FRIDAY : : : : May 21st. THE LEGISLATURE.

The Legislative Assembly sustained its reputation for work at yesterday's sitting. In addition to general business of more or less interest, the Fire Limit bill was further amended and passed its third reading. It now only awaits the King's approval to make it law.

His Excellency Mr. Gibson replied in writing to Mr. Dole's inquiry regarding Mr. Daggett's mission to Washington. It was a harmless as well as a proper service upon which Mr. Daggett was engaged, as our readers will perceive by referring to our report of the day's doings in the Legislative chamber, and in no wise warranted the lying statements regarding a contemplated sale of these islands, which were published abroad, and originated either in San Francisco or at Honolulu.

Mr. Dole gave notice of a bill to amend sections 65 and 68 of the Constitution, relating to the Supreme Court. The President announced that the Hon. H. K. Kihelani and Mr. Kalua had each asked leave of absence for one week. GRANTED.

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Hawaiian Parliament.

Legislative Assembly - Eighteenth Day. THURSDAY, May 20th. The House met at 10 a. m. Prayer by the Chaplain. At 10:15 a quorum was present and the minutes of the previous session were read in English by Secretary Pierce, and in Hawaiian by Interpreter Wilcox.

North Kona, Hawaii, with 95 signatures, praying that the election of J. K. Nahale for the district of North Kona be set aside. The petition was read by the Interpreter, and gives the following reasons why the election should be void: 1. The refusal of the Board of Inspectors to give the voting power to eight old men, because they stated they should vote for G. W. Filipo, the opposition candidate.

Mr. Castle moved that the petition be referred to the Judiciary Committee with instructions to examine into the matter. Carried. Mr. Kauai presented a petition that \$5,500 be appropriated for repairs of the bridge over the stream at Waimea, Kauai, just completed by W. E. Rowell. Laid on the table to be considered with the Appropriation bill.

Mr. Nahale presented a petition from North Kona that \$2,000 be appropriated for improving a certain road in the district. Referred to Committee on Public Lands. MR. DAGGETT'S MISSION.

His Excellency Mr. Gibson presented the following statement in answer to a resolution: "Hon. J. S. Walker, President of the Legislative Assembly—Mr. President: In response to a resolution passed by the House on the motion of Hon. S. B. Dole, requesting me to inform the Assembly of the object of Mr. Daggett's mission to Washington, and the results of such mission, I have to say that Mr. Daggett was appointed in June last as His Majesty's Special Commissioner at Washington to co-operate with and assist His Excellency Hon. H. A. P. Carter in the presentation to the Government of the United States of America of the facts connected with the visit to these islands of Captain (afterwards Commodore) Jones in the U. S. S. Albatross, in the year 1826. It was believed that the statement of this case, founded on such evidence as was available to His Majesty's Government here, which honorable members will find in the appendix to my report to the Legislature (appendix B, page 13), could be materially extended and strengthened if the original documents in the archives of Government departments at Washington were examined, and it was especially with the view of his assisting Mr. Carter in this task that Mr. Daggett was appointed. The result of the conference with Mr. Carter was, that, as stated in my report (Report, page 13), it was deemed desirable in the meantime to take no action beyond putting a statement of the case on file in the Department of State at Washington.

Mr. Daggett was also requested to ascertain the view taken by the Government of the United States of a proposal that had been made to His Majesty's Government to admit the rice required by Japanese laborers, imported from their own country, free of duty. The Japanese are prejudiced in favor of their own rice, and the Government was disposed to accede to the request, provided that such a course involved no infringement of treaty obligations. Before Mr. Daggett reached Washington this matter was virtually settled by the proposal to withdraw, and Mr. Daggett was not therefore called upon to take any steps in regard to it.

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It will get into the papers, and that was what he wanted. The Legislative Assembly is not for "panni" but for business. A little pot feel the evening before, and a little business in the morning, should not cause a member to be late.

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Second reading of a bill to amend section 1, chapter 21, of the Session Laws of 1881, relating to the challenges of jurors. Mr. Castle moved it be engrossed; it was a very good bill.

Mr. Dole said he did not think the Crown should have the right of challenging jurors. The law as it stood was introduced by Mr. Cecil Brown and had worked well. The Government controlled the Courts and jury lists, and had every advantage.

His Excellency the Attorney General said he was surprised at the objection by Mr. Dole. All criminals, outside of those convicted for murder, should pass a vote of thanks to him. The objection surprised him, unless Mr. Dole had made up his mind that all defenses of criminal cases would come to him during the next two years. During his residence in the country his experience, especially in Honolulu, was that this would be a wholesome law in the furtherance of justice and good behavior. He hoped the amendment would not pass.

Mr. Kaulukou hoped the bill would pass without any amendment whatever. On the amendment proposed by Mr. Dole being put to the House, only three voted in its favor. The bill then passed to engrossment, and, on motion of Mr. Aholo, was ordered to be read a third time on Saturday.

Second reading of an act to license pawnbrokers. On suspension of the rules, the bill was read by its title and then referred to the Judiciary Committee. VAGRANCY ACT. Second reading of an Act to amend section 1, chapter 37, of the Penal Code, relating to vagrants and disorderly and idle persons.

Second reading of an Act to amend section 498 of the Civil Code, relating to the Board of Education. Mr. Castle moved it be referred to the Committee on Education. Carried. ADJOURNMENT. Mr. Castle moved the House adjourn until 10 o'clock Saturday morning. It would give the Select Committee time to go around and visit the public institutions. It would also materially assist the committee in their work.

His Excellency has now entered upon his fifth year of office, with every prospect before him of a long and prosperous ministerial career. Narrative of the Loss by Fire of the Bark Jorsalfarer.

Nine Days at Sea in Open Boats—Interesting Narrative by Captain J. C. S. Stoesen.

The ADVERTISER recently published a short narrative of the loss of the Norwegian bark Jorsalfarer by fire on her voyage from Newcastle, N. S. W., to this port; and so much interest attached to it, that Captain Stoesen was requested by us to furnish a detailed account of the voyage. This he kindly consented to do, more especially as a statement had appeared in a local paper regarding the privations of the men in the boats which he desired to correct.

On the 14th, at 2 a. m., the ship's position 4 deg. 41 min. south latitude, 153 deg. 14 min. west longitude, the First Officer, who had watch on deck, suddenly called me and reported that he had noticed steam issuing from the forehatch, which had always been kept open for ventilation. Immediately went forward and saw steam rising from the hold. Went down to ascertain where the steam came from, but as no light was seen, being afraid of explosion, nothing definite was ascertained.

Something New in the Canning Trade. (Chicago Times.) Many housekeepers have for years put up fruit for their own use in glass jars, employing clarified cane sugar instead of glucose to aid in preservation. If they raised their fruit or were able to obtain that which had been recently picked, they would have a table luxury vastly superior to anything sold in tin cans. Few town people, however, raise fruit of any kind, and there is generally considerable difficulty in procuring perishable fruits that are in good condition for canning. To meet their wants, some fruit-raisers during the past few years have put up choice fruits in glass jars and placed them on the market. They have sold at prices never before realized for canned fruits. They are in demand for invalids and epicures, who never hesitate to pay large sums for very superior articles of food. That certain kinds of fruit put up in glass will soon take the place of those packed in metal cans appears certain. The fruits that are most in demand are cherries, red raspberries, currants, black currants, and strawberries. The former can be preserved to good advantage in metal cans on account of the acids they contain.

DIRECTIONS FOR MAKING POI.—Take the desired amount of flour and mix very thick with cold water, being sure there are no lumps. Continue this in a bag or cloth and place in a kettle of boiling water, and let it continue to boil 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 hours, according to quantity used, care being taken to place a piece of perforated tin at the bottom of the kettle so as to prevent the cloth from burning. When done (while warm) stir with a stout spoon, adding a little water until the whole is well mixed. Let this stand from five to six hours. Then add water in small quantities, mixing thoroughly and kneading until the desired consistency is obtained. Owing to its purity it takes from three to four days to become acid or sour.
