



Naval Notes.

World.

The United States steamer York town, the second of the Behring Ses patrol, arrived at Vallejo September

24, nine days out from Ounalaska, and proceeded to Mare Island. The Yorktown left the Mohican, Ranger, Alert and Albatross at Oun-alaska, also H. M. S. Pheasant. The Alert was to sail for Vallejo immedi-

ately.

A number of minor repairs will have to be made to the Yorktown before she is ready for service in China. A board of inquiry will meet at the navy-yard to inquire into the grounding of the United States steamer Adams at St. Paul's Island.

Advices received at San Francisco are to the effect that the future commander of the cruiser Boston, now under repair at the navy-yard, will be Captain Higginson, now on duty at Mare island as captain of the yard. Captain Higginson made a short cruise on the Boston and his assignment to the cruiser again is said to be for the purpose of allowing him to complete his sea duty. The Boston will be ready for service

by the last of December. The United States revenue cutter Richard Rush, which has put in the summer months cruising in the Behring sea as a part of the Behring sea patrol, has passed through the or-deal of a naval survey and has been recommended to undergo extensive repairs and a general overhauling from stem to stern.
