TWENTY-EIGHTH DAY.

Wilcox on the Stand—Says Markham Was Thought a Spy

Court convened at 9:30 o'clock. Captain Hookano, sworn, states: Saw Markham on Beretania street near C. O. Berger's residence on Monday morning; he was coming towards town; did not see Mrs. Bertelmann near.

George Sea, sworn, states: Am clerk at Police Station; Markham was arrested on Monday at 6:40 p. m.; record was made by B. Zablan.

William Chung Hoon, sworn, states: Sold cartridges 45-70 and 44-70 besides Colt's cartridges to Markham early in December; the revolver cartridges were changed because they did not fit the gun.

E. O. White, sworn, states: Was present when William Chung Hoon sold Markham cartridges early in December; Markham later returned some Colt's cartridges; Markham returned these to change them from centre to rim fire; am positive of that.

Marshal Hitchcock, sworn, states: Remember issuing a permit to Markham on a requisition from E. O. Hall & Son; remember giving a revolver to him some time ago about the time of the St. Clair and Crick conspiracy, because Markham said his life had been threatened.

Sam Nowlein, sworn, states: Remember Bertelmann saying something about sending someone to buy cartridges; Markham bought the cartridges; the box containing them was brought back next day to be changed to rim fire.

Charles Clark, sworn, states: Nowlein sent me to Bertelmann's and received cartridges; got them changed because they were centre fire cartridges; wanted them changed to rim fire.

Mrs. H. F. Bertelmann, sworn, states: George Markham is my brother; he came to our house on Sunday, Jan. 6; he came there after breakfast; he stayed until lunch time, when he left with Robert Wilcox; he came out there on horseback; don't remember what kind of clothes he had on him; he returned to the house on Monday morning, and requested me to come into town; he got on his horse and we got into our carriage and came to our Makiki residence; met white soldiers with Lieutenant King near Sans Souci and were allowed to pass; came in on Beretania street; went into house and Markham went off on horseback; did not see him again.

R. W. Wilcox, sworn, states: Saw Markham at Bertelmann's on Jan. 6; he got there before me; I got there at 3 p. m. and asked Markham to go with me; saw two sentries near Telegraph hill; Markham seemed surprised at seeing them; we went right along; I told the men that Markham was all right, as he could not get away.

Cross-examination—Met Markham on Thursday night near Alapai street on King street; he was on horseback and riding into town; I stopped him and told him to send out a hack, as I wanted to go out to Bertelmann's; there were four of us—Hakuole, Jim, Willie Lane and myself; met Sam Nowlein in front of the Kawaiahaeo Seminary; G. Patterson's hack came out and I and the others jumped in; the hack had lights on it; went out to Bertelmann's; had come from Junius Kaee's place; met Lot Laue there; was at Kahala on Sunday midnight; had not whispered conversation with Markham; he was there with the rest of the prisoners; no one had any faith in him; he was pointed out as a Government spy.

Charles Bartow, sworn, states: Saw Markham at Kahala on Jan. 6; he was a prisoner with others, including ladies; heard talk among some of the men to shoot Markham because he was a spy; he had no gun during the time I saw him.

Cross-examination—Saw Markham showing one man how to use guns, how to load and unload; he also made inspection of the arms; when he first came there he was not a prisoner; he was made a prisoner at 6:30 o'clock on Sunday evening. Court then takes recess till 1:30.

MEETING OF COUNCILS.

Special Business Before the Assembly this Afternoon

There was a special meeting of the Executive and Advisory Councils this afternoon in the Executive building. Present; President Dole, Chairman W. F. Allen, Ministers Hatch, King, Damon and Smith; Councilors Tenney, Bolte, Mendonca, Eaa, Homer, Emmeluth, Nott, Morgan, G. P. Castle and D. B. Smith.

Minister Damon introduced the following resolution:

"Resolved,—That the officers and privates of the volunteer company on duty at the Judiciary building from January 17, 1895, to February 11, 1895, inclusive, be allowed the same rate of pay as paid volunteer officers and privates, between January 6, 1895, and January 16, 1895."

President Dole supported the resolution and it passed unanimously.

Minister Damon also moved the following resolution:

"Resolved,—That Section 4 of Act 73, of the Provisional Government of the Hawaiian Islands, be not so construed as to apply to persons on military duty and members of the Citizens' Guard." (The Act in question forbids any Government official receiving \$1800 or more a year from receiving any other Government pay.)

Minister Smith supported the resolution.

Mr. Emmeluth was opposed to paying any Government official who was paid \$1800 a year or over.

Mr. Castle considered the proper thing was to pay all alike. The resolution passed unanimously.

Mr. Emmeluth propounded the following question to the Minister of Foreign Affairs:

"Has the Minister of Foreign Affairs at any time during the past ten days given assurances of recognition to royalists or ex-royalists that they could organize and agitate for annexation without taking the oath of allegiance to the Government?"

Minister Hatch replied that no such assurances had been given. All that had been in question was the right of public meeting which could not be denied.

Mr. Emmeluth said that under the cover of annexation advocacy there was liable to be more dangerous business for the Government than anything that had heretofore happened. Those people distinctly avowed that they could not support the Government.

Minister Smith said that the people in question could not be prevented from holding open meetings.

Minister Damon said at first blush he had looked at the matter in somewhat the same light as the honorable gentleman who had asked the question. But the Government had been able thus far to cope with everything that had been brought to bear against it, and he had no fear but that any unlawful doings of these ex-royalists would be met with equal effectiveness.

At 2:05 the Councils went into executive session.

JUDICIARY JOTTINGS

Two Cases in Probate Adjudicated by Judge Cooper.

Judge Cooper has admitted the will of the late Charles Lunt Carter to probate, and ordered letters testamentary to issue to Mary Horton Scott Carter, widow, and Alfred W. Carter, under \$3000.

Judge Cooper has appointed Mrs. Mary Horton Scott Carter as guardian of the persons and property of H. A. P. Carter and Grace Stevens Carter, minor children of the late C. L. Carter and the guardian so appointed, under \$20,000 bond.

THE ANNEXATION POLICY.

(Boston Herald.)

Senator Lodge has given away the secret of these protestations that have been made at Washington at the indifference of the present administration to Hawaiian matters. He says that he wants to have the islands annexed to the United States, and on that account is obviously desirous that the United States should put itself and keep itself in evidence at Honolulu all the time. So far as the present government is concerned, not a scintilla of evidence has been given that it is not abundantly able to defend itself. It represents, as we have repeatedly said, the larger part of the wealth, intelligence and enterprise of the community. It is distinctively the rule of an aristocratic few, who certainly would prove false to their American training if they were not able to hold in check and govern in an autocratic manner a relatively poor, semi-ignorant and discordant multitude of men.

This little group of Americans who have gone to Hawaii and who have taken possession of the land, the business and the government of the islands, are in no need of having the warships of the United States sent there to help them against the native or immigrant inhabitants, nor is there the least danger—though for political purposes Senator Lodge and others pretend that there is—that England, France, Germany or Russia will interfere and endeavor to take control. The only possible danger in the future will be from Japan, and the Japanese are at present altogether too much preoccupied with the war they are engaged in waging against China to make it at all probable that they would arouse the hostility of the United States, as well as England and France, by an entirely gratuitous interference in Hawaii.

But if it is shown that Hawaii, with its independent government established and maintained by colonizing Americans, can support itself without trouble, particularly if its independence is guaranteed by the United States, it will then become entirely useless to urge the plan of annexing the archipelago as a means of preventing foreign powers from taking possession of it. For this reason—that is, to prevent such an outcome—Senator Lodge and others are desirous that American warships should be permanently stationed at Honolulu, and we dare say he would not object if a force of United States troops was landed and permanently quartered upon the islands. It is simply a land-grabbing policy that Senator Lodge is interested in promoting, and he does not wish the administration to throw any obstacles across the way of the easy evolution of this scheme.

To our mind such a change of policy on the part of the United States Government would be seriously detrimental to our national interests. If we can annex Hawaii we could also, with equal justice, annex Nicaragua or one of the states of South America, if a system of American colonization is made precedent to the act. But apart from this question of the policy of thus indefinitely extending the boundaries of our country, there is the further question of taking in a section containing a mixed population unfitted for a republican form of government. If Hawaii was annexed there is no reason that can be shown why the political rights that are now freely granted to the negroes in the South, no matter how ignorant they may be, should be denied to the Hawaiians who have been taught to read and write, and so far as these tests are concerned are vastly the superiors of the colored population south of Mason and Dixon's line.

For Mr. Lodge and his friends to get into a state of fine indignation because the political rights of the negroes are denied, and at the same time to establish a system of government for Hawaii that denies these political rights to the natives of the islands, would be, we should suppose, too illogical a position for even a Republican politician to assume. For ourselves we very much prefer not to increase the burdens that are already thrown upon our system of popular suffrage, and we should hold the annexation of Hawaii to be objectionable in almost every respect. If Senator Lodge wishes to enlarge the boundaries of his country we should advise him to turn his attention northward toward Newfoundland, where a country can be found the majority of whose people would be only too glad to have the United States take them under its care, where all the people are of our own race, and where, it may be added, the development of natural resources would tend a hundredfold more to the prosperity of New England—which Mr. Lodge should properly represent—than any gain that this section of the country can hope to draw from these faraway islands of the Pacific.

Native Rebels on Trial Before the Military Commission.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Court convened at 1:30 o'clock.

Marshal Hitchcock, sworn, states: Know George Markham; he has been in the employ of the government as secret police; he has stood watch at W. O. Smith and President Dole's residences; did not see him again after the Kakaako affair; you did not report any Waikiki affair to me.

W. O. Smith stated the assignment of Markham as watchman at his house, and of his being missing from his post on New Year's night.

Kaukali and his wife Pau saw Markham at Kaalawai; he came out there in the morning; he talked with R. W. Wilcox.

Carl Luckenville also saw Markham at Kaalawai.

George Townsend saw Markham when he was brought in by natives who said he was a spy.

Limahopu and Sam Kanahela saw Matthew, Kahopuwaiki, Kamali and Kauwenaole at Rosa's house, Kaalawai.

Court adjourned until 9:30 o'clock Tuesday morning.

THE PACIFIC SWITZERLAND.

Sir Renny Watson's Views on Hawaii and Its Future

F. A. Schafer has received the following, in the form of a newspaper cutting, from John Purvis, St. Andrews, Scotland, and kindly handed it to the BULLETIN for publication:

ROYAL SCOTTISH GEOGRAPHICAL SOCIETY.

Yesterday afternoon Sir Renny Watson delivered a lecture to the Royal Scottish Geographical Society in the Society's Hall, Queen street, Edinburgh. There was a good attendance, and the chair was occupied by Sir Thomas Clark. Sir Renny Watson began by saying that during these last few years Hawaii had become a much more familiar name than it used to be, and during the past few months and days the newspapers had given much attention to the group. They would remember the long debate in the United States Senate, which arose on the question whether the group should be annexed by the United States or not. The lecturer went on to describe the geographical position of the group as well as their topography; and he referred to the proposal to cut the Nicaraguan Canal—a work which could, he understood, be carried through at much the same cost as was involved in the construction of the Manchester Ship Canal. It would only be a matter of some years before that Canal was cut; and when it was, the Hawaiian Islands would occupy a unique position on the way from Panama to China for our road to the East. The climate of the Hawaiian Islands was like a mild summer—warm and salubrious, never hot in the shade, and seldom chilly. In July and August it was warmest, and the thermometer might reach 90 degrees in the shade, but that was not usual. So far as one might judge in relation to human comfort, the climate was perfection, and the islands might truly be called the Paradise of the Pacific.

After speaking of the many natural beauties of the islands, Sir Renny Watson recalled their recent history, and pointed out its leading incidents. He spoke of the passing of the McKinlay Tariff Act as a severe blow to the commerce of the islands, as it admitted all sugars free to the United States, thus knocking the bottom out of the former commercial reciprocity treaty between the Hawaiian Government and the States, and causing the price of sugar to fall to the old figure. That matter, he was afraid, might end somewhat seriously for many interests in the islands. In regard to the present Government of Hawaii, he thought those who were in power were managing the business well, and were indeed the only class in the islands to bring back any kind of settlement in the way of government. America, as they knew, regarded the position of these islands as of very great importance, and while he could not say how from time to time the question of the proposed annexation of the group would fare in American politics, he could not but wish that they should remain, as they had remained for the last century, free to all nations, and supported as such by all. Why could we not have a Switzerland in the Pacific, so to speak—an attractive country, the holiday ground of all the other Powers. The wonderful climate and natural beauties of the country all contributed to such an end. (Applause.) The lecture was illustrated by a series of lime-light views, which served to convey to the audience some idea of the manifold natural attractions of the islands. At the close a hearty vote of thanks was given to Sir Renny Watson.

Mr. Emmeluth like Uzzah is afraid of the ark's falling over if the natives go in for annexation without taking the oath to support the Government.

Mr. Gunn of Connecticut must be a great wag. His amendment to the Hawaiian resolution, in the Legislature of that State, declaring war on Great Britain, was a bold joke.

Some journals in the United States represent views adverse to the annexation of Hawaii, which appear to arise from the objection to a departure in the line of an imperial policy. Their stock argument is that if Hawaii be annexed, then Cuba, or Mexico, or any South American republic might as well be annexed. Perhaps the time may come when any of those countries may be ready and wanting to be annexed. In the meantime Hawaii is asking, not to be made an object of conquest, but to make a treaty of union with the United States. If annexation is the word balked at, let it be changed for the handier word union.

WELL-MEANT BUT ERRONEOUS.

Sir Renny Watson's remarks before the Royal Scottish Geographical Society, reprinted in this paper, evince a broad and statesmanlike view of the Hawaiian question. His idea of making Hawaii the Switzerland of the Pacific is, however, long out of date. That was the idea that made many friends of good and stable government here in favor of the monarchy until the last ditch. But it is now buried forever under a load of irremovable circumstances. One of these is that this country has got into the fashion now of changing its administrations, when deemed objectionable, by revolution instead of by constitutional agitation and patient bearing of ills we have rather than flying to those we know not of. This is a chronic condition of the country, and the only salvation from its consequences is shelter under theegis of the star spangled banner. Commercial and industrial interests however great are secondary to this consideration, yet there is no reason to fear that the group will not profit by its undoubtedly great natural resources as part and parcel of the United States equally as it would in the position of a "buffer state." Sir Renny Watson is right from his distant point of view, but if he were well acquainted with the elements existent in this group he would be of a different mind. Our little republic has more to fear from its once friends than from kanaka insurrections. These be hard words, but time will show that their foundation is in a true estimate of the situation.

Runaway Accident.

Mrs. E. G. Hitchcock, wife of the Marshal, narrowly escaped severe injury this forenoon near the Post Office. The lady was driving up Bethel street when a two-wheeled cart came dashing down the street. It overturned at the corner within a few feet of Mrs. Hitchcock's carriage. The wagon belongs to C. B. Dwight and ran away from Hotel street, where Mr. Dwight is engaged doing some street curbing.

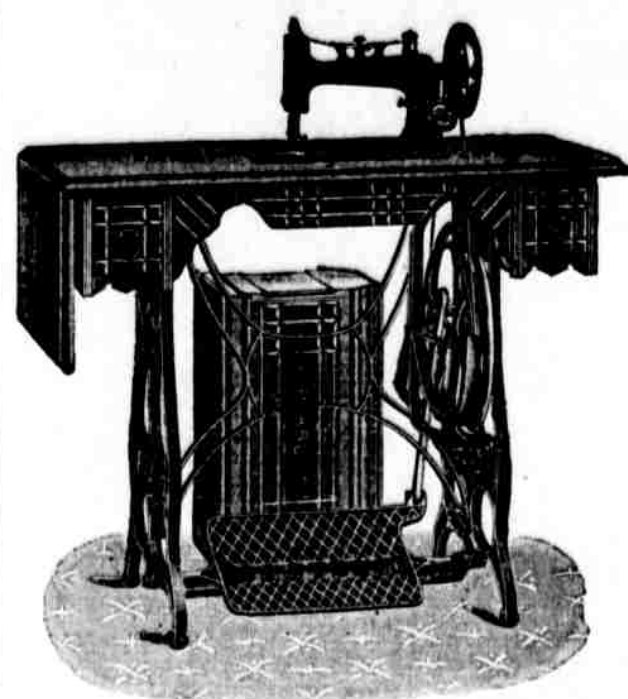

SYMPATHY WITH HAWAII.

Resolutions in Two New England Legislatures

In the Legislature of New Hampshire at Concord, the following resolution was introduced and referred to the committee on national affairs:

WHEREAS, Hawaii, in her struggles to establish a free and independent republic in place of a despotic and cruel monarchy, has wonderfully succeeded, independent of the aid and in the face of the prejudice of crowned heads, and even of our own administration, and, believing, as we do, that their late struggle for freedom, and their knock for admission at our doors, should have received our protection and kindly adoption as the child who, under our missionaries and teachers, have advanced from a savage state to an intelligent desire for our free institutions; and,

WHEREAS, Revolutions have arisen and troubles are liable to continue, therefore, Resolved, By the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring, that we, the Legislature of New Hampshire, extend to them our sympathy and encouragement, and desire our representatives at Washington to use every effort in their power to aid them in this and every time of need.

The following resolutions were adopted by the Connecticut Legislature at Hartford:

WHEREAS, Many of the citizens of Connecticut are personally interested in the financial and commercial affairs of the Hawaiian group of islands, and,

WHEREAS, We believe that every true American citizen is interested in sustaining a republican form of government in those islands; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we urge on our senators and representatives in Congress to advocate and support all measures and resolutions looking to the stability of Hawaiian government, and that we deprecate the withdrawal of the American warships from Honolulu and, while heartily condemning the previous action of the President in his treatment of the struggling republic, we commend his recent, though tardy, action in dispatching the warship Philadelphia to those islands.

We protest against any abrogation of the Hawaiian treaty which will give Great Britain a foothold or claim upon any island of the Hawaiian group, or which will allow any submarine cable that is not under the supervision and control of the United States or of the Hawaiian government to be landed upon any of said islands.

We learn with profound regret and indignation of the sad death at Honolulu of Mr. Charles Carter, and we extend to his bereaved family our sincerest sympathy.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be transmitted to each of our senators and representatives in Congress.

Mr. Gunn introduced an amendment sympathizing with the efforts of all people to free themselves from the yoke of oppression and urging our members in Congress to support measures looking to the liberation of Ireland from the British government and the sending of ships of war to give aid to any movement looking to that end, supplementing it, if need be, with a suitable land force to accomplish that purpose. The amendment was tabled.

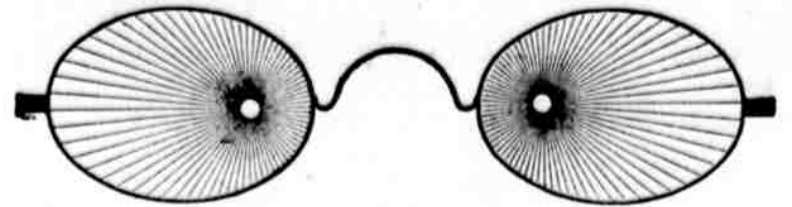

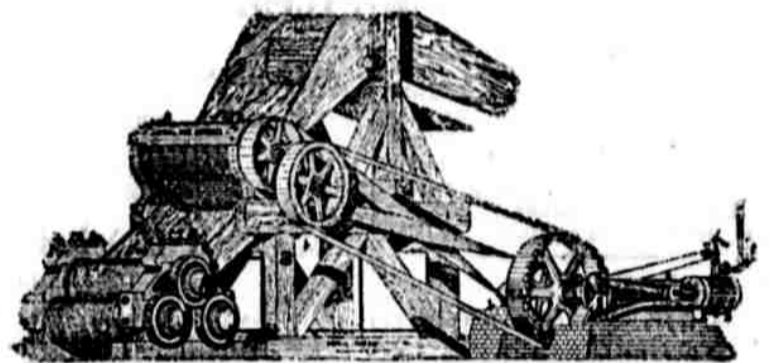

SOUTH SEA HURRICANE.

Great Damage Done in Fiji and the New Hebrides.

Particulars of the terrific hurricane which swept over Fiji on January 6 and 7 have been received at Auckland by the steamer Ohau from the islands as follows:

The buildings in Suva suffered very severely. The Presbyterian Church, the Wesleyan Church, the native Polynesian Church, and the Church of England collapsed, and were entirely destroyed. The European Church of England was unroofed. The Customs-house and Bonded Store and many small stores and dwellings were wrecked.

At Nausori the sugar mill was uninjured, but the manager's and officers' residences, the mechanics' barracks, and many other buildings in the neighborhood were badly damaged.

At Levuka the bark Ophir was wrecked on the reef, and her cargo of 700 tons of copra was lost. There was also considerable damage done to buildings and small craft.

A schooner, whose name is unknown, foundered off Taviuni, and it is believed that the whole of the crew were drowned.

Holuhurst's sugar estate was damaged to the extent of £1500.

The coconut plantations have been ruined.

The hurricane apparently worked toward the New Hebrides group, as a report from Santo states that on the 9th inst. the wind did a great deal of damage to property and trees were blown down.
