#### Court Notes.

In Sarah A. Berger vs. K.W. Booth and C. S. Desky, a motion has been filed by J. A. Magoon and Kinney, Ballou and McClanahan for Booth and F. M. Hatch for Desky, to have a day set for hearing.

A stipulation has been filed in Rita C. Tewksbury vs. A. G. Gunba et al. discontinuing the case as far as relief against the trustee is concerned, the plaintiff obtained a deed of her interest, but that the bill may be retained as a bill for partition. It was further stipulated to withdraw the demurrer, the defendants to answer within three days and that the case may then be set for hearing and adjudication. G. A. Davis for plaintiff, Kinney, Ballou and McClanahan for defendant.

The master's report in the final accounting of W. A. Bowen, administrator of the estate of Inga Larsen Bergersen, deceased, has been approved and the administrator to be discharged upon filing his final receipts from the beneficiaries; Acting Judge Silliman signing the order. There is \$4212.03 to be distributed to M. W. M. Bergersen, a minor, 6 years of age, subject to the curtesy right of the widower, Hartzig Bergersen, which is one-third of the income during life. It is ordered that the said Hartzig Bergersen receive the money equivalent to the present value of his annuity, which at his age of 41 with interest at 6 per cent is placed at 1001.35, computed according to standard actuary tables. The administrator was declared to be the guardian of the minor child, she being the sole heir to \$3210.68, the remainder. P. L. Weaver for the administrator.

Returns were last Saturday made by Deputy Marshal Chillingworth as being served upon defendants in Jacob Jensen et al. vs. 1669 tons of coal by delivering and relinquishing the possession to Allen & Robinson as per warrant of restitution of Feb. 21 last, also in Lum Ah Lee et al. doing business as See Yick Wai Co. vs. Ah Soong et al. on a bill for injunction, and in V. Vasconcellos vs. James Deed, to substitute executors as defendants.

In the case of Makee Sugar Co. vs. Tuck Chew, a motion to docket and dismiss, on the ground of defendant's failure to prosecute his appeal, has been filed by Kinney, Ballou & McClanahan for plaintiff. A notice was accordingly addressed to defendant's attorneys, Paul Neuman and J. T. De Bolt. This is an old standing case, a jury at the 1897, August term gave a verdict for defendant, assessing damages at \$29,843.20 for unlawful ejection, etc.

After hearing motion in A.S. Clegghorn, administrator, vs. W.R. Castle, Acting Judge Silliman denied the same for a decree pro confesso and ordered defendant to file an answer within two days. During the hearing the Court disallowed the motion previously reported to make the Antone Rosa estate responsible for a certain claim of \$1100 paid by defendant to said A. Rosa during his lifetime, at the request of Ana Momona, life tenant. Robertson & Wilder for plaintiff, P. L. Weaver for defendant.

#### Retaliation in Sight

LONDON, March 20.—In the House of Commons to day the Parliamentary Secretary of the War Office, Sir George Wyndham, said the Secretary of State for the Colonies, Joseph Chamberlain, was about to issue a proclamation on the subject of the alleged threats of the Boers to destroy Johannesburg and as to what the Boers may expect in the event of wanton destruction of British property.

It was asserted in the lobby this evening that the proclamation would be a brief document of general ap-

plication prohibiting the destruction of farms, houses and other property, as well as gold mines.

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

The active interest recently taken by colored men in the use of sharp weapons in affray is an indication of what might happen had we a few thousands of them on our sugar plantations.

How much longer are we to continue under the ban of the plague situation? It seems very probable that we shall have desultory cases for months to come, occurring probably within fifteen days of each other. We hear a weird story that a recent death in a typhoid fever case was practically caused by the injection of the serum a few hours before death, but we can scarcely credit the statement.

Acting by authority of our Senior President, President Dole has appointed the Court of Claims to adjudicate on the losses caused by the destruction of property by fire as a sanitary precaution. As to the members of the Court criticism in advance would be manifestly unfair. On the termination of their official career let us hope that we may all concur in saying "Well done, good and faithful public servants."

It has been intimated to THE INDEPENDENT that our own local President is of the opinion that under the strictest construction of law, international and otherwise, the Government is not responsible for damage done to property through the presence of the plague, inasmuch as such destruction was necessary as a sanitary measure. It must not be implied from this, however, that Mr. Dole does not believe that there are equitable grounds to be considered.

Mrs. Helen W. Craft states that on Saturday morning her attention was called to a horse dying from starvation at the Government Pound. If the horse or horses were too sick to eat why not have them killed instead of allowing the poor animals to suffer. We suggest to the humane officer to have Minister Young or his pound master arrested and charged with cruelty to animals. The horses were probably offered some of the Board of Health rat poison for grub.

A "Republican Party" will meet at T. B. Murray's hall to-morrow evening for the purpose of "organizing." One clique of Republicans take exception to Murray's using the name of the G. O. P., but the indefatigable captain is again to the front and ready to plunge into politics. We think our "republicans" are borrowing trouble because there is no indication that a republican party in Hawaii will carry a single vote for the next ten years to come. Try a Democratic dodge, dear captain, or go independent.

Is Minister Young aware of the fact that horses in the Government Pound are dying from neglect and starvation. Mrs. Craft, the officer

for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, made several calls to the Pound last week and found one dead horse and one in such a condition that it became necessary to shoot it. The man in charge may not be to blame, as he is not furnished with sufficient feed for the animals impounded, but the Minister who allows such a disgraceful condition is certainly open to criticism.

Our most esteemed contemporary the Bulletin, evidently holds the field in prize contests. May we suggest to its controllers that their next venture in this line should be; "the most popular man for our first Governor." This would afford an excellent opportunity for fun and political frolic, but scarcely furnish weight for a candidate in McKinley's eyes. If this proposition doesn't suit we suggest "the most popular Chinese washhouse."

We would like to know under which section in the Constitution of the United States President McKinley or President Dole received authority to appoint a Court of Peace, as we necessarily must call the so called Court of Claims? No such power is vested in the President, and the work of the Court will be futile except as far as it furnishes "pap" to the members of the Court and to attorneys. Besides it deprives the poor sufferers from the fire of another double eagle for costs which few of them can spare.

If an employee under the Minister of Finance gets sick through the unhealthy surroundings of the place where his duties call him, he finds himself "docked" when he returns to his post, although his work during his absence was performed by his colleagues and no substitute appointed. When a Chief Justice gets sick, and absents himself for several months, the Minister of Finance has no hesitation in digging up \$500 per month for the official. Quarantined school marms are told that they must either go into quarantine at their own expense, or take the prophylactic injection at the risk of their lives, or pay a substitute out of their small wages. But the \$500 a month for the absentee, resigned C. J. is all right, as far as the Minister of Finance and his Auditor-General are concerned, and the taxpayers say Bah!

The Rev. W. M. Kincaid is to be congratulated upon the manly and sensible tone of his lecture in Central Union Church last evening. He is not far wrong in premising that the Boer supporters of the United States are actuated by political and party reasons of a demagogical nature and he is certainly right in his judgment as summed up in the following paragraph:

"I do say, speaking from the Anglo-Saxon standpoint, that the contention of England is a righteous one; and I trust she wins in this struggle, as it seems certain she is going to win. England will not oppress the Boers, and certainly will not exercise the kind of oppressions by them over Englishmen. It will mean justice and enlightenment, because I believe from my heart that the Anglo-Saxon deal of government is nobler and better for the Boers in Africa. While I deeply deplore this war and long to see peace on honorable terms, yet I do pray for the speedy success of British arms. This is my view of the ethical problem in South Africa as I have been able to gauge the situation from what I have read."

The Hawaiian Relief Society acknowledges the receipt of a draft for \$100 from B. L. Banning, sent from San Francisco through J. A. Magoon, his attorney. A donation of \$5 from L. T. Kenake and \$20 from certain foreigners residing at Makaweli, Kawai.

**A Nuisance Stopped.**

Acting upon complaints from residents on Boretania street, Deputy Marshal Chillingworth made a successful raid on a gambling den located in a building owned by Mr. Shaw and specially objectionable to the Board of Health. Sixteen Japs and Chinese were caught and failing to settle the matter with a bribe they were taken to the Station House, and this morning fined \$3 each. The place has been a nuisance for some time to Messrs. Waity, Crane and others.

**A Serious Row.**

On Saturday, a nasty fight occurred on Queen street in which a negro and a white man took a prominent part. The result is that the negro who is badly done up and two other men are in custody and the white man lying at the Queen's Hospital with terribly slashed face. The men will appear in Court as soon as they are in a condition to do so, and serious charges will be entered against them.

**The Marshall Libel Case.**

The case of Mr. W. H. Marshall, Editor of the defunct Volcano, on Hebeas Corpus and attacking the constitutionality of his arrest as the laws did not define different degrees of libel, was on trial before justices Frear and Whiting and Circuit judge Perry this morning. Assistant Attorney General Dole appeared for the government and Mr. De Bolt for Mr. Marshall, the latter making a splendid argument. The case was taken under advisement.

**Another Case.**

Catherine Sullivan, aged 13 years, died at 9 o'clock on Saturday evening at her residence on Liliha near School street. After the autopsy the case was declared one of plague and the body was incinerated. The house is under guard and the residents have been placed in quarantine. It is stated that she was inoculated with the serum three hours before she died.

**O. P. S.**

They had a luau at the Merchant's Exchange yesterday. The goat was killed and there is no more "Boek" to be had. After the goat was finished and the rich spring of Book beer had run dry, Sealey Shaw looked at Sam Nowlein and the O. P. S. specially bottled for the Merchant's Exchange, was flowing and there is plenty of it. Sam Nowlein stated confidentially that O. P. S. does not necessarily form. "Oom Paul surrenders," but that the legend reads: "Oh! please somemore."

**CORRESPONDENCE.**

From Our Tongan Correspondent.

S. S. MOANA, March 29, 1900.

ED. THE INDEPENDENT:—

At 2 o'clock this afternoon we passed close to the Mariposa. Signals were displayed, after which we were informed that no stay would be made at Honolulu on account of the place not being free from the plague. The news caused a murmur of disappointment from the couple of hundred passengers on the ship. She carries an extra large number of passengers who are going to the French exposition, while others are leaving Sydney on account of the plague having a footing there.

The latest news from Tonga is the birth of a baby princess to Queen Lavinui. The royal salute was fired. Dr. McLennan was in attendance, his engagement with the Tongan Government having been renewed for another year.

Copra is coming in so rapidly that all sheds are full to bursting, large steamers and vessels carrying away hundreds of tons.

Basil Thompson left Apia on the 23d instant for Fiji, where a war vessel awaits him to carry him to Savage Island, where he will hoist the British flag, from there he will proceed to Tonga, where he expects to remain several months as some interesting developments may be expected later on, Aloha.

**Remembered.**

Ungrateful, as a rule are princes, but at times they remember those who served them in the days of trouble. It was a pleasing surprise to Mr. Andrew Brown, the superintendent of Water Works, and to Mr. M. R. Counter, the well-known jeweller to receive each a medal from the Canadian government in remembrance of their services in the Canadian militia in 1866 when a number of Fenians and the riff-raff of the United States army endeavored to invade Canada.

General Andrew Brown was 30 years younger then than he is now but he responded willingly to the call for volunteers and he cherishes his medal as a souvenir of an historical event. Mr. Counter served in the 39th battalion of the Fenwick Rifles of Ontario, and Brown belonged to the Montreal Sappers.

The medal sent to the gentlemen is of solid silver having a stamp of the Queen's picture on one side and one of the Canadian flag on the reverse. The clasp holding the medal and attached to a red and white silk badge bears the legend "Fenian Raid 1866."

**CONDENSED FOREIGN NEWS.**  
The Boers have been warned  
against wanton destruction of prop-  
erty.  
Sir Frederick Carrington is to  
command a Rhodesian force to pre-  
vent any Boer Trek from the Trans-  
vaal into British Territory to the  
north of Limpopo.  
George L. Watson will design Sir  
Thomas Lipton's new yacht, with  
which he will challenge for the next  
America's cup match. Captain Ed-  
ward Sycamore has been asked to  
be her skipper.  
MADISON, Wis., March 17.—Gen.  
Henry Harnden, commander of the  
Wisconsin department, Grand Army  
of the Republic, and who command-  
ed the Wisconsin troops that with a  
Michigan company captured Jeff  
Davis, died of pneumonia this even-  
ing.  
General Harnden was born in  
Massachusetts in 1823; roved the  
sea for several years; was in Califor-  
nia in 1838 and again a decade later;  
participated in the Mexican war;  
was several times wounded in the  
Civil War; captured Jeff Davis; was  
for ten years a revenue collector,  
and has lived in comfortable retire-  
ment ever since. A widow and four  
children survive him.  
VIENNA, March 17.—The official  
Wiener Zeitung to-morrow will an-  
nounce the betrothal of Princess  
Stephanie of Austria to Count Ele-  
mer Lonyay.  
Senator Morgan claims that the  
Puerto Ricans are entitled to full  
American citizenship.  
The U. S. State Department is in  
a quandary to devise means for the  
effective protection to the mission-  
aries at Shantung.  
Serious difficulties are apprehend-  
ed on account of the anti-foreign  
element in China, and the United  
States, Great Britain and other  
powers are sending their warships  
to China to enforce the open door  
policy and to protect the rights and  
interests of their citizens.  
The Senate measure will provide  
for the immediate laying of the  
cable line to Honolulu.  
The Sultan is reported to have

is not organized with the same dis-  
cipline as our own. I never wish to  
meet a braver General than Cronje  
and never served in a war where  
there was less vindictive feeling be-  
tween the two armies than in this  
one.

**Goebel's Murder.**  
The politics that leads to such a  
condition is something worse than  
filthy; it is a menace to the peace  
and safety of society; and the sooner  
the Democrats and Republics resolve  
their parties into their original ele-  
ments, and begin anew by paying  
due regard to law and order, the  
better it will be for their state.—
