Articles 3, 4, 5, Hayselden: 6, and 7 dealt respectively with the duties of the District Committee of-CONVENTION ficers, and all carried as read except cule 5 which had a rider added that the Secretary should submit a report to the District Committee whenever required as to what business had been transacted as per his minutes from the time he took office. Article 8 specified that the Executive Committee should consist of one member from each of the twenty precincts. Article 9 defined the duties of the Executive Committee. Article 10 made a majority of the members of the Executive Committee a quorum, and Article 11 fixed two thirds of the

as a quorum.

Article 12 provided that all precincts should have the privilege of nominating representatives, apportioned as follows: Precincts 1 and 2, one candidate; Precincts 3, 4 and 5, one candidate; Precinct 6, one candidate; Precincts 7, 8, 9 and 15, one candidate; Precincts 10 and 11, one candidate; Precincts 12, 13 and 14, one candidate. This brought Delegate Kalua to his feet in a rousing speech in which he argued that as the sixth precinct had been divided, it was only fair that both Waihee and Waikapu be recognized and given a voice in the selection of candidates Chairman Kepoikai offered an amendment that the selection of candidates be apportioned according to the Judical or Taxation Districts, which would give a representative from Hana, Makawao, Wailuku, Lahaina and Molokal, and one rielegate at large. Delegate McKay suggested that as Makawao had a senator already, and proposed putting up another senator and two representatives, and Lahaina and Molokai together would be rep presented by a senator and two reppresentatives, the candidate at large should come from Wailuku, thus giving Wailuku District two representatives. This led to a long discussion led by Delegate Baldwin, supported by the Hana, Lahaina, Molokai and Makawao delegates against Wailuku having a second representative, while Delegates Kepoikai, Kalua and McKay fought for the measure. Finally on motion of Delegate Kalama the consideration of Article 12 was temporarily postponed until the convention could caucus on

Article 13, outming the order of business and Article 14 providing for changes in the by-laws, were passed, and the convention went into caucus for half an hour, at the end of which time the convention was called together again, and after some slight amendments to Article 13, adjourned to 9.30 A. M., Tuesday morning.

9:30 a. m. Sept. 6. The session was again opened with prayer and after the reading of the minutes and other routine Delegate Baldwin made a motion that article 12 be adopted as originally drawn up. Carter set foot upon the soil of Maui at Labai na, Wednesday evening, and was lustily cheered by hundreds of admiring and staunch supporters.

As early as six o'clock in the even ing people of all nationalities began gathering at the wharf and by the time the Kinau was sighted it is conservatively estimated that there were in the crowd fully eight hundred people, many of whom came halfway across the Island to be present to greet the Executive.

The wharf was so crowded that even elbow room was at a premium. while on the street in front of the Pio neer Hotel there were fully five times the number as on the wharf, the crowd extending possibly fifty feet each way.

The Governor was escorted to the veranda of the Pioneer Hotel by the Reception Committee of the Executive and the Lahaina Precinct Club, Hon. H. P. Baldwin, A. N. Hayselden, Delegate Henning and Mauager Cooper. Mounting a table the Governor said that he not was going to address them, that he had been given to understand, and in fact had read in the papers, that Thursday had been set aside for a big jubilee meeting, but that before he retired he wish to tell those gathered how glad he was to be among them, that he had been fasting for a week that he might do justice to the many luaus. It was his wish to meet and know every one present, and that they must not hesitate to come forward; that he was no different than they, he was one of them and wished to be treated as such. That his reason for holding off free to any part of the Islands. Maui to the last, was because he liked the good things last and "Maui No Ka Oi."

Thursday morning, the Governor held a reception and listened to the various suggestions regarding the needs of Lahaina. In the afternoon he inspected Lahainaluna, and went over the water rights question, and at 4 p. m. was given another recep tion and luau in the Court Yard. After the lunu and address by the Governor the first guns of the campaign were fired by the newly appointed Senators and Represent atives in rousing speeches.
