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


astically Received by a Packed House-Big Success Scored Again.



HARD AT WORK.

Captain Cameron reports very great activity in the Union Iron Works ship yards, where the Claudine was repair-ed, and the Maui is being built. In addition to the work on the Island boats, the works have under way the new Japanese cruiser, the battle ship Wisconsin, a 1500 fon steamer for the Alaska Commercial company, exten-sive repairs on the Pacific Mail steamers San Juan, Newport and Barracouta and numerous smaller jobs. On the Saturday before the Claudine sailed, the works paid off 2900 men the majority of them being skilled mechanics.

In one experiment in which too much water has been applied was soil that has been fertilized with nitrate of soda. The excess of water which had drained through the soil was collected and evaporated and a large bottle of pure salts was obtained.

George F. Renton read the report the purpose of carrying cane from the fields to the sugar house. This is a wire rope suspended at an elevation some distance from the ground, and bundles of cane of about 125 pounds are put upon this and by gravity carried to the mill. This was much cheaper than the old system, now in use on nearly all the plantations in the Islands, of fluming the cane, inas-much that it carried it across wide. gulches and without the assistance of

The income tax law passed by the last Legislature has been declared unconstitutional by the Supreme ourt owing to certain discriminating features entertained therein: the property tax law has again caused a great deal of friction in regard to the fair and reasonable aggregate value of various sugar estates, as shown by the numerous appeals, which have become necessary and have thrown the burden of deciding this very difficult question on the Judges of the Su-preme Court. I hope that the next Legislature will revise the present tax laws to such an extent that constant appeals on the tax returns may be avoided in future.

Several valuable reports will be submitted to you; as a great deal of time will be lost by reading them in full, I suggest that only the import-ant parts of the same be read and taup for discussion. ken

The second week of the present season will open with a comedy adopted from the German, by Augustin Daly, the famous New York playwright and manager. It is full of humor of a delicate and subtle order.



A LITTLE CAKE TALK.

WORK TO BE COMMENCED IN REAL EARNEST.

Good Roads and Town Lots Will Go. Up-Four Murderers to be Tried at Walluku-Maul Gossip.

Maul, Nov. 20, 1897. Two days severe Kona wind, and two days rain, mostly from the north. is the record for the past week. All parts of the Island are affected by the storm and there is mud everywhere. During the early part of the week the clouds of red dust enveloped Spreekelsville, almost hiding it from view, and the rain there is more than velcome.

Mr. W. L. Hardy and Mr. S. Fukuda will be the first to actively commeace work on the Nahiku coffee lands, recently thrown open. They will com-mense immediately to clear and plant and will push the work as fast as pos-sible. Mr. Hardy has a nursery of 130,000 choice coffee trees, and will have many to sell to new settlers. If the actual settlers who will move to Nahiku within a year, seventeen are Portuguese, seven Americans or Euro-peans, one Japanese and one Hawaiipeaks, one Japanese and one Hawan-an. These, with the laborers who will be sent there to work in coffee, will constitute quite a settlement. It is hoped that the Government will commence work on roads there very soon, as very little can be done without them. The first road needed is the one down to Nahiku landing, and then through the coffee fields, making the lots accessible. As soon as this is done times will be lively there, and town lots at Nahiku will go up. Many people are now looking for-ward to the sale of the eleven lots to be offered soon. The pumping plants of Haiku Sugar Company and Pala plantation, now un-

der construction, are very interesting pieces of work. Excavations some 30 feet wide by 30 feet deep are made. and the plants placed in them, so as to get them nearer to the level of the water. In consequence much digging and masonry work is required. Haiku's plant is nearing completion, and they expect to be pumping in ear-nest before January 1st. By the Mary Dodge the Paia plantation received a small pump to keep the water out of their hole while they dig. Their big plant will not be completed for some

Months yet. A. Enos & Co. of Walluku soon com-mence to lay their water pipe from Kaupakalua to their Makawao ranch. The Lurline brought the piping, and it is now at Paia. It will cover a dis-Anyone in want of a low-priced piano will do well to feet. Surveyor Eldredge of Walluku is to have charge of the work. This is a big undertaking, but Enos & Co. have to do it to get water for their large herd of stock. They have been buying up much land lately, adjoining their ranch.






