

And if he can retain his citizenship in the United States by what law and where in the statues of the United States is he entitled to protection, if he aids or abets a revolution in a foreign country, and if there is no law by which this can be done, does he not forfeit his citizenship by taking an oath to aid or abet either by oath or action?


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
