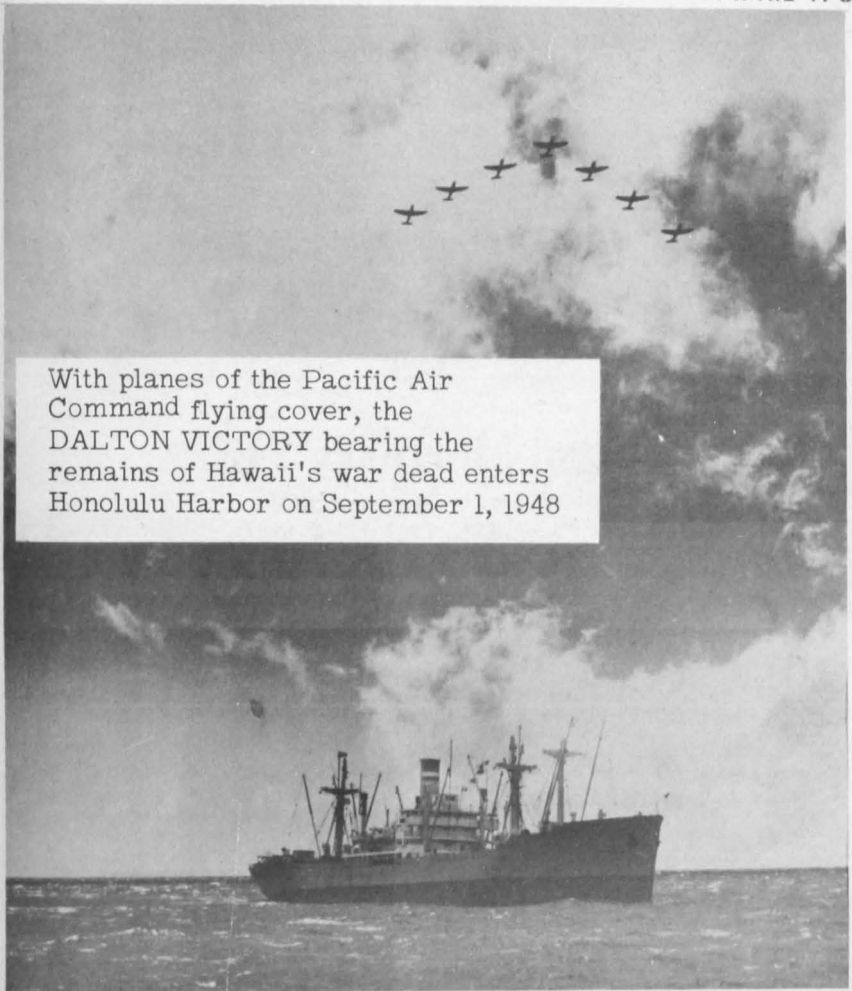

After that he went on duty in Brussels. Had a chance to visit Switzerland, too. I stopped drooling when Tom said that the Army did not discharge him until he had served five years and nine months! EDITORIAL

James Michener blasts Hawaii's racial and religious bigotry

Hawaii is not just a literary interest for James A. Michener; it is also home. He established residence in the islands a few years ago, and he has become an active participant in the civic affairs of Hawaii. His keen interest in statehood for Hawaii manifested itself in activities on many fronts.

EDITORIAL - The Phenomenon of Michener

The phenomenon of Hawaii is that it comes closest to representing "a gathering place" where each race has a chance to meet and contribute something to the good of the other. We in Hawaii have never asked for more than this opportunity to serve.

Just as much as the stylized Japanese tea ceremony presents one with a sense of timelessness, so it is that we recognize the long road that we have yet to travel in search of a perfect gathering place. We here in Hawaii like to feel that we are contributing something to this timeless search, and further like to feel that we are making a bit of progress, too. Then a James Michener comes along and makes us wonder whether we are living in dreams.

But we have company. For Michener is also in search of a dream. Up until his recent blast in an interview in the New York Post, we had assumed that Michener's dream was Hawaii. Now, we are told that his dream is elsewhere.

We are sorry to hear that Michener's paradise is not here in Hawaii. Perhaps, Michener was dreaming when he wrote his monumental novel "Hawaii", which ends up in his search for the "Golden Man." Listen to Michener in the opening paragraphs of Chapter VI - The Golden Men:

"In 1956, a group of sociologists in Hawaii were perfecting a concept whose vague outlines had occupied them for some years, and quietly among themselves they suggested that in Hawaii a new type of man was being developed. He was a man influenced by both the west and the east, a man at home in either the business councils of New York or the philosophical retreats of Kyoto, a man wholly modern and American yet in tune with the ancient and the Oriental. The name they invented for him was the Golden Man.

"At first I erroneously thought that both the concept and the name were derived from the fact that when races intermingled sexually, the result was apt to be a man neither all white nor all brown nor all yellow, but somewhere in-between; and I thought that the Golden Man concept referred to the coloring of the new man - a blend of Chinese, Polynesian and Caucasian, for at this time Japanese rarely intermarried - and I went about the streets of Hawaii looking for the golden man of whom the sociologists spoke.

"But in time I realized that this bright, hopeful man of the future, this unique contribution of Hawaii to the rest of the world, did not depend for genesis upon racial intermarriage at all. He was a product of the mind. His was a way of thought, and not of birth...His awareness of the future and his rare ability to stand at the conflux of the world he owed to his understanding of the movements around him...."

There is Michener's "Golden Man", and his characters who represent the "Golden Men" are Hoxworth Hale, age 48, the archetype of the descendants of the missionaries and subsequently the industrialists who molded and governed Hawaii up to World War II; Hong Kong Kee, age 53, again the archetype of the Chinese who made their fortunes in real estate; young Shigeo Sakagawa, age 23, descendant of immigrant parents, who became a captain in the United States Army and beachboy Kelly (Kelo) Kanakoa, age 21, pidgin-English speaking descendant of the royal line.

For the purpose of this editorial, we shall dwell slightly longer on Michener's fictional Captain Sakagawa, for he is the embodiment of the captains and other officers and men nurtured from the ranks of the 100th Infantry Battalion and the 442nd Regimental Combat Team. Michener's main point in his blast against racial discrimination and religious bigotry in Hawaii is that his wife "Mari has been through the mill. She was one of the first Japanese-Americans sent to California concentration camps after Pearl Harbor..." and Michener says about this, and his other gripes, that "there's a lot of guff I just won't put up with any more..."

Well, Mr. Michener, we Japanese-Americans in Hawaii at the time of Pearl Harbor also took a lot of guff. Perhaps, the difference is that we in Hawaii were finally given a chance to prove ourselves. However, many could not stick around to see the results. For they came home on ships like the Dalton Victory.

As the colloquial phrase sums it up - "That's the way the ball bounces." And as Michener's fictional Captain Sakagawa speaks out from the political platform while running for position as state senator, and speaking in defense of unjust accusations against his family, we are "two edges of the same sword...cutting away old and unfair practices..."

If Mr. Michener, at this point of the game, cannot stand the guff of everyday living in Hawaii, then we have overrated the man. Perhaps, his fictional Captain Sakagawa is fiction after all. Perhaps, his novel "Hawaii" is not something to be believed, but is merely another tale of the Pacific. Perhaps, the phenomenon of Michener is not that he is real, but merely fiction - and that his "Golden Man" is not here in Hawaii but in a fictionalized Bucks County where life can be had for the asking, as the girls in Kelly Kanakoa's life - "Da bes'."

Mr. Michener should be the first to acknowledge that Hawaii is certainly not perfect, by all means. We don't claim to be; we never will be. Let's face it. So long as there are Russians, Frenchmen, Chinese, Africans, Japanese, Portuguese, Hawaiians, Englishmen, Filipinos, Caucasians, Koreans, and what have you, there will be differences; differences of all sorts. And we suspect that life is purposely created this way. After all, without these differences, what then becomes the purpose in life?

The test of Hawaii is not in the few instances, like Michener's, where discrimination is claimed. The weight of evidence is really on the opposite end of Michener's scale where 600,000 people of many races live together on the day-to-day operational level. In work and at play, in the schools and churches and clubs and community groups, you see them all side by side in the greatest display of racial and religious tolerance anywhere.

In Hawaii, we retain the integrity of the races by encouraging their individual arts and cultures; by constantly seeking new environments in which to captivate the zest of these differing races - and yet, at the same time, we continually delight in mixing them all up and coming up with new wonderments in racial and religious tolerance.

So we say to the Micheners that we in Hawaii are not perfect, but try us the second time around. We have worked hard for our place in life, and we would like to continue to show you our handiwork. And as you, Mr. Michener, have written of the "Golden Men" in the concluding paragraphs of your novel "Hawaii", we likewise offer you a return passage to paradise: "I was there then they became vital parts of the new Hawaii....for in an age of Golden Men it is not required that their bloodstreams mingle, but only that their ideas clash on equal footing and remain free to cross-fertilize and bear new fruit...."

A Plea for Continuing Service

Richard and Evelyn Miyashiro, operators of Hilo's CAFE 100 believe in continuing to serve good meals to the people of Hilo and its visitors, including many of you Puka-ites and families during your visits to Hilo.

As you probably know, Richard and his family (wife and three girls) lost both business and home during the tsunami of May 23, 1960. The Miyashiros were one of the hardest hit by the tidal wave, both home and business (sole proprietor). They had invested about \$60,000 in the New Cafe 100, borrowing about \$45,000 from the Small Business Loan and they were in the new building for only 18 days. For the past eleven months, his home, built about 5 years ago has been sitting on oil barrels, a few hundred feet from the original location, waiting to be moved to a new site purchased a few months ago through the State.

The Miyashiros with their good Puka-Puka spirit are trying hard to re-build at a new location. They desire a location in the industrial area, where the traffic, both auto and people will be good. Unfortunately, they came across government restrictions and red tapes, and the location desired is not available.

The Miyashiros are temporarily operating a small restaurant and fountain on Kilauea Avenue, on a monthly rental basis. If Richard is going to continue to operate a good restaurant where he will be able to serve good meals, a new building site will be needed. Although Richard has the old loan to repay, he can re-build with a disaster loan. If the Miyashiros don't re-build, it could mean bankruptcy.

At the present time, Richard is interested in a 25,000 feet lot across Kapiolani School on Kilauea Ave. He has applied for the lease or purchase of this property with the Land Office of the State of Hawaii, but the wheels of government move slowly.

Any helping hand by Puka-ites or their readers in contacting Legislators of the Senate or House Land Committees will be greatly appreciated.

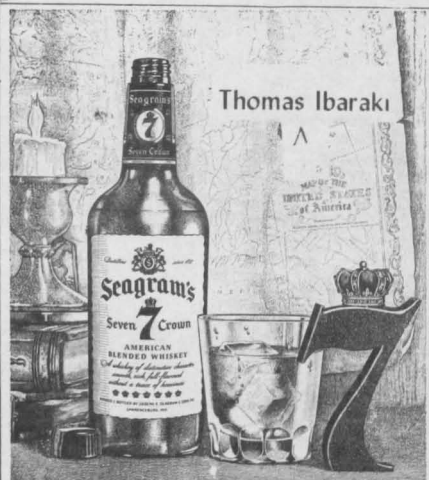
