Honotoliv, H. I., Dec. 11, 1895. A. M. Brown, Marshal Republic of Hawaii,

Sir-There is a rumor in circulation in Honolulu at present, and which has been in existence for many months, that I am, and have been, employed in the secret service of the Government. As this is untrue I ask you to be kind enough to give me a denial of it in writing. You alone car know that I have never been nor am now in such em-

This report has been a considerable hindrance to my prospect of employment and in many other ways has caused my great annoyance.

I have to the present time simply tried to "live the matter down," but as I have learned that a man named Osmer, in an affidavit made by him on February 14th last, which has been used officially by the Hawaiian Republic, states that he told Mr. E. B. Thomas that I was employed in the secret service, and that according to his own language, was "giving you fellows away"—whoever they may be—I must now ask you for a distinct contradiction of this, as it is well known that Osmer was in the amalor of the dearwhard of which employ of the department of which you are the head.

The insinuation in this man Os-mer's affidavit that I was working or taking any part against the Government is absolutely untrue. I took the oath to the Republic of Hawaii in August, 1894, my letters of denization are dated September 7, 1894, and I am not ashamed of either. I have never had nor have I now any inclination to oppose the present Government, nor can anything ever

Government, nor can anything ever influence me to do so.

I ask you therefore in your capacity as head of the Police Bureau to state officially in writing that I have never been on the payrolls of your Department on any other of which you have knowledge so that I can publicly contradict these false statements.

I do not ask this for any reason of enmity or animosity to yourself or the Department, or to our Government, but simply because it has injured me, (and will continue to do so), to be classed as a spy or one who has at any time given informa-tion of any kind to the police author-

So in justice to myself I ask that you will certify that I have never been engaged in any such work.





BIBLES.

At last our navy has made a capture. The Eleu went out yesterday and captured a schooner. And it wasn't loaded to the gunwales with opium-or even filibusters. Perhaps in that case the fug would have been the captured, and not the capturer. However, as it happened, the tug caught the schooner which was loaded down with bibles. And the crew didn't fight or show any symptoms of trying to capture anything but the souls of those on board the tugboat. Instead of firing cartridge at long range the crew of our naval exponent found that they were expected to attend a Salvation Army meeting and in quire, "What shall we do to be saved?" instead of inquiring from the schooner and its crew, "what will you do to be saved?" from us. Such as it is, the situation has caused more humorous remarks in Honolulu than any situation since January 17, 1893. Here has our noble navy, accompanied by a portion of our army, gone out to search for arms and opium, and brought back -bibles. Sure such a ridiculous end to the wild goose chases we have seen was never equalled or excelled in any part of the world. If they had brought back rum or playing cards, everyone would have saidlike to like. But now we see our army and navy coming back with the spoils of war in the shape ofbibles. Let us hope it will do them some good.

AS TO HIPOCRISY.

The following communication from Judge Hart was refused publication by Mr. Dole's organ, under the editorial management of Mr. Alatau T. Atkinson. This is the first clear evidence we have seen of a sense of shame on the part of Mr. Dole and his organ for the part they have been playing in Hawaiian affairs since January 17, 1893, and as such all good men and women will read the letter with keen pleasure: (The letter is addressed to the Star.)
