[It is only fair to "Nemo" to say that his original statement was that there were only 28,000 prohibitionists in Ohio.

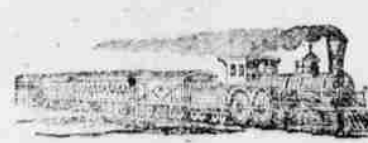

RAINS ON KAUAI.

An Uncommon Fish-Breeds Some Fishermen—Barefooted Bill.

For the past two weeks almost daily rains have ended the extremely dry spell Kauai has suffered from for a long time. The rains continue over nearly the whole island, extending even to the dry district about Nawiliwili.

Quite a number of cattle have died throughout the island owing to the drought and scarcity of drinking water. Since the rains the fresh, green grass is such a change that many of the famished beasts died of eating it. Few have died lately. The rains have gladdened the hearts of the planters and grazers, for the cane and the pasture have already improved in growth.

Sunday, Sept. 13th, a monstrous fish was seen near the landing at the "Beach House" on the Spalding plantation. Quite a number of people saw it, but no one could tell what kind of a fish it was, none like it having ever been seen around prior to that time. It was about 10 or 12 feet long by 6 or 8 feet wide, with fins that looked like wings, so large were they. They were spotted like a leopard while the color of its hide was green. As it rose to the surface several shots were fired at it without any effect; it finally swam out to sea.

Kauai can boast or perhaps deplores the fact of having a Barefooted Bill. Friday night, Sept. 11th, a thief entered the Kealia store by means of boring a hole in the wooden window shutter and breaking a pane of glass, opening the window that way. In breaking the glass he evidently cut his hand, for blood stains marked the window and every place where his "paw" touched anything throughout the store. Watches, two gold ones and four silver, and a few dollars in change were about all that was taken. No one has been caught, but a general inspection of hands was made the following day.

**FOREIGN NEWS.**  
A RUSH FOR HOME.  
London, September 5.—The situation of hundreds of Americans in London is becoming absolutely tragic. The difficulty of getting passage back to America may be judged by the fact that as high as \$100 has been offered as a premium for berths on the steamer sailing to-day, but all in vain. There is a multitude of Western speculators here who did not foresee the early boom in stock due to big crops, who have been rushing back from all parts of Europe, wild with excitement and clamorous for passage back before it is too late to make money on the general rise. I saw one Minnesota man last night who offered \$200 extra for a passage on the Umbria. Had it not been for his wife and child he would have gone in the steerage. Three Americans went to the office of the Guion line and wanted a cabin on the first ship that sailed. The agent informed them that he could not give them a cabin until about the beginning of October.  
The agent of the Hamburg-American line said: "We have been sold out since July up to October. There have been many more Americans in Europe this year than last year. I never knew such a crush before. The First Bismarck has been sold out all the season, even to the cooks and butchers' rooms; in fact, the First Bismarck is sold out for the entire year, except the chance that some one is giving up his cabin or berth." This is the story of all the other lines.  
REFUSED ENTRANCE TO THE LAND OF THEIR FATHERS.  
London, September 5.—A letter is published here to-day from the minister in charge of Christ Church, Jerusalem, saying that the Sultan has stopped the influx of Russian Jews, and that he will not permit them to land in Palestine without a special order. Fifty families who arrived recently were sent back.  
The letter adds that Baron Hirsch ought to arrange with the Porte terms of settlement which would permit of the Jews locating in Palestine. Palestine, the writer says, at present is thinly peopled. If the country were terraced, planted and supplied with water reservoirs it would be highly productive and the cost would be small in comparison with the expense of the system adopted in South American countries.  
Copenhagen, Sept. 5.—The Czar gave audience to Arnold White on Baron Hirsch's scheme yesterday. It is reported that the interview was satisfactory.  
LOOKING FOR WIVES.  
London, Sept. 5.—Prince Albert Victor has been informed that he must marry, and Prince Henry of Battenberg is privately making a tour of the various Protestant courts with a view to discovering a suitable princess, if possible, and one possessing a proper dowry and robust health. The feeble constitution of the Prince of Wales' children points to the fact that intermarriage with a sturdier stock is necessary.  
St. Paul, Sept. 5.—As threshing progresses throughout the Northwest reports of large yields of wheat increase in number. Devil's Lake, N. D., reports fifty bushels to the acre. Conservative estimates place the yield of Minnesota and the Dakotas at 125,000,000 bushels, against 90,000,000 bushels last year. It is asserted that the wheat crop of the three States would fill a train 250 miles long.  
CANADIANS SENT HOME.  
Buffalo, September 5.—For some time past there has been a movement on foot here among several labor unions to exclude the crowds of Canadians who cross the river every morning and work for from 50 cents to \$1 25 a day. Last night Immigration Inspector De Barry sent back to Canada four men who have been working in Buffalo and living in Canada. They are all employed on the Erie and Central railroads. As they stepped on the American shore they were met by Inspector De Barry and a policeman, who told them that they would have to go back to Canada, as they were violating the domicile laws. Yesterday morning he secured evidence that John Robbins, a freeman in the Central yard at Black Rock, was violating the domicile law, inasmuch as he lives at Victoria and only comes over here to work. The inspector went to the Black Rock yard to report Robbins, and was informed by Freight Agent Barcom that he had discharged all the Canadian employes of his department whom he was certain were violating the law. During the past two days over 100 Canadians have been sent back to their homes.  
MILLIONS FOR AN INVENTOR.  
New York, Sept. 5.—Inventor James Knibbs, Chief of the Telegraph System of the Fire Department of Troy, has gained another victory for his invention—a relief valve in steam fire engine pumps. His patent has been sustained by Judge Wheeler of the United States Circuit Court in a decision rendered in the case of Christopher Campbell, assignee in trust of the patentee, against the Mayor of New York. The city will have to pay inventor Knibbs, according to an accounting made by Commissioner Joseph M. Duell in 1885, the round sum of \$2,270,000 for the use of his patent device on fire engines since 1864, when it was patented.  
There are 500 similar cases pend-

ing against other cities throughout the United States, and it is computed that they aggregate \$15,000,000. All these suits depend upon the same state of facts as in the test case just decided, and it practically means that inventor Knibbs will get judgment for that amount of money here. The present suit has been in the courts for fourteen years and a fortune has been spent on both sides in counsel fees.
