



IN THE SUPREME COURT OF THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS—INTER-MEDIARY.

Before Mr. Justice McCully... Case for Illegal Impounding. C. B. Kanakani vs. Mani et al.

The principal defendant impounded certain animals running on the public roads of Ewa, by order of Mr. A. J. Campbell, the Chairman of the Road Board of that district.

The right to impound animals for trespass is altogether a statutory right and must follow the statute of the country.

Our statute, chapter 45 of the Acts of 1888, gives the right of impounding only to land owners. Section 9, "The owner of the animal shall pay the owner of the land" trespassed upon. Section 10 uses the expression, "The owner of such land." Section 11 speaks of "land owners," so Sections 12 and 13, and no other persons are designated.

There is a Legislative interpretation of the right to impound by the Act of 1891, found at page 56 of the Compiled Laws, by which the Governor of Oahu was authorized by the Statute of 1891 to cause all cattle trespassing on roads in the city of Honolulu to be impounded.

Looking through the powers and duties of the Minister of the Interior, I find nothing that authorizes him to impound animals for trespass upon the public property. The Statute constituting the Road Board gives them "entire charge and control of the public labor on all roads, bridges and public highways" within their respective districts, but it goes no further, it does not give them a general charge of the roads to keep them in any way, to keep them in order, it is a charge of the labor on the roads.

I find therefore that the act of impounding was illegal. It was done in good faith and with a good intention and a supposed legal authority on the part of the Chairman of the Road Board, and by the plaintiff was made a test case. There is no evidence to support the large judgment awarded by the District Court.

There were four animals impounded, and I award damages of one dollar per head, four dollars. I regret that there is no statutory authority for taking up animals on the roads of the Kingdom. John Kaneakua for plaintiff; Cecil Brown for defendant.

The motion to indefinitely postpone the bill abolishing barbed wire fences brought out the full planter vote. All the same the barbed wire fence is a barbarous institution.

Rep. Nawahi's reason for trying to abolish barbed wire fences is perhaps because a "nigger" cannot be concealed in a barbed wire fence. With the barbed wire fence in general use part of his occupation would be gone.

The Hilo and Hamakua Railway ought to be a safe line to travel over, when the "block system" has been adopted on it before it is built.

THE LEGISLATURE.

FIFTY-NINTH DAY.

WEDNESDAY, AUG. 20.

The House met at 10 o'clock.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Rep. Cummings presented a report of the committee on public lands and internal improvements upon several petitions. They find that certain water pipes at Honolulu can be laid without special legislation. A sea wall at Kawaioa is already provided for. The petition for a certain road on Maui is recommended to the Minister of Interior. An additional appropriation of \$2000 is recommended for Hawaii to permit of certain improvements in Hamakua.

Report referred to Minister of Interior. Rep. Lucas from the printing committee reported several bills printed.

Noble McCarthy presented the report of the select committee on claims of J. C. White. They find that his bill of \$300 for work on plans in connection with electric lights was approved by the Superintendent of Waterworks, but referred to Public Works, which latter sum was declined by petitioner. The committee consider that the work was worth \$500, and recommend that an item for that amount be inserted in the Appropriation Bill. With regard to petitioner's claim for work done on foundations of Palace electric light station, they find that while doing the work he was under pay from the Government and therefore is not entitled to the amount claimed.

Laid on the table to be considered with the bill. Noble McCarthy also read the report of the select committee on the petitions of J. F. Bowler. The report is as follows:

To the Hon. J. S. WALKER, President of the Legislature of 1890. Sir:--Your select committee to whom was referred petitions 221, 227, and 228 from J. F. Bowler, being for claims amounting to \$49,214.84, would report as follows:

We first took up petition 228 for work done on Palace electric light foundation, etc., and found the following facts, to wit:

That in the month of March, 1887, the then Minister of Interior, L. A. Ahoio, ordered Mr. Bowler to perform certain work on electric light foundation at Palace, also repairs to gas house in Palace yard. In pursuance of such order Mr. Bowler performed said work to the amount of \$1612.08. From evidence your committee believe that a good job was done at a reasonable price. That on or about June 30th, 1887, the said amount became due and payable, and shortly after said time Mr. Bowler presented his bill to the then Minister of Interior, L. A. Thurston, who refused to approve it, on the ground that there was no appropriation from which to pay it, and that the Palace did not belong to the Government but was the private property of His Majesty. Your committee find that the Palace is Government property and it appears as such in the schedule, Minister of Interior's report 1890, page 226. That there was an appropriation from which this bill could have been paid, namely, "Lighting City of Honolulu with electric light," for your committee have found that the late Minister of Interior, L. A. Thurston, approved the voucher 2638, which was for the cement used on this work, and gave his draft for same, and it was drawn from the above appropriation.

As regards petition 227 your committee found that in November, 1886, tenders were asked for, for certain work to be done on Palace wall. Tenders were received from J. F. Bowler, R. Lishman, and Honolulu Planing Mill, and Mr. Bowler being the lowest bidder the work was given to him. These tenders were for so much per square yard for cement wash and plastering; per lineal foot for coping and side wall; per post for concrete posts and for gates complete, the total amount to be received for the work to be determined on measurements to be made by the Superintendent of Public Works on its completion. After the completion of this work the Minister of Interior instructed the Superintendent of Public Works to measure the other walls for the same alterations as the Likelike street gates, which at the same rates as per paid for the former work would amount to \$7000. The job was given to Mr. Bowler on Feb. 1st, 1887, as per letter press copy book in the Interior Office, and he was to wait for payment till Feb. 1st, 1889, as the appropriation was nearly exhausted. The work was performed and was approved by the Minister of Interior, L. Ahoio, by the Superintendent of Public Works, Julius H. Smith. When the bill became due Mr. Bowler asked the then Minister of Interior, L. A. Thurston, to have an item inserted in the Appropriation Bill of 1888 which he refused.

As regards petition 221 your committee have found the following facts: That about April, 1887, there were on these islands a number of South Sea Island laborers whose contracts had expired and the Government at that time were being urged by the Foreign Diplomats to return said laborers to their homes. Mr. Bowler hearing that these peo-

ple were to be returned had a consultation with W. M. Gibson, Minister of Foreign Affairs, and L. Ahoio, Minister of Interior and President of Board of Immigration, with the result that Bowler purchased the bark Kalakaua for the purpose of returning said laborers, and fitted her up accordingly. On the 29th day of June, 1887, a written contract or charter party was signed by J. F. Bowler and C. H. Henderson (his captain), parties of the first part, and the President of Board of Immigration, L. Ahoio, party of the second part, by which said bark Kalakaua was chartered to return said laborers at \$30 per head. Mr. Bowler was also granted permission to recruit labor, a copy of such permission being on file in the Interior Office. Mr. Frank Godfrey was commissioned Government agent to see that such laborers were properly returned home. There being a change of administration about this time, Mr. Bowler was notified that the contract before mentioned had been cancelled and also that his permission to recruit had been revoked.

From testimony taken we find that there were between 350 and 400 of these people whose contracts had expired and who were ready to return to their homes. Also that the vessel could have recruited between 250 and 300 laborers, which at that time were paid for at the rate of \$105 per head and the estimated cost of recruiting would be about \$50 per head. We also find that the vessel was to take coal and supplies for the Kaimilos, which were to be landed at Apiaing, 250 tons at \$5 per ton. We find in copies of contracts on file in the Interior office that the Government was bound to guarantee these people their passage home if they desired it; also that at that time there was an appropriation of \$150,000 from which Mr. Bowler could have been paid.

In view of the foregoing your committee recommend that an item be inserted in the Appropriation Bill for the amount of \$34,839.84, as follows:

Table listing expenses: Passage of 330 laborers at \$30 each, 9900.00; 250 tons freight to Apiaing at \$5, 1250.00; 250 recruits at \$105-\$26, 6500.00; 250, less cost of recruiting at \$50 per head, 12500.00; \$12,500; Repairs to Palace wall, 7000.00; Interest on same from Feb. 1, 1889, to June 30, 1890, 892.50; Foundation electric light, etc., 1612.08; Interest on same, 3 years at 9 percent, 435.26; Total, \$34,839.84.

Respectfully submitted, C. J. MCCARTHY, C. O. BERGER, SAMUEL PARKER, JOS. NAWAHI, A. ROSA.

Laid on the table to be considered with the Appropriation Bill.

Rep. Kalua read a first time his bill to continue the subsidy for mails between the Hawaiian Islands and San Francisco. Rules suspended and bill read a second time by title, and Rep. Kalua moved it pass to engrossment.

Minister Brown objected to bills appropriating large sums being rushed through, and moved the bill be referred to the finance committee.

Noble Baldwin thought it was a simple bill on which there would be no disagreement, and he would favor the motion to pass it now.

Noble J. M. Horner supported the motion of the Minister of Finance. When the subsidy bill passed a few years ago, it was hinted that perhaps the company would soon be able to do without the subsidy. Possibly, that was the case now. So far as he knew the company had not asked for a subsidy. The House should wait to see if the United States Subsidy Bill passed, in which case the company would not need our subsidy.

Noble Burchart thought a condition should be imposed that the steamer should get in at daylight instead of noon, so that the mails could be despatched for the other islands in good season.

Noble Phillips called attention to the fact that the bill provided \$1500 a month not for one but for two steamers, which was \$3000, or \$72,000 for the period instead of \$48,000 as members might suppose. There was no necessity for this rush, as the item passed in the Appropriation Bill was enough without this bill.

Noble Iseberg could not see the necessity for haste. He moved the bill be referred to the Cabinet.

Rep. Brown favored reference to the finance committee. The statement of Noble Phillips was perfectly correct. He did not know what the bill was till he sent for it to the Clerk's table. Also there was another line asking for a subsidy, and besides the Tahiti line. They ought to look into these things carefully. He would vote to give the Oceanic Steamship Co. the preference over all others, from having had dealings with them and from their having interests here.

Noble Widemann thought the objectors were mistaken, but would second the motion for reference to finance committee.

Minister Brown said it wasn't as if any hardship was being done to anybody. The company were getting their subsidy every month.

Noble Baldwin thought that out of consideration for the feelings of hon. members the bill might be

committed, but it was exactly the same as the old one. So long as only one steamer was running the subsidy would not be payable for two.

Rep. Paeleole moved for a select committee. Rep. Bush favored passing the bill now. Denying that the bill called for \$72,000, if the community found two round trips a necessity, the bill would enable the Government to provide for the additional service. They were not obliged to pay the money without a contract anyway.

Rep. Kalua said the bill was the same as the old law. The company could not get any more money than the Legislature appropriated.

Rep. Brown said that in 1886 the Legislature passed a bill under which \$72,000 was drawn. This bill if passed would be a contract and if this session did not appropriate the money, and two steamers were put on, there would be a claim for the balance in 1892. He was not against the company, which paid out for labor in this city the last two years over \$16,000. The subsidy simply amounts to paying the company the amount they expend loading and unloading the steamers here.

Referred to special committee. Noble Corwell read a first time his bill to prohibit the keeping and breeding of rabbits.

Noble J. M. Horner gave notice of a bill to provide that the expenses of the Honolulu Fire Department shall be borne by the property owners whose property is protected by such department.

Rep. Cummings gave notice of bills to encourage, respectively, the cultivation of tobacco, the cultivation of coffee, the manufacture of taro flour, the cultivation of ramie, the industry of fruit drying.

Noble Pua read a first time his bill to provide for a Police Justice for Molokai.

Rep. Kalua gave notice of a bill to authorize a national loan.

The President appointed, as the special committee on the Oceanic Steamship Co. bill, Paeleole, Baldwin, Marques, Huid, Marsden.

Recess from 11:50 to 1:30.

FOREIGN NEWS.

Judge Coffey has decided that Florence Blythe is the heir of Thos. H. Blythe's four million dollar estate in San Francisco.

Trouble is reported in the Samoan villages. Foreigners think the three Powers ought to establish a proper government.

The revolution at Buenos Ayres suddenly collapsed by the failure of the insurgents' ammunition after they had carried things their own way several days.

The United States Senate is still discussing the tariff. A tableware manufacturer of Findlay, Ohio, says his establishment, with that of every glass concern in the United States, has been sold to an English syndicate. The price paid averages \$100,000 per factory, or \$3,300,000, as there are thirty-three factories in the country. The price of tableware is to be advanced as soon as the syndicate assumes control.

The revolt at the capital of San Salvador has been suppressed. General Rivas was captured and shot. Hundreds of people had been killed in the streets. Guatemala has withdrawn her forces from the frontier and all is quiet.

Cholera is spreading at Mecca. There were 81 deaths in one day.

General Fremont's will executed Aug. 19, 1854, has been discovered in New York. The estate all goes to the widow.

Emperor William has left for a visit to England.

The liquidator of the Panama Canal Co. finds it possible with economy to realize 300,000,000 francs.

The Grenadier Guards have been recalled and, it is said, will go to Halifax.

Sir James Ferguson, Secretary of the Foreign Office, in the Commons, confirmed the reports that the British African Land Company's steamer James Stevenson had been seized by an officer of the Portuguese navy. He stated that the British Minister at Lisbon had been instructed to remonstrate with Portugal against the seizure, and to demand the punishment of those who seized the steamer.

Count Luof Tolstol's book, "Kreutzer Sonata," has been forbidden circulation in the United States mails, on the opinion of Assistant Attorney-General Tyner "that it is of an indecent character."

A more friendly feeling is said to be growing toward Mr. Blaine's scheme in the Senate. In the House, however, the Republican members of the committee on ways and means will not listen for a moment to any plan which interferes with the popular political programme of free sugar.



THE LEGISLATURE.

FIFTY-EIGHTH DAY.

TUESDAY, AUG. 19.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The House resumed at 1:35. Third reading of bill to regulate the drawing of talesmen in jury trials.

The bill passed on motion of Minister Peterson and is as follows:

Section 1. Whenever a sufficient number of jurors regularly summoned do not appear, or cannot be obtained, to form a jury in any case, civil or criminal, the Court may order the Marshal to summon talesmen. Two talesmen may be summoned from among the bystanders if no objection is made by any party to the cause. If more than two talesmen should be required, or if objection be made to summoning any bystander, the Clerk shall draw such number of names as may be required from a box containing all the remaining names of the fifty last semi-annually selected as jurors by the Clerk in concert with some Judge as provided in Section 1 of Chapter XVII, Laws of 1870. Whenever said list shall be exhausted before proceeding with the trial of the cause before the Court, a new list of fifty names shall be prepared in the manner provided in Section 1 of Chapter XVII, Laws of 1870, and such talesmen as may be required shall be drawn by the Clerk from such list. And new lists of fifty names shall be prepared from time to time as may be required. The persons whose names are so drawn shall be forthwith summoned to appear as jurors in the cause on trial.

Section 2. All laws and parts of laws inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This Act shall take effect from and after the date of its approval.

Third reading of bill to repeal the law relating to the shipping of Hawaiian seamen.

The bill passed. It does away with all the restrictions heretofore existing against the shipping of Hawaiian seamen on foreign vessels.

Third reading of bill to prevent the counterfeiting of foreign postage stamps.

Passed, on motion of Rep. White.

Third reading of bill to change the fire limits of Honolulu.

Minister Peterson asked if this was the bill that the committee reported with their amendments.

Rep. Lucas said it was, and moved the bill pass. Carried.

Second reading of bill to encourage railways on the Island of Hawaii.

Minister Peterson moved the bill be deferred till the Oahu Railway bill is under consideration. Carried.

The bill relating to lodging houses was deferred owing to the absence of the introducer, Noble Phillips.

Second reading of bill to prohibit barbed wire fences.

Minister Peterson moved the bill be referred to the committee on public lands.

Noble Marsden moved it be indefinitely postponed.

Referred to committee.

Second reading of bill to amend Sec. 65, Civil Code, as amended in 1882, relating to auction licenses. (Introduced by Minister Spencer.)

Rep. R. W. Wilcox moved the bill pass.

Minister Peterson was in favor of the bill, but doubted if the provision was not too sweeping, which said "that no holder of a retail license shall be entitled to a license to sell at public auction." He moved, therefore, that the bill be referred to the commerce committee. Carried.

Second reading of bill to provide for the quieting of titles, estates, and interests in real property. (Introduced by Noble Cornwell.)

Considered with majority and minority reports of judiciary committee, respectively, for and against its passage.

Noble Cornwell held that this bill would be a very useful law. Similar laws existed in almost every other civilized country. He could say that it had nothing to do with any present interest of his own. It was a hardship that the holder of property should be impeded by claimants to the title without any means of bringing the matter to a judicial test. A claimant might wait to just short of twenty years and then bring a suit. He moved the bill pass, to be read a third time Thursday.

Rep. Nawahi repeated the argument of his minority report against the bill. It would encourage persons without title to make vexatious claims, and, if defeated in one division of the Court, he might renew his claim in probate.

Noble Crabbe favored the passage of the bill. His title had been assailed in one case and he only won after incurring costs of a thousand dollars. He did not think the bill would prejudice the interests of natives.

Rep. Kalua supported the majority report of the committee signed by him. The provisions of the bill were different from those governing a suit in ejectment. If a man's estate was claimed by another, under the proposed law, the first could compel the second to come into court and prove his claim. This provision would be for the benefit of everybody.

Rep. Rosa thought the hon. member for Hilo was laboring under a misapprehension of the object of this bill. If a probate court designated the heir of a certain estate, that did not prevent another party bringing in a claim against the heir. The proceedings would not bind any person not served with a process.

Minister Peterson favored the passage of the bill.

The bill passed, and is as follows:

Section 1. Action may be brought in the Supreme Court or in any of the Circuit Courts by any person against another person, who claims adversely to the plaintiff an estate or interest in real property for the purpose of determining such adverse claim.

Section 2. Any person may be made a defendant in such action who has or claims an interest in the property adverse to the plaintiff, or who is a necessary party to a complete determination or settlement of the question involved therein.

Section 3. If at the time of the commencement of such action the property in question is in the possession of a tenant, the landlord may be joined as a party defendant.

Section 4. If in such action the defendant disclaim in his answers any interest or estate in the property or suffer judgment to be taken against him without answer, the plaintiff shall not recover costs.

Section 5. This Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

Second reading of bill relating to licenses issued by the Interior Department. (Introduced by Minister Spencer.)

Minister Brown moved the bill pass. It was so plain as to require no explanation.

Rep. Nawahi objected that some evil-disposed person might tear down the license when exposed as required.

Rep. Kalua approved of the bill.

The bill passed, to be read a third time Thursday. It reads as follows:

Section 1. From and after the passage of this Act, all persons holding license from the Interior Department for any class or kind of business shall keep said license exposed to view in some prominent place, convenient for inspection, on the premises for which the same is granted. Any failure to comply with the requirements of this Section shall, upon complaint to the nearest Police or District Justice, subject the party or firm, under whose name the license is held, to a fine of not less than \$10, or more than \$50.

Section 2. If any person or persons holding a license from the Interior Department shall close out, transfer or assign the business for which said license is held during the term for which the same was issued they shall within thirty days from the date of such closing out, transfer or assignment, notify the Minister of the Interior of such fact in writing, and return said license to the Interior Office for cancellation under a penalty of \$100 upon complaint to any Police or District Justice.

Section 3. All licenses issued by the Interior Department shall be signed by the Minister of the Interior or his Chief Clerk, and impressed with the seal of the Department.

Section 4. This Act shall become a law on the date of its approval, and all laws or parts of laws inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Second reading of bill relating to cake peddling.

The bill passed as follows, to be read a third time Thursday:

Section 1. That Section 2 of an Act entitled "An Act to prohibit the peddling and hawking for sale of cakes of every description in this Kingdom without a license" approved July 13th, A. D. 1874, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 2. The Minister of the Interior may issue a license to any one applying in writing for the same for the peddling and hawking of cakes on any one of the Hawaiian Islands for one year; provided that the applicant shall be a resident of the Island for which he applies to be licensed and provided also that the application shall be accompanied by the written recommendation of the Sheriff of the Island for which the license is required. The fee for each license shall be the sum of \$25.

Section 2. This Act shall become a law on the date of its approval.

Second reading of bill to provide for the more efficient medical and sanitary administration of the public institutions of the kingdom. (Introduced by Minister Peterson.)

Read a second time by title and on motion of the introducer, referred to the sanitary committee.

Second reading of bill to enable trials of cases to be proceeded with in the Supreme Court in addition to the trials regularly holden before the Justice presiding at the term.

Rep. Kalua moved the bill pass, and, after remarking on its merits, moved the previous question, which carried.

The bill passed, to be read a third time Thursday, and is fully explained by its title.

Second reading of bill granting a franchise to the Hawaiian Gas Co. Deferred on account of absence of the introducer, Rep. Brown.

Second reading of bill to encourage the establishment of steam communication between Tahiti and the Hawaiian Islands.

Read a second time by title and referred to select committee on corresponding item in Appropriation Bill.

Second reading of bill relating to marriage and divorce. (Introduced by Rep. White.)

Read a second time by title and referred to the judiciary committee.

Second reading of bill to regulate the importation, sale, and use of opium and preparations thereof, in the islands of Hawaii, Maui, and Oahu of this kingdom. (Introduced by Rep. Lucas.)

Read a second time by title and referred to the select committee on opium.

Second reading of bill relating to the sale of salmon. (Introduced by Rep. Waipulani.)

Read a second time by title.

Rep. Kalua moved the bill be laid on the table. At present anyone could sell all the salmon he pleased on paying a license of \$20.

Rep. Waipulani moved the bill pass to engrossment.

Rep. Kalua changed his motion to one of indefinite postponement. (Both members speaking together the president raps for order.)

Rep. Kalua said the bill came in first and the petitions afterward, showing that the introducer had written to his constituents to get their backing for his bill.

Minister Brown said that after the amount of money voted thus far he did not wish to see the taxes further reduced. The salmon licenses yielded \$270 a year, and this bill proposed to reduce the amount one-half. The \$135 saved would not amount to much for each seller of salmon in the kingdom.

Rep. Nawahi thought if the people of Kona were given much salt salmon, with the scarcity of water in that region it would cause much distress among the people. (Laughter.)

Rep. Waipulani thought it hard that a general dealer, who could sell everything from a needle to an anchor, had only to pay \$50 for a license, while the salmon dealer had to pay \$20 for selling his single article. (More laughter, to which a Chinese auditor contributes an unmistakable smile.)

Noble W. Y. Horner criticized the slur and ridicule to which the hon. member had been subjected. The hon. member was doubtless honest in his motive and the speaker was quite aware that he was pleading for some poor Hawaiians, to whom \$10 was quite a large sum. He seconded the motion to pass the bill.

The eyes and noses were called on the indefinite postponement of the bill as follows:

Ayes—Ministers Brown, Peterson; Nobles Widemann, Muller, McCarthy, Kauhane, Hani, Burchard, Anderson; Reys, Baker, Kanealii, Kalua—12.

Noes—Nobles Berger, Pua, Crabbe, J. M. Horner, Marsden, W. Y. Horner, Kanoa; Reys, Cummings, Margies, Lucas, R. W. Wilcox, Rosa, Bush, Kaahi, Nawahi, A. Horner, Waipulani, Apiki, White, Halstead, Kamai, Rice, A. S. Wilcox—23.

The bill passed, to be read a third time Thursday.

A motion to adjourn was postponed to allow notices of committee meetings to be given. The President called attention to the large number of select committees out.

Noble Widemann presented the report of special committee on items of the Government Survey, recommending \$56,900 to be appropriated as follows:

Office expenses, instruments, etc.....1,840
Meteorology.....500

Committee make several recommendations in matters of detail.

Laid on table to be considered with the Appropriation Bill.

The House adjourned at 4 o'clock.
