## FAIR DOG FANCIERS.

WEALTHY WOMEN WHO PROPOSE TO ENGINEER A BENCH SHOW.

Pet Canines Who Eat the Fat of the Land from Solid Silver Dishes and Have a Jolly Time Generally in the Splendid Homes of Their Mistresses.

After invading about every other domain that has hitherto, by the men at least, been considered sacred to the lords of creation, the American woman is now arranging to enter actively into the field of bench shows.

The new departure is to be made by the American Pet Dog club, which is composed almost entirely of ladies, though, with the most praiseworthy magnanimity, male creatures are not entirely excluded from membership. But the control of affairs rests in the hands of the female members, and only one of the offices, the presidency, has been given to a man. The presidency is held by Mrs. Charles Wheatleigh, of New York; Mrs. S. C. Barnum, of the same city, is vice president, and Miss Marion E. Bannister, of Crawford, N. J., is secretary. The membership rolls embrace ladies from half a dozen different states. It is the president, Mrs. Wheatleigh, who has the most active in promoting the scheme for a bench show.

"We are tired," she said to me recently, "of being shoved off into some deserted corner at the bench shows which we attend. Our dogs are always the greatest attraction in the shows, at least for women and children, but the managers invariably put us off into the darkest places where no one can ever find us. As a result, any number of people who own pet dogs have of recent years refused to exhibit them, and all of these, whether members or not, will aid us if we give a show. Our club was formed for the purpose of protecting the rights of the pet dog and improving the breed. Our specialty clubs will be invited to co-operate with us, and we will probably have our show in Madison Square garden."

To give a successful bench show is an undertaking little less difficult than building a railroad through a wilderness, and many an ambitious man has gone down helplessly before the undertaking. But Mrs. Wheatleigh is endowed with a very unusual amount of energy, and she will bring enough enthusiasm to the task to enable her to surmount any difficulty. She fairly idolizes her dogs, of which she has seven, all thoroughbred pugs, with Yuma-Yuma, a blue ribbon winner, as queen, and she is willing to submit to any amount of trouble and annoyance to advance the interests of the pet dog world. She is the wife of Charles Wheatleigh, the actor, who is also a member of the club, and their handsome home at No. 129 East Sixteenth street, in New York, has been generously placed at the disposal of the club as a meeting place and general headquarters.

The other members, many of them prominent society women, are scarcely less enthusiastic than their president for the proposed dog show.

Mrs. Barnum, the vice president, is the wife of a very wealthy clothing merchant, and lives in an imposing mansion on Lexington avenue, New York. She has a way taken an active interest in dogs, and was at one time a prominent exhibitor at the bench shows. At present Mrs. Barnum is content with the honor of possessing the fattest and jolliest pug in the club.

Miss Bannister, the club's secretary, is a handsome young woman of 19 or 20, and almost as popular in New York as she is in her home circles at Crawford. Miss Bannister has any number of thoroughbred spaniels and pugs, but her most particular pet is Nady, the smallest pug known to dogdom. Nady is quite the belle in her circles, and the quitted wraps she wears on her New York visits have made an undying reputation for her. Miss Bannister has a special playground for her pets at Crawford, a tract of ground 200 by 100.

Mrs. Frank Leslie is one of the most earnest members of the club, but on account of her exacting business and social duties she rarely finds time to attend the meetings, which are held in the afternoon, just at a time when Mrs. Leslie is busiest at her desk. She keeps fully posted in the affairs of the club, though, and at the proposed bench show her dog,

The Kalakaua Monument Association lately established, with the endorsement of the general public, is now ready to receive subscriptions. The many details, necessary for properly carrying out a scheme, involving the subscriptions of an indefinite number of patriotic citizens throughout the group, have been skillfully arranged by the very able committee appointed at the organization meeting.

The committee referred to comprises: Hon. Sam'l Parker, Hon. C. J. McCarthy, Hon. John Ema, Hon. Antonio Rosa, Hon. E. C. Macfarlane, and Messrs. W. G. Ashley, of the O. R. & L. Co., Mark P. Robinson, J. F. Colburn and E. F. Bishop. These gentlemen have already secured blank receipts, which will be issued as vouchers entitling the holder to a souvenir, Kalakaua Monument certificate.

The souvenir certificates, as before mentioned in the BULLETIN, will be gotten up by the American Bank Note Co. of New York, and will be exchanged for the certificates now

being issued, as soon as the former are received.

We believe this is the first time in the history of Hawaii that a monument fund has been projected by popular subscription. There is every reason why this project should be made a success. It is not only a fitting tribute to a dead monarch, whose reign has been noteworthy for the commercial advancement of the Kingdom, but it devolves upon us, as loyal patriotic citizens, a duty which we owe the Kingdom at large, to acknowledge the beneficence of our past Government by endorsing, in the erection of a fitting and appropriate memorial to the head of Government, the strides of national advancement placing us upon the plane of our present commercial and political condition amongst the nations of earth.

There is no doubt the response of the nation to this monument fund will be general, as it deserves to be; and we urge upon every man, woman and child within the Kingdom to come forward, without being called upon, and cast a patriotic mite into the treasury of the Monument Association.

As we, of Hawaii, scrutinize our past and anticipate our future, so, largely, will we be weighed in the opinion of the world. Let the Kalakaua Monument fund be named hereafter as an exponent of the historical integrity and national patriotism of Hawaii nei.

ENGLISH PRECEDENT.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—In the current discussion on "The Queen and the Cabinet," I do not lay much stress on foreign precedent. Particularly not on United States practice, where the President is the responsible head of the Executive, and chooses his ministers to suit his policy. Not much, either, on German precedent, for that Empire is behind our own in constitutional limitations of the sovereign's will. England is the most nearly analogous to Hawaii, but England's practices are not low to this independent kingdom with a written Constitution. They are only useful as guides in a new situation for which our Constitution does not adequately provide.

Below will be found extracts and condensed statements from the British Encyclopedia, the facts in which I have generally verified by reference to several English historians at hand. These are not intended as contradictions of the assertions made by "E. N. N.," but to show that some of these must be taken in a greatly modified sense. Under the heading, "Cabinet," the Encyclopedia has the following passages:

"Instances are not wanting in our history in which the direct action of the Sovereign has overthrown a Cabinet, or prevented a Cabinet from being formed. \* \* \* In 1812 Lord Moria was defeated in the attempt to form a Cabinet by the refusal of the Regent to consent to a change in the household; and in 1839 a similar reason was alleged by Queen Victoria to prevent the accession to office of Sir Robert Peel. But though this step was defended and sanctioned by a minute of the Whig Cabinet of the day, it is now generally regarded as unconstitutional, and the objection was never repeated."

"The representatives of the spending departments \* \* \* should, if possible, be members of the House which votes the supplies. Mr. Disraeli followed this precedent."

"A serious 'division in the Cabinet' is, as is well known, an infallible sign of its approaching dissolution. There are cases in which a minister has been dismissed for a departure from the concerted action of his colleagues. Thus, in 1851, Lord Palmerston having expressed to the French ambassador in London his unqualified approbation of the coup d'etat of Louis Napoleon against the Assembly when the Cabinet had resolved on observing a strict neutrality on the subject, Lord Russell advised Her Majesty to withdraw from Lord Palmerston the seals of the Foreign Department, and his lordship never again filled that office."

Sir Robert Peel said that, on resigning office, he offered no opinion as to the choice of a successor. "That is almost the only act which is the personal act of the sovereign," were his words: "It is for the sovereign to determine in whom his confidence shall be placed." Commenting on this the author of the article, "Ministry," in the Encyclopedia, says: "Yet this selection by the crown is practically limited. No prime minister could carry on the government of the country for any length of time who did not possess the confidence of the House of Commons."

William IV.'s dismissal of Lord Grey's Ministry, and calling in of Sir Robert Peel to form a new Government was the "last time" that "the sovereign actively interfered in the change of a Ministry."

Under the head, "Ministry," the Encyclopedia says: "In order that there may always be an existing head of the state the king is regarded as a corporation. He cannot die; there can be only a demise of the crown—that is, a transfer of the royal authority to a different person."

The impression I should gain from a consideration of the actual working of the English preference of the sovereign does not count in the formation or mutations of ministries. She

has the prerogative of choosing her advisers, but only exercises it to the extent of naming the first minister, and, in this privilege, her rule is to choose one who will be sustained by the House of Commons. When Gladstone last defeated Disraeli by the force of his Midlothian speeches, the Queen sent for Lord Hartington and, when he failed, for Earl Granville, but she had to take Gladstone at last in order to have a Ministry that would not be immediately voted out of power.

While I doubt whether our Queen can exercise her prerogative of choice until the Ministry goes out of office in the manner alone prescribed in the Constitution, I would not be dogmatic on this head as some are because I am not a constitutional lawyer. What I do claim is that if the Cabinet of Kalaupapa by courtesy or compulsion of law have resigned, the spirit of our Constitution and laws requires that they should without delay receive new commissions from the new Sovereign. The reasons for this conclusion may be briefly stated.

No solidly have the foundations of the British polity been compacted, a change of Ministry there by whatsoever or whomsoever brought about is only a routine incident. Here, where the state is substantially compressed in the capital, making the national legs very slender and the national neck very slim, a change of Ministry, especially under extraordinary circumstances, is a serious matter. Already the present political situation has to a large extent paralyzed business, and started injurious influences on trade which will be long in overcoming.

The present Ministers have a strong claim on being regarded as the choice of the nation. Coming in, as one of the Ministers said in the Legislature, "to fill a dangerous gap," but coming in as a coalition Cabinet so far as party support was concerned, they could hardly be so regarded if their tenure had not been contested and maintained. An attempt was made to withdraw from them the confidence of the Legislature, but its failure was so egregious as to amount to a handsome declaration of confidence in them by the people's representatives of both branches.

The present Ministers became very familiar with all the mass of legislative opinion not embodied in the laws of the session, but yet which is invaluable to Ministers who wish to administer affairs in agreement with the representative voice of the nation. They have gone far on the way of the period's administration but there is no need of repeating the arguments of others.

If we had a parliament sitting perpetually as in England, the situation would be of no moment, outside of questions of popular policy, than the arrival and departure of a steamer. But with the election and assembling of a new Legislature a year beyond, there is in the contingency of a change of rulers the liability of having a Ministry, or part of one, so inexperienced and incompetent as to create confusion in affairs, and give us an administration the bad effects of which would not be obliterated in decades of good government—just as the country is still heavily handicapped with the results of former regimes of misgovernment. There is the further possibility of a Cabinet opposed to the recently accepted principles of constitutional government, which might at the least allow executive matters to run in dangerous channels, establishing precedents that would make very uncomfortable situations in the future.

The late King gracefully submitted latterly to Cabinets that were partially distasteful to him, knowing that what might be his choice had no assurance of being granted tenure by the Legislature. It cannot be gained that under our system, as under the English, the personal preference of the sovereign in regard to advisers is of necessity very limited. Our Queen can only look forward, at the very best, to one year's enjoyment of counselors that may be after her own heart. She knows that the present Cabinet has the seal of the present Legislature's approval, also that no radical departure from the even tenor of our constitutional way will be acceptable to the people or the foreign interests, not to mention the foreign interests so weightily here which will be protected, and this according to the views they represent, by the respective Powers concerned.

Under all the circumstances, and in view of all considerations in point, the consummation most devoutly to be wished by friends of the country, as an autonomous state, is that any manifestations of friction may be cast in the background, and the public and private business of the kingdom be allowed to flow on serenely without a change of administration.

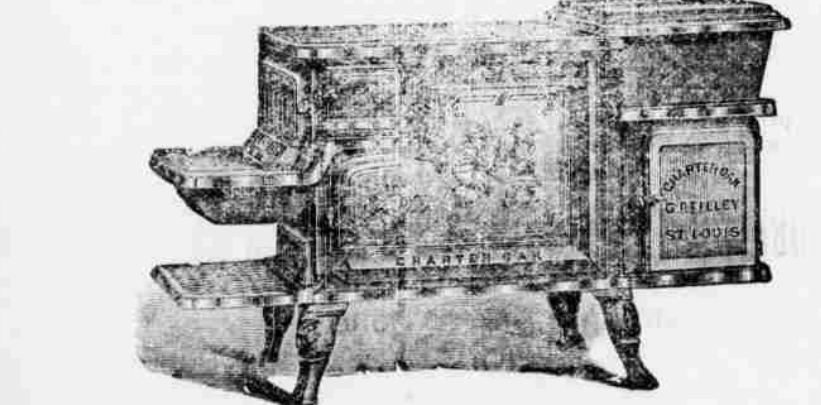

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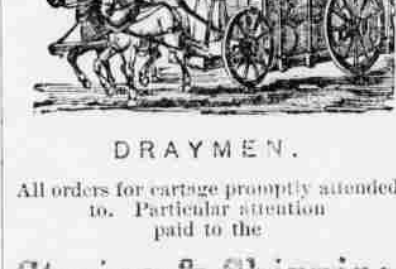
