

EDITOR BULLETIN :-Nemo wants to know the source of my information about the 338.026 arrests in New York City, of which over 250,000 were for drunkenness suggests that a "little bird" told me. Those figures were compiled from

and crimes growing out of it. He Ohio the Reports of the New York Police Department for the years 1887-90. seen that it was not for two but four years that I gave figures. He could not see it. Nema suggests that prohibitionists are largely the cause of the vice and crime in New York City. He gives no figures, so that his mere bald assertion amounts to nothing. The parts of the sermon of the Rev. De Costa quoted by Nemo have nothing to do with this question of prohibition. Mr. Editor. I am not discussing religion with Nemo, nor do I intend to-do so. We are writing about "prohibition and the liquor traffic," of which Nemo seems to need reminding very often. I may say in passing, bowever, that the sermon quoted by Nemo never even suggests that the christianity or 'churchianity' (as Nemo calls it) by exercising economy in the use of | of the Christians of New York was responsible for the state he describes, viz., "vice is all about us, and it rankles with every description of festering greed." Nemo seems to be unable to distinguish between those who make or create this "vice" and debauchery, and those who, as the sermon says, leave such neighborhoods and move up-town. The liquor traffic makes vice, and when Nemo thinks a moment he will hardly blame a man with a family of children for removing them from a

> men and women, thieves, gamblers and blacklegs. If Nemo be a married man he probably would be one of the very first to take his family out of such a place on the doublequick. But this is aside from the point. Who is to blame for the vice and crime of New York City? Nemo says, "prohibitionists largely helped to swell the tide." He gave no figures for the good reason that he ean't do it. If Nemo wants to know who causes it let him consult the reports of the Police Department. In 1888 there were 7809 schoons in New York City. Taking the census of 1890 as the basis of population, that is one saloon for every 194 inhabitants. In the same year (1888) there were 46,174 arrests for drunkenness and crimes due to drink in New York City. Who was responsible, Nemo? of wines and spirits were imported into New York City. Don't you think, Nemo, that the "swelling of the tide" of vice is on the wrong side of the fence for the liquor men in a city where so much whiskey, etc., is drunk that it can support one saloon for every 194 of its inhabit-

Now as to the cause of the poverty and pauperism of New York City. In 1880 the Commissioners of Correction and Charity for New York said in their report;

Nemo, they show up too much of the

work of the liquor business to suit

"Many reasons for this painful and rapidly increasing pauperism among the people may be assigned, but that which takes precedence above and beyond all others is the curse of intemperance." In his article of September 17th, Nemo professes to be unable to find any statisties in my replies. "None so blind as those who won't see." He (Nemo) asks "what do they amount to?" Just enough, Nemo, that you haven't attacked them.

No wonder, Mr. Editor, that Ne mo couldn't see the statistics in my articles, he couldn't see his own without mixing them. In the But-LETIN of July 29th he said that there were only 28,000 prohibitionists in Ohio in a total vote of about 700,-On September 17th, Nemo says that there were 280,000 prohibitionists in Ohio at the same time that he referred to in his article of July 29th. It is not a typographical error, either, for he repeats it three times. Nemo calls his statistics "solid, unanswerable government statistics." I propose to show the readers of the BULLETIN and Nemo, if he can see it, that he (Nemo) did not know what he was writing about. If Nemo chooses the figures he gave on July 29th, viz., 28,000 prohibitionists in Ohio, then I wish to point out the fact that 323,189 votes were etc., etc., etc. east for prohibition at that election. In other words Nemo made a mistake of nearly 300,000 votes. If Nemo takes the figures given by him September 17th, he only gets himself in deeper. 

RAINS ON KAUAL.

An Cukeswa Fish Esares Some Fish-

ermen -- Barefooted Bill. For the past two weeks almost daily rains have ended the extremely dry spell Kauai has suffered from for a long time. The rains continue over nearly the whole Island, extending even to the dry district about Nawiliwili.

Quite a number of cattle have died throughout the Island owing to the drouth and searcity of drinking water. Since the rains the fresh, green grass is such a change that many of the famished beasts died of eating it Few have died lately. The rains have gladdened the heartsof the planters and grazers, for the cane and the pasture have already improved in growth.

Sunday, Sept. 13th, a monstrous fish was seen near the landing at the "Beach House" on the Spalding plantation. Quite a number of people saw it, but no one could tell what kind of a fish it was, none like it having ever been seen around prior to that time. It was about 10 or 12 feet long by 6 or 8 feet wide, with fins that looked like wings, so large were they. They were spotted like a leopard while the color of its hide was green. As it rose to the surface several shots were fired at it without any effect: it finally swam out to

sea. Kauai ean boast or perhaps deplores the fact of having a Barefooted Bill. Friday night, Sept. 11th, a thief entered the Kealia store by means of boring a hole in the wooden window shutter and breaking a pane of glass, opening the window that way. London, September 5.-The situation of hundreds of Americans in London is becoming absolutely tragic. The difficulty of getting passage back to America may be judged by the fact that as high as \$100 has been offered as a premium for berths on the steamer sailing to-day, but all in vain. There is a multitude of Western speculators here who did not foresee the early boom in stock due to big crops, who have been rushing back from all parts of Europe, wild with excitement and clamorous for passage back before it is too late to make money on the general rise. I saw one Minnesota man last night who offered \$200 extra for a passage on the Umbria. Had it not been for his wife and child he would have gone in the steerage. Three Americans went to the office of the Guion line and wanted a cabin on the first ship that sailed. The agent informed

The agent of the Hamburg-American line said: "We have been sold out since July up to October. There have been many more Americans in Europe this year than last year. I never knew such a crush before. The Furst Bismarck has been sold out all the season, even to the cooks' and butchers' rooms; in fact, the Furst Bismarck is sold out for the entire year, except the chance that some one is giving up his cabin or berth." Buffalo, September 5.-For some time past there has been a movement on foot here among several labor unions to exclude the crowds of Canadians who cross the river every morning and work for from 50 cents to \$1 25 a day. Last night Immigration Inspector De Barry sent back to Canada four men who have been working in Buffalo and living in Canada. They are all employed on the Erie and Central railroads. As they stepped on the American shore they were met by Inspector De Barry and a policeman, who told them that they would have to go back to Canada, as they were violating the domicile laws. During the past two days over 100 Canadians have been sent back to their homes.


