Mayaquito Captured.

CARACAS, Venezuela, via Haytien cable, Dec. 3.—After a fight lasting sixteen hours the city of Maracaibo, capital of the State of Zulia, is in the power of the Hernandist revolutionary forces.

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Dec. 3.—Trinidad revenue officers overhauled to-day a Venezuelan sloop, believed to be a filibustering vessel, near the island of Patos, in the Gulf of Paria. There were five men on board the sloop, and when called upon for the ship's papers they had none to show. Search was made by revenue officers, who found concealed on the sloop several rifles and revolvers, all loaded, and a quantity of cartridges.

Captain Pashley, in charge of the revenue officers, seized the sloop and arms and ammunition and took the latter and five Venezuelans ashore. The Venezuelans attacked the British boatman after landing. Captain Pashley ran to the men's rescue, firing his revolver at the filibusters. The latter returned the fire and seriously wounded Pashley. One of the boatmen was also shot, but his wound is slight.

The Venezuelans recaptured their sloop and arms and succeeded in escaping.

In Memory of Washington.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Arrangements are about completed for the Masonic celebration of the centennial of the death of Worshipful George Washington on December 14. Large numbers of Masons from all over the United States and from Canada are expected to attend. Colonel Robert White of Wheeling, W. Va., who was appointed by the Grand Lodge of Virginia as chief marshal, and his staff will have full charge of the procession and all matters connected with the celebration aside from the regular Masonic rites. The principal ceremonies will be at Mount Vernon and will include an address at the tomb by the grand master of Masons in Colorado. Masonic rites at the new tomb and address at the mansion by President McKinley and R.T.W. Duke, grand master of Masons of Virginia.

Women Drive Out Non-Union Miners.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Dec. 3.—Diamondville was the scene of a riot this morning, when 300 women, wives and daughters of the coal miners who are on strike, marched on the mines owned by Marcus Daly, the Montana Copper King, and with clubs and guns drove the operators and a small force of non-union miners away. A week ago 600 men laid down their tools and demanded an increase in wages.

The company resumed work in a few days with a small force of men. It is feared that unless the trouble is settled soon bloodshed will result. The strikers have shipped in large quantities of arms and ammunition, and they are not only arming themselves, but the women are also procuring firearms. Several non-union men were injured to-day by being struck by clubs in the hands of the women.

Held in Quarantine.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—Four steamers from Santos, Brazil, with coffee, are detained at quarantine, having come from a bubonic plague port. They are the J. W. Taylor, Roman Prince, Lessel and Ragusa. Seven lighters with the cargo of coffee discharged from the J. W. Taylor are anchored off Clifton, S. I., under close observation of the police patrol. Three lighters of the seven have served the eight days' detention required by Health Officer Doty and are free from further quarantine restrictions as far as Mr. Doty's department is concerned. The plague patients on Swinburne Island are doing well. There is no illness among the crews or stevedores detained on board the vessels or at Hoffman Island.

OUR GREETING.

A MERRY CHRISTMAS to all. It is true that we are in the land of the Oleanders and taroes and that the Misteltoe is not here. Kisses are exchanged however to-night although the misteltoe is not hanging under the roof. Good will exists and we remember no Christmas here where the people of the land harmonized better than they do to-day. Let us whoop it up and for the last time on the territory of Hawaii say—Merry, Merry Christmas!

STAR GAZERS.

Since that "benevolent assimilator" Wm. McKinley took title to these islands from the piratical gang who overthrew the monarchy in 1893, the S. F. Bulletin seems to have had some qualms of conscience about imperialism. Its conscience was apparently pricked by the utterances of Senator Kyle, who it appears has been reading the stars for enlightenment concerning South African affairs.

The Bulletin says that the Senators reading of its stars has convinced him that it is the destiny of civilization to creep in and help those people whose conditions are needful of improvement. As most peoples are in that condition, destiny seems to have imposed upon civilization a pretty hard task. It will be admitted that, in the abstract, as a matter of right, one people has as good a right to judge of the conditions of other peoples as any other. There is no accepted international standard which gives a nation which stands upon it a right to assume that the conditions of the peoples of other nations are in need of improvement. When one nation corrects another nation, its action is based upon its power to accomplish its purpose. A weak nation never undertakes to chastise a strong one. The weak nation may think that the strong nation deserves chastisement, but its right to administer the needed chastisement depends upon its power. It seems, therefore, that in the last analysis the law of civilization rests upon the assumption that might makes right. Looking the world over, we find much reason to doubt if what we call high civilization would be conclusive to the happiness of all peoples.

It may not be generally known that between 1893 and 1898 our own Rev. Sereno Bishop assumed the task of enlightening the Bulletin and its readers on Hawaiian affairs; and, as was the case of the majority of the Congregational preachers, applauded the scoundrels who stole Hawaii.

Now the Bulletin has in its turn taken to preaching, and says:

Society recognizes the right of an individual to live in his own way, so that he does not stand in the light of one who wants to live some other way. But this rule, which in its philosophy is much like the Golden Rule, is not recognized in the dealings of nations one with another. Men of the Kyle stamp—and there are a good many of them—assume the right of one nation, if it has the power, to step in and make other people conform to its standard of civilization. Mr. Kyle seems a little doubtful of the soundness of his philosophy, and in a weak way throws the responsibility upon the Almighty. He says:

"I think the Almighty gives these opportunities to nations, and that it is but a question of time when the best influences of civilization will have prevailed in quarters now torn and tormented by strife against pro-

gress and discontent because of outside interference."

It may never have occurred to Mr. Kyle that the Almighty may have had something to do with the conditions of nations which are content with a lower grade of civilization. Mr. Kyle certainly would not be so egotistical as to assume that only the peoples of the higher civilization are included in the plan of the universe. May not the peoples in a low stage of civilization be performing their part in the divinely appointed order of things? Is contentment really a sin of such heinous nature that it is only by rising out of it a people can hope for a share of divine favor?

We commend the Bulletin's preachment to our dear brother Sereno for to-morrow's reading. We all know that when our dear brother talks or writes shop he would pass for an angel of sweetness and light; but when he forgets shop he is handy with a pitch fork and other carnal weapons. We sometimes wonder how our dear brother would act if a bigger fellow were to attempt to take from him his kuleana on School street for the purpose of improving it, as McKinley has taken Hawaii from the Hawaiians with Sereno's hearty approval.

The Churches.

There will be a special service in all churches on Christmas Day. In the Cathedral of the Anglican Church there will be a church celebration of the Communion at 7 a. m., with music by the surpliced choir. The 11 o'clock service will be strictly a choral service with a sermon by the Bishop. On Christmas eve the surpliced choir will render Christmas carols during the service.

The branch congregation will have services commencing at 9:30 p. m., the Rev. Alexander Mackintosh will preach the sermon. The music, under the direction of Wray Taylor, will consist of anthems and solo, and the services will be followed by a celebration of the Holy Communion. There will also be a Holy Communion service at 5:30 in the morning.

The Central Union Church will hold its Christmas services to-morrow morning at 11 o'clock. The Rev. Wm. Kincaid's subject for the Christmas sermon will be, "The Real Christ Who Came Into the World." In the evening he will give the eighth sermon on the Making of Manhood—"Self-Control."

Christmas services will be held at the Methodist Episcopal Church at 11 o'clock. The sermon will be preached by Rev. Mr. Pearson on "Peace on Earth." Evening service at 7:30.

Princess of Trebizonde.

To-night the Boston Lyrics will present that highly amusing opera Offenbach's Princess of Trebizonde. Lovers of comedy and pretty music will be in their element, as the reigns supreme and the music is exceedingly tuneful. Miss Stanton plays Prince Raphael with a spirit that has won nothing but praise for her throughout the country. Kunkel and Henderson, the funny fellows take the part of a juggler and a clown respectively and will no doubt keep the audience in an uproar. Monday night will be the last performance of the Boston Lyrics and a tremendous house should be in attendance to give them a rousing farewell. The bill for the evening will be made up from the best plays done here. Parties having seats for Christmas are requested to call for them as they will not be held later than Monday noon.
