SUPREMACY OF PARLIAMENT.

The supremacy of Parliament has not yet reached the zenith, even in England—the fatherland of representative government. Lately Mr. Henry Richard, M. P. for Merthyr-Tydvil, brought forward a motion condemning declaration of war, or completion of treaties, or annexation of foreign territory, without the previous sanction of Parliament. On a division being taken the motion was rejected by a majority of six. This was a close enough shave for privileges of the executive branch—privileges, it cannot be denied, which place enormous stakes in the hands of Ministers, in the intervals between parliamentary sessions. It is true, the Ministry must give an account of its doings in those intervals, on the earliest opportunity, to the representatives of the people. Yet, all the punishment that it is in the power of those representatives to impose upon the Ministry will avail nothing to repair any damage that may have been wrought to the nation in the meantime. Examples made of the executive by the popular branch of government, in such cases, can at the best be valuable only for their exemplary influence upon future Ministries. Such a beneficial effect may be very great, although in no way redemptory of the blunders and malfaisances that are past.

The subject, however, as it has come up in England, seems to involve more a question of popular privileges in the abstract, in the light of modern constitutional development, than the ultimate popular welfare. The reasoning upon it must be subordinated to the doctrine of the comparative infallibility of parliament, that, as representing the people, forms the final court of resort in responsible government. To discuss the relative merits of the executive and the legislative branches, as to which is the safer repository of the "greatest good of the greatest number," would be to open the floodgates of a controversy as profound as, and in some degree identical with, that which raged between Macaulay and the Utilitarians respecting the disposition and the capacity of absolute rulers to do either good or ill to their subjects. For it cannot be contended that parliament, the arm and mouth of the popular will, is infallible, any more than the people themselves. Parliament may do serious damage in acting upon proposed "declarations of war, or completion of treaties, or annexation of foreign territory." Still, if parliament is the incarnate popular will, it may be the right thing, according to the genius of the age, to recognize its supremacy to the full, or for itself to enforce such a recognition. The Ministry being, however, only a "committee of parliament" under the British system, the question resolves itself into one of utility. Can parliament afford to hamper its chief committee to the extent involved in the motion that so narrowly escaped passing into law in the House of Commons? England's parliament may be educated and trained to the point when it may safely assume to hold the executive in such absolute control.

There are other countries, certainly, with representative institutions, where parliament has a good deal to catch up with, in its undisputed functions, before being justified in going the length of the proposal just defeated in the British House of Commons. First of all, a parliament should be free and independent. It should honestly and disinterestedly represent the people.

This it cannot do if it admits salaried public servants, holding their positions wholly in the favor of the Ministry. It is impossible, either, for parliament to represent the true interests and the wisdom of the nation if elected by corrupted suffrages. Unless the election laws are framed on the principle that the buyer and seller of votes, together with the user of undue influence and him who submits to such, are criminals, therefore ineligible to have any voice in government, their participation in any election being sufficient to render it void—then the parliament resulting from the suffrages thus left liable to be bought, coerced, or stolen, cannot be recognized as being composed of the tribunes of the people. It is such a parliament as a nation would be better without, a despotic system being even preferable, for under the latter a spirited people would find it easier to effect a change if misgovernment became unbearable.

Another requisite to parliament, before it assumes all the privileges to which in an ideal state it might lay claim, is that it faithfully perform the functions already expected of it by the people. It should compel the fullest and most open scrutiny of the Ministry's administration of affairs; have no packed committees of deliberation or enquiry; take no excuse for withholding information except in the case of unfinished work, the details of which are not ready to be disclosed without danger to public interests. Upon a question of the latter sort, it is, of course, always competent for parliament to use its discretion as to the worthiness of the Ministry to hold such confidence.

There must be a pure and a faithful parliament before a supreme parliament can be aspired to. A nation that cannot achieve the former cannot expect to obtain the latter.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

It has been suggested that the continuation of Kaahumanu street from the upper end across to King street would be a wise measure, and would entail comparatively little outlay, because most of the land required for that purpose is in possession of the Government. One of the advantages of the suggested extension would be increased frontage to the Post Office.

A speech delivered before the sub-committee on Ways and Means, at Washington, in opposition to the reciprocity treaty, contains the following statement:—"Before this reciprocity treaty was granted it was a novelty, and almost a wonder, to find a Hawaiian begging. To-day you can count them on the streets." It was indeed a novelty to find a Hawaiian begging before the treaty, and has been and continues to be as great a novelty since the treaty. To a man at Washington it may be an easy thing to count in imagination scores of beggars in the streets of Honolulu, but to those who walk those streets daily beggars are invisible. Because why? Because they are not there.

THE steamer Likelike from Kahului this morning, the Lehua from Windward Ports, and the Iwalani from Kaula, bring news of good weather on their respective routes.

A MEETING of the Trustees of the Sailors' Home will be held next Wednesday, 28th instant, at 10 A. M. A full attendance is desirable, as business of importance will be transacted.

FROM May 1st the Oceanic Steamship Company will occupy Folsom street wharf, instead of Beale street wharf, at San Francisco, the business having grown beyond the accommodations of the present berth.

MESSRS. E. P. Adams & Co. to-day sold the premises on Pensacola street, belonging to the estate of the late J. M. Daigle, for \$1,800 to Mr. Manuel Andre. This is \$300 better for the widow than the sale disallowed by the Supreme Court.

POLICE COURT.

SATURDAY, April 24th.

Kekapa was given three months' residence on the reef, for stealing a bottle of wine from the Commercial Saloon.

John R. Silva and Kahiohio were tried for stealing a boat belonging to Kaanani, on the night of the fire. In defence they said they had taken the boat to carry a marine to one of the men-of-war, and were taking it back, both being drunk, when caught. They were remanded until Monday.

Four natives were arraigned for deserting contract service of the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company. It was proved that when caught they were searching for their effects lost at the fire, they having been burned out. Judge Bickerton thought the case was one for sympathy and not prosecution, and gave one of the men further time to gather his household goods. The others promised to return to work this afternoon, and all were discharged without costs.

FOREIGN NEWS.

(San Francisco, April 17th, per S. S. Mararoa.)

THE TREATY DOOMED IN THE HOUSE COMMITTEE.

On April 15th the House Committee on Ways and Means decided by a vote of nine to one to report favorably the resolution recommending the abrogation of the Hawaiian treaty. Messrs. Morrison, Mills, Hewitt, McMillin, Harris, Breckenridge of Arkansas, Maybury, Kelley and Hiscock voted in favor of the resolution, and Representative Breckenridge of Kentucky cast a negative vote.

Notwithstanding the adverse vote of the House committee, other news regarding the treaty, through private sources, is decidedly favorable. The Committee of Ways and Means is not the final arbiter of the destiny of either country. A decided advance in the price of sugar may be looked for.

ENGLAND.

Gladstone introduced his home rule bill into the Commons on the 8th, causing one of the greatest sensations of the century in parliament. Although the House of Commons does not meet until 4 o'clock in the afternoon, the members commenced crowding in at daylight in order to secure seats. Outside an immense crowd collected and cheered Gladstone wildly when he entered. He asked leave to bring in a bill for the government of Ireland and made a great speech, lasting four hours, in advocacy of it. G. O. Trevelyan then spoke against it and Parnell followed with a speech thanking Gladstone and endorsing the bill in its main features.

Justin McCarthy does not believe the bill will pass.

The reception of the Home Rule proposals has been generally unfavorable in England. In the provinces some of the Liberal papers support it, but in London they all oppose it. The chances favor Gladstone's defeat and the downfall of the Ministry.

Earl Shaftesbury committed suicide, while under mental depression, on April 13. He was riding in a cab through Regent street, when he shot himself several times with a revolver. He was 54 years of age and was the eighth Earl of Shaftesbury, succeeding October 1st, 1885, to the title, on the death of his father, the world-renowned philanthropist.

Mars was the god of war, but he couldn't compare in this respect with mars-in-law.—Burlington Free Press.


