PLATFORM Of the American Union Party.

For the promotion of the best interests of all the people of the Hawaiian Islands and for the organization of a party having only this object in view, the following is adopted as a declaration of the principles upon which the organization to be known as the 'American Union Party' is to be established, and upon this platform we invite the co-operation of every friend of good government.

1st. REPRESENTATIVE GOVERNMENT--The American Union Party is unalterably opposed to any form of monarchical government in the Hawaiian Islands, and declares its full allegiance to the Provisional Government, endorsing the proposal for a constitutional convention looking to the extension of popular representation in the Government.

2d. PUBLIC LANDS--We favor such legislation as will promote the occupancy of all public lands, including those heretofore known as 'Crown lands,' by small holders, and foster the development of varied industries, believing it to be of vital importance that 'many acres' should be for 'many men.'

3d. CITIZEN'S RIGHTS--We declare that all citizens are equal before the law, and we are opposed to any laws or privileged classes, favoring participation in the government by every loyal citizen and declare for a liberal suffrage law that will give all great value to every man who rendered satisfactory service in the military or police departments of the Provisional Government.

4th. IMMIGRATION--We favor the immigration of all persons of good character and sound mind, and we are opposed to any laws or other European immigration as shall supply the necessary labor and furnish the country with permanent settlers.

5th. PUBLIC WORKS--We favor the immediate establishment of a comprehensive system of public improvements that shall be of permanent value to the country and afford needed employment to the laboring classes, but we declare against importation of labor and material of any kind whatsoever for use on public works which can be obtained in the home market, and materials which must be obtained from abroad should be obtained through local dealers in open competition.

6th. PUBLIC OFFICES--We hold that no person should occupy any position of trust or profit under the Government who is not loyal to the same.

7th. PRISON LABOR--We oppose the employment of prison labor in any mechanical industry.

8th. TAX SYSTEM--We favor a revision of the tax system whereby all property, improved and unimproved, shall be taxed on an equal basis.

9th. LABOR--We declare that in the Constitution and in legislation thereafter the rights of the wage-earner should be fully considered.

10th. EDUCATION--We favor the enlargement of the scope of the free-school system to the end that a university course may be available to the youth of the country.

11th. TELEGRAPHIC LINES--We favor the establishment of an inter-island as well as a foreign cable system.

THE MONROE DOCTRINE.
Some person who signs him-
self Another Tourist when he
ought to write himself down An-
other Fool sends the following to
the Bulletin:

The STAR man seems to think that
these islands are a part of the American
continent and there is where he differs
from most authorities. But why the
Monroe doctrine should include Ha-
waii and not Ireland, Jamaica, Ber-
muda and Canada is one of the questions
for the lawyers, professors, dismis-
sion of the P. G. to explain.

This writer needs a severe course
in the Kindergarten. The Mon-
roe doctrine was laid down to
govern the relations of the United
States to all independent countries
in the Western hemisphere, to the
end that their domestic concerns
should not be interfered with,
nor their territory seized, by
any foreign power.

Someone has guaranteed a fund
of \$67 dollars a month for one year
and \$13 a month for three years, to
induce the minstrels of the Salva-
tion army to encamp in Honolulu
and attempt to drive out the devils
from among us, Chinese fashion,
by the beat of the tom-tom and the
crack and jar of the horse fiddle.

Who it is that has this pro-
ject in hand the STAR does not
know; but we feel at liberty to
doubt that it is anyone who has
had practical experience with the
Salvation army in the States. There
the army has had a fair trial and
the conclusions as to its value all
tend to the same general verdict.
First, that as a religious body its
methods breed a spirit of irrever-
ence to sacred things; second, as a
charitable organization it is of great
and needed benefit to the starving
poor. Now here in Honolulu where
all religious influences have been
the lofty and reverent ones of New
England protestantism or have
taken the conservative and
solemn forms employed by the
ritualistic bodies, it would be
demoralizing, particularly to
the natives, to have the func-
tions of worship identified with
the variety show of the dives. All
religious feeling vanishes at a hurdy-
gurdy where the sacred names are
attuned to the air of "Mulligan's
Wake" or the beauties of holiness
are described in the slang of the
day to the accompaniment of a tam-
bourine and a pair of bones.

In the matter of the poor we have
no such classes as are found in the
Whitechapel district of London or
south of Market street in San Fran-
cisco—none of those ragged and
faded creatures whom the Salva-
tion Army is accustomed to clothe
and feed. Our unfortunates, as a
rule, have enough to eat and wear
and a place to lay their heads.
Their needs are well attended to by
benevolent organizations, and there
is no field whatever for Salvation
"life-boats" and soup kitchens. To
establish such things here when
millions of people are hungry on
the mainland and in Europe would
be a foolish waste of time and sub-
stance.

Keep the hurdy-gurdy out!
The Bulletin does not like the
intellectual exhibit made on behalf
of the Constitutional Convention.
Those whom it really wants to see
at the front are the geniuses whom
Charles Wilson named over to Mr.
Willis as good material for the
restored Government—the ones who
were on the list "by authority."
With those bright particular spirits
at the fore Hawaii would have rap-
idly, in the Bulletin's opinion, ac-
quired the status of a first-class
power.

It is making in street cars is not
suggested by Manager Paine. We
advise our esteemed contemporary
to pursue its woman suffrage ideas
to the bitter end. With the ballot
in the hands of man's better half
laws would soon be passed making
the use of tobacco anywhere a mis-
deed, a felony or a case of mayhem—it wouldn't matter which
to the lady legislators, so long as
they got rid of the weed. Further
than this there would also be a
curfew law obliging men to be
within doors at nine o'clock—but,
as Kipling would say, that is an-
other story. Does our besmoked
contemporary enjoy the prospect?

SECTION 2. It shall be lawful for the
Minister of Finance to continue to make
payments in accordance with the appro-
priations authorized by this Act until the
Thirty-first day of July, A. D. 1896,
and thereafter at the same rate until
new appropriations are made.
SECTION 3. The Minister of Finance
shall not cause or allow to be paid from
the Treasury any money for the objects
named in this Act, except as herein pro-
vided, and the unauthorized expendi-
ture of any money from the Treasury, to
be hereafter accounted for to the Coun-
cils by Indemnity bill, is hereby ex-
pressly prohibited.
SECTION 4. No person holding more
than one office, for which salaries are
provided, shall be authorized to draw
more than the salary of the highest
grade of office held by him, if the salary
of any office held by him shall amount
to Eighteen Hundred Dollars or more
per annum, and shall be entitled to no
other or further compensation.
SECTION 5. The Minister of Finance
shall not pay or allow to be paid from
the Treasury any sum on account of any
item of this Act in excess of the
due proportion of the amount appropri-
ated for such item for the time elapsed;
provided, however, that the Executive
Council may authorize the Minister of
Finance to pay, on the requisition of
the head of any department, moneys in
excess of such proportion.
SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect
and become law from the date of its
publication.

DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR, HONOLULU, March 19, 1894. In accordance with the provisions of Section 2 of Act 69 of the Provisional Government of the Hawaiian Islands, being an act entitled "An Act to provide for a Constitutional Convention," notice is hereby given that an Election for Delegates to the Constitutional Convention will be held throughout the Islands, between the hours of 8 o'clock a. m. and 5 o'clock p. m. on Wednesday, the 21 day of May, 1894.

First Precinct—Extending from the boundary of Puna to and including the land of Ninole. Polling place: Pahala School House. Inspectors: W. P. Fennell, Chairman, H. L. Aho, Akaaka.

Second District—HONOOLEI. Consisting of all that portion of said Honolulu or Kona, North of the First District and inside of a line drawn from the flagpole at the old battery on Puna-o-waina (Punchbowl) to the junction of School and Emma streets, along the middle of School street to Fort street, along the middle of Fort street to Beretania street, middle of Beretania street to Nuuanu street at Smith's bridge, thence up the middle of said street to School street, middle of School street to Liliha street, middle of Liliha street to Judd street, along the middle of Judd street to the crest of the ridge on the Northwest side of Nuuanu Valley, and thence along the crest of said ridge to the peak called Lanihuli in the Kona range of mountains.

Third Precinct—That portion of said District extending from the Second Precinct to the Puuanaea Point. Polling place: Kelaaha School House. Inspectors: Augustus Knudsen, Chairman, A. Linsley, David Kuu.
