CONSUL CHURCHILL TALKS UPON POLITICAL CONDITIONS IN SAMOA.

The Natives Have Great Respect for the Stars and Stripes—The American Residents There.

Much has been said concerning the attitude of the McKinley administration in Samoan affairs. Reports have come from the United States, England and Germany that trouble could not be averted in Samoa between the old powers interested there. William Churchill, who has just been relieved as United States Consul General at Apia, today kindly consented to talk on Samoan political affairs. He is informed upon the instructions of his successor, Mr. Osborn, but declines to talk concerning them. However, he had no hesitancy in speaking upon the affairs as they exist.

"The political situation in Samoa at the present day," said Mr. Churchill, "comprises two elements which need distinct consideration. First, as to the relations between the United States, Germany and England, and second, as to the present condition of the native Samoan monarchy. The former of these elements is perfectly provided for by the Berlin general act of 1890, which defines the regulations and the duties of each of the three contracting parties to the agreement. So long as that act is observed with scrupulous interpretation to its provisions, just so long is it impossible for any questions to arise of conflict between the three controlling parties.

"During Mr. Cleveland's administration and particularly during the memorable brief administration of Judge Graham as Secretary of State, a tentative announcement was made that it would be better for the United States to withdraw from an arrangement which was considered by them un-American and possibly productive of international complications. The present administration of Mr. McKinley and Secretary Sherman apparently recedes from Mr. Cleveland's point of view and regards the continuance of the Berlin tripartite control at Samoa as proper. The statement made in various papers that an American man-of-war was to be sent to Apia to protect the American rights is quite unofficial. If a cruiser is sent to Samoa it will be done not so much by reason of any American rights being jeopardized, which would call for armed interference, as by reason of the obligation under the Berlin tripartite treaty upon the United States to bear its portion of the treaty in police duty which Germany and England do not neglect. For eight months of each year Germany always has one and frequently two corvettes in Samoa and during the same period more vessels of the same type from England's Australia squadron are anchored in the harbor for the same purpose. The last American war vessel in Samoan waters was the Alliance which left Apia in February of 1893.

"Since that time the United States has occupied a high position in the affections and regard of the Samoans and Uncle Sam has had to live up to his exalted position by the use of a 23 foot row boat."

CENTRAL UNION DATES.
Tomorrow afternoon the Junior Endeavor will meet in the primary room. The women's prayer meeting will meet the same afternoon in the parlor. HARD AT WORK.
Captain Cameron reports very great activity in the Union Iron Works ship yards, where the Claudine was repaired, and the Maui is being built. In addition to the work on the Island boats, the works have under way the new Japanese cruiser, the battle ship Wisconsin, a 1500 ton steamer for the Alaska Commercial company, extensive repairs on the Pacific Mail steamers San Juan, Newport and Barracouta and numerous smaller jobs. On the Saturday before the Claudine sailed, the works paid off 2900 men the majority of them being skilled mechanics.

THE SEASON'S SUGAR CROP REACHES 248,555 TONS, A GOOD INCREASE.

Annual Gathering of the Sugar Planters This Morning—Interesting Reports are Submitted.

The liveliest interest was manifested in the annual meeting of the sugar planters at the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association rooms this forenoon. Representatives from the Honolulu agencies and managers of many of the plantations were present. Among the latter were H. Morrison of Makaweli, Kaunoi; Geo. F. Renton, of Kohala, Hawaii; W. W. Goodale, of Onomea, and Papaikou, Hawaii; and J. M. Horner, Hanalei, Hawaii. The others present were John F. Hackfeld, J. B. Aberton, Theo. H. Davies, C. Bolte, J. Horton, W. M. Giffard, Geo. Robertson, F. M. Swanson, W. W. Hall, H. P. Baldwin, of Maui; George N. Wilson, of Kaunoi; Dr. Maxwell, W. C. Parks, William Baisdel, Mr. Averdam, Editor Whitney and others.

J. H. Hackfeld, president of the association, presided over the meeting. In delivering his annual address, Mr. Hackfeld spoke on many important subjects, which were interesting to the association. Secretary Bolte's report gave the total crop of the Hawaiian Islands for 1896 and 1897, at 248,555 tons. This estimate, which is authentic, has just been secured. In the absence of P. C. Jones, the treasurer's report was read by Secretary Bolte.

The old trustees were re-elected for another year. They include J. F. Hackfeld, W. G. Irwin, F. A. Schaefer, H. P. Baldwin, J. B. Aberton, F. M. Swanson, P. C. Jones and C. Bolte. Dr. Maxwell submitted a report on the experimental station. The report was read by title only and ordered printed. The association voted to meet at the experimental station at the corner of Wilder avenue and Makiki street at 3 o'clock this afternoon. Dr. Maxwell also stated that the report on soils would be prepared and published in about five months.

Dr. Maxwell also reported on cultivation. He suggested a change in the method of getting up reports in the future; that instead of the director of the experiment station being made chairman of the committee, that he be made ex-officio member of each of these committees, so that more of the work be thrown on the shoulders of the plantation men. It appeared that there was a tendency to put too much work on the director and top little on the plantation men. He found that through the present system the plantation men would lose interest in the work.

Several members spoke on this subject agreeing in the main with Dr. Maxwell's suggestion. In making his report on fertilization Dr. Maxwell stated that he had just learned from a San Francisco dealer who reported that the demand for phosphates and potash was greatly decreased while that for nitrogen in its various forms was doubled. This is in consonance with recommendations made by the Honolulu office. Reference was made to experiments in irrigation now being made at the experiment station. Large samples of nitrate of soda was shown the members by Dr. Maxwell, which had been washed from the soil by a too great application of water.

Dr. Maxwell has made an experiment for the purpose of determining the correct amount of water to be applied in irrigation and also to show the danger of over-application of water. In one experiment in which too much water has been applied was soil that has been fertilized with nitrate of soda. The excess of water which had drained through the soil was collected and evaporated and a large bottle of pure salts was obtained. George F. Renton read the report on machinery. The principal thing mentioned was a gravity truck invented by Mr. Horner of Hanalei for the purpose of carrying cane from the fields to the sugar house. This is a wire rope suspended at an elevation some distance from the ground, and bundles of cane of about 125 pounds are put upon this and by gravity carried to the mill. This was much cheaper than the old system, now in use on nearly all the plantations in the islands, of fluming the cane, inasmuch that it carried it across wide gulches and without the assistance of water. The trustees are in session this afternoon to select officers to guide the association affairs during the coming year. The association will continue its work tomorrow morning at 10.

THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT ANNUAL STATEMENT TO THE PLANTERS OF HAWAII.

John F. Hackfeld Makes the Opening Statement at the Planters' Meeting This Morning—A Good Showing.

Mr. Hackfeld made the following address to the Hawaiian planters this morning. He said: Gentlemen: In opening this, our annual meeting, congratulations are again in order on the very large crop of sugar, which has been produced on the islands during the last year; although the price realized has not been as satisfactory as for 1896, you still can be well satisfied with the results obtained. I regret that, owing to the severe droughts which have been experienced during the last year in several districts, the output of sugar will be materially reduced during the next season. During the passage of the new Tariff bill in the Congress of the United States considerable anxiety was felt here in regard to the continuation of the benefits now enjoyed by us under the reciprocity treaty, but happily the matter was finally settled in our favor, thus assuring to us for a time at least a fair price for our principal produce. A treaty of annexation between Hawaii and the United States, no doubt a measure of considerable importance to our industry, is now pending and awaiting action by the United States Congress in December next.

The laboratories and experiment stations of our association have been successfully carried on under the able management of the director, Dr. Maxwell, a considerable sum of money has during the year been contributed by the fertilizer manufacturers towards the expenses of the laboratory. It is however to be regretted that the latter has not been patronized for the analysis of fertilizers as generally was anticipated, especially as all analyzing of fertilizers is done free of all charge to the plantations. At the experiment station some very interesting experiments are being carried on, about which Dr. Maxwell will fully report to you; they consist of raising cane with and without irrigation, of green fertilizing for the restoration of the soil, growing different varieties of cane, and gaining exact knowledge on irrigation and fertilizing by the use of the lysimeter. I believe a visit to the station will be well worth to be considered as a part of our progress.

The supply of labor, I am glad to state, has been in general sufficient during the past year; whether this will continue however in the future is somewhat doubtful, and this matter probably requires your special attention. Mr. Kohe'e, who at I receive's financial aid from this association, has been absent during the year, but is shortly expected to return here; he has continued to render very valuable services for the Islands. The income tax law passed by the last Legislature has been declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court owing to certain discriminating features entertained therein; the property tax law has again caused a great deal of friction in regard to the various sugar estates, as shown by the numerous appeals, which have become necessary and have thrown the burden of deciding this very difficult question on the Judges of the Supreme Court. I hope that the next Legislature will revise the present tax laws to such an extent that constant appeals on the tax returns may be avoided in future. Several valuable reports will be submitted to you; as a great deal of time will be lost by reading them in full, I suggest that only the important parts of the same be read and taken up for discussion. Before concluding I beg leave to express my best wishes for your future prosperity and hope that at our next meeting the sugar industry of these Islands may be in as promising a condition as it is today.

SECOND WEEK'S BILL.
Bright Plays Will be Presented by the Frawleys.
The second week of the present season will open with a comedy adopted from the German, by Augustin Daly, the famous New York playwright and manager. It is full of humor of a delicate and subtle order. The theme carried all through the play is the delicate love making of a young lieutenant (Frank Worthing) and a charming, vivacious widow, Mrs. Valentine Ospray, who is charmingly portrayed by Miss Blanche Bates. The scenes between these two popular artists are as delicate and refined as the love making between two highly cultured people could possibly be, and are as amusing and stimulating as a clever flirtation.

THE PLAY AND THE PLAYER SHENANDOAH IS GIVEN BY THE FRAWLEYS.

Bronson Howard's Drama is Enthusiastically Received by a Packed House—Big Success Scored Again.

The house was filled on time on Saturday with one of the largest audiences, though not the largest, that has been within the walls of the theater. I have heard and read a good deal of Shenandoah as a play and was glad to see it on the boards. It is an excellent picture of how the civil war broke up and scattered to the four winds friends and relatives, and how those who deeply loved night and did find themselves with opposing interests and even in actual conflict with one another. There is not a scene in it that might not have happened. I have now among my old letters one from a friend in the north lamenting the struggle that had to take place, and saying that his brother was in the Confederate army. Based on such material Bronson Howard produced a strong play, with plenty of opportunity for good acting, not only for one or two characters, but for a large portion of the company. Without a wrong vein of comedy running through it the piece would have been too gloomy, but this element was plentifully supplied. In the cast the whole strength of the company was engaged and lovel talent was called in, in the shape of Harry Wilder's horse, Harrison.

So wide a field gave opportunity for seeing the work of all the actors and actresses and a better chance of judging of their capabilities. Among those who had the opportunity of showing their mettle for the first time, were Lillie Wrenn, Eleanor Robson, Will Lewers and Herbert Carr. Lillie Wrenn is the soubrette of the company and understands a soubrette's pretty ways. As Jennie Buckthorn, U. S. A., Miss Wrenn gave a bright rendering of a taking part. Miss Wrenn is very small, very bright and cute, and will, I feel sure, grow upon her audience. She has no lack of the dash and smartness which her particular line calls for and is thoroughly painstaking, which is one of the chief attributes of a good actress. I am very sorry to hear that Miss Wrenn is suffering from ill health, and that on Saturday night it was quite a question whether she would be able to take her part. I hope that she will recover in our balmy climate, and I know that with improved health will come the additional sprightliness which will add to the excellence of her work.

Eleanor Robson is evidently a young actress. She has plenty of ability and an even manner of playing which gives good promise for the future. There is no nervousness in her manner, and she plays down to her part, which shows good training and ability. Will Lewers gave his friends an opportunity of seeing him tried in a capital part as the young Confederate Colonel, Robert Ellingham. Mr. Lewers looked his part well and was bold, dashing and gentlemanly as the Colonel should be. He made very pretty love to his northern sweetheart, Madeline West (Selene Johnson) and with all showed himself a rising young actor. I have only one fault to find with Mr. Lewers, and that is his rapidity of utterance. I think this is due to nervousness. When the fault is overcome Lewers has an opportunity before him of rising high in the profession. He is a thorough theatrical student and deserves success. In Herbert Carr, Honolulu recognizes an old friend. He was Taffy in Palmer's Trilby company, which played in the drill shed over a year ago, and a very excellent Taffy he was, but no better than as General Haverhill on Saturday night. Mr. Carr is a man of inches and looks the veteran general; both in uniform and in mufti he had the military air. His enunciation is clear and distinct, his power of pathos good. He adds considerable strength to a company which is by no means weak in its selection of actors. The scenes between General Haverhill

NEW JAPANESE MINISTER
 SHORT SKETCH OF BARON NISHI'S PREVIOUS CAREER.

The Successor of Count Okuma Well Acquainted With Russia and the Russians—Has Been an Explorer.

Baron Nishi Tokojiro, the new Japanese Foreign Minister, is a native of the province of Kagoshima, says the Japan Times. Until he was about 22 or 23 years old he remained in his province learning Chinese classics. In 1870 when the country was still in a state of turmoil subsequent to the Restoration and the Saghalien question was pending Baron Nishi recognized the importance of making a thorough inspection of the conditions of Russia. He started for St. Petersburg with a samurai of Sendai at the instance of the government, who paid all the expenses and also the cost of prosecuting his studies there. Mr. Guoiera, the name of the samurai, understood Russian a little, but hardly enough to converse with a Russian. The inconvenience of Baron Nishi while he was on board a steamer was very great. After he arrived at the Russian capital he devoted his energies to learning and to making an inspection of the affairs of the country. In the meantime the policy of the Department of Education was changed and he was ordered to return home. He did not, however, return, but remained in Russia pursuing his studies at his own expense. At last he entered a university and obtained a degree of bachelor of laws. Since then he found it necessary to learn French, and went to Paris as a student secretary to the Japanese Legation. Later on when Mr. Enomoto (now Viscount) was appointed Minister to Russia and opened the Saghalien negotiations with the Russian government, Mr. Nishi was made secretary of the Japanese Legation in Russia. Since then when Minister Enomoto returned home by way of Siberia Mr. Nishi was appointed charge d'affaires. After the arrival at St. Petersburg of Count Yamagata, now Minister, Mr. Nishi obtained leave of absence and made a well known exploration through Central Asia. He left the Russian capital in July, crossed a desert in Asia, when it was in the hottest season, passed the Mongolian desert when it was severely cold, and arrived at Peking in January of the following year. Thence he traveled overland to Shanghai where he embarked on a steamer for Japan. The travels he accomplished should be described as one of the most brilliant deeds of his life. After his return home he was appointed chief secretary of Daijokan (present cabinet) in addition to a similar post in the imperial household department. On the occasion of the coronation of the late Czar he accompanied Prince Arisugawa Taruhito to St. Petersburg, and after the ceremony was over he followed the Prince on a tour throughout Europe. In 1888 he was for a time out of office but was soon afterwards appointed Minister to Russia. He is a man of unflinching energy and reserved manners. The reports he made to the government from St. Petersburg when the three powers interferred with the question of the Liaotung peninsula gave no little benefit to the country, and for these merits he was raised to the peerage with a title of Baron.

KILKENNY CATS.

"As long as Hawaii remains independent she will free from all the trials that beset the world." So said one of the prominent foreign Royalists in public meeting lately, and one presumes he really meant what he said. But what utter balderdash such a statement is. It seems hardly possible that a man of ordinary common sense in general matters, should have made such a wild assertion. If Hawaii remains independent she will, far from being free from all the "trials that beset the world," have a very plentiful crop of trials which may ruin her trade, destroy her property, and plunge her into difficulties as yet undreamed of. No condition that a country ever could be in would make it "free from all the trials that beset the world" in point of fact. You might as well promise a man immunity from all fleshly ills, and some patent medicine quacks do, but we all know how little those promises are to be depended upon, and despite all the nostrums that quack-sellers may put forward, man suffers decay of the organs, and various ills which carry him off at last, no matter whether he has lived ill or well.

But as exposure or hard living or carelessness can aggravate man's diseases, so a certain course can aggravate the diseases of the body politic. A long course of "independence" in Hawaii would produce as fine a crop of "trials" as would satisfy the most enthusiastic political doctor. It would be a most interesting case—most interesting indeed—operation entirely successful, but like the patient, when inquired after, it would be found to have "died."

Hawaii is divided into many opposing parties. At present, to the outside observer, it is apparently drawn into two camps, "the annexationists and the anti-annexationists. But the anti-annexationists are by no means at one. They are divided. The chief source of division is between those who follow the Ex-Queen, and those who would have another candidate for the visionary throne who has disappeared as all thrones ought to disappear. These two parties hate one another with a virulent hatred. Then again there are race parties, and yet again there are men who are ready to intrigue in the interests of various foreign powers, unauthorized free lances, willing to risk a good deal to gain a big stake.

Let Hawaiian independence continue and take away the hope of annexation and the little country would present an admirable illustration of the Kilkenny cats. Under the stable government which we have had, while the country has been waiting for annexation, it has progressed in prosperity and in wealth, and annexed to the United States it would continue to progress in prosperity and wealth, for once annexed, and the hopes of the seething factions would be gone for ever, the rickety throne would cease to be even a dream to any candidate and foreign intrigue would be as dead as a door nail. There would be absolute safety for investing capital, and such capital would seek investment in our exuberant soil. Political struggles there would be, but they would be of the healthy kind which keep men men alive to their duties of citizenship, and which do not cause undying rancor between those who hold different sets of opinion. The advancement of the country is assured under annexation, its retrogression is as certain under independence.

That those who wish well to Hawaii and who have some ideas of governing, will do their utmost to keep the little ship of state sailing on the prosperous and quiet waters goes without saying, but the struggle to keep in the proper direction, and the pressure from abroad will prevent them carrying out their views.

It would have been a better aphorism to have said, "So long as Hawaii remains independent so long will she be open to all the trials that beset the world, plus a special set of her own, which will do their best to wreck our prosperity."

The progress of the United States navy is satisfactory and steady. The report of Chief Naval Constructor Highborn records the advance towards completion of no less than twelve new vessels. When these are added to those already in service, the effective sea power of the United States will be raised to the first rank,

and make it second, says Mr. Highborn in practical efficiency to Great Britain and France. During ten months of the present year twelve new vessels have been added to the commissioned fleet. In the past fourteen years fifty-seven vessels have been added to the United States navy, all of which are of modern type.

and his wife, Madge Cooke, were excellent, so were those between him and Colonel West (Frank Worthing), while jealousy kept rising in his heart, to be repressed and yet breaking forth again. The speech over the dead body of Lieutenant Bedloe was capably delivered and the whole scene was most impressively carried out.

I have spoken thus at length of these ladies and gentlemen because they are new to our audience. Of those we know well it is almost needless to speak. Blanche Bates is an excellent actress and whatever she does she does in perfect taste and with the best of theatrical skill. Her impersonation of a warm-hearted southern girl, with her love for her cause and her affection for her northern soldier, drawing her now this way now that, till when Colonel West, wounded and weak, dashes forward to head his retreating men, everything gives way and she cheers the on-coming Sheridan as he sweeps to the rescue, was fine. As I said before it is a real treat to see Miss Bates and Worthing play together. The acting is so even, so well balanced, so easy, that it is more a bit of real life than acting. Worthing made a fine officer and had opportunities for showing power, notably in the quarrel scene in the first act, and again almost throughout the second and third acts.

I am exceeding my space and must mention the other members of the cast but briefly. Daniel Frawley represented the brave officer who is timid before the fair sex, admirably. The whole scene of the proposal between himself and Jennie was pitched in a high comedy key. Madge Carr Cooke's Mrs. Haverhill was well rendered. She is a conscientious and lady-like actress, and shows the power of the experienced hand. As for Harry Corson Clarke he is a host in himself. His Sergeant Barket was inimitable. He will keep his house laughing with the turn of an eyelid. There is no doubt that he is one of the best low comedians of the day. He is always funny and never vulgar. One never tires of seeing and hearing him and one almost regrets when he leaves the stage. Wilson Enos is good as a heavy villain, and so did credit to the part of Captain Thornton, while Perry was an amusing General Buckhorn, and Phosa McAllister's small part of Margery was, as it always is, thoroughly satisfactory.

Honolulu has now seen the whole of Frawley's company, and I certainly think it is a good one, from which those who appreciate the stage, and who like to see good conscientious work, will be able to derive much pleasure during the ensuing nine performances. I hear that the matinee performance was very good, but unfortunately I could not get round, which was a disappointment to

LAHAINA NOTES.

Gambling Bow Ends in a Fight—Two Witnesses Can't Put Up Bonds.

Lahaina, Nov. 20, 1897. The Jap who was hurt on the head last Saturday night is getting better, the injuries proving to be scalp wounds only. He quarrelled over a game of cards with a Jap named Horie, who threw a lighted kerosene lamp at him, striking him on the back of the head. Horie, after throwing the lamp, got on board the Helene, and left for Honolulu. It will probably go hard with him when he is caught, for he has already served out a sentence for a similar offense.

Judge Kalua and Sheriff Baldwin were over here last Tuesday on business connected with the Japanese murderer Yoshida's case. Two of the Japanese witnesses were committed to prison for safe keeping. They were ordered to give a bond for \$2500 each, and were unable to do so.

The foreign jurors have been notified that they must be at the court house in Lahaina on the 6th of December.

During the week a native woman named Malie Kaahana gave birth to triplets. One of the children is doing well, but the two others lived only a few hours.

Dr. Davison went to Laval on last Thursday, by the Makohi, for a little change. While he is absent, his place will be filled by Dr. Irwin, who arrived last night by the Mauna Loa. There have been several showers of rain during the week and it is now blowing a gale from the north.

WILL ARRANGE FOR XMAS.

The ladies of the Second Congregation of St. Andrew's cathedral are in meeting this afternoon at the cathedral arranging for a Christmas tree. The Central Union Sabbath school teachers chose plans last week. The Christian and Methodist churches will meet next week for the same purpose.

TURNED OVER TODAY.

Pymaster Mohun today surrendered his accounts and books to Lawrence Heap, the new pymaster of the Benington. Mr. Mohun will leave on the Moana on December 9th for his home in Washington. He will be granted four months leave, before taking another cruise.

A UNION SERVICE.

All arrangements have been completed for the union Thanksgiving services in Central Union church on Thursday morning, at 11 o'clock. Rev. G. L. Pearson, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church, and Rev. D. P. Brede, pastor of Central Union, will conduct the services. There will be an elaborate musical program.

Mr. and Mrs. M. S. Grinbaum, who arrived from Japan Saturday, on the Gaelic, did not remain over in Honolulu, as they had planned. Upon learning that the Moana, sailing on December 9th, was the next boat for San Francisco, Mr. Grinbaum decided to continue to San Francisco on the Gaelic.

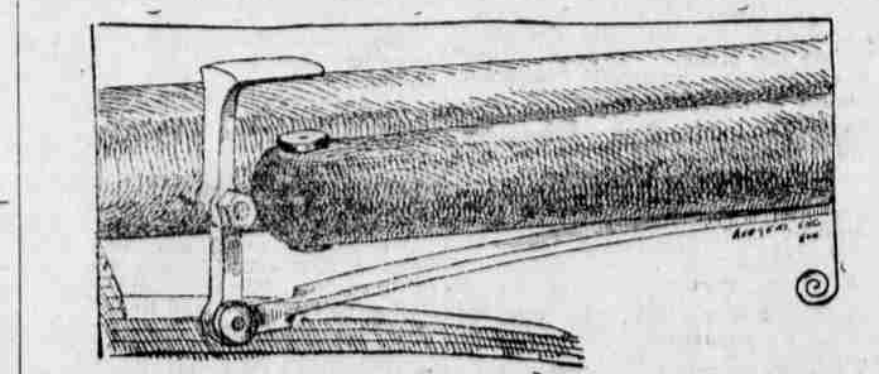

NAHIKU COFFEE ESTATES

WORK TO BE COMMENCED IN REAL EARNEST.

Good Roads and Town Lots Will Go Up--Four Murderers to be Tried at Waikuku--Maui Gossip.

Maui, Nov. 20, 1897. Two days severe Kona wind, and two days rain, mostly from the north, is the record for the past week. All parts of the Island are affected by the storm and there is mud everywhere.

Mr. W. L. Hardy and Mr. S. Fukuda will be the first to actively commence work on the Nahiku coffee lands, recently thrown open. They will commence immediately to clear and plant and will push the work as fast as possible.

The pumping plants of Haiku Sugar Company and Paia plantation, now under construction, are very interesting pieces of work. Excavations some 30 feet wide by 30 feet deep are made, and the plants placed in them, so as to get them nearer to the level of the water.

A. Enos & Co. of Waikuku soon commence to lay their water pipe from Kaupakalua to their Makawao ranch. The Lurline brought the piping, and it is now at Paia. It will cover a distance of nearly six miles, being 31,112 feet.

Four murder cases will be the principal events before the Circuit Court in Lahaina next month. The calendar includes some 27 criminal cases.

Alona of Paia and Tam Yan of Makawao were each fined \$125 for liquor selling, by Judge McKay last Monday.
