Pledged to neither Sect nor Party. But Established for the Benefit of All. FRIDAY, MARCH 23, 1894.

That letter from Minister Willis to the Provisional Government was kept secret a long while for a document of such great importance as it was assumed to be by the Councils. It was burdened with no news at its date, and any information it bears now is too minute for a microscope. Who ever thought that the Minister would continue intervention in behalf of restoration while the whole question was pending in Congress? Yet the fact still remains that the United States Government's final answer to Queen Liliuokalani's appeal and protest is still awaited.

It will have been seen, by our report of the meeting of Councils yesterday, that the Government mildly repudiated the editorial in the Star, propounding the policy of disfranchising the native Hawaiians, which was commented on by us the same day. Under annexation everybody knows that the Hawaiians could only be disfranchised with everybody else by a carpetbag government such as the Provisional Government commissioners said in the United States was wanted. The Star has now put itself on record as the advocate of that disgraceful and by the Government—apparently discarded scheme for the utter degradation of Hawaii.

One of the most significant happenings in yesterday's Councils meeting was the withdrawal of the Chinese restriction bill which has been introduced as a ministerial measure. Although it originated under pressure of agitation by the American League, the particular spokesman of the League, D. B. Smith, joined with John Emmeluth, an oldtime anti-Asiatic agitator, in meekly capitulating to the paramount interests of our "main industry." If the Provisional Government had only taken the sound advice, given to it from within and without early in its career, to avoid all general legislation not absolutely required by the conditions of its being, it would have saved the consequences of many a blunder and foolish notion.

A LAME REPLY.

In an attempt to answer the New York Post, the Star says:

The moment it heard of the annexation movement it declared, in its ex cathedra way, that the sugar men, led by Claus Spreckels, had inspired the new departure in the hope of getting the bounty, and it held to that absurd idea until Spreckels himself came out for restoration. I did no good to inform the Post meanwhile that the sugar men, if they wanted the bounty badly enough to fight for it, would have begun the battle when the political signs were right in America, and not after an election which had been won by a party that was opposed to the bounty altogether. Against the impregnable logic of this rejoinder the Post merely set its dogged bounty assertion, and would be doing so yet, we think, had it not been for the course taken by the Sugar King himself.

What the Star says the sugar men would have done if they wanted the bounty badly, is just what they did do. They began the battle when the political signs were right in America." Mr. Thurston visited Washington before the opening of the Legislature of 1892 to sound Harrison's administration on the subject. He found the prospects favorable there and returning home was one of the leaders in promoting a state of confusion in the Hawaiian Legislature tending to make self-government seem impossible to be maintained. Minister Stevens' despatches to his Government long before the revolution, together with his irrepressible eagerness, shown in utterances here, to throw discredit on the government of Hawaii, prove the existence of a "battle" begun on two sides against Hawaiian independence. When Admiral Skerrett was detailed to the command of the Pacific station he called at the Navy Department to see Secretary Tracy, to ask him if he had any final instructions. The Secretary said he had no instructions to give him. He (the Admiral) would go there

To Be a Farce.

EDITOR BULLETIN:— Electing delegates to a convention under present tactics is a hollow fraud. Try the Australian system, and let the would-be members come out and speak before their constituents and see if they command their confidence. As things are going, we are likely to see a brilliant farce. But there is one comfort left and that is, the American people will never be gulled by this election. Just pause and think: Hawaiians are compelled to take a east-iron oath against the monarchy, and swear allegiance to Tophet, before being allowed to vote in their own country—and this act was drawn up by men who are constantly boasting of American principles and liberty. The late Gravesend election was the most rotten ever brought to light, and the P. G. is about to imitate it. The following is from an interview with Senator Sherman, published by the Cincinnati Enquirer, and gives room for much thought on packed conventions: "I am in favor of putting under the Civil Service," said Senator Sherman, "every Federal office-holder except those who are to be elected." "Are you not also in favor of the election of United States Senators?" "Yes, by the people, but not by State Legislatures. The abuse of nominating conventions has become very great. Nobody is paid to go to them; they are not representative of anything. The people could elect their United States Senators over the choice of conventions. Look there in my district of Ohio; Mr. Harter is going to resign at the threshold of his career and move to Philadelphia. I know what ails him. He has failed to satisfy his office-seekers."

While the news received by the "Alameda" may not be favorable to the sugar planters and consequently to every resident of the Hawaiian Islands it is not of a character that should cause serious alarm. After calm consideration it is difficult to find where in the sugar planter will be worse off after the treaty is discontinued than he has been since the McKinley Bill became a law. When the duty was taken off sugar in the United States the price of that article dropped out of sight and our planters received a blow by being placed on the same level as those in other foreign countries; the putting on of a duty and the abrogation of the treaty with Hawaii does not alter their position in any respect provided the price of sugar advances to the extent of the duty. It is probable that the cost of producing sugar in Cuba does not differ materially from that of this country, and there is no way that it can be reduced. It is reasonable to believe that if the price of an article is reduced by abolishing a tariff, the opposite must be the result if one is imposed. For months the people here have understood that the duty would be imposed and the bounty discontinued. Some people considered the probabilities of the discontinuance of the treaty, but a majority of them did not, they looked only at the "duty on" and contemplated the profits with the treaty still in force. To those people the news by the Alameda had the most depressing effect. The question will be asked, "If it is in the power of the trust to advance the price of sugar, after the duty is imposed, why has it not done so since the passage of the McKinley bill?" There are several answers to the question but one, perhaps, will suffice. The trust, while not posing as a benevolent institution, may be considered an American one, and will naturally protect American industries when its purse is not touched. Germany comes next to the United States in its sugar production, and its planters are subsidized as are those of the United States; the low price of sugar made it undesirable for foreign producers to compete. If one Congress saw fit not to protect its planters through the tariff, the trust, which must be considered an interested party, did so by manipulating prices. Under the Wilson bill with the Senate changes the American planter is protected to a certain extent, but the benefits he will derive will not be equal to those under the McKinley bounty clause. If the trust kept the price down to benefit the American producer, the increase of a cent a pound on the foreign product will place him in the same position as under the McKinley law. If the present low price is maintained the Louisiana planter suffers, because he is out two cents a pound bounty and he gets no more for his product. But the tariff laws of the United States will have no effect upon an article like the Jones Fence. Its quality will be maintained and every consumer will be as well satisfied as Mr. Monsarrat, who says:



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

THE AMERICAN LANGUAGE.

Peculiarities of Speech in the United States. (MR. T. HARRON RUSSELL, IN THE GENTLEMAN'S MAGAZINE.)

In these times of six-day steamers the nations mix too freely for many actual misunderstandings to arise as to the signification of words, but it would not be difficult to set down a page or two of perfectly usual American words which are either not used at all in England or are used in a sense that would make them incomprehensible in America to five Englishmen out of six. There are, moreover, subtle differences in the use of common words which might well lead to error. "Corn" in America always means maize. Wheat is distinguished as "grain." To be clever often means, especially in New England, to be kindly or good natured—not acute, intelligent or "smart." A person described in America as being "queer" is, not a little "out of sorts," as with us, but mildly insane. "Mad," of course, usually means angry (as in Acts xvi. 11); "crazy" is the right word for insanity. A lady who described herself as "kissed" would be thought to have indelicately confessed to a condition sometimes affecting young married women, but not usually spoken of. "Clear" applied to a fluid means, not transparent, but "undiluted." "Sauce" is used to mean vegetables in New England. "Long sauce" means carrots, parsnips, and so on; "short sauce" signifies potatoes, turnips, and the like. "Long sweetening" and "long sugar" mean treacle, more usually, however, called by the correct name of molasses. A railway "sleeper" is not a crescent, but a sleeping compartment—wherein arose the expressive proverb "to wake up the wrong passenger," which is the equivalent of our own "to have the wrong pig by the ear." A "cracker" is, of course, not a firework, but a biscuit, the last word being applied to small loaves such as we call French rolls. "Chores" (odd jobs in the house) often occurs in American books, and (as one generally hears it pronounced by English people with a k) it may be worth while to mention that it is of the same root as our English "charwoman," and is pronounced "shores." A charwoman in America might probably be a "chorelady"; there are also "washerladies," "salesladies," "foreladies," "domestic helps," and "hired girls," but no servants or women. A "despatch" is a telegram; a "dog-gery" or "dive" is a low public house ("saloon"); "a hog in togs" is a Jack in office; and "a lame duck" is a defaulting stockbroker. Bulls and bears in Wall-street are "longs" and "shorts." A "dodger" is a small cake or biscuit, and also sometimes an advertising handbill; a "casket" is a collar; a "fakir" or "freak" is a swindler; "gall" is, not bitterness of nature, but impudence. "To hump oneself" is to make haste, which may, perhaps, be old, seeing that "hump" is etymologically of the same root as "hop." In a fight a "scoedolager" is a final knockdown. It is supposed by some to have been corrupted humorously from "doxology," coming at the end of an encounter as the doxology comes at the end of divine service. I may say, however, that I personally suspect it of being Dutch in origin. The American use of "guess" it may perhaps be permitted me to observe in closing, is grievously misunderstood by most English people. The American guesses, quite correctly, in order to draw conclusions from imperfect evidence. He would frequently "presume," "calculate," or "believe," where English writers insist that he shall still "guess." Nobody ever heard an American say, except on the English stage, "I guess and calculate." The respective employment of the words enumerated is governed by perfectly clear, though unformulated principles, and the expressions are certainly not incapable of defence at greater length than the present opportunity permits.


