

And though it is certain that the interest may "by express terms be made payable at the end only of five years," so it is equally certain that the lender has something to say in the matter, and it may be made payable by express terms every six months. Certainly there is nothing in the Bill to indicate the payment of interest at the end of five years only.

It is asked, do we think the trading and mercantile public of Honolula to be fools, that they cannot understand the operation of the Bill as it reads? Letter from Farani.

CHERBOURG, May 25th, 1874. DEAR ADVERTISER :- It seems to be the unenviable fortune of your correspondent Farani to arrive in France in times of political troubles or social crises. Four years ago it was to witness the preparations of a foreign war, unjustly and unwisely declared in the hope of diverting public attention from the internal complications of a declining power, and with the no less delusive idea of consolidating on a tottering throne, a dynasty founded on popular suffrage. Events have proved the vanity of the schemes of that potentate, a few years ago one of the proudest of Europe, and who died an exile, having lived long enough to see the calamities and humiliations heaped upon the land which had made him the absolute master of its destinies. And yet, the war and its terrible consequences might have been avoided, and it is now generally admitted that the main cause of the fall of Napoleon III., is to be attributed to his want of energy in the latter part of his reign and to the concessions he made to democratic ideas. Imperialism means an autocratic rule, and as such it might have been maintained in France much longer, but was doomed to destruction the moment it gave | person fair play to the dissolving action of republican notions. To his credit it must be said that it was with the best of intentions that he tried to conciliate two contradictory elements, but when he deviated from the principle of Imperial rule, his was a lost cause, and his fall was predicted by many. These retrospective considerations are of little interest however. and I must leave this trite subject to speak of the present times and of the state of affairs in Paris, on

On my arrival a few days after the meeting of the Assembly, after their Easter recess, there was a certain uneasiness in the public mind, prefatory to a conflict. called Leper Settlement, Sunday morning. June 21st, and examined a large number of patients most of them had passed through the first, second and third stages of the disease of what is called leprosy. Several cases were inherited from parents, traced down to the third progenitors; and a large number of cases were traced to deeply marked syphilitic scrofulous faint. Among minor patients, not ripened into a state of puberty. I ascertained that they had invariably inherited the disease from parents. In addition to innoclous syphilitic taint, I find in some cases, traces of vitiated virus, which has been used for vaccination, deeply marked over the body, turning the cuticle from natural color, to black. I have seen several similar cases in the States, of bad vaccination, which after being expelled turn a fair complexion to a very dark color. Whilst I am in doubt, as to whether the disease which now obtains is leprosy, yet perhaps we may as well yield the point witht cavil and name it as such for the sake of convenience.

THE PACIFIC

Honolulu Sixty-Five Years Ago.

SATURDAY, JULY 11.

With the island of Atooi the natives carry on a considerable trade. The inhabitants of Wahoo excel in making taper or cloth, whilst those of Atooi excel in canoes, paddles, and spears, and they very often make exchanges in these articles. Owing to the number of ships that are constantly touching at these islands, provisions are by no means cheap. A pig is estimated by its length. The largest size, called poanana, or fathom pig, measures that length from the shout to the rump, and is valued at two axes; a junk of the thickest part of the sea-horse tooth, five or six inches long, a yard and a half of blue cloth,

or five dollars, Those that measure from the elbow to the opposite hand, are valued at one axe, or about half the price of the larger size. A sheep or goat may be had for a smaller piece of ivory; a maro, or a pair of fowls, for a knife, a pair of

scissors, or small mirror. From their earliest years, the natives spend much of their spare time in the water, and constant practice renders them so dexterous, that they seem as much at their ease in that element as on land; they often swim several miles off to ships, sometimes resting upon a plank shaped like an anchor stock, and paddling with their hands, but more frequently without any assistance

Although sharks are numerous in these seas, I never heard of any accident from them, which I attribute to the dexterity with which they avoid their attacks.

Throwing the top shoots of the sugar-cane at each other, and catching them in their flight, is a favorite amusement, the practice of which tends to render them very expert in the use of the spear. Dancing, wrestling, and foot races, are also common amusements, particularly at macaheite

The dances are principally performed by women, who form themselves into solid squares, 10 or 12 each way, and keep time to the sound of the drum accompanied by a song, in which they all join. In dancing they seldom move their feet, but throw themselves into a variety of attitudes, sometimes all squatting, and at other times springing up at the same instant. A man in front with strings of shells on his ankles and wrists, with which he marks time, acts as fugle-man. On these occasions the women display all their finery, particularly in European clothes, if they are so fortunate as to possess any. They receive great applause from the spectators, who fre-

quently burst into immoderate fits of laughter, at particular parts of the song. They have a game somewhat resembling draughts, but more complicated. It is played upon a board about twenty-two inches by fourteen, painted black, with white spots, on which the men are placed; these consist of black and white pebbles, eighteen upon each side, and the game is won by the capture of the adversary's

The game of draughts is now introduced, and the natives play it uncommonly well.

Flying kites is another favorite amusement. They make them of taper, of the usual shape, but uncommon size, many of them being fifteen or sixteen feet in length, and six or seven in breadth; they have often three or four hundred fathom of line, and are so difficult to hold, that they are obliged to tie them to trees.

The only employment I ever saw Tamena, the queen, engaged in, was making these kites. A theatre was erected under the direction of James Beattie, the king's block-maker, who had been at one time on the stage in England. The scenes representing a castle and a forest were constructed of different colored pieces of taper, cut out and pasted together. .
