

Influenza vs. Cholera.

They who regard with undue hor-
ror the approach of cholera would
do well to bear in mind that not
more than two years ago the world
was visited by an epidemic as much
more terrible in its consequences
than the cholera ever was, as the
cholera is more terrible than the
measles. Physicians have expressed
the opinion that the grippé has no
rival for destructiveness of human
life among epidemic diseases. The
cholera at its worst attacks but a
small proportion of the population,
and it kills only a certain proportion
of those attacked. The grippé spared
hardly anybody. Like the epidemic,
it consumes every individual in its
way. If a man takes the cholera
and recovers he is not worse off than
before. The grippé, when it did not
kill outright, undermined the con-
stitution and left its victim an easy
prey to other forms of disease. It is
impossible to estimate the number
of fatalities by the grippé, because
tens of thousands of people have
died from its direct effects fully a
year after the attack and there are
to-day thousands of persons in this
country to whom life is a burden by
reason of weakened constitutions
following their struggles with it. Of
the two diseases, grippé and cholera,
the former is incomparably the more
terrible, yet it is doubtful if many
people would tremble at its ap-
proach. This shows that the im-
agination does in lending terror to
the calamities of life.—The Detroit
News.

Scotland Indignant.

London, Sept. 13.—Scotland is
seething with indignation in conse-
quence of a series of letters in the
London newspapers concerning the
conduct of Scotch soldiers in the
last Boer war. All writers charge
the Highland regiment with gross
cowardice. One writer, who was at
the Majuba Hill defeat of the British
troops, declares the Highlanders to
be the worst cowards who ever wore
uniforms. They acted like a herd of
calves. He says many threw their
arms and ran away for dear life. They
did most towards losing the battle
for the British troops, and lastly
besmirched the honor of the British
army. Several writers go so far as
to demand a parliamentary enquiry
into the conduct of the Highlanders
in the Boer war. The defenders of
the Highland regiments contend
that few Scotchmen have joined
these regiments in the last thirty
years, and call for a reform which
will realize the plan of picking the
Scotch soldiers carefully, paying
them well, and making them what
they are supposed to be—the elite of
the British army. The Scotchmen
say their friends decline to be an-
swerable for the cowardice of White-
chapel Highlanders and Cockneys
clad in lion skins. The Highlanders
are represented as having an un-
tarnished record in the field, although
their successors in the Scotch regiments
have dragged their names in dis-
grace and shame.

Postal Savings Bank Notice.

By authority of Section 11 of "An Act to Amend and Consolidate the Laws relating to the Hawaiian Postal Savings Bank," approved on the 7th day of September, 1892, and on that day taking effect; notice is hereby given that the rate of interest on Savings Bank deposits is fixed as follows:

On amounts under and up to Five Hundred Dollars (\$500), in Gold Coin of the United States of America, in any one account, on deposit in the Hawaiian Postal Savings Bank on September 30, 1892, interest will be payable from October 1, 1892, forward until further notice, at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum, in Gold Coin of the United States of America.

On deposits placed in the Savings Bank after September 30, 1892, interest will be paid until further notice, at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum on accounts not exceeding Five Hundred Dollars (\$500). No interest will be paid on accounts exceeding Five Hundred Dollars (\$500), in single accounts, deposited after September 30, 1892.

By Section 17 of "An Act to Amend and Consolidate the Laws relating to the Hawaiian Postal Savings Bank," approved on the 7th day of September, 1892, and on that day taking effect, the Minister of Finance is authorized to issue Coupon Bonds of the Hawaiian Government, to be styled the "Postal Savings Bank Loan," to be issued only to depositors in the Hawaiian Postal Savings Bank who may apply for the same.

The "Postal Savings Bank Loan" bonds are redeemable in not less than five nor more than twenty years, at the option of the Minister of Finance, and bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum, to be paid semi-annually, interest and principal payable in Gold Coin of the United States of America or its equivalent.

Any depositor with an aggregate amount to his credit in the Savings Bank, of not less than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200) in Gold Coin of the United States of America, which shall have been on deposit at least three months, is entitled, on application, to an issue of "Postal Savings Bank Loan" bonds in exchange therefor, in sums of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) or multiples thereof.

Applications will be received at the Postal Savings Bank for "Postal Savings Bank Loan" bonds from date until October 31, 1892, inclusive.

IRRIGATION NOTICE. Holders of Water Privileges, or those paying Water Rates, are hereby notified that, owing to the drought and the scarcity of water in the Government Reservoirs, the Hours for using water for Irrigation purposes are from 7 to 8 o'clock a. m., and 5 to 6 o'clock p. m., until further notice.

RUMORED CABINET.

A deputation from the majority of the House on the want of confidence vote had a conference with the Queen this forenoon. Results have transpired in a rumor that the Queen has appointed the following gentlemen as Ministers:

Hon. John A. Cummins, Foreign Affairs. Hon. Joseph Marsden, Interior. Hon. G. N. Wilcox, Finance. Mr. C. L. Carter, Attorney-General.

The three first-named composed the deputation that had the conference with Her Majesty.

The Advertiser has the audacity to say that the Registration Bill was not devised in the interest of the planters. As a matter of fact, the measure originated in the Planters' Labor & Supply Company.

The Cabinet once for all completely disproved the allegations contained in the preamble to the vote of want of confidence in their speeches on Monday, and not a single voice was raised in their proof by any of the party who voted against the Ministry.

The Advertiser as usual belabors with its spleen the honest opponents of its absolute autocracy in movements for the government of the country. Its characterization of the majority of the Noble voters of Oahu as a "mob" is worthy of its established reputation for abuse and slander of all who do not fall down and worship the golden image of its clique.

Mr. F. S. Pratt has been appointed Her Majesty's Consul-General at San Francisco. Mr. Pratt has done long and faithful service to the Government of Hawaii as Registrar of Finance. He is allied by marriage with the native Hawaiian people, which gives him a peculiarly representative character. The appointment will doubtless be well received by the business communities of Honolulu and San Francisco. It has been suggested that a bright young Hawaiian should accompany Mr. Pratt as consular clerk.

Mr. C. A. Brown has been removed from the office of tax-assessor-in-chief, on the ground of gross interference with party politics. Mr. Brown's best friends can hardly have any sympathy for him, as his conduct was a vicious example to all public servants. While an official has a right to his own opinions on all matters, it is subversive of all discipline and harmony for an official to devote his time—especially office hours—to unscrupulous wire-pulling and tampering with legislators, for the overturning of the administration of the day.

The Advertiser's assertions of what is legal and constitutional are certainly, to say the least of it, wonderful, especially considering the legal acumen and training of its editors. 


