## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

The Star of yesterday evening contains an assertion that the Provisional Government has prepared an ultimatum to be handed to the U. S. representative in case he announces that his government insists on replacing government affairs here in the *status quo ante* January 17th 1893. This ultimatum it is asserted will defy the United States and its forces, and announces the unalterable determination of the P. G. to stick to its guns—and its salaries. Can any one imagine anything more idiotically bombastic than this announcement?

Fancy! Eighteen shopkeepers, attorneys, and graziers, announce that they and their 150 men in buckram hired from amongst the lowest scallaws in the floating scum of the Pacific will boldly stand up behind their sand bags under the direction of the valiant Col. Soper of bricks and straw notoriety, and the Southern California land speculating Attorney General (learned in the law) W. O. Smith, and defy the military and naval forces of the greatest Republic or earth. Ye Gods!! Ajax defying the lightning isn't a circumstance to it. Just picture to yourselves the gallant (if thick-headed and acquisitive) Colonel, and the intelligent (if unsuccessful) W. O. boldly secreted behind a double pile of sand bags and yelling "go on, my brave men, we, your gallant leaders will remain behind these bags and plan how to escape if you are unsuccessful in annihilating uncle Sam's troops. We will pray for your success and so will the other old women of the party. Remember you are getting \$40 a month and grub, to get shot at, and go and get shot. We stay here." Our most brilliant flights of fancy fail to carry us any further except to imagine the only Stellar, and his "prominent physician" embracing each other as closely as their protuberances will allow and weepingly confessing that \$40 a month on such terms would be too great a reward even for their cowardice to accept. Yah!!! the picture is sickening.

The Advertiser states this morning that the friends of the P. G. must "stand by it" and "meet the crisis." One of them yesterday whose money-raising schemes the revolution defeated declared "he was sick of it, no more for him." Another who had his traveling expenses paid by it said "that settled him, no more annexation to the United States for him." Many more of them are of the same mind. Their hired men are willing to draw their pay, wear out their clothes, and eat their grub, but that is all. Life is sweeter than the memory in another world of having drawn \$40 a month and

getting shot by the U. S. forces for not surrendering on demand. The only friends (if you can call them so) that the P. G. has are those who realize that while "dressed in a little brief authority" they have behaved themselves so as to feel in their own minds incapable of ever being pardoned by the victims of their cowardly spite and babyish tyranny.

We always admire newspaper enterprise, and we have certainly nothing to say against the Star for securing the papers which contained the message of the President from the Revenue Cutter Corwin; but we are inclined to think that a very irregular course was adopted by someone on board the cutter in allowing a paper to be given to a political local journal, and at the same time refusing any information or any paper to be handed to the local journals of an opposite political stripe. The paper from which the Star printed the President's message was dispatched in a private boat from the Corwin to the Philadelphia by a sailor on board the Cutter and was then taken to the Star office. A special dispatch-boat should not be a mail carrier—but we have no doubt that the Admiral will investigate and properly punish those connected with this matter.

Mr. J. L. Stevens the dilapidated journalist from the hamlet called Kennebec who, because he was a schoolmate of Mr. Blaine, was rewarded by political offices, and succeeded in making a frightful mess of everything is out in print in a feeble attempt at answering Blount. It is a great pity that the Star does not take courage, and print in full the evidence of Mr. J. L. Stevens which is to prove the "disreputable character" of J. F. Colburn, C. L. Hopkins, A. P. Peterson and Dr. Trousseau. We pray the annexation organ to come out with everything which the old doffer has said against the men mentioned, and we are prepared to guarantee to the organette all immunity from libel suits or arrest from any of the persons slandered by the man who has proven himself a failure when he represented America in Buenos Ayres, a fool and a ignoramus when he held the same office in Stockholm, Sweden, and an unmitigated scoundrel when he got a chance to get in his deadly work on Hawaii nei. And for each word which he may say against the men referred to in comparison with the three paragons Dole, Thurston, and Waterhouse, we shall bring forward sufficient evidence to eternally damage them, and show what they are.

An esteemed correspondent has a few lines in this issue which can be read and we hope digested with some advantage by W. O. and others.

Law firms of the annexation stripe were busy yesterday making "wills and last testaments" of their political friends. Owing to hard times we are informed that the charge for such loyal action has been reduced by 50 per cent. The Royalist lawyers still keep up the old rates and the will business is rather slow. Perhaps the royalists haven't any thing to will.

## Sound the Warning Note.

This heading may seem to some of our readers rather misleading, but we are going to refer to those notes of the Government usually styled silver certificates. These are certificates that the face value has been deposited in silver coin in the Hawaiian Treasury, and that on presentation there the note will be redeemed in that coin. Heretofore under the much abused (by the Tims and Macs and the Missionaries) Monarchical Government, this question of whether the money was there in the vaults to redeem the notes has been the first duty of every Legislature through its Finance Committee to answer. So far for many decades the question has been answered in the affirmative. The public could rest assured that if the note was presented, it would be redeemed on presentation in coin. Now we hear that one of the wild schemes of the Provisional Government when, after declaring war on the U. S., they retire to the foothills, is to take the money laid by to secure these Treasury certificates and use it for the support of the crowd of hopeless bums, criminals, and beachcombers, whom they have hired to defend the sacred prerogative of the missionary rule in Hawaii.

We sound the warning note (the treasury note) and let them know, even if Thurston counsels it and Damon endorses the policy, that such an act of embezzlement will do more to ruin them in the eyes of the public than any other action of tyranny they have heretofore committed.

## THE SITUATION.

The Corwin's arrival and the possible or probable purport of its dispatches continues to be the prevailing topic on the streets and in the business offices. Half of the P. G. adherents are deeply weighing the significance of His Honor Albert Francis Judd's statement, "if we do not all hang together we will hang separately." We hasten to assure them that there is no unmitigated vengeance in the hearts of the restoration party. Those misguided but sincere men who honestly thought that they were acting for the benefit of the country have nothing to fear. But those who went into the rebellion to save their own positions, or to grab those of other people, need not grumble if they find that in the words of the Scriptures from them "shall be taken away even that which they had." But all honest men, however they may theoretically view the form of government, which is destined to control these islands, will undoubtedly admit that any contest with the expressed will of the Government of the United States is simply folly, and means ruin to the country, and to the very people who oppose what they are pleased to claim as their own government and nation. All the others need not worry. Political opinions differing should not cancel ancient friendships, or prevent mutual working for the common benefit of the nation and country.

## HAMPTON COURT GHOSTS.

### Strange Nocturnal Appearances

ONE of the representatives of a London paper, who has been inquiring into the stories circulated recently of ghosts making nocturnal appearances at Hampton Court, writes:

On my way to the Palace I dropped into a local baker's, and was regaled with buns and stories of blood curdling "appearances," which had been poured into willing ears by gossiping and excited serving maids. But it must be acknowledged that these stories were for the most part incoherent and disconnected. The retailers of them had evidently been indulging somewhat prematurely in Christmas literature of the good old Yule log type. Out of the confusion, however, there seemed to stand forth three figures. In the first place there is a lady, who, ignoring the ethics of the spirit word, walks abroad at night clothed in garments of sombre black. Then there is another visitant, whose sex is unknown, as its presence is recognised only through the sense of hearing; and, lastly, there is a soldier.

### THE SOLDIER GHOST

seems the most in explicable of the three. I was unable to find anyone who had actually seen it, inasmuch as the man who "runs" this particular apparition was off duty and was in bed asleep. The spot where the ghost appears was, however, carefully pointed out to me. It is at the end of the cloister, upon which open Cardinal Wolsey's apartments. He who showed it drew attention to a mark on the wall. It is the mark of a bullet (so it is said) which killed a man. The man was a sergeant, and his murderer was a soldier of his regiment who had a grudge against him. The soldier was on sentry duty at the time, stationed somewhere away down the long perspective of the cloister. The date of this tragedy is lost in antiquity, but the appearance of the ghost of the murdered sergeant is as recent as last Saturday week. On this night a watchman, whose name was furnished to me, was going his rounds, and upon arriving at this spot saw a soldierly figure leaning against the wall, just where the bullet mark is. The uniform was not observable, as the figure was wrapped in a long military cloak. The watchman spoke, but received no answer, and the figure "glided" away into the darkness of the interior of the building. Under this cloister, it is said, there runs

away to the river's bank. It is led into by a small doorway under a staircase. In the case of the lady ghost, I was fortunate enough to find one who declared she had seen her. This eye-witness is the maidservant of a lady occupying a suite of apartments in the Palace. She believes that what she saw was a *bona fide* visitor from the region of spirits. More than a week ago she was returning through the gardens, and upon reaching the archway which leads into Fountain Court,

side. She is positive that a moment before no one had been anywhere near, and not a sound was even then observable. In her sudden fright she shrieked, but the dark figure took no notice, and moved along by her side into the court. The girl stood still, but the figure moved along the north side of the court, and disappeared in the direction of what is known as the haunted staircase.

These are the two best authenticated stories. There are others, but they do not seem to bear the stamp of genuineness. Another maidservant declares that people have walked about her room when there was no material body there to walk, and a man felt a mysterious hand on his face while walking about one night.

### THE HAUNTED STAIRCASE

is a place to be avoided at night. It is a very handsome and massive, but uncanny. Visitors will know it as the staircase which they descend on leaving the picture galleries. At the foot there stand generally two policemen, and the night watchmen deposit their coats there when they come on duty. Light is admitted by tall small-paned windows. Descending the stairs one looks at an enormous canvas filling all the opposite wall. It sadly needs restoring, and all that can be made of it is that an interesting female is being dragged somewhere, while a number nude persons dance around in what, under the circumstances seems to be indecent glee. But on the landing, before the descending the stairs, one sees two doors. The one in the corner deserves special attention. It is the door of

### THE HAUNTED CHAMBER.

Nobody knows why, but this door has not been opened in the memory of the oldest inhabitant. It is locked and barred, and the keyhole, is stopped up with wood. It is a massive oaken door, of great age and strength, and behind it no one knows what mystery lurks. You could not tempt anybody, especially of late to pass this door in the night. Fortunately nobody requires to pass it, as there are no apartments in this portion of the building. From what I learnt it would seem that the panic is so really serious that several servants have given notice that they will leave their situations. The watchmen go on their rounds in couples at present.

### AN ANNIVERSARY.

Hon. James I. Dowsett celebrates to-day the 65th anniversary of his birth. Mr. Dowsett who is one of the most prominent citizens in Hawaii has never been absent from here for more than 60 days in succession during his life. Our esteemed fellow citizen who is as hale and hearty as when he was twenty years old has raised a large and promising family, and is one of the solid pillars of Hawaii. **A Birthday Luau.**

Mr. Frank Harvey entertained a large number of his friends at his residence at Palama last night. A most elegant luau was given, and Mr. Harvey displayed himself as usual as an excellent host. The occasion of the festive gathering was the sixth birthday of the daughter of Mr. Harvey. Many wishes for "happy returns of the day" were expressed to that young lady, and many kind expressions were uttered for the success of the parents of the little hostess. Mr. Harvey is one of the most popular, and most intelligent Hawaiians in Honolulu.

Minister Dole stated at yesterday's session of the Councils, "that the arrival of the Corwin had created some excitement, but that the Government had received no dispatches on it." He surely did not expect it would.

The Star says, that "the executive framed an ultimatum in which it declined to negotiate for a restoration of the crown, and declared that it would resist with military force and every attempt to overthrow the Provisional Government." This ultimatum is ready to be sent to Minister Willis so they say.

**LILIUOKALANI'S STATEMENT.**

Mr. Blount would have done better for the Administration if he had not taken the statement of the deposed Hawaiian Queen; certainly Mr. Gresham has not strengthened her case by publishing the document. The story, even as she tells it, goes far toward justifying the revolution which dethroned her. And then in what she says about herself as well as in her reference to Mr. Cleveland she appears and makes him appear ridiculous before the world.

Out of her own mouth the ex-Queen is convicted of being the first aggressor—of attempting to overthrow the Hawaiian Constitution which she had sworn to support when she succeeded to the throne. And her account of the affair puts it in the most absurd light. She relates, in the most naive manner, how with two members of the Legislature she "started in to make the new Constitution;" how she completed it and placed it in the hands of one of her Ministers, who afterward insisted that he had not read it. Then she tells how, after taking counsel with Marshal Wilson to prevent an uprising, she prorogued the Legislature and summoned her Ministers and others to see her sign this new Constitution in the "blue room." And she seems to be astonished and indignant that there should have been any objection to this method of procedure.

And, by the by, we have a curious and significant story concerning the destruction of this instrument of government which the simple-minded Queen had prepared by the aid, or at least with the knowledge, of two members of the Legislature. The members of the Provisional Government have asserted and their supporters contend that the object of Liliuokalani was to practically exclude the whites, who own nearly all of the pro-

ductive wealth of the islands, from all participation in the Government. If the Queen and her retainers deny this she has at any rate, on her own confession, put it out of her power to disprove the statement.

In a letter addressed by her to one S. C. Damon and given out by the State Department she says that the new Constitution and all of the copies have been destroyed; the original by her own hand and the copies and the draft by her orders. By this act she confesses that she was engaged in a scheme which she cannot now justify.

It seems that Liliuokalani has been confident all along that she would be sustained by President Cleveland. She is personally acquainted with him, having met him in 1887 during his first term. And so she hailed his reaccession as a good omen. So when Mr. Blount arrived at the islands he brought relief. And in all this she recognizes a high sense of justice and honor in the person "who is the ruler of the American Nation."

The Queen has "caught on," to use a vernacular phrase of the day. She has estimated Mr. Cleveland at his own valuation of his official self. She therefore did not appeal to the American people, to the Government of the United States, but to the "ruler of the American Nation," confident that she would find sympathy and secure aid. "And I have not been disappointed" She remarks, while some of us wonder, albeit foolishly perhaps, at her confidence.
