

ENGLISH LORD'S FATE IN PEOPLES' HANDS

The Land Barons Will Be Denounced by Assuith—An Appeal to the Nation—Auditors rise When Stateman Enters Hall.

LONDON, December 1.—The Na-tional Liberal Federation tonight is-sued a manifesto to the country. which may be regarded as a party raily for the elections. It concen-trates attention entirely on the constitutional struggle between the House of Lords and the House of

It says: "If the present action of the peers is not repudiated swiftly by the people, rights and privileges on so dearly by our forefathers in the great struggles for freedom are all surrendered."

The manifesto declares the peers' power of veto must be restricted so that the last word on legislation and finance will rest with the House of Commons. Otherwise no Liberal Ministry again can assume the res-

onsibilties of office.
"In the fight forced upon us." the manifesto continues, "the electors will have to decide whether they wish to govern themselves or be govrned at second hand by a few hun-lred hereditary peers, who have thrown the constitution into the melting pos in order to shift the burden of taxation from wealthy land and liquor interests to food and the when the Premier entered the

hamber this afternoon the supporters of the Government rose and greeted him with ringing cheers. Immeditely following the conclusion of routine business, the Prime Minis-ter took the floor, and as soon as he concluded the House adjourned. In introducing his resolution tomorrow Premier Asquith will go exhaustive-ity into the question of the respec-tive privileges of the House of Lords and the House of Commons, and state in detail the Government's inten-tions. He also will fix the day of rorogation, which probably will be ext Friday.

Former Premier Balfour, leader of the opposition in the Commons, will reply, setting forth the view that the ew and important departure in public policy reptesented by the budget bill should be submitted to the peo-John Redmond, head of the irish party, and possibly one repre-sentative of the Labor party will re-

ply with speeches.

The Cubinet, which had already determined on the policy it would pursue in the event of the Lord Lanslowne's amendment being carried. had an unusually early meeting to day to confirm its decision and con-ider the wording of the motion which Premier Asquith will ask the House of Commons to adopt. All the members of the Cabinet were present at the meeting, which excited so much popular interest that a great crowd gathered in the vincinity of 10 Downing street, the official resi-dence of the Premier. . In many respects the impending

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26. - The great volume of American merchan-dise now being carried by rail across he Isthmus of Panama and the Isthmus of Tehuantepec & shown by the fact that for the fiscal year 1909, the goods transported amounted in value to more than \$60,000,000. The total for this calendar year probably will report \$75,000,000. These are the salient features of a statement issued on the subject by the Bureau

1907-between \$25,000,000 and \$30. 000,000 worth of merchandise; in 1908 nearly \$38,000,00 worth, and in the present year its business in freight will exceed \$50,000,000.

The Panama Railroad, engaged chiefly in work and traffic growing out of the construction of the Panama Canal, carried in 1907 about \$12,000,000 worth of merchandise orginating in the United States; in 1908 about \$9,500,000 worth, and in 1909 about the same.


