

THE PROBABILITY of the speedy introduction of East Indian families into these Islands, as a laboring class, leads us to make some remarks on the subject of Eurasians, already alluded to Lyon, pAs we previously observed, the Eurasians are half-castes in India, sprung from the union of natives and Europeans. Most of them are Christians. It should be remembered that, besides the British, two other European Powers, hold a footing on the Indian Peninsula, the Portuguese at Goa, on the Malabar coast, and the French at Pondicherry on the Koromandel Coast. Formerly, the Portuguese held sway over a far more extensive region of India than that now ruled by the King of Portugal. Consequently, the half-caste Portuguese Christians are exceedingly numerous, not only at Goa, but also at Bombay, Calcutta, and all over India. These people would form an excellent stock from which to draw some of our East Indian Immigrants, In the Island of Salsette near Bombay, the writer saw a very interesting little community of half-caste Portuguese Christians, who cultivated rice, and lived quite distinct from the other Indians. They are very laborious, industrious, and honest. In many cases it is necessary to go back several generations to find their first European ancestor. Many of them still bear the names famous in the chivalrous times of old Portugal-such as Gama, Dacunha, Soza and Albuquerque. The Portuguese is generally spoken by them, and their form of christianity would certainly be less objectionable here than Islam or the Vedas. The French halfcastes of Pondicherry and Chandernagore near Calcutta, generally speak French, and are for the most part of the same Christian form as the Portuguese. They are also an industrious, honest, sober class. The third division of Eurasians consists of the British half-castes, scattered over all the three British Residencies of Calcutta (including the Upper Provinces and Punjaub), Bombay and Madras. We did not however visit the plantation, as our errand to the island was to inspect the lands of Kealia and Kapaa, some fifteen miles to the Northward, where Captain James Makee and others are about commencing a new sugar plantation. There was no difficulty in procuring mounts for our party of five, although the native horse owners were sufficiently whimsical in their way of dealing. One demanded six dollars for the use of his animal for the day, but readily consented to sell it outright for eight; not a bad horse either, for he kept up with the best during the more than thirty miles that we travelled

The first three or four miles of our road lay through lands of Libue Plantation, on which were some fine looking fields of cane; an immense field just plowed; through a gulch in which nestled a comfortable looking overseer's residence and a baker's dozen of laborers' cottages, all in a row and as like as a lot of peas in a pod; until we came to the Wailua river near where it runs into the sea. In our last issue, we alluded to the necessity of raising money by a foreign loan, for the purpose of reducing the interest on the national debt, and furnishing the country with the money required for the further development of its abundant resources. The Report of the Royal Commissioners has thus far been highly favorable and encouraging. It appears from that Report that these islands contain a large area of unimproved lands that are eminently suited for the culture of the sugar-cane, which industry, with proper development, promises to become a source of great wealth to the country at no distant days Coffee, cotton, indigo, tobacco, and other tropical products, can also be cultivated in these fertile islands with the most promising results. Nature here is prodigal even to extravagance.

But what avails the most lavish accumulation of natural advantages, if a corresponding enterprise and energy is not displayed on the part of the people of these favored isles? And, again, even with the most active exertions of the people themselves, how little can be accomplished of lasting importance without the strenuous aid of a provident, enlightened and energetic government? Indeed, we may assert without fear of contradiction, that the future of this nation lies almost completely in the hands of this government. We trust, for their own sakes, that the good

natured race of Hawaii nei may never fall into the hands of the rulers of the Maori, the Tabitian or the "red injun," for gradual extermination would then become their inevitable doom. To avoid this calamity, much depends upon the people, but infinitely more upon the government of this country. The decay of the native Hawallan race is unhappily too true, but is not by any means hopeless. The Royal Commissioners have noted the depopulated condition of the once populous districts through which they passed. But, they have also suggested a remedy in the introduction of an East Indian people, supposed to have an ethnical affinity with the Hawaiian race, and consequently naturally disposed to amalgamate with them. It is plain that even for this reason, and abstracting from the question of labor, however highly important, the suggestion of the Royal Commissioners deserves prompt attention, and speedy execution. As a matter of course, money will be wanted but this, as we remarked in our last issue, can be easily obtained by a foreign loan. Under present circumstances, the most perfect unanimity is required amongst the members of this government. This is not a question about which it would be at all fit to be wasting time in idle disputes. The immigrants are wanted, to amalgamate with this people, and to help to till the soil. To bring them over from the East Indies. as proposed, money is imperatively necessary Therefore, the government should set about raising the amount required without loss of time. There may be and doubtless are, some timid short-sighted individuals in our midst, arrant pessimists, who are frightened at the danger, as they call it, of getting into debt, and who thus endeavor to obstruct the efforts of those farsighted statesmen who advocate East Indian immigration, and a foreign loan. Let such little minded political antiquarians retire into the seclusion of private life, and leave the guidance of the ship of state to abler and more efficient

We need now at the head of affairs, men who shrink not at the responsibility of the means when their keen far-sighted statesmanship foresees the success of the result. To the hands of such men alone should the destinies of the Hawaiian race be confided at the present conjuncture, when the adoption of an enlightened and progressive policy calculated to raise the reputation of this little Kingdom in the esteem of

The military forces of Turkey were in 1875 officially estimated as follows: On a peace footing, 157,667 men; on a war footing, 586,-SATURDAY, MAY 19.

The navy consisted at the end of 1875 of 20 ironelad ships and 70 other steamers. In addition to these there were 4 steam transports and a number of old sailing vessels not fit for service. The total length of railways open for traffic on January 1, 1875, was 825 English miles, of which 654 were in Europe and 171 in Asia. The length of telegraph lines on the 1st portions of the continents of Europe, Asia and of January, 1875, was 17,597 miles. The total number of dispatches carried in the year 1874 was 910,130 of which number 102,987 were Africa, and consists of Turkey Proper, which is under the direct rule of the Sultan, and of numer-

international messages.
