FOREIGN NEWS.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Aug. 22.—The defender Reliance won the first race of the international series against the Shamrock III by a margin of nine minutes. It was one of the best cup races ever held, the Shamrock's lead on the first leg adding zest to the struggle and the wind blowing strong enough to test the sailing qualities of the boats to the full.

There was a brisk 10-knot breeze when the big yachts Reliance and Shamrock III began their maneuvering for the start. Signals were set for the course fifteen miles to the windward and return.

The Reliance crossed the line nine minutes ahead of the Shamrock, making the American beat an easy winner after giving the Shamrock its time allowance.

The race was sailed in three hours and twenty-seven minutes.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Aug. 25.—The American defender Reliance won her second race from the Shamrock III today by the narrow margin of 1 minute 22 seconds corrected time.

The race was over the triangular course and the stiff nine-to-ten-knot breeze that was blowing gave the skippers good opportunity to bring out the best sailing qualities of their boats.

The Reliance turned the first mark 2 minutes and 30 seconds ahead of the Shamrock. In the second mark the Reliance steadily drew away from the challenger and turned the mark with a lead of 4 minutes.

The Reliance crossed the finish line with an advantage over the Shamrock of 4 minutes and 40 seconds, having gained in actual sailing time 1 minute 19 seconds corrected time. Figuring the time allowance, it was announced from the judges' boat that the race goes to the Reliance by 1 minute and 23 seconds.

The result of this race puts the Shamrock III in a class with the best work ever done by any the British challenging yachts. On September 16, 1885, the defender Puritan won from the Genesta by the narrow margin of 1 minute 52 seconds. October 13, 1893, the Vigilant won from the Valkyrie II by 40 seconds. In the races of 1901, the Columbia in the first race defeated the Shamrock II by 1 minute, 20 seconds, and in the third race of this series the American boat won by the narrow margin of 41 seconds.

OYSTER BAY, L. I., Aug. 25.—Reports of changes in the War Department were confirmed today by the announcement that the President has accepted the resignation of Secretary Root to take effect next January. Secretary Root will be succeeded by William H. Taft, at present Governor of the Philippines.

BOGOTA, Colombia, Aug. 26.—A committee of three Senators has been named to devise amendments to the Panama Canal Treaty that will be acceptable to the Colombian Congress.

TELEGRAPHIC ITEMS

Wireless telegraphy between San Francisco and the Farallones is in successful operation.

J. H. Woods, one of the escaped Folsom convicts, was captured in Reno, Nevada on Monday.

The Turkish Government has made contracts for twelve million dollars worth of munitions of war.

Prof. Martin Kellogg, former president of the University of California, died at his home in Berkeley.

It is definitely announced that the Czar of Russia will visit the Emperor of Austria during September.

It is reported that an entire Turkish regiment was annihilated by Macedonian rebels, August 23.

The Trans Mississippi Commercial Congress opposes the sale of large tracts of land in the Philippines.

Japanese troops are being hurried into Formosa to prevent a Russian invasion, in case war breaks out.

Lord Salisbury, late Premier of Great Britain died last Saturday at his home, after a lingering illness.

An oil fire caught in a local well at Sourlake, Texas, August 21, and the damage is estimated at \$1,000,000.

After having been in revolt since 1873, the leaders of the Achm rebellion are negotiating for surrender.

The Humberts, the famous French swindlers, have been found guilty and sentenced to long terms of imprisonment.

Secretary Root has gone to London to act as chairman of the commission to settle the Alaska boundary dispute.

On Monday Lou Dillon, the famous California mare lowered the world's trotting record to two minutes flat.

A Seattle reporter has just completed a trip around the world in fifty-four days and eight hours, beating all records.

Commander Takeshura of the Japanese navy says that Japan will enter a yacht in 1904 to compete for the America cup.

It has been definitely announced that Lord Roberts and his staff will visit the United States during the month of September.

The St. Louis World's Fair buildings will all be completed in November, and everything will be ready for the opening in March.

A negro rapist at Halifax, North Carolina last week confessed his crime, and was immediately taken out and hanged by a mob.

The Philippine Sultan of Deseen after committing an act tending to insult the American flag, has made a complete apology to the government.

The Governor of Jamaica has presented an appeal for an imperial loan of £1,250,000 to assist in the restoration of the Jamaica cane sugar plantations.

Turkish troops are committing unprintable barbarities in Macedonia, and Pasha Vall claims that his officers are unable to restrain fanatical muslimans.

Twenty-two villages in the districts of Florida and Monaster have been raided by Turkish soldiers who slaughtered women and children in a terrible manner.

There is tremendous interest in Ireland and Scotland in the yacht race in New York, and many awaited the result of the first race in holiday attire.

Turkey has unconditionally accepted all the demands of Russia including the immediate pacification of Macedonia, and a reform in methods of governing there.

A British force of thirty white soldiers and five hundred natives inflicted a fearful defeat on the forces of the Sultan of Sokoto, Nigeria, August 20, who lost 700 men while only eleven of the British force were killed.

Now that the republicans and the home rulers are lining up for the tug-of-war for county offices, the proposition looms up that all the people on Maui who do not want office, do want honest and capable officers from sheriff down to pound man.

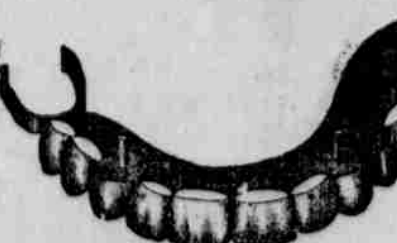

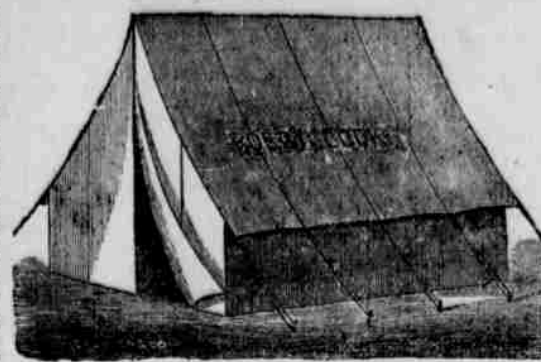

SHIPPING NEWS

Chicago, Aug. 18.—A dispatch to the Record Herald from Omaha, Neb., says:

The Hamburg American Steamship Company will invade the Pacific ocean and together with the Orient and Wabash Railroads will encircle the earth," said Vice-President Edward Dickinson of the Orient Railroad who has just returned from London, where he together with President Stilwell of the Orient line, negotiated the traffic agreement between the railroads and the steamships Company. "The night before I left London we concluded a contract with the Hamburg-American line for a line of steamers from Port Stilwell to China, via Hawaii and Japan. That company already has steamers to all points in the Orient via Suez."

The U. S. S. Iroquois returned from Pearl Harbor yesterday afternoon, having on board Admiral Terry, Captain Niblack, Captain White and Captain Rodman, who returned from an inspection of Pearl Harbor.

In all probability Admiral Terry will recommend that the channel leading into Pearl Harbor be straitened, as it is quite tortuous at present. It is also recommended that the channel be provided with aids to navigation.—Bulletin.

The Chronicle of August 18 has the following to say in regard to the recent fast run of the S. S. Sierra:

Constantinople, Turkey, Aug. 23.—The Russian squadron has been recalled from Turkish waters and will return to Sebastopol, the Porte having made complete promises for the carrying out of the reforms requested by Russia.
