NUPTIALS.

Mr. J. M. Dowsett and Miss W. Widemann United in Marriage.

The Ceremony Takes Place at St. Andrew's Cathedral Before a Large Assemblage—Full Particulars of the Affair.

At St. Andrew's Cathedral yesterday morning at 11:30 o'clock, Mr. John McKibbin Dowsett, employed in the banking house of Bishop & Co., was united in marriage to Miss Wilhelmina Widemann, daughter of our respected townsman Hon. H. A. Widemann. The Cathedral doors were thrown open at 11 o'clock and a quarter of an hour later every seat which was not reserved for the relatives and friends of the two families was occupied.

The chancel of the Cathedral was most profusely decorated with choice flowers, palms and evergreens. Between the pillars were pretty hanging baskets, while the pillars themselves were festooned with different colored vines. On either side of the chancel were handsome pots of ferns and small palms. The desks of the two front seats occupied by the relatives of the contracting parties were almost buried in choice and fragrant flowers.

At 11:30 o'clock the bridegroom, attended by his best man, Mr. H. M. Whitney, Jr., and Messrs. C. J. Deering and Carl Widemann, took up positions near the altar. A few minutes later the bride, leaning on her father's arm and attended by Miss Bernice Parke, maid of honor, and Misses Dora Dowsett and Alvina Widemann, entered the Cathedral and passed up the center aisle to the music of the Wedding March from Lohengrin. The bride was dressed in a handsome costume of white crepe trimmed with lilacs. She also wore a veil and diamond ornaments. The bridesmaids wore dresses of white flannel trimmed with military braid. The bride carried a bouquet of white stephanotis, and the bridesmaids each a parasol trimmed with the same flower.

The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Alexander Mackintosh according to the ritual of the Episcopal Church. After it was over the bridal party retired to the vestry to sign the register. They left the Cathedral to the strains of Mendelssohn's Wedding March.

At the residence of the bride's parents, Hotel street, the newly married couple held a reception from noon to 3 o'clock. The interior of the house was magnificently decorated for the occasion. One round table in a corner of the parlor where the reception was held was covered with magnolias, while the center lamp chandelier was festooned with stephanotis. The wedding presents were numerous and of the most exquisite kind. Their Majesties the King and Queen, H. R. H. Princess Liliuokalani, H. R. H. Princess Kaiulani, His Excellency Governor Dominis, Hon. A. S. Cleghorn and a large number of our leading residents attended the reception. The Royal Hawaiian band was stationed on the lawn and played appropriate selections during the reception.

Late in the afternoon the happy couple left for their future residence at Makiki. Next week they leave for a trip on Hawaii. We join in wishing Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Dowsett much prosperity and happiness in their journey through life.

Hot Fomentations.

An exchange gives the following: "Wring several thicknesses of flannel out of cold water, so it will not drip; place between two folds of paper, and lay it upon a hot register or top of a stove. Steam will generate and permeate the whole cloth, and thus the required temperature will be obtained. In this way there is no running long distances to a kitchen, no burning of the hands, no uncomfortable moisture in the bed and no ruffled tempers. A hot fomentation is beneficial in almost every acute disease accompanied by severe pain, and is often of great service in chronic inflammations. It is more effectual and more accessible than any other therapeutic agent. By quick, prompt and thorough use severe attacks of illness are often prevented."—Herald of Health.

CONTEMPT OF COURT.

The "Hawaiian Gazette" and the "Hawaiian Chinese News" Adjudged Guilty.

SUPREME COURT, SPECIAL TERM, FEB., 1888. Before Judd, C. J., McCully, Preston, Bickerton and Dole, Judges.

The King vs. Lee Fook. Application for attachment against Lum Kum Cheung, Ching Cheung Ping and H. M. Whitney, publisher of the "Gazette" for contempt.

An opinion to the following effect was given by Mr. Justice Preston and acquiesced in by the Chief Justice, Associate Justices McCulley and Bickerton:

On the 6th of January last Lee Fook was committed for trial at the then next ensuing term on a charge of perjury in swearing to the truth of certain statements contained in a petition presented by him to the Chief Justice for a writ of habeas corpus for the release of certain Chinese women and girls alleged to be unlawfully detained.

On the 14th January Lum Kum Cheung published in the "Hawaiian Chinese News" of which he was editor and manager, a proclamation purporting to be issued by the United Chinese Society, reflecting upon the said Lee Fook. It was also published in English in the daily and weekly editions of the "Hawaiian Gazette" on the 18th and 24th of January respectively.

It was charged and admitted that H.M. Whitney, the publisher of the "Gazette," was instigated by one Ching Cheung Ping to publish it.

On the application of Lee Fook an order was made by this Court on the 15th February for the three persons named to show cause why an attachment should not issue against them for contempt of Court.

The article complained of, which was quoted, was headed "Chinese Female Traffic. Important Proclamation by the United Chinese Society." The proclamation related to the alleged kidnapping of girls and women in Canton, Hongkong and other places, for the purpose of being shipped to California for immoral purposes; to the sentence passed upon Wong Hung in California in connection with the traffic, and to some of the girls and women he was accused of kidnapping being returned on the San Pablo which touched at Honolulu. It went on to reflect upon Lee Fook for the action he had taken in regard to these females.

Upon argument it was contended that the mere fact of Lee Fook having been committed for trial did not make his case pending in this Court, and that the publication was made in good faith and without any intention to prejudice a fair trial of defendant.

The Court is of opinion that when a person is committed for trial in this Court the case is at once pending in this Court. Otherwise it would be impossible for the Crown or the defendant to enforce the attendance of witnesses until an indictment was found, which would in many cases prevent the defendant having his trial for some months.

The Court is also of opinion that the publication is unquestionably contempt of Court—according to decisions in other cases, tending to prejudice the right of defendant to a just and impartial decision of his case and to embarrass and obstruct the course of justice.

The respondents having disclaimed any improper motives, and it appearing that the defendant has been discharged by a demurrer to the indictment allowed, the Court are not disposed to inflict any punishment. The respondents were accordingly discharged.

DISSENTING OPINION.

Mr. Justice Dole doubted whether the mere committal for trial in the Supreme Court gave that Court jurisdiction over the case. He quoted the statute of 1876 on procedure in criminal cases, pointing out that the Supreme Court had no authority to try the case until an indictment was presented, and concluded that the publication was not a contempt of court.

MIDNIGHT ON THE DOCKS.

SHADOWS COME AND VANISH LIKE GHOSTS IN THE DARKNESS.

The Lonely Life of Dock Watchmen and the Queer Ways of the Remarkable Characters Who Frequent the Docks After Dark.

A sharp nor'wester had driven the watchmen of the North river docks to their stoves and shelter, while a pale moon illuminated the desolate scene outside, deepening the somber shadows around. "Naw, dad's gone ashore," he answered slowly. Just then the head of a woman appeared beside the boy and a whispered conference ensued.

"Are you the captain's wife, madam?" asked the reporter.

"I reckon so," replied the woman angrily. "but what do you want to know for? Suthin's wrong, I guess," and a pained expression passed over her face as she looked with longing eyes toward the lights and the city in the distance. In spite of assurances, her anxiety aroused by the questions asked became greater.

"Now if suthin's wrong, why don't ye tell me?" she pleaded. "I know suthin's the matter. I'm sure on it! Why don't ye tell me?"

"What is wrong?" asked the reporter.

"Well, ye see my husband went ashore this mornin' spectin' to return at noon, and he ain't back yet."

It was useless to ask further questions; the woman was inconsolable, and refused to answer any. The reporter withdrew, leaving the two figures outlined against the sky—the wife looking anxiously toward the city, the boy watching the lights on the river, while the cabin within was desolate.

On the Wilson line steamship docks a little man leaned lazily up against a post, puffing large clouds of tobacco from a pipe and gazing solemnly at the boards.

"Pretty quiet around here?" said the reporter.

"Yes. Somethin' like a graveyard to-night," replied the man in a deep, sepulchral voice, his eyes still fixed on the ground. "I was watchin' the rats scamperin' about there. H'm! They're havin' a high old time to-night; none of the men's workin' ye see, and they're undisturbed."

A stout, muscular man clothed in pea-jacket and sou'wester, sauntered slowly up and down the dock, humming the "Girl I left behind me" in a gruff, unmusical voice.

"Wuz that two bells, mate?" he inquired of the solemn individual.

"One bell," replied the watchman.

"Good night for suicides?" suggested the reporter.

"Yes, or even a murder," continued the watchman, gloomily. "There's been many an accident and much loss of life happened around here night times."

"Do you generally attempt a rescue?"

"Of course we do. Who else would it be didn't? You see we're so used to it that we understand all the sounds and noises around here. We can tell the difference between a dash of the wave and the splash of a suicide. Why, I could detect the slightest footstep in any part of this dock. Do you hear that?"

A low, plaintive sound like the moan of some one in distress echoed near by. "Now, that sounds like a groan, but it ain't; it's the wind. There, hear that? That's the side of some ship scratchin' alongside the wharf. Some time ago a soloon keeper had trouble with his wife. He took a duetkin, and when we fished him out he thanked us, took a car and went home. No one was the wiser 'ceptin' ourselves. Pretty women-tramps, broken down bankers, lovers, bums, all kinds, drops over the side here into the river at night, and we generally fishes 'em out."

"Don't you report these cases to the police?"

"We ain't obliged to, 'cause we ain't officers of the law. Then we don't often see a policeman above Fourteenth street. It's too quiet for 'em, I guess."

Schooners and small craft were anchored alongside the wharves, while lights shone from the cabin windows and their columns of smoke poured from the small chimneys on the barges. Attracted by a light which hung from a short mast drifting about in the wind the reporter walked to the end of a wharf and found a canal boat lying a few yards from the end. 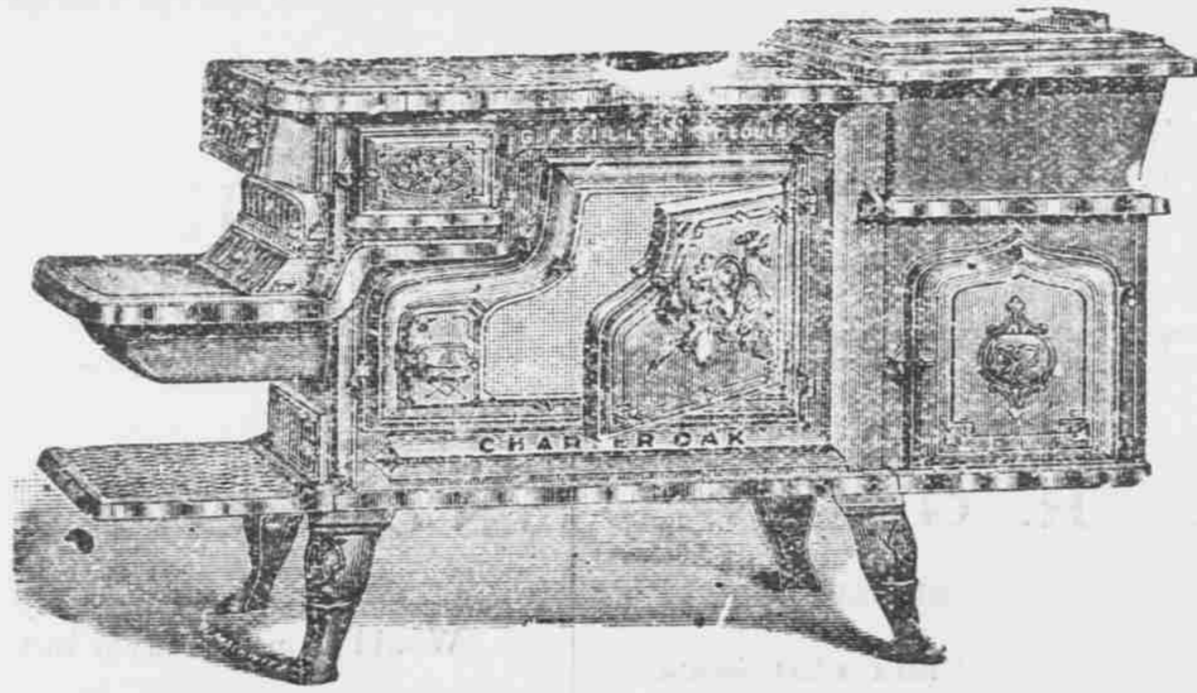
