 Rev. W. K. Azbill, who is returning to the States from Japan, is in Honolulu, the guest of Rev. T. D. Garvin.  
 There will be no lunch served at the headquarters of the Red Cross Society on Nuuanu street at noon today.  
 Gear, Lansing & Co., have purchased the property including the Makiki baseball park from the Kapiolani estate.  
 The first installment of the Klondike clean up, \$1,500,000 has reached San Francisco. The total will be \$10,000,000.  
 A talk in arrangements prevented a baseball game between the Regents and visiting soldiers yesterday afternoon.  
 The Government has given permission to General Otis to established a camp on a big piece of land near the Makiki pumping plant.  
 The new Japanese Methodist church is being rushed to completion with the special view of having Rev. Harris, from Japan, assist in the dedication.

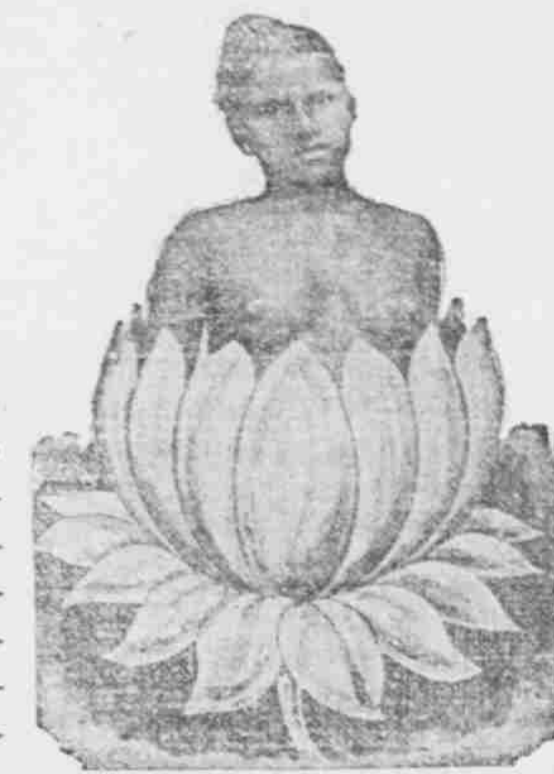
