character was that of Bolah, in which Miss Katherine McNeill showed her great talent as a comic actress.

The minor parts were cleverly represented and the chorus is graceful, magnificently costumed and trained singers.

We congratulate Colonel W. H. Thompson on his brilliant success, and we admit that his clever advance agent Mr. Harkinson has made no promises or statements which have not been fulfilled or realized.

It will be in the best interest of educators of the rising generation to bring the young people to the Opera House and let them listen to fine music, cultured voices and refined acting.

To-morrow evening the famous opera *Magtana* will be produced and should be greeted by a full house.

It wouldn't be THE INDEPENDENT if there wasn't a "kick" coming, but we do wish that the counting and jingling of money in the box office would not be allowed while the opera is going on and the curtain is up. It was rather annoying last evening especially to those who had seats near the doors. The music of jingling coin is as a rule very pleasing to the ear, but not while you are listening to the singers of the Boston Lyric Opera Company. It is so suggestive.

Death of O. F. Wall.

After a prolonged illness Charles F. Wall, a well-known German resident of these Islands, passed away yesterday afternoon at his residence on the Punchbowl slope.

The deceased was 64 years of age and had lived here for many years. He resided for several years in the District of Kona, Hawaii, and was engaged in sheep raising. He sold out to the late Dr. Trouseau, making a handsome profit. Then he established himself in Kau planting cane for the Hawaiian Agricultural Company, and he made a success of his business. A few years ago he came to Honolulu, built a comfortable house, and remained here until his physicians advised him to go to the Mainland for medical treatment. With him went his only child, a promising youth who succumbed to the severe climate of Oregon and died. The deceased returned by the last Australia to die in his adopted country. He was married to a Ha-

waiian lady who survives him and he leaves considerable property.

The funeral takes place this afternoon from the Masonic Temple, and is in charge of Undertaker Henry Williams.

Trouble at Waianae.

The deputy sheriff of Waianae summoned the assistance of the police department yesterday to help him in stopping a row which had occurred between the lunas and a gang of Chinese. There has been trouble for some time and when the manager insisted in upholding discipline a row started. Captain Parker with six men went to Waianae arrested the ringleaders and put a stop to the fight.

The Captain returned to town but left his men at Waianae to protect the lives and homes of the manager and the lunas where the row occurred. The men will return this afternoon if no further trouble arises.
