Government Building Lots on Mount Tantalus.

The Auckland Herald gives the following interesting information: "The census of the Maori population has been published, and shows that the Maoris in New Zealand now number 41,312. This shows a decrease on the census of 1886 of 120 persons. The Maori population may be taken as being about stationary. In some districts, where the natives are not harassed about land-selling, and where they have taken to steady habits and to the cultivation of the soil, as in old times, they are actually increasing. In other places they are decreasing." There is a great idea lurking in that sentence about the class of New Zealand natives that is increasing, which might be taken to heart by influential friends of the native Hawaiians.

Section 22 of Chapter 65, Session Laws of 1888, reads: "No person shall hitch or fasten any horse or animal in such a manner that such horse or animal, or the appliance used for hitching or fastening such horse or animal, shall obstruct the free passage along any side or cross-walk." And Section 23, after forbidding the obstruction of a street by a vehicle longer than fifteen minutes, says: "Nor shall any person unnecessarily obstruct the passage of any street, lane, alley or cross-walk, by means of any vehicle or animal." These provisions seem to be honored as often in the breach as in the observance on the streets of Honolulu. Frequently sidewalks are barred by saddle horses, and cross-walks obstructed by carriages, compelling pedestrians to walk into the often muddy carriage way.

Hon. Judge J. G. Swan, Her Majesty's Consul at Port Townsend, is a live official in that capacity. For a long time he has been striving to induce large railway corporations to start a steamer service between Port Townsend and Honolulu. In a letter to the Minister of Foreign Affairs received lately, Judge Swan expresses his great pleasure at hearing that two steel ships are to be built to ply between Port Townsend and Honolulu. Lumber vessels he says are not suitable for carrying vegetables and fruits owing to the odor from green lumber. He says that with proper means of communication between the two ports, oats of the finest quality, white barley, rye and timothy hay, potatoes of superior quality, and all kinds of root vegetables, and apples, pears and other fruits which excel in a northern climate would be supplied to Honolulu. We should be able to supply the Northwest by the same means with sugar, bananas, coffee, pineapples, sweet potatoes, grapes, and other raw and preserved tropical products. That is, there ought to be such a development of our resources as to enable us to take advantage of the market of the Northwest whenever available. It is a market that will rapidly expand for many years to come.

But mention I must the sweet voices of Jessie Neil as Strepshon, and Gertie Whitney as Phillis. Their duets are full of expression and effectiveness. Jessie Neil's solo in the last act is the sweetest thing in the whole opera, and her rendition would do credit to a professional. May Weir as the Fairy Queen is good. Her singing is good; her impersonation "dignified and stately." Lena Bruns as Iolanthe is gentle and pretty. Lionel Hart as the Chancellor is exceptionally clever and his part is well rendered. The little boys are good, especially the comedian Albert Harris. He is immense. The others in their parts do well and the ballet is novel and pretty.

As I sat in the Opera House last evening, a disinterested observer, I felt that if I did not do my part toward crowning Mrs. Gray with laurels, my conscience would trouble me ever after. I candidly say that nobody need regret the money spent in attending this show, and should my words be an inducement to the perhaps many to doubt as to the worthiness of the performance, it will be a pleasure to

HONOLULU FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The regular meeting of the Board of Representatives of the department was held yesterday evening at the Bell Tower, 16 members present.

In the absence of the Chief Engineer Mr. G. K. Norton, First assistant, presided.

Mr. C. H. Purdy giving satisfactory reason was excused from non-attendance at the previous meeting of the board. Mr. Walter Hill, delegate of the Fire Police, preferred to pay a fine of one dollar for non-attendance at the same meeting.

A communication was received from Engine Co. No. 1 certifying its newly-elected officers for the ensuing year.

The committee to report on the destitute circumstances of a member of Company No. 5 recommended that the weekly allowance to that member be increased, and accordingly the board voted that he receive an allowance of seven dollars out of the sick fund of the department.

Delegate Smith presented a claim of \$22 for medical attendance of a member of Co. No. 2, which was allowed.

It was suggested by the meeting that the Minister of Interior be asked to put a temporary shed over engine of Co. No. 2 to protect the machine from exposure to the weather.

Mr. John C. White explained the reason which led to the Minister of Interior taking the machine of No. 2, which was for the purpose of pumping water into the main pipe to supply the Waikiki section of the town with water.

The matter of having the bills against the appropriation of the department audited by the board instead of the system heretofore in force, was postponed for a month to allow the chief to be present and state his approval or disapproval of the proposed measure. Adjourned.

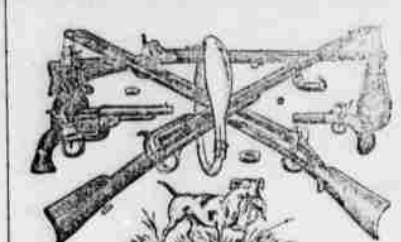
