HONEST JOURNALISM.

An independent, non-political church paper has complimented the Honolulu press for being "pure in language, healthy in tone, ready to recognise the truth of religion, and anxious for the promotion of good morals." Very good. But how about journalistic honesty in Honolula ? Can it be said that our newspapers are candid and truthful? No. The Government organ is prone to exaggerate everything favorable to the administration and to belittle everything of an opposite ten dency. The opposition papers rush into the other extreme. disiugenuously obscuring the good and magnifying the evils of the present government. In plain English, these papers are in the habit of lying-wilful, intentional lying-hoping thereby to strengthen their respective positions at the expense of their opponents: In fact, Honolu'u papers are party organs, and all party organs, the world over. are unreliable, because partial and one-sided. They do not scruple to misrepresent the trath, if misrepresentation be considered helpful to their party. For an example of this read the Saturday Press of last week, which says, "A minority of good citizens, quite apart from the palace party and its uncanny following, has not ceased until now to deprecate the action of the Press, 'because it would hurt us abroad.' Now, these fearful fragiles are with us, to a man." The misrepresentation is m the last sentence. No doubt, the Press 1s, and always has been, very bold and out-spoken-not to say abusive-and has fearlessly struck at laxness and corruption and staunchly advocated reform; but why stretch the truth? It does not follow because the Press gained the victory in the libel suit, that all those, "to a man," who formerly disapproved of the prominence given to the subject of leprosy, are now in favor of the course adopted by that paper. The fact is, many "fearful fragiles," "quite apart from the palace party," were opposed to the Press's line of conduct in this matter before the trial, and many of those same "fragiles" are still opposed. Whether the *Press's* views are right or those of the "fearful fragiles," is quite another question; but it is untrue to say that these people have all changed their minds and are now "with" the Press.
