THE LIQUOR PROBLEM.

A considerable amount of discussion has been going on of late in the open columns of some Honolulu newspapers about the advisableness or otherwise of enacting prohibitory legislation with regard to the liquor traffic. The practical value of such legislation, the question whether or not it is effectual to compass the end for which it is framed, can only be determined by actual experience. and that is not wanting. It is afforded in the history of several States of the Union. But so many conflicting reports have emanated from different sources as to the effects of prohibition that it is a matter of extreme difficulty to get at the truth. The typical prohibitionist wil tell you that the results are such as to warrant the universal extension of the principle; the anti-prohibitionist is as ready to prove that the law has been utterly futile. Both are enthusiasts, and as such their claims should be subjected to the severest scrutiny before receiving acceptance. For this reason the appointment of the United States Liquor Commission is a step which should be hailed with satisfaction by all honest men and women who take an interest in the subject, inasmuch as it is calculated to throw much valuable light upon the whole subject. In the meantime we would direct attention to the possibility of eradicating the craving for liquor in those who have developed it in an abnormal degree. We are under the impression that there are instances on record in which this has been accomplished, and although it does not appear to have commanded a large amount of public attention it is a matter eminently deserving of examination by the medical profession.

Some little time was occupied in discussing a motion made by the counsel for the defense with regard to the indictment not being explicit enough, but His Honor over ruled the motion.

THE EVIDENCE.

Attorney General Ashford, at 10:43 o'clock, opened to the jury, briefly reviewing the facts of the case for the prosecution. He also gave a brief outline of the law on the subject. The first witness he called was

W. R. Castle, who being sworn, stated : I am a member of the Legislature. Durthe session of 1887 I was a member of a special committee appointed to examine into a tabular statement of the withdrawal of bonded liquors from the Custom House. In performing the duty I went to Mr. Luce about a certain withdrawal by the Portuguese Commissioner. [Exhibit A was here introduced and was the order for the liquors.] I saw him about this order at his store and asked him about it. He told me the order was handed to him by Captain Hayley with the erasure on the back. He stated that he filled the order in himself and showed me the stub. He said Captain Hayley received the credit of the remitted duties. That was about the first of the conversation. It occurred at Mr. Luce's store. Merchant street. We were alone until he showed me the stub when we

went into his office. I believe Mr. Cecil Brown was there. Luce said it was customary to have the orders signed in that way. I think something was said about the disposition of the liquors.

Cross-examined-I was chairman of the Special Committee and made a thorough investigation. Found a large amount of withdrawals. The amount on that tabulated statement was nearly \$40,000. I found withdrawals by Mr. Canavarro. The duties remitted were somewhere about the amount of \$1,200. It was in November. I also went to Macfarlane's store. I did not find at any other place withdrawals credited to third party. L. A. Thurston, sworn, stated: I am Minister of Interior. Have held office since July 1, 1887. I know defendant. am aware of the nature of this prosecution. I have had conversation with defendant about it. It was in March of this year at my office, in the presence of Messrs. Hartwell, Hatch, Whiting, the Attorney General and myself. On the 1st of March I received an application for renewal of license from Mr. Luce. [Application here read.] Upon the same date I received a letter from the Attorney General objecting to a renewal of the license for certain reasons. In consequence of the protest I wrote to Mr. Luce. [Letter here read.] It was dated March 2d. On March 3d I received a letter from Luce asking for an interview. [Letter read.] In reply I made an appointment for an interview. It was held, I think, on the Monday following. It lasted about an hour and a half. The subject was about the withdrawal of liquors, more particularly with regard to the order on which this prosecution is based. A number of statements were made by Mr. Luce. Many questions were also asked him. The latter said Hayley had a liquor account with him, Canavarro did not. Hayley said he would bring an order from Canavarro, the remission of duties on which would amount to \$500. He (Luce) approved of such proposition on the part of Hayley and the latter did bring the order. The order was in blank and was made out by Mr. Luce for such liquors as he chose to fill in. He made out a list of liquors, the duties of which remitted would be about \$504. He withdrew the liquors as filled out in the order. That the liquors were not delivered to either Hayley or Canavarro. but went into his general stock of merchandise. He then placed \$300 to the credit of Hayley and the balance to Can avarro although he had no account with

ABOUT THE OOKS.

On reassembling at 1:30 the Attorney General read an order he had forwarded to defendant's counsel the previous day, calling upon them to produce certain books used by the defendant in business. He would ask if the books were produced.

Mr. Hartwell said they had not, nor would they be produced. There was a civil action pending, and by statute the defendant was not bound to produce them.

The Attorney General would then ask if the reason why they were not produced was because they would criminate the defendant?

Mr. Hartwell said the defense gave no such reason. He then quoted the statute. His Honor thought that the statute protected the defendant.

THE EVIDENCE CONTINUED.

The Minister of Foreign Affairs was then to be called to prove that Senhor A. de Souza Canavarro was Commissioner for Portugal during the year 1887. The defense admitted that such was the case, therefore the Minister was not called.

Attorney General Ashford, sworn, stated: On March 5th or 6th I was called into the Interior Office and there met defendant and his counsel. The subject of the renewal of Mr. Luce's license came up. My protest against its renewal was the first point that came up. I enlightened them on the subject of my protest. I said we considered Mr. Luce guilty of forgery in regard to the Canavarro order. There was direct reference to conspiracy in that interview. We did not have the original order present, but a copy. The interview was lengthy, from 11 to 12:30 o'clock, and the matter was discussed by us all. Mr. Luce's object was to remove my protest to the license as not being well founded. Luce professed throughout the interview he had not been guilty of a crime. Mr. Luce stated openly that Capt. Hayley had a running account with him. My recollection is that Luce said Havley was indebted to him at the time of this transaction, but would like to look at his books. Luce stated that Hayley suggested that he (Hayley) should secure an order from Canavarro for the withdrawal of liquors from the Custom House. Hayley proposed to bring an order from Canavarro for \$500. Also, that Hayley should secure Canavarro's name on a blank order, and that he (Luce) should fill in the order with liquors the duty on which would be \$500. They, having so filled it in, should draw those liquors from the Custom House without payment of duty, and should use Mr. Canavarro's name to secure a remission of duties, the amount remitted to be placed to Hayley's account. It is not clear to me what amount was to be placed to Hayley's account. Luce stated that he gave Hayley a blank form, and that Hayley returned the form to him with Canavarro's endorsement on it. Luce thought it was redelivered to him the same day or the next. After Hayley brought it back Luce filled it in with the liquors and signed it with his name. With reference to who handed the order to the Custom House, I did not hear him say who did that. Luce, however, withdrew the liquors, the duties on which were \$501 15. He made a credit to the account of Hayley and credited the balance to Canavarro. He was not positive to the respective amounts of those credits. However, he settled \$301 to Hayley and \$200 to Canavarro. He was pretty sure those were the amounts credited up. With regard to Hayley's indebtedness to him, I examined him on that point. He stated Hayley was indebted to him, but whether a larger or smaller sum than credited by the duties he could not say. He stated he had no account with Canavarro at that time. He said, though, he had sent liquor to the Hotel Stables on the order of Hayley. The latter stated it was for Canavarro, but Luce said he charged it to Hayley because he ordered it. He the latter. Luce stated that liquors said he had no knowledge whether this liquor was sent to Canavarro. He stated that the amount of \$200 was still standing to the credit of Canavarro, though he had had no dealings with him before or after. I asked him if he was using Canavarro's name to pay Jack Hayley's whisky bills. He did not denv it in terms, but answered, "Well, I supposed it was for Canavarro." He did, however, say he had avoided the duties which had gone to pay Hayley's liquor bill. He stated the liquor drawn went into his general trade; that no portion of it went to Canavarro; that no portion of it went to Hayley on that transaction. He admitted that through the transaction he knew that none of the liquor would go to Canavarro. The principle in this transaction was nothing new; it was customary, or they all did it. He used words to that effect. He relied upon Hayley's statement throughout the transaction. He would not have taken such a part had he known Canavarro was not aware of it. He stated distinctly that he saw Canavarro's name on the order, but did not see the erasion, nor did he see any limitation on the order as to the amount. The original order was for one cask of wine. This had been erased. Luce denied with much warmth, apparent sincerity and indignation having changed the order or having any knowledge of its being changed. I got pretty warm at the interview. Luce protested that books. He had a running account with he made nothing by the transaction. He said he did not know Hayley was a dead beat, but nevertheless he has secure

\$300 credit from me. He protested that he did not know Hayley was generally in debt, and that there was trouble in collecting bills from him. Mr. Luce and his counsel did not secure the withdrawal of my protest against the renewal of his license. Mr. Luce proposed a speedy trial of any charge to be brought against him.

Cross-examined-I stated that the interview commenced at 11. It may have been later than that when we commenced. Five lawyers were present, and they all talked. I do not think any of Luce's counsel used any epithets. Perhaps the expressions I used were rather warm. I characterized Hayley pretty strongly, and I think Thurston concurred with me. I think Mr. Hatch disapproved of Hayley being called a scallawag and dead beat, and said he moved in good circles. I never believed Hayley was an officer in the British army, nor do I still. I do not think he knows anything about military matters. To some limited extent I know something about military matters. Prior to April last year I had never spoken to Luce. I have no personal animus against Luce. I had a lawsuit with Luce about a building, and got waxed, or in other words, beaten; I am aware the building has since been removed from that window. Am not aware of the circumstances of the removal.

I. Q. Tewksbury, sworn, stated: I am a storekeeper at the bonded warehouse at Custom House. I have been there five years. I receive goods in bond and collect duties. Have liquor under my charge in considerable quantities at times. If a liquor dealer wishes to withdraw they come to me. I know the defendant; he is a wholesale liquor and wine merchant. He has had business relations with me. I have seen this (Exhibit A); it is an order for the withdrawal of liquors. The signature is Luce's. I saw this order on February 1, 1887, at my office. 1 do not know

THE CONSPIRACY CASE.

W. S. Luce Tried Before a Foreign Jury.

In the Supreme Court yesterday the case of the King vs. W. S. Luce, conspiracy, was commenced before the following jury: P. Opfergelt, James Nott, J. D. Tucker, F. W. Wood, S. Ephraim, R. W. Podmore, T. K. Moore, W. C Wilder, Jr., W. Lantz, R. J. Lillie, E. J. Spalding and W. H. McLean.

THE INDICTMENT.

The indictment under which the defendant is charged is a somewhat lengthy one. Following is an abstract:

That W. S. Luce, a foreigner by birth, on January 28, 1887, did fraudulently and feloniously conspire, combine, confederate, concert and agree together with one A. B. Hayley, by false pretenses and with intent to defraud, cheat, debar, deprive and defraud another, to wit, the Hawaiian Government, of the legal reve ues of said Government of the value,

who brought it there. Mr. Luce generally brought orders of this size himself. If he did not come his teamster would. This order was for the purpose of getting out the goods mentioned. They are all dutiable goods. Neither Mr. Luce nor any person paid duty on those goods, because the order bears the signature of Senhor Canavarro, the Portuguese Commissioner. These goods were all imported. Either myself or the clerk delivered them to Mr. Luce. I recollect the order being scratched. With the name of Canavarro on the order it entitled him to the goods mentioned free of duty. The goods were in bond before they were delivered to Luce. The amount of duty on these goods on the order amounts to \$501 15. It has never

yet been paid. Cross examined—I noticed the erasure at the time the order was presented. The orders are filed upstairs in the Custom House, but not by me. This order has been before the Chief Justice and also in the Attorney General's office. The erasure looks a little more prominent now than when I first saw it. [The witness was here shown a number of orders which he said were from the Custom House files, and the book (produced) contained others]. I have not learned anything new in this matter between the time the case first came up and now. The prosecution here rested.

THE DEFENSE.

At 4:05 o'clock Mr. Hatch opened the case for the defense. He stated that they would show that there had been no conspiracy between the defendant and Havley.

W. S. Luce, sworn, stated: I filled in this order (produced), signed it and drew the goods from the Custom House. I did it at the request of Captain Hayley. He was a customer of mine and Canavarro told him he would give him an order for remission of duty. I gave him a blank order and he returned it later signed by Mr. Canavarro, the Portuguese Commissioner. Hayley did not owe me anything at that time.

[At this point the Attorney General asked that the Court make an order for the defendant to produce his day and cash books, journal and ledger, showing the entries for February, 1887. His

to wit, five hundred dollars, and to commit an offense against the laws of the Hawai'an Kingdom, to wit, the offense of gross cheat.

And so the Atterney General, upon his official oath, doth present and say that the said W. S. Luce, at Honolulu aforesaid, upon, to wit, the date aforesaid, and in the manner aforesaid, did commit and is guilty of the crime of conspiracy in the first degree against the peace and dignity of our Sovereign Lord the King, and contrary to the form of the statute in such case made and provided.

And the Attorney General doth further present and say that the said W.S. Luce did fraudulently and feloniously conspire, combine, confederate, concert and agree, together with one A. B. Haley, to do what is obviously and directly wrongfully injurious to another, to wit, to the Hawaiian Government, to wit, to deprive and debar the said Government of certain revenues, to wit, of the sum of five hundred dollars of its legal revenues. to wit, the duties upon certain imported and dutiable goods and to obstruct and prevent the collection by said Government of certain of its legal revenues, to wit, the legal duties to the amount of, to wit, five hundred dollars upon certain imported and dutiable goods.

And so the Attorney General doth say that the said W. S. Luce did commit the crime of conspiracy in the first degree against the peace and dignity of our Sov-

were sent to the Hawaiian Hotel stables by the order of Hayley, who stated they were for Canavarro. With regard to the erasure on this particular order, he (Luce) stated he did not see it. He also stated he did not then see the limitation to the order for one case of wine. He stated if he had seen the erasure or the limitation to one case of wine he certainly would not have filled out the order. He disclaimed any wrong intent; he supposed it was all right, as Hayley told him so. He thought that Canavarro had told Hayley to fill out the order. I knew Hayley. Believe he was Intelligence Officer in the Hawaiian army. He left here last fall. Luce stated he had Canavarro's signature or otherwise he would not have acted upon

the order. Cross-examined - At the interview there was something said about going to Canavarro's house and taking his statement. I think it was suggested by Luce and his counsel that they wished a trial at once, and the charg- of forgery was mentioned. The Attorney General said he had spoken to Canavarro, but the latter would have first to write to his Government to obtain permission to be a witness. Luce said he could not remember any erasion. At the interview we used a blank order. Luce said he could not remember that Hayley owed him anything without referring to his Hayley.

At 12:15 the Court took a recess.

Honor said he could not do that. The Attorney General then asked that all the evidence given by the defendant re lating to the subject be stricken out. His Honor said he should prefer not to rule it out.]

The examination of the witness was then continued: Frequently Captain Havley came to order goods of me for Canavarro. I knew Hayley shortly after he arrived. He has acted for other members of the Diplomatic Corps in getting orders from me. It was during he time after he was in business for bimself. He ordered largely for these different people. I never mistrusted Hayley's statements. I don't know anything about Hayley's financial standing. He had an income from home and also held two or three positions here. I considered for this place he had a very good income. He had credit. I believe he paid his bills; never heard he didn't.] do not remember seeing the erasure on the order. I observed Canavarro's name. I do not think the paper looks the same now as it did before. When I saw it a month ago I was surprised at the difference in it. The amount of money for duties I filled in at Hayley's The \$501 15 was filled H. I. dictation. in prior to the order being presented at the Custom House. I had no agreement with Hayley about these liquors before drawing them. Had no agreement with him whatever. Have drawn liquors for other Diplomatic Représentatives. Sometimes filled in the order before they signed and somet mes after. I said at the interview that I did not know how Hayley's account with me stood. I had not looked into it. I have had dealings with Canavarro since the date of that order. I did not say anything about this at the interview. At 5 o'clock the Court adjourned to 9:30 o'clock this morning.
