## THEY SAW A WATERSPOUT

WARRIMOO PASSENGERS SEE A RARE WONDER.

The Canadian-Australian Mail Steamer Arrives One Day Late Due to the Heavy Head Seas.

The passengers on the steamship Warrimoo on the way from Sydney were treated to a sight of one of the rare wonders of the sea, a waterspout. It was seen a distance of a mile or so last Monday in Latitude 8 North, Longitude 165 degrees 30 minutes west. It was visible for some time and called everybody on deck to see it.

The Warrimoo came up to the Oenac wharf just before 1 o'clock this afternoon, about one day behind her schedule time. This was due to the strong headwinds throughout much of the voyage and particularly strong the last twenty-four hours. So far as the passengers were concerned it was a very pleasant trip.

A couple of slight accidents gave piquancy to the entry in harbor. The custom house boat in coming alongside to put the customs officers aboard fouled on the line of the steam launch which was also alongside and came within an ace of capsizing. Boatman John Mahuka came to the rescue and took the customs officers aboard. The second accident was the snapping of the bowline when it was made fast to the wharf.

Purser Bellmaine gives the following itinerary of the trip:

Cleared Sydney Heads at 2:10 p. m. September 19th; experienced moderate to strong W. S. W. to N. W. winds with fine weather to Wellington, which was reached at 12:50 p. m. September 14th; left again at 5 p. m. following day; experienced unsettled weather and headseas to Suva, at 3 p. m. September 20th.

Proceeded on voyage at 8 o'clock next morning; cleared the Fiji group at 9:30 p. m. same day, and passed Alofa Island at 10 a. m. next day. Crossed the equator on the afternoon of September 24th. Unsteady trade winds, variable in force, and well to the eastward were experienced between Suva and Honolulu.

Passed the R. M. S. Aorangi at 10 a. m. September 19th south of Portland Island, N. Z. Bark County of Merianeth of Liverpool was spoken in Latitude 34 degrees 5 minutes south, Longitude 178 degrees 57 minutes east, reported all well.

### WARRIMOO FREIGHT.

The Warrimoo brought 48 tons of merchandise for Honolulu, and carries 1,100 tons of through freight.

## THE CAPTAIN ON THE STAND

COLUMBIA LIBEL SUIT IS STILL DRAGGING ALONG.

Some Cases Appealed From Judge Wilcox's District Court—Matters of Probate and Guardianship.

The Colegrove libel suit for \$15,000 damages for breach of contract against the steamship City of Columbia still drags slowly along in Judge Perry's court. Captain Milnor was again on the stand this morning and was questioned particularly about Colegrove and his antecedents. The testimony has been so voluminous in this case that it is likely some of the other suits will be submitted on the testimony taken in this. The Rose Berliner libel will likely be submitted on the testimony taken in the criminal case against Captain Milnor.

The case of Sam Kalua vs. D. G. Camarinos, decided in the district court has been appealed to the supreme court, on points of law. The plaintiff sued for \$150 for damages sustained in being knocked down by a horse and wagon driven by a Japanese in the employ of the defendant, the plaintiff at the time riding a bicycle. Judge Wilcox dismissed the case, holding that the defendant's ownership of the horse and wagon was merely that of administrator of his brother's estate, he could not be held personally liable.

An appeal from the same court has also been taken to the supreme court in the case of Kaumakaoe Lazarus vs. Joseph O. Carter, for the recovery of certain jewelry valued at \$250 and \$50 damages for the detention of the same. The defendant interposed a plea in bar to the effect that he held possession of the property as administrator of the estate of Eleazar Lazarus, who originally owned the property. The plea was allowed by the lower court and the case dismissed, from which decision the case is now appealed.

In the assumpsit suit of M. A. Reis vs. A. F. Franca, the defendant files a general denial. The same cause has been pursued in the assumpsit suit of Nakakubane vs. S. W. Kalekiki, administrator of the estate of Lilia N. Hanala, deceased.

In the matter of the guardianship of S. L. Kekumano, Jr., a minor, the guardian files an inventory showing the estate to consist of a one-third undivided interest in three pieces of real property, one being situated in Honolulu and the others on Molokai.

### STOCK EXCHANGE.

Considerable Activity is Shown in Several Stocks.

The sales on the Stock Exchange today were 10 shares of American Sugar at 110 and 10 shares of Oahu assessable at 135.

Between board sales reported were 21 shares of Oahu assessable, at 135; 10 shares of Paia, at 225, and 6 shares of American Sugar, at 110. Bids were made of 105 for American Sugar, 135 for Oahu assessable, 230 for Pacific Sugar Mill and 105 for Wilder steamship.

Asking prices were: Brewer & Co., 250; American Sugar, 110; Ewa, 240; Hamoa, 105; Hawaiian Agricultural, 400; Hawaiian Sugar, 170; Honomu, 325; Honokaa, 350; Kahuku, 140; Kipahulu, 120; Oahu assessable, 136; Oahu paid up 152 1/2; Ookala, 100; Olowalu, 125; Pacific Sugar, 250; Paia, 250; Pepeekeo, 210; Pioneer, 390; Waimanalo, 197 1/2; Hawaiian Electric, 250.

Dividends payable September 30th were announced of 5 per cent on Hawaiian Sugar, Olowalu and Waimanalo, and 3 per cent on Wilder Steamship and Inter Island Navigation.

### A MOSAIC PORTRAIT.

At Pompeii a mosaic life size portrait of a woman, the first antique portrait in mosaic ever discovered, has been found near the house of the Vettii. The workmanship is so fine that it is difficult to discern that it is not a painting.

### THE RAINFALL.

The rainfall this month seems to have had the peculiarity of dropping in spots. At Frank Brown's place on Tuesday, .17 of an inch was registered, while in town fully half an inch fell. Yesterday Mr. Brown's gauge showed a fall of .96 and this morning of .02. The total for the month as shown by this particular gauge is .47 of an inch.

## RETIRE FROM THE BANK

P. C. JONES LEAVES THE BANK OF HAWAII TOMORROW.

Will Also Retire from the Presidency of Brewer & Co., at the Annual Meeting—Parker Ranch Affairs.

Hon. P. C. Jones retires from the position of president of the Bank of Hawaii tomorrow and in a short time expects to retire from active business entirely. He will be succeeded, as has already been announced by Charles M. Cooke, who is expected to arrive on the Australia on Saturday. Speaking of the matter this morning, Mr. Jones said:

"I am glad the time has come that I can be relieved from business cares. After tomorrow I shall have no more to do with the management of the Bank of Hawaii and at the coming annual meeting of the stockholders of Brewer & Co., I shall retire from all participation in the affairs of that corporation. I am still one of the trustees of the Parker estate and expect to continue as such until its affairs are placed on a sound financial basis. This will give me occupation for a year or two yet and after that I shall keep out of business entirely. You may be sure I am getting out of business when I tell you that I was not present at the meeting of the Planters' Association yesterday, and don't even know what they did."

### HILO CHINESE.

Leaving Plantations on Hawaii for Those on This Island.

Eight Chinese laborers, whose terms of service on a Hilo plantation expired a few days ago, refused offers to re-engage at \$12.50 per month and came to this city on the last Kinai. They at once contracted on one of the other plantations on this island at \$15 and \$16 per month. This example will likely be followed until the plantations on the big island offer equal inducements to those on this.

### UNDERWRITERS.

The Board of Underwriters are in session this afternoon at the Chamber of Commerce. The meeting was called for 2 o'clock. One of the special matters being considered is the rating for Hilo, the rainy city now being under the jurisdiction of the board.

Some alleged inequalities of rating in Honolulu are also being considered.

### A COSTLY SHIP.

The new French battleship Suffren of 11,870 tons is to be fitted with 20 Nielaue water tube boilers to develop 16,500 horse power. The total cost of the ship, including armament, is estimated at \$5,591,755. The Marceau, built in 1887, is also to have a set of the same type of boilers. The Belleville boiler is gaining in popularity in Great Britain, but the Nielaue is now almost entirely displacing the Belleville in the French navy.

### GERMAN SHIPYARDS.

There is great activity in the shipyards at Kiel, Stettin, Elbing and at Hamburg. Among the orders placed by the government are six large torpedo boat destroyers of thirty-three knots speed to be ready for service early next year. Orders have also been received from Russia, Spain, Brazil and Argentine.

### BOARD OF HEALTH.

Proceedings of the Board of Health meeting yesterday were of little interest. The report of Food Commissioner Johnstone on coffee adulterations was read. Sheriff Andrews of Hawaii accepted the position of business agent of the Hilo hospital, but his application for a special clerk to do the work was refused. The application of Norman Watkins for the position of milk inspector was not acted on.

### MISSION CHILDREN.

The members of the Hawaiian Mission Children's Society are requested to bear in mind that the postponed meet of August is to be held Friday, September 30th, at the residence of W. W. Hall, Nuuanu. An interesting meeting is promised. Mrs. McCully-Higgins and Philip Weaver will read original papers. The annual reports will be distributed.

## MANUFACTURE OF SWIPES

HOW AND WHAT IT IS MADE FROM.

Ingredients of the Extra Brew which Knocked Out the Soldiers—Chance for Uncle Sam's Revenue Men.

The manufacture of swipes is an industry that is on the increase in spite of the efforts of the police to stop it. Until a few months ago the stuff was a comparatively harmless drink, containing a very low percentage of alcohol. Now it is different, very different in some instances.

Swipes is the name given to a native beer which is made in various ways. A quantity of potatoes are prepared just as a housewife would make yeast and put into a barrel of fresh water. To this is added hops, either put directly into the potato mixture or first bottled, and a little sugar added. In one or two days the mixture commences to ferment, and when that process is fully on the stuff is ready to drink. It is then strained into another barrel and sometimes it is bottled, but owing to the danger of bursting the bottles this is not often done, but the swipes is sold by the gallon instead. This was the stuff sold as swipes up to a few months ago before the soldiers commenced coming. It contained from 3 to 7 per cent of alcohol and beyond the alcohol nothing deleterious.

Now it is different. The quantity of alcohol in the samples of swipes captured lately and analyzed by the police has suddenly run up to 12 and 15 per cent and in one or two instances still higher. It has also been found that articles deleterious to human health are being used to make the swipes stronger or rather to fortify it so that it will take a stronger hold on its victim. A common practice now is to add a plug of navy tobacco to each barrel. The plug is thrown in whole but gradually dissolves in the swipes. Another dodge is to add a quart bottle of washing ammonia to each barrel. The ammonia is a powerful stimulant when taken internally, and it causes a burning sensation to the mouth and throat similar to that produced by raw spirits.

But this is not all. The police have known for some weeks past that another and more powerful agent is being used, and within the last few days have obtained positive proof of it. This is methylated spirits, which can be obtained at any drugstore. In a recent raid at Manoa Valley the police captured the entire outfit of a swipes joint, including a gallon demijohn nearly fully of methylated spirit, and subsequent observations have led to the discovery that this spirit is now being used to mix with the swipes, even if it is not retailed out by the drink.

Methylated spirits is nine parts of grain alcohol and one part of wood alcohol. It first came into use in England, where the government in an endeavor to stop the sale of pure alcohol as a drink, allowed it to be sold with the addition of 10 per cent of wood alcohol for mechanical purposes, varnishes, etc. It was supposed that the poisonous effects of wood alcohol would prevent its being drunk. It has to a certain extent, but men will drink it when they can get nothing else. Wood alcohol or pyroxylic spirit, formerly known as naphtha, is a violent narcotic sedative poison. Its effects are peculiar in that they are lasting, several days being required to recover from its effects. It is this stuff that soldiers are now drinking when they think they are getting a harmless swig of homemade beer brewed on the sly. It is no wonder that after a few drinks at Hawaiian swipes they wander around in a semi-diotic and dazed state out of which they emerge with no recollection whatever of where they have been or what they have been doing.

There is one consolation the police have in this matter. In a few months they will have the assistance of Uncle Sam's revenue sleuths in putting a stop to illicit liquor making in the Islands, and it will not be long before the manufacture of swipes will become one of the lost arts.

### SEA FULL OF HOLES.

Captain Thompson of the Mikahala says his steamer experienced most unusual seas last night on her return from Kauai. He describes the sea as being "full of holes" as though it were being acted on by cross currents or cross winds. It was such a sea, he says, as is met with on the coast of Australia. The wind was about east by north, considerably farther east than the usual direction of the trade winds. The result was a slower trip and an unusually unpleasant one.

## PROPOSED CAMP CHANGE.

CAMPS OTIS AND MCKINLEY MAY BE ABANDONED.

The Site Near Moanalua, Which General Merriam Thought so Highly of will Probably Soon be Occupied.

There is a possibility that Camp McKinley may soon be abandoned and the Honolulu garrison moved into camp near Moanalua on the site which has been seriously considered for the location of the permanent post and barracks. Nothing definite has been decided about it yet and will not be until after the Australia arrives.

But the unsuitability of the race track for a camp is recognized and the necessity for getting the soldiers away from it before the rains begin is considered imperative.

If the proposed site of the permanent post meets the approval of the war department the change to that location will be made and probably very soon.

Captain Freeman of the volunteer engineers is enthusiastic in his project of taking his company, Company M, on a military tour of the Island, Monday, accompanied by E. C. Aldrich, an orderly, and another officer of the company, he made a reconnaissance of a part of the proposed route. He went up Nuuanu valley, over the Pali and around by Waimanalo. At Waimanalo he met Lieutenant Mills, who had gone around the other end of the Island on a similar mission.

A place near the electric light reservoir was considered a suitable place for one night's camp, and a place near Waimanalo as another. Both wood and water can be secured at both places.

A similar reconnaissance will be made starting from the Pali in the other direction.

The purpose of the proposed outing is partly military, as giving a practice march, and partly as an outing for recreation, giving the members of the company an opportunity to see more of the Island.

### MINISTER DAMON.

Minister Damon, who has been confined to his house with a severe cold, was much better today, but hardly able to go to the government building.

### THE CABINET.

The meeting of the Executive Council this morning was of an informal nature. A number of matters were under discussion, but owing to the absence of Minister Damon did not advance beyond the talking stage.

### VICTORIA PASSENGERS.

### RAPID TRANSIT.

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the Rapid Transit Company is called for this afternoon. It is anticipated that the first 10 per cent assessment on the stock will be called very shortly.

### CHOLERA IN JAPAN.

The report of Dr. Rokaku, sanitary inspector of the Hawaiian government at Yokohama, shows that cholera has again made its appearance in Japan. From August 17th to September 12th there were seven cases in Tokio and four in Yokohama and vicinity.

**HIS CHECKS THROWN OUT**

CHARLES ALBRECHT IN SANTA ROSCA JAIL.

Married Miss Marshall, Formerly Governess in the Family of Francis M. Hatch—Claims He Deceived Her.

SANTA ROSA, September 7.—Chas. Albrecht, who claims to be an architect residing at the Golden West hotel in San Francisco, is in jail here pending an investigation into some transactions that have a decidedly shady look.

Albrecht was married at 430 on Tuesday afternoon at the home of Officer Herman Hankel, to Miss Mary Marshall, daughter of M. V. Marshall, a well to do farmer residing near Fulton. On Monday Albrecht, accompanied by his bride-to-be, visited many of the stores and purchased a trousseau for the young lady. To Brooks & Loomis, dry goods merchants, he gave a check for \$10, drawn on the First National Bank of San Francisco.

This afternoon that firm became suspicious and wired the bank about the check. A reply was received saying that Albrecht's name did not appear on the bank's books. Steps at once were taken to arrest Albrecht, who was found at the home of his wife. He was brought to this city, and locked up. When seen at the jail Albrecht protested his innocence and declared that tomorrow, as soon as he could communicate with his friends, everything would be fixed.

Albrecht met Miss Marshall when she was a governess in the family of Francis M. Hatch, ex-Hawaiian Minister to the United States. The young bride is prostrated with grief over the arrest of her recently acquired husband, though at their parting when Albrecht was arrested she accused him of having deceived her and declared she never wanted to see him again.

Albrecht has several other bills to settle. His father in law paid his dressmaker's bill of \$10.50, but declined to settle others when they began to roll in upon him. The groom forgot to pay the minister who officiated at the wedding and told numerous and conflicting stories about the non-arrival of trunks, money and other necessary adjuncts to a wedding day. He stoutly asserted tonight in his cell at the jail that his account at the San Francisco bank is much larger than the amount of the checks drawn since coming to Santa Rosa.

The retirement of P. C. Jones from active business life is a thing of note in the community. For over forty years has Mr. Jones worked in our midst, and has raised himself to one of the most prominent positions in our commercial community. His name has always been synonymous with business integrity, and as wealth has come to him he has taken care to help in all charitable and philanthropic objects. But Mr. Jones while retiring will ever have the welfare of Hawaii dear to his heart and all his friends hope that he will for many years to come take an active interest in it, even though he is no longer active in business. May he enjoy thoroughly his well earned rest.

The Morning Grandmother has discarded her venerable garb and has once again donned the cap and bells. This elderly capering is very melancholy, but to the good Royalist it brings back a reminiscence of the King's Jester, and therefore the good Royalist is undoubtedly happy. This was the wit that used to scintillate about the throne, and flash refulgent in the boat house. One must confess that a column of it somewhat palls upon the Republican palate. But the editor of the Advertiser really becomes egotistical when he nominates himself for governor and desires to run two of his relatives for Secretary and Attorney General.

**THE SUGAR WAR.**

The sugar trade war which has been threatening for two years past, has actually begun. The contending parties against the Trust are the Arbuckles of Brooklyn, who have just completed their refinery, and Messrs. Doscher, also of Brooklyn, who have gone into business again after having been bought up by the Sugar Trust. The Arbuckle refinery is supplied with the very newest machinery and has a capacity of 3,000 barrels a day, but has commenced by putting out 1,000 barrels. The Doscher refinery will have a capacity of 5,000 barrels a day. At present, according to trade papers, these two refineries are not working in unison, but if the "sugar war" is continued, they undoubtedly will combine.

Naturally we, as a sugar producing country, are interested in the coming struggle, for it will have a distinct influence upon sugar prices throughout the continent. The state of the case is this: The American Sugar Refining Company, commonly known as "The Trust," has a capacity from the various plants controlled by it of 34,000 barrels a day, but it only turns out 22,000 barrels a day. It is very evident that if the two opposing firms put 8,000 barrels a day upon a market which can only consume 22,000 barrels a day, there is going to be a big cut in prices in order that one or other competitor can collar the market.

According to Bradstreet's there has been a general idea that a compromise would be effected between the contending parties, but the latest of stock quotations from New York showed an unsteadiness in the price of American sugar shares, which was an indication that those who knew did not consider the compromise feasible. The idea on Wall street has been in the past, that the Sugar Trust would be able to carry on a fight of this kind indefinitely, and yet keep up its present dividends of 12 per cent per annum upon its common stock. This idea came from the supposed fact that there was an enormous surplus, although the exact amount of it was not known. So that the unsteadiness in American sugar shares shows also that not only is there no hope of compromise, but that there is a doubt about the size of the surplus.

It is interesting to know what are the underlying motives for the "war." In the case of the Arbuckles it was because the firm desired to obtain their sugar at a somewhat lower price from the Trust, with which they had been accustomed to deal, in order to put it up in bags by a process of which the Arbuckles held the patent. Upon the refusal of the Trust to sell for less, the Arbuckles started to

build their refinery and the Trust went into the coffee business, under the name of the Woolson Spice Company, and have for over eighteen months been fighting the Arbuckles on their own ground, causing a loss to them, it is claimed, of \$4,000,000.

The Doscher case arises from another cause. Doscher owned a refinery which he sold to the trust, and his sons under the agreement became employees of the Trust at good salaries. But they got tired of being employees, so the elder Doscher made that fact known to Havermeyer and others, whereupon the sons were promptly fired, with the result that the Doscher refinery was started.

If the sugar war is carried on it need not necessarily effect the market of raws, though most probably it will. For a time it may have the effect of giving the market an upward tendency, but the end will be to send it down. All mankind has to look out for itself, and it is from the point of view of how it will effect us commercially, that the prospective struggle is interesting to the sugar growers of Hawaii.

**CRUEL ON THE CHILDREN.**

However good the cause may be, the collection of money from school children is distinctly not a thing to be commended. When such a thing comes backed up by the highest school authorities in the land, it certainly calls for condemnation from the press of the community. The erection of a statue to Lafayette is a laudable thing. Lafayette was a man of prominence and he rendered signal service to the struggling States. But the question of the statue is not at issue. The question is whether it is justifiable for the head school authorities to call upon the children to subscribe for any object.

To the mind of any one who knows children and has studied them, the proposition appears cruel. There is no period of life when the mind is so sensitive, and when children have to deal with money, they are especially sensitive. A child will feel very badly when the subscriptions are handed in, if its parent has felt unable or unwilling to supply it with the necessary five, ten or fifteen cents. A wound will be made on the little heart that will never be forgotten. Read many a biography and you will find how many people have in their childhood been troubled about the little inability to vie with others in money matters. Such a thing hurts a child when it neither hurts nor worries the grown man.

In another way the proposed scheme is bad, it will cause a rivalry among the teachers of an unwholesome character, and since the matter has official sanction, it will probably prove an actual tax upon them, for to make their school appear well, they may dig into their own pockets.

## KIKI RINGER'S DROWNING

MYSTERY CONNECTED WITH IT IS STILL UNSOLVED.

Four of the Mikahala's Crew Arrested but Afterwards Released—Change of Tactics by the Police.

On the arrival of the Mikahala this morning the police boarded the vessel and arrested three natives belonging to the crew. They were Dan, the night watchman, who was on duty when Ringer is supposed to have been murdered and thrown into the water; John Nelson, the quartermaster, and Kualawa, a deckhand. Later on another member of the crew was taken to the station house. No charge was made against them, the entry on the prison register being "held for investigation." During the morning these men were separately examined by the marshal and Detective Kaupa, and subsequently released by the marshal's order.

Marshal Brown, in answer to an inquiry as to any new developments in the case, said this afternoon:

"I can't say that there are. We are satisfied, however, from what we have learned that Kiki came to his death through foul play. We have questioned a number of men whom we have reason to believe know something about the affair, but to very little purpose. One of the men certainly knows something of what took place at the wharf that night, but what the circumstances were he won't tell, and we do not now know. We have decided not to let the matter drop, in fact it will be pressed harder than ever. We shall adopt an entire change of tactics in the case, but what those are I can't tell you. I have ordered the release of all those heretofore arrested on suspicion of being connected with the case and shall take a fresh start from this point."

## FIJI SUGAR.

The Warrimoo brings as part of her freight 210 tons of sugar from Fiji and 750 tons from Sydney. It is consigned to the refinery at Vancouver. This is the first shipment under a contract made some time ago and may be the beginning of a large trade in this direction.

Canada has lately allowed a preferential reduction of import duty of 25 per cent in favor of sugar from other British colonies which makes it possible to ship sugar from Fiji and Australia.

Mrs. Herman Focke gave a lunch this forenoon at which a number of prominent society people were present. The lunch table was beautifully decorated and the affair was among the pleasantest of many similar pleasant reunions.

## SUPREME COURT MATTERS

TWO LAWYERS AND ONE JUDGE  
ON THE BENCH.

Dr. Raymond Denied a Rehearing in His Suit Against Paia Plantation Company—Case Argued.

The supreme court this morning took up the first of the Kahului Railroad suits against the Hawaiian Commercial, an action for debt to recover \$1,000 on a bond. Chief Justice Judd being disqualified and Justice Frear otherwise engaged, Justice Whiting is presiding judge, with A. G. M. Robertson and John T. de Bolt, members of the bar, as his associates. In the absence of Judge Hartwell, L. M. Thurston represents the plaintiff and Kinney & Ballou the defendants.

Justice Frear is the author of a unanimous opinion of the court in the case of Dr. J. H. Raymond vs. Paia Plantation Company. Plaintiff sued the corporation for services rendered in performing a capital operation on one of the plantation laborers. The decision of the lower court was against him and on a hearing before the supreme court was sustained in a decision dated June 21st last. Plaintiff then moved for a rehearing and the same was had on August 4th. The decision was filed, and says: "The case we must confess, was a difficult one to decide, but we are of the opinion that sufficient grounds for a rehearing have not been shown and therefore the motion is denied."

Argument in the Chinese laundry case was closed yesterday afternoon by A. L. C. Atkinson for the government and the cause submitted and taken under advisement.

**JOSEPH HOLLADAY DEAD.**  
PORTLAND, Ore., September 14.—Joseph Holladay, a large property owner, and brother of the late Ben Holladay of pony express fame, died today; aged 77 years.

**KILLED DURING THE WAR.**  
The official record of the war departments far as completed shows that there were thirty-three officers and 231 enlisted men of the army, 264 in all, killed in battle during the war with Spain. These casualties include all the lives lost in the army in the battles in the Philippines as well as those in Cuba and Porto Rico. The percentage of officers killed is said to be unprecedented in the battles of the world. The contrast is especially striking in the case of the battle of Omdurman where, although the loss of life was particularly heavy, the list of killed included only one officer of the British army.



### ODD NAVIGATOR'S CHARTS

MARSHALL ISLAND PILOTS QUEER METHODS.

Steer a Fearless Course Without a Compass—Guided by Charts Made of Sticks and Shells.

The German protectorate of the Marshall Islands, which lie just east of the Carolines in the equatorial Pacific, contains the most daring sailors known, says an exchange. They are constantly performing feats in navigation that European sailors feared to venture on long after they had the compass, which instrument, by the way, the Marshall Islanders reject as useless.

The archipelago lies in two widely separated groups, the Radaek and Baliek chains, and in each chain the islands lie for the most part at extensive intervals. Yet the native pilots conduct voyages all over their own archipelago and to the Carolines in one direction and the Gilberts in another. For this voyaging they rely upon charts of their own construction, the knowledge having been all handed down from remote antiquity. The charts are generally about a yard square and are constructed of slender sticks tied together. At some intersections of the sticks are fastened small shells, which stand for the different islands. The pilot posts himself in the bow of the vessel with his chart before him. He begins by establishing the particular shells corresponding to the islands from which he is just sailing. He sets the course as indicated by one of the sticks radiating from that shell in the proper direction. Thereafter he watches the course in the sea with very slight use of the heavenly bodies for the determination of the direction.

They make no secret of their art. They are often at great pains to teach it to white men, and wonder that no one has yet been found capable of grasping it. Their explanation is that each stick on a chart shows the course of a stream in the sea and that by following the streams they can find their way to their destination. They claim to see these streams with their intersections just as shown by the sticks. Whatever may be the explanation, it is certain that they navigate hundreds of miles of empty ocean with neither compass nor chronometer nor other instrument save a chart of sticks. If by any accident they go astray, they may no attempt to continue the voyage, but run at once to leeward until they make a familiar headfall, often as far west as the Carolines.

### WOMEN NOVELISTS.

"The death of Mrs. Lynn Linton," says the Westminster Gazette, "calls attention to the circumstances that many of the most famous women novelists came of a clerical stock. Jane Austen was the daughter of a Hampshire rector, the Brontes were the daughters of the Vicar of Haworth, Olive Schreiner is the daughter of a South African missionary, and Mrs. Humphrey Ward is the granddaughter of Rev. Thomas Arnold, the famous head master of Rugby." To these may be added a noted American instance, Harriet Beecher Stowe was the daughter of Rev. Lyman Beecher.


