LETTER FROM MAUI.

Waihee is indeed beautiful in her clean, new green dress, the result of recent abundant rains. A fairy spot certainly. Yet the natural depravity of the human heart seems to thrive and flourish here like the vigorous weeds after the showers. Unholy passions have come to the surface and found expression, recently, in the firing of the cane on two occasions, and again in the brutal assault upon the person of the manager of the plantation here the other day, and for which a suspected native is on trial to-day in our local court at Wailuku.

The Fruit & Taro Co. seems to be booming under the able management of Mr. Ed. Bailey. The mills hereabouts are all in readiness to commence grinding, and most of them will start up early next month with prospects promising an abundant yield.

The Government schools are all running smoothly with attendance almost perfect. The principal of Waihee informs us there are one hundred and eighty odd enrolled at his school, and that an assistant for the primary department is still very much needed. He also says Honolulu is now a refuge for children who do not wish to go to school, that he has thirteen absentees, who he is reliably informed are idling about the streets of your city. It might be well for the proper authorities to look into the matter.

Speaking of schools and teachers, how about the appointment of Government employees as members of the Tax Appeal Boards—in view of recent decision of Supreme Court? Vide those for Wailuku, Lahaina, etc.

Verily, verily, Wailuku is progressing at a frightfully rapid pace, in fact it has become quite lively, festive and gay, full of sports, gamblers, police judges, mounted policemen, dudes and other things. A mixture of the righteous and the ungodly which must be exceedingly pleasing to a plutonian observer.

Now it was said of old "whoso causeth the righteous to go astray in an evil way, he shall fall himself into his own pit."—Prov. XXVIII. 10. Consequently when the above festive gathering were "rounded up," by our stand old sheriff, Mr. Thomas Everett, Tuesday the 3d inst., and corralled in the District Court on the 4th before his Honor Judge Geo. Richardson, to stand trial for indulging in a quiet little game that has become most fascinating and peculiar the world over and in which United States Ex-Minister to England—Schenck—was an expert; there was a gnarl, the air became suddenly warmer, and a very decided odor of brimstone pervaded the premises; but they were all found guilty and politely requested to contribute \$25 and costs each, towards the support of law, order, and morality; from the many "jack-pots" and "straddles" they had so recently taken in. "He that being often reproved hardeneth his neck, shall suddenly be destroyed, and that without remedy."—Prov. XXIX. 1.

Mr. C. B. Wells, contrary to prevailing opinion, won his case vs. the native—who was sentenced to three months. The defendant was poor and friendless, and had no lawyer to defend him. There is talk of an appeal among the natives now; which will probably end in talk. The general health of the public is very good, as reported by the Government physician. More anon.

HON. A. S. CLEGHORN.

Some Notes on the New Governor's British and American Tour.

Hon. A. S. Cleghorn, who returned by the steamer Australia last week from a four months' absence in the British Islands and the United States, discoursed freely of his experiences while abroad to the BELLETTIN representative who called at the Collector-General's office to welcome him home.

Mr. Cleghorn was delighted with his visit to "old Edinburgh town," his native place, and to other famous localities in Scotland. His daughter, the Princess Kaiulani and himself were shown all over Edinburgh Castle. The presence of royalty was an open sesame to the keeping places of many precious relics.

The Princess and her father did the Forth Bridge very thoroughly, inspecting it on foot, by rail and by steamboat. In St. Giles Cathedral Princess Kaiulani was given the privilege only accorded to royalty of sitting in the ancient chair of state.

Before H. R. H. the last one who had sat in the chair was the Queen of Roumania. A feather cloak of Hawaii was discovered in the Edinburgh Museum. There also was seen one of the Hawaiian views taken away by the H. B. M. S. Challenger party, which contains the pictures of the late King Kalakaua and Governor Dominis, also those of Mr. Cleghorn himself and others.

The distinguished tourists were treated very kindly by the British Foreign Office. Cards were given to them which gave them not only admission to Windsor Castle, but to the secret chambers of that famous seat of England's royalty. Similar privileges were accorded them at Buckingham Palace.

Four days were spent at the great Naval Review at Portsmouth, when the French squadron was given a grand reception. The party were on board the old flagship Victory, where memorials of Nelson are preserved. They were shown the secret parts of the dockyard, and they visited the Royal Sovereign, the largest ship of war in the world.

Mr. Cleghorn and the Princess spent a very pleasant time at Normansbury Court, Lord and Lady Brassey's seat, staying there two days. Mr. Cleghorn has a portrait of the present Lady Brassey, showing her to be a very good-looking woman. They went to Lord Ashburne's place, which has seventy-five rooms for guests.

In London the tourists saw where the Lords of the Admiralty have sat for 150 years. Another ancient relic seen was a 24-hour clock—an article such as some may have thought originated in the present era of American standard railroad time.

Mr. Cleghorn and the Princess spent a week as guests of Sir Charles and Lady Wiseman at Chelmsford. Sir Charles will be remembered as commander of H. B. M. S. Caroline, here three or four years ago. Mr. Sydney Hoffnung, in the absence of his uncle, Hawaiian Charge d'Affaires in London, was exceedingly attentive to Mr. Cleghorn and daughter.

Mr. Cleghorn left his daughter in good health and embarked on the steamer Umbria. The ship had one of the stormiest passages ever experienced, arriving in New York on the 12th of October, two days behind time.

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At Washington he put up at the Arlington and at 10 o'clock the first morning he called at the State Department and left his letter for Mr. Blaine, who, however, had not then returned from his long vacation in Maine.

the Spanish treaty, also with Mr. Brown, one of the under secretaries. Then he saw Mr. Wharton, acting Secretary of State, who went with him to see President Harrison. Mr. Cleghorn took occasion of his interview with the President to contradict the published statements of Queen Liliuokalani's health, also the stories regarding English intriguing here to gain possession of the Islands.

President Harrison informed Mr. Cleghorn that Ceto Cesar Moreno had sought an interview with him, and he had declined to see him. It was learned from other sources that Mr. Moreno did not stand in good esteem at the State Department. The President was very kind, although it was a day (Monday) that he does not usually receive visitors.

Mr. Cleghorn visited the chief places of interest in Washington and its environs—the Capitol, Smithsonian Institute, National Museum, Washington's Monument, ascending to the summit, the Treasury, Art Gallery, Soldiers' Home, the Opera House at a performance, and the British Legation, where he was well received by Sir Julian Pauncefote.

Before finishing his narrative of experiences, Mr. Cleghorn reverted to his London visit, saying he saw a good deal of Mr. Godfrey Brown there, frequently dining with him. He also saw the young Hawaiian doctor and wife, Mr and Mrs. Makalua. The doctor was doing very well, and, said Mr. Cleghorn, he would be very unwise to come back to Hawaii before completing his studies.

AMERICAN LETTER.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 31, 1891.

TACOMA TO HAWAII.

G. G. Chandler, General Agent of the Northern Pacific, has a brilliant scheme on hand. It will be presented to the Puget Sound and Alaska Steamship Company, of which he is the first general passenger agent, and quite likely will be a success. His idea is to run a boat for about six months in the year between Tacoma and the Sandwich Islands. The boat to carry about 200 passengers. The expense for a trip for thirty days could be put as low as \$180 to \$200 per passenger, and every expense of the tourist during that time would be borne by the steamer. The tourists could enjoy the beauties of Hawaiian scenery, by making a thorough tour of the islands. This would solve the problem of what to do with the Alaskan steamers during the winter months, and give the people of the snow-bound Eastern countries a chance to enjoy the balmy climate of your lovely Hawaii. The plan is to be presented by Mr. Chandler to the Puget Sound and Alaska Steamship Company at its next meeting.

SUGAR MATTERS.

According to a correspondent, beet-sugar making is a grand success in Utah and that territory is no longer dependent on the San Francisco market for its supply. This will make quite a cut into the Central Pacific's Utah traffic receipts. A correspondent to the Salt Lake Tribune from Lehi says that he had just received word from the sugar factory that they were loading a car of sugar for Cunningham & Co., of Salt Lake. The order was given at the celebration of laying a corner stone and the order was enclosed and sealed up in the stone. The factory is producing an exceedingly fine grade of sugar.

Reymond Loran, United States Inspector of California beet sugar, was a guest at the Russ House last week. He had just returned from the great beet farm and sugar works at Chino and had also noted the progress of the two factories at Alvarado and Watsonville. He says the growing of beets and making of beet sugar is getting to be a bigger thing every day in California, and that before ten years there will be \$1,000,000,000 invested in the beet sugar business here. It is now talked of in every community in Southern California, and many people are intending to go in it. Mr. Loran said also that there was one thing that was going to greatly increase the product that had not yet been discussed, except by those in the business, and that is the planting of beets so as to have them maturing constantly for six months, instead of three. This is going to be done, and then the factories, instead of running 100 days, as at present, will run for six months.

Commissioner Mason of Washington, D. C., received the first application for bounty on cane sugar manufactured under the tariff law on October 23d. It came from Joseph W. Dougherty & Co., Louisiana. The amount of sugar manufactured upon which a bounty is asked is 65,963 pounds and the bounty is \$1319.

The Chino factory has produced 825 tons of granulated sugar since August 20th. It has shipped 756 tons of sugar, mostly to Southern California towns, but some went to San Francisco, Fresno, Arizona and Colorado points. The inspector says the sugar polarized as high as 97.9 percent in purity, and the entire output is a very high standard.

The crop of sugar beets in the Watsonville valley will greatly overrun the estimate made early in the season. The Pajaro crop will not be less than 1000 tons greater than was estimated. Several fields have averaged 20 tons per acre and on the Moro Cojo ranch of thirty-one acres they turned off as high as thirty-one and a half tons to the acre. The price paid for the beets is \$5 per ton.

Spreckels has been leading his rivals in the sugar business a lively dance and has finally succeeded in his scheme.

Under the impetus of what is called the Spreckels movement granulated sugar went down to four cents on the 20th inst. for the first time in many weeks. When the market reached 4 1/10 cents, a local sugar broker made an offer of four cents for 500 barrels of Spreckels' selling agent. The order was promptly accepted and then it leaked out that among the first sales, if not the first, of Spreckels' sugar at four cents, was made to a firm of his competitors in the business, E. C. Knight & Co. Then a lower price was sent broadcast over the country. The object of these sensational concessions on Spreckels' part seemed to be to keep his prices at a point where the other refineries would not meet it. The price broke to 4 1/2 cents in the afternoon and the Franklin and E. C. Knight & Co. refineries promptly met the cut, but it was hard to sell sugars, and later Spreckels dropped his price to 4 1/10, which was also met by Knight, but not openly by Franklin. Later in the day Spreckels came down to four cents, which brought in a great many orders that had been apparently waiting for this climax of downward movement of values.
