



IOWANS PLAY FOOTBALL.
The Clever Place-Kick Trick Twice Successfully Utilized.

The feature of yesterday's game was the place-kick goals made by the Iowa men. The play was first introduced by the Pennsylvania University team and successfully played by the Carlisle Indians. The Iowa boys rushed the pigskin within some yards of Punaoh's goal and failed to gain the required five yards in two attempts to advance the ball. Suddenly the quarter fell back about ten yards, and the center snapped the ball true as a dig into his hands. R. Daly, the quarter back, held the ball for a place kick, and Palmer caught it on the tip of his shoe and away the pigskin flew right between the goal posts, creating the wildest enthusiasm, and scoring the first five points of the game. In the second half this clever work was repeated.

The game ended with the score of 21 to 0 in favor of Iowa.

STOOD ON BURNING DECK

OR, RATHER WARNED PEOPLE OF THE LIVE WIRE.

Nuuanu Valley Grateful to Green and Andrews—Braved the Storm to Save Life.

The following card, received at this office today, explains itself: "The people living in Nuuanu Valley wish publicly to thank H. W. Green and Carl Andrews for averting what might have been a serious catastrophe last evening. A wire of the Hawaiian Electric Company broke and fell directly across the road in front of the residence of Henry Waterhouse, producing a circumstance similar to that on King street about three weeks ago. The gentlemen named stopped in the hard rain and warned pedestrians and drivers of carriages of the danger until the electricians arrived from the works and removed the wire."

Investigation shows that the case referred to had its parallel in some respects in the King street affair. A big rain was in progress. Just before 6 o'clock the wire was forced down by the storm. Green and Andrews had run under a neighboring tree for temporary shelter. The wire stretched across the right side of the road. Numbers of vehicles returning from the city had to pass that way. The danger was great.

The two men took up positions in the blinding storm on either side of the live wire and stopped everybody. Now and again a vehicle rushing forward to get out of the rain, would be pulled up just in time. The lives of many people were undoubtedly saved by the two men. Residents of the valley witnessed the events from their verandas. Both of the men were wringing wet during the whole performance. Andrews, especially, who was clad in a light suit, was a sight.

The electric people responded very promptly to a telephone call and soon had linemen on the scene.

DROPPED DEAD.
Old Kekahuna Falls on a Wharf and Expires Instantly.

A native named Kekahuna, aged about 60, dropped dead near Brewer's wharf this morning. Heart disease was the trouble. Deceased lived with a friend in Palama and had been in a measure an invalid for years.

The sudden death caused disturbance on the water front. It was at first thought that a bale of hay from the vessel at the wharf had struck the man. This, however, was not the case. The old fellow started to help a drayman load some hay on his rig. He fell forward over the freight and expired instantly. There was a cut over the right temple, sustained in the fall.

The body was taken to the station house. There will not be a coroner's inquest.

POLICE COURT.
Ah Tai, Tin Hop and Kum Wun were fined \$50 each in Judge Wilcox's court this morning for having opium unlawfully in possession.

Punuku was given two years on the reef for larceny in the second degree.

Kaauwai was fined \$5 for assault and battery on a Japanese named Tanaka.

The annual meeting of the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association has been set for Monday morning, November 28th, at 10 o'clock.

MARINE GLASSES LOST.
A pair of fine marine glasses, the private property of Collector General McStocker, but used by the customs officers on duty, are missing. It is believed they have been stolen, but if they have been, the customs officers will overlook that feature of the case if whoever has them will return them.

Professor Koebele may arrive home by the Doric on Thursday.

KILOHANA ART LEAGUE.
The hanging committee of the Kilohana Art League began its work this morning. Most of the contributions have been scanned by the judges and the others will have gone over by Thursday. The catalogue will be arranged by the last of the week. First view will be held next Monday evening, and the exhibition proper will open the day following.

MISSIONARY RESOLUTION

THREE BISHOPS WILL INQUIRE INTO EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

The Action of Bishop Willis and His Clergy Will be a Subject of Investigation.

A large number of the community are interested in the Rev. Alexander Mackintosh outside of the congregation over which he presides. There has been much said about his status, but the following resolution which was adopted in the United States, shows that an inquiry into church matters here is to be held by high authorities. The resolution reads as follows:

MISSIONARY RESOLUTION.

Resolved, That a committee of three bishops be appointed to inquire and report to the presiding bishop, of the condition of the church in Hawaiian Islands, and what in their opinion may be the duty of this church in regard to that new territory of the United States.

The Committee—Thompson, Bishop of Mississippi; Nichol, Bishop of California; Kendrick, Bishop of New Mexico.

October 24, 1898.

The local disagreement is being attended to by lawyers of eminence and will be conducted on proper legal lines. A meeting of the lawyers and the officers of the Second Congregation will be held tomorrow evening. The whole matter will be then discussed in all its aspects, legal and ecclesiastical.

GASOLINE EXPLOSION.
Joseph Santos Severely Burned on the Arms and Face.

An explosion of gasoline vapor in Bailey's bicycle shop this morning sent Joseph Santos, an employe, to the hospital with severe and painful burns about the hands, arms and face. Gasoline flame is used in some of the processes of bicycle repairing. The burner is enclosed in a sheet metal cabinet, the reservoir containing the gasoline being above it. In using it, it is the rule to light the gas at the burner immediately after turning the gasoline on, before the generating vapor has time to escape into the cabinet. Santos, who had frequently used the apparatus before, was about to use it again about 10 o'clock this forenoon. He turned the gasoline on, but just as he was about to light it his attention was called away by something else for a few minutes. When he returned, instead of turning off the gasoline and throwing open the cabinet to let the accumulated vapor escape, and then commence anew, he touched a match to the burner. Immediately the vapor with which the cabinet was filled leaped into a flame like an explosion. The flame burst through the seams of the cabinet and caught Santos. His hands, arms and face were scorched and burned.

J. S. Bailey, the proprietor, at once had him taken to Dr. Burgess' office, near by, where his injuries were dressed, and then sent him to the Queen's hospital, where he will remain for treatment.

The burns are all superficial, and though painful are not thought to be dangerous.

Santos is about 18 years old and is highly thought of by all who know him. His employer gives him the best of character for steadiness and carefulness.

EAGLE AND LION.
Good Feeling Between the United States and Great Britain.

SOUTHAMPTON, November 5.—A great demonstration here today signaled the departure for New York of the American line steamer St. Louis and the resumption of the American line service. The mayor of Southampton attended in state and large crowds of people cheered the American steamer. Two special steamers took the officers and their guests as far as Calshot Castle, where the farewells were exchanged.

When the steamers returned, after bidding farewell to the St. Louis, lunch was served on board the American line steamer St. Paul and toasts were drunk to the Queen and President McKinley and the Newspapers of America and England.

United States Consul Hopeley spoke to the toast The Visitors, and in so doing referred pleasantly to the cordial relations prevailing between the United States and Great Britain. His remarks were received with hearty cheers.

AFTER THE CROWN LANDS

LILIUOKALANI ON HER WAY TO WASHINGTON.

Will Present Her Claims Before Congress—Colonel Macfarlane Her Personal Representative.

Liliuokalani has gone to Washington to prosecute her claim to the crown lands before Congress.

Everything has been arranged to get the subject before that body early in the session, so that it will be up for consideration at the same time as the report of the Hawaiian commission and the legislation in regard to the government of the new territory.

Eminent opinion on the legal aspect of the claim has already been secured and a mass of information and evidence along the lines suggested and pointed out in these opinions has been secured, prepared and taken to the city of Washington. Colonel George W. Macfarlane will be Liliuokalani's personal representative in securing the presentation of the claim to Congress and in its management in committee, and will have full and exclusive control of the matter. Eminent American counsel have been retained to make argument on particular legal points involved. The names of these counsel, the friends of the ex-Queen do not at present care to divulge, but it is said that there is a surprise in store for the public when they become known.

It is intended that Congress shall be fully advised of the claim and its nature and its relation to the past legislation and present judicial status of the Islands, at the same time that the report of the Annexation Commission comes before it. So that while the attention of Congress is being directed to Hawaiian affairs, this claim will be pressed for its consideration.

Liliuokalani sailed on the Comlie last evening on her way to Washington. She was accompanied only by her maid and by her physician Dr. English. A large number of her immediate friends, including Princess Kaiulani, A. S. Cleghorn, Prince David, Mrs. Carter, and others, were at the steamer to wish her bon voyage.

THE TRANSPORTS.
The Pennsylvania is scheduled to sail with the Iowa troops tomorrow morning. Efforts are being made to get the City of Puebla ready to sail at the same time.

HONORS TO GEN. KITCHENER.
The Sword Given Him a Fine Specimen of the Jeweler's Art.

LONDON, November 5.—Apart from politics the attention of London this week has been mainly directed to the ceremonies in honor of General Kitchener yesterday and to the resumption of the exposures of Hooley, the bankrupt company promoter.

The general was the guest of Queen Victoria at Balmoral during the early part of the week and he presented her majesty with many interesting relics of the battle of Omdurman. On Thursday the general went through the quaint ceremony of being admitted to the freedom of the "Fishmongers' company, and it was as a citizen and fish monger that he received the freedom of the city of London on Friday.

The sword of honor presented to General Kitchener is a magnificent specimen of the jeweler's art. The hilt is of solid gold, surmounted by a figure of the British lion, and it also bears the figures of Britannia and Justice and the monogram of the general, indiamonds and rubies and sapphires, and the British and Egyptian flags enameled in their proper colors. The scabbard is finely ornamented and inscribed with the names of the Sirdar's victories. The blade is of the finest steel, damascened near the hilt with gold.

THE GALICIAN STRIKERS

TWENTY-TWO MALCONTENTS ARE MERE BOYS.

Their Contracts are Ruled Void—Accept Offer of Manager Ahrens—Men Still Dissatisfied.

Among the number of Galician strikers from Oahu plantation it has been discovered that 22 are boys, not one of whom is over 20 years of age. Judge Wilcox, upon receiving evidence to this effect, declared that their contracts were null and void.

All of the boys were assembled in the station house yard this morning, and asked what they intended to do. They said that they wanted to work, but did not want to return to Oahu plantation. They would look around among the other plantations until they found something that suited them. Attorney General Smith was present, and, through an interpreter, explained the vagrancy law and reminded the lads that they could not hang around town for a very long period without encountering more serious trouble.

Manager Ahrens of Oahu plantation came in and made the young fellows a proposition. It was to give them \$18 a month to work for him. The lunsas, he said, would treat them right. Attorney Kaulukou, who has represented the Galicians before the court, advised the boys to accept the proposition, and they did so. They will go to work tomorrow.

All the older men who were found guilty in court of deserting contract service and ordered to return to work, have refused to do so, and say they will accept the punishment prescribed by law. It remains now for the plantation to say whether the cases will be pressed against the men or not. If they are to be punished they will be sentenced to imprisonment and put to work upon the roads.

More of the cases are before Judge Wilcox in the district court this afternoon. Each man is being heard separately. In every case the court has found that the kicks are of the most puerile character and not sufficient to sustain judicial interposition. There is a trace all through the tales related of outside influence, maliciously brought to bear upon the otherwise faithful and industrious Galicians.

It is a mystery how the boys came to be signed in Austria. The presumption is that they falsely stated their ages to the agents who signed the laborers.

Edna Krouse celebrated her eighth birthday yesterday by inviting a number of her little friends to the Arlington. About twenty children responded. They all had a good time with games and dancing. During the afternoon, ice cream and other dishes dear to children, were served.

ON THE RAMPAGE.
Fever Follows the New York Regiment to Waialae.
The health situation in the New York convalescents' camp at Waialae is becoming as alarming as it was at Camp McKinley. Last night there were in camp 300 cases of fever in various stages of development. Colonel Barber is criticised for putting the infected companies together again in camp at Waialae. It is pointed out that the companies, and, as far as possible, the men individually, should have been separated.

Eight cases of fever have been taken from the Puebla to the military hospital. One is certainly typhoid and the others may prove to be the same. Yesterday afternoon the transport was scrubbed and thoroughly fumigated. All the men were taken off. Last night they slept on the wharf. There are thirty patients in the fever hospital on the slope of Punch-bowl. That is about as many as can be accommodated there at present.

GEORGE MCCARTHY DEAD.
George McCarthy, an old drayman of Honolulu, was buried at Makiki yesterday afternoon. He was a native of Australia, aged 43, and was well known about town. Quick consumption was the cause of death. Deceased lived near the corner of Ala-kea and Queen streets.

FRANCE WORRIED.
LONDON, November 5.—The activity of Prince Louis Napoleon is causing anxiety to the French government at present. He is evidently awaiting an opportunity and his chances are infinitely more favorable than those of the Duke of Orleans.

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THE FIRST NATIONAL BANK

ISSUANCE OF A CHARTER HAS BEEN AUTHORIZED.

American Allotment of Capital has Been Oversubscribed—\$300,000 Allotted to Honolulu.

The First National Bank of Hawaii is said now to be assured. It is to commence business as soon as the necessary preliminaries of advertising and official formalities required by the national bank act can be complied with.

Colonel Macfarlane received a telegram yesterday by the City of Puebla from the Seligmanns of New York announcing that the comptroller of the currency had authorized the immediate issuance of the charter and that the stock allotted for subscription in New York and San Francisco had already been oversubscribed.

The authorized capital of the bank is \$1,000,000 on which it is proposed to call for an assessment of 50 per cent at the start. James Campbell, who sailed for the coast on the Moana, is the largest individual subscriber. He has taken \$100,000 of the stock. Another \$100,000 has been reserved for small subscriptions in Honolulu, the expectation being that it will be taken in small amounts, none perhaps exceeding \$2,500, the intention of the promoters being to popularize the bank as far as possible, securing the widest local financial interest in it. Another \$100,000 has been subscribed for locally, but in large blocks. The remaining \$700,000 of the capital stock has been allotted for subscription in New York and San Francisco. In New York the Seligmanns, the American representatives of the Rothschilds, are interested, and in San Francisco the Bank of California has had charge of the subscriptions.

A majority of the directors will be Honolulu men. The subscriptions for the Honolulu allotment of stock and the necessary local arrangements for a banking office and the inauguration of the bank will be in the hands of James Campbell and Colonel Macfarlane.

"Every day's experience," said Colonel Macfarlane yesterday, "shows that the banking facilities and capital of Honolulu are inadequate to meet the needs of business which has developed and is developing under the auspicious conditions following annexation. More banking capital is needed. With it the increase and development of business will be free to go on."

"The new bank will be the depository of United States funds, which with a garrison here and the harbor improvements and fortifications which are sure to be made will be very large. The bank will be authorized to issue national bank notes, which are practically gold notes and good the world over. This will give the Islands a paper currency which will not be confined in its circulation to the Islands, as our present silver certificates are."

"But perhaps one of the greatest benefits to be derived by the Islands from the bank arises out of the fact that through the interest in it of New York and San Francisco capital, an interest in Island securities, in sugar stocks and government bonds will be developed abroad, which cannot fail to attract foreign capital hither."

"My advice by the City of Puebla were to the effect that the charter would be waiting for me by the time I reached San Francisco, so that everything could be arranged there in time for return by the Coptic three weeks hence, to make the necessary arrangements here at once."

DR. ASHLEY.
Dr. Maurice C. Ashley, who has been so ill with typhoid fever for so many weeks, left by the Coptic for his home in Middleton, on a three months furlough. It would be indeed gratifying to him could he hear all the words said in praise of him by the men of the New York regiment. He won the hearts of all by his strict attention to duty, working early and late for those who needed his care. His courteous manner to the ladies who assisted at the Red Cross tent will never be forgotten. He has the best wishes of all who were fortunate enough to meet him, for a safe journey and a speedy recovery.

THREE HENRYS.
Colonel Henry the French officer who killed himself when the fact that he was a forger was discovered, was the third member of the family within twenty-seven years who died a tragic death. The first had the misnomer of "Fortunate Henry." He was a member of the commune and a colonel under it in 1871. His son was Emile Henry, who dynamited the police station of the Rue des Bons enfants and the Cafe Terminus in 1894.

LOST ISLAND.
Her Majesty's steamer Porpoise, one of the Australasian squadron, recently returned to Suva from a cruise among the Islands with the news that Falcon Island, recently situated midway between Tongatabu and Haapai groups, and immediately opposite the Nomuka group of islets, some twenty-seven miles to the westward, has lately disappeared. Falcon Island was of volcanic origin, of half a mile or more in diameter and possessed of an altitude of forty feet, and was uninhabited.—Sydney Telegraph.

The two companies of the New Yorkers who are in Hilo seem to be having a glorious time. Hilo citizens are proverbially generous and hospitable and have laid themselves out to do the right thing by the boys in blue.

The claim of the ex-Queen to the crown lands of Hawaii is evidently going to be argued at considerable length and with all the ability that can be obtained. In rebuttal it will only be necessary to point out that all Charles II's property was confiscated by Cromwell's government and also to show that on the fall of the French empire, all that was left by the imperial family was promptly taken by the state. Deposed monarchs are not usually supported by the country that deposes them.

Another break in the electric light wires came near causing death again, yesterday. One hears that everything is being done that can be done to put the system of electric lights in order, but it seems as if enough had by no means been done. If Messrs. H. W. Green and Carl Andrews had not been on hand and stopped the carriages as they came up, there would have been at least one, and perhaps more lives lost. A menace to life such as this should be promptly guarded against. It is criminal on the part of those in charge to allow any of the poor material to remain.

Hardly does one gigantic swindler disappear before another takes his place. A short time ago there was the parson who got up a company to extract gold from sea water. Then there was Mr. Hooley, who seemed to have the touch of Midas, and whose bankruptcy has brought many an honored name to the dust. By the way, there is an excellent account of Hooley in the Cosmopolitan. The latest telegrams bring the account of Claude Vautin, who is well known on the Pacific coast. Mr. Vautin had an improved method for extracting gold, and was a consulting mining expert. He was also well known in financial circles. He persuaded certain brokers to buy stock for which he gave notes and then calmly walked off with the booty, amounting to \$100,000. It is evident neither all the dupes nor all the rogues are dead yet. By the bye, if there were no dupes there would be no rogues, and it is hopeless to get rid of all the dupes.

CHINESE CHAUVINISM.

Affairs do not improve in China. The anti-foreign movement now that it is partially supported by the palace party in power, is becoming stronger and stronger. At Chung King there has been much destruction and all the foreigners have been obliged to fly. The central government has been appealed to, but the central government gives no heed to the requests of the Ambassadors.

Another instance of Chinese arrogance is not to allow M. Pavloff, Russian Charge d'Affaires, the Russian admiral and forty Russian officers and sailors to leave Tientsin for Peking. This is the more striking because it was supposed that Li Hung Chang was in the pay of Russia.

The fact is the reactionary party in China has fairly taken the bit within its teeth. Whatever Chinese may have been abroad and learned something of the power and organization of other nations make very little impression upon the mass of the people and none whatever upon the old palace party, which considers itself superior to any race of people in the world.

The Chinese are the most difficult people in the world to deal with. They view all matters from an entirely different standpoint to ours. It is almost impossible for an American or a European to view any matters from a Chinese standpoint. It is absolutely impossible for an average Chinese to view matters from an American or European standpoint. Even Chinese who have lived among the western people and had a university education remain mentally Chinese, and revert to the national modes of thought. Of course there are a few exceptions, but they go to prove the rule.

This present Chauvinistic movement in China, however, may prove of good

effect. It may force the hand of the western powers to show their real strength. Nothing will make the Chinese ever behave themselves properly towards foreigners in their country but force, and not force on the sea coast, which is like nibbling at the edge of a big cake, but force at the very heart of the empire, viz: the occupation of Peking and of the imperial palace. That would show that there is some power greater than the Brother of the Sun and Moon. It is a thousand pities that the Japanese were not permitted to carry out this plan during the late war. They understand the Chinese thoroughly and would have humiliated their pride completely. Until this is done there will always be outbreaks against foreigners in China.

THANKSGIVING.

The Thanksgiving dinner to the soldiers promises very well. Ladies have undertaken the duties of looking after squads of men and The Star subscriptions keep swelling up from day to day, while Mrs. Dole has quite a sum on hand.

It is true that our citizens have had heavy calls upon their purses during the year, and have very nobly responded to those calls. It would be difficult to sum up what has actually been subscribed for the entertainment of the soldiers, but one knows that nearly \$20,000 has been passed into the hands of committees, and it is a very moderate estimate indeed to say that \$10,000 more has been spent by private individuals.

But this is a special case and we should make a special effort to make these men understand that on America's great Thanksgiving day, though they are far from home, they are not forgotten and that Honolulu's brightest and best housekeepers will do their utmost to give them a dinner worthy of the occasion.

Among so many men there will be some black sheep undoubtedly, but both the regiment and the engineers are largely made up of respectable, well educated, high principled men. It is no use condemning the mass for the escapades of a few. These men think of their homes, of their mothers and fathers, many also of their wives and children. Their duty here is irksome to them, for while willing to fight and die for their country, they did not contemplate the idleness and ennui of garrison life. Then let us all make an effort to show them the true hospitality of the Thanksgiving time.

The liberal subscriptions which have come in, headed by Minister Damon's \$100 check, show that our citizens have their hearts in the right place.

NEWLANDS IN A MINORITY

NEVADA SOLDIERS GIVE WRENN A MAJORITY.

Only Half of the Troops Cast Their Ballots—The Others were Too Sensick to Care About It.

Congressman Newlands, the author of the Newlands resolution by which Hawaii was annexed, did not poll a majority of the votes among the Nevada troops now on the way to Manila. He only received about five-twelfths of them. There does not seem to be any definite reason why he fell behind in the polling list. At least none of the soldiers seem to give any particular reason, except party political differences, and in a few instances personal feeling.

The vote was very light. A complete state, congressional, legislative and local ticket was voted for. The City of Pueblo was in the middle of the ocean on election day, and the Nevada cavalry voted for the sage brush desert state officials with nothing but sea and sky in view. There are one hundred of them but only forty-eight votes were cast. The rest of the men were too sensick to care for the destiny of empire or who represented Bad Man's Gulch in the state legislature.

For congressman, Newlands received about 20 votes to 28 for Wrenn. The election returns were sent to Secretary of State Howell yesterday on the Coptic.

KARO CASE DECIDED.

A mixed jury this morning awarded \$105 and interest from April last to plaintiff in the suit of M. K. Kabilikane vs. Wilder Steamship Co., damages for taro he had prepared at Hala-wa, Molokai, for shipment by one of defendant's steamers. Defendant excepted to the verdict and gave notice of appeal.

ARRESTS TODAY.

Three sailors, supposed to be runaways from some merchant vessel in port, were captured by Officer James Kupihe and are held for investigation at the station house.

Peter Fernandez was arrested this morning for assault and battery on David Kowalo. He gave bail in the sum of \$25 for his appearance in the district court Monday morning.

SECOND WELL FINISHED.

The second well on the Gear, Lansing & Co. tract at Kaimuki, was capped this morning. It has a depth of 237 feet and is claimed to be the best of the two sunk in that locality.

TINKER ILL AGAIN.

Joseph Tinker, the Nuuanu street butcher, is seriously ill this afternoon with stomach trouble. He had a bad spell of the same sort some months ago.

OFF KOKO HEAD.

At 2 o'clock a ship was sighted off Koko head.

SHE IS FINISHED.
SANTIAGO DE CUBA, November 5.—Captain Chester of the cruiser Cincinnati and a board of officers yesterday visited the wreck of the Spanish cruiser Cristobal Colon and finally decided that work on the sunken ship should be abandoned, as in their opinion there is no possible chance of ever raising her. The men of the wrecking company who have been at work on the Spanish vessel have been ordered to proceed to Santiago harbor, there to raise the Reina Mercedes and blow up the Merrimac so as to clear the harbor channel.

PICQUART'S CASE DROPPED.
PARIS, November 9.—The Fronde says the case against Colonel Picquart who was charged with communicating to unauthorized persons the contents of important military documents in his defense of Dreyfus, has been now quashed and that the prisoner, who has been closely confined in Chirche Midi prison, is to be released.
The Council says the court of cassation has decided to hear Minister of War M. de Freycinet in its investigation into the Dreyfus case, and that the court will content itself with his statements without insisting upon seeing the secret documents in the case.

SILK FLAG TO FIRST.
A California Product and Presented by the Women.

When Brigadier General Miller sails for Manila he will be the bearer of a handsome flag, a present to the First California regiment in the name of the women of California. The silk from which the flag is made is a California product. It was raised and reeled by members of the California Silk Culture society, through which organization the gift is made. Women of thirty-eight counties of the state are represented. General Miller will present the flag to the California regiment upon his arrival at Manila.



TO SEE HIM IN THE FLESH

JAPAN WILL KNOW THAT THE EMPEROR LIVES.

Minister Yano Dispatched to Peking to Demand a Personal Interview With the Deposed Emperor.

SEATTLE, November 4.—The Japanese government is taking steps to determine for a certainty whether or not the emperor of China is alive, according to advices received here today by the Japanese Mail steamer Ryojun Maru. To that end Minister Yano has been dispatched to Peking, with instructions to demand a personal interview with the emperor. If refused the Japanese government will consider Kaung dead.

That the reform movement may be given backing, the Japanese are going to assemble a fleet of war vessels at Peking as soon as possible. Some of the best ships of the Mikado's navy will be included. The Japanese papers bitterly condemn Minister Yano for not throwing the Japanese flag around the emperor at once when he saw that the young ruler's life was in danger.

It might have brought about grave foreign complications and would have probably caused censure of the foreign office, but Yano would have had the praise of the entire civilized world.

The native press wonders that Sir Claude McDonald did not grasp the situation for Great Britain. The official organs of Japan claim that their government has no prejudice against the dowager empress in favor of the emperor, but that the latter is to be supported for trying to prevent China from lapsing into her old conservatism, so that she may effectively defend herself against foreign aggression.

SOLDIERS CHEERED.

Emma square was jammed with people last night to hear the concert. All of the numbers were applauded. Near the close of the program the band played "Dixie" as a special compliment to the Tennessee soldiers present. At the first notes of the Southern air a deafening yell arose from the crowd of boys in blue and was kept up until the piece was finished. The Star Spangled Banner was loudly cheered by all the soldiers present.

MRS. MAYBRICK.

The Sad Condition of an Erring Woman.

LONDON, November 5.—The Baroness Roques has arrived here from France and has paid her semi-annual visit to all the authorities. She was permitted to visit her daughter, Mrs. Florence Maybrick, who is undergoing imprisonment for life after having been convicted of poisoning her husband, in Aylesbury Prison, on Wednesday. She reports the prisoner in a lamentable condition, worn to the bone and still unable to work. She is confined in the infirmary and her spirit is utterly broken.

Friends of Mrs. Maybrick here are convinced that some influence which does not appear on the surface is responsible for the opposition of the home office to the release of Mrs. Maybrick. It is known that Colonel John Hay, just before leaving the United States embassy here to assume the duties of secretary of state at Washington, made another unsuccessful effort to obtain her release and that the Lord Chief Justice also lately took steps in the same direction.

FISH EGGS.

In China hens are employed to hatch fish eggs. These are sealed in an egg shell and placed under the unsuspecting hen for a few days until the spawn has warmed into life. The contents of the shell are then emptied into a shallow pool, where they can bask in the sunshine until the minnows are strong enough to be turned into a lake or river.


