



22. The road taxes collected in each village to remain in the village and not to be put in the District Road Funds. 23. The above twenty-two points are WELL-KNOWN to be sat upon and duly considered before he (the Representative) runs the gauntiet in the Legislative halls.

A committee was then picked out as follows: Paele, chairman; Kala, secretary; Anakalea, Kamoau, Kanamu, Helio, Naehu, Karolo, Nehemia, Haleauki, Anton Paiko, and Kalima. The committee is to meet next week, April 12th, to further consider the dire wants of Kaupo and the district in general. Before the meeting dispersed a letter was read from Ulupalakua, requesting

our Rep. P. Kamai to be present at a grand luau to be held there in honor of "Missy Wilikoki" some day next week. The meeting then adjourned.






CHINESE CHURCH.


