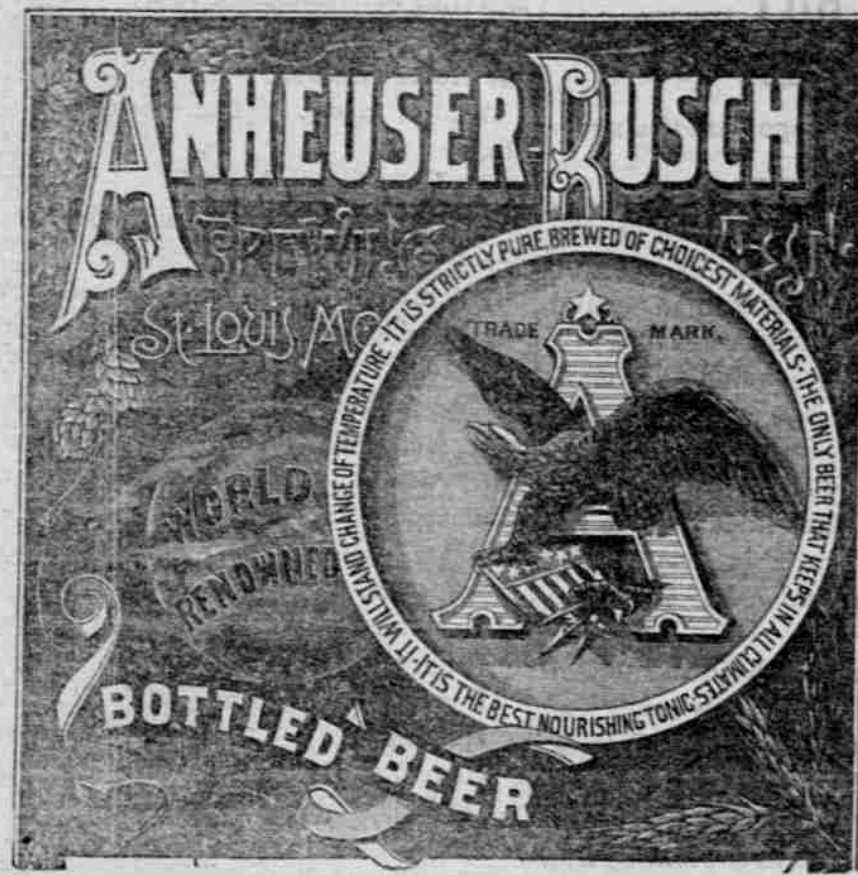

FRIENDS TO THE P. G.

With Neither Wit nor Wisdom.

It is well worth reading the speeches of the Republican Senators on Hawaii. They are honorable gentlemen who express themselves and cannot be accused of lying, we presume, or of willfully misstating facts, but will have to be excused on account of the wrong information given to them by partisans of the P. G., whom they, for their own purposes, believed in implicitly. We have before us the speech of Senator W. F. Frye of Maine, who was the leading speaker on the Hawaiian question in the defense of the Blaine-Stevens-Dole combination. The inaccuracies—to say the least—displayed by the Senator, and the ignorance which he exhibits in regard to Hawaiian affairs are really astounding. We select a few of his remarks at random and we could fill columns if we considered his wrong statements of sufficient importance to have them reproduced. Look at this: "He (Blount) went to Antone Rosa and Antone Rosa told him that when the proclamation was read from the steps of the government building the United States troops were paraded in front with cannon and arms, and Mr. Blount knew, when Rosa told him that, that there was not a United States marine in sight. Yet he finds truth with Antone Rosa."

So speaks this small Frye from Maine. We do not blame the poor duffer because he doesn't know any better, but we have a very distinct and very correct opinion of the men like Thurston and Alexander who primed the senator and who made him appear as a common-every-day liar. By the way, it would be of interest, if Professor Alexander of the Hawaiian University (sic) whatever that may be, would now explain some of the outrageous stories which he dished up to the Senate committee and about which he said after his return here that "of course everything reported as coming from him was not accurate although the main points were." Shall we reproduce some of the main points for the special benefit of the Professor and his gullible Washington audience?

PEARLS of sanctity rolled from the pen of the Star editor yesterday in his article on Sunday concerts. We hope nevertheless that the concert will not be "sacred," if by that word is meant only "church-music." The excellent taste of Professor Berger will guarantee a suitable and popular programme and while, it is to be hoped, he will leave out "After the Ball," and other profane music, he will also allow "Nearer my God to thee," to be confined to its proper precincts and proper spheres—inside the portals of the Central Union.

A combination of disgruntled ex-Reform—Royalists is making an attempt to get the leading strings of the Hawaiians into their hands. A bull let in to a china shop is a side show in comparison to the havoc which occurs occasionally in their camp.

THE effect of the decision, by the court in the p. g. vs Norrie case for alleged attempt to seduce prospective followers of the p. g. from their expected, in the unknown future, allegiance to that power, has been, to say the least, to cause good humor amongst all parties concerned. The laugh is universal and he generally is regarded as most hearty in the merriment, who laughs last.

TO THINK for even one moment, that the sacred names of some of our best missionary representatives would be dragged before the public gaze as *particeps criminis* in furthering the exhibition of the licentious hula, is enough to cause the HOLOMUA, and those whose cause it represents, to retire with bowed heads in sorrow to their holes. That the missionary element always have a move on where the dollar is concerned is well-known, but this glaring inconsistency. Oh, wats, save us!

THE Oracle has not yet spoken in regard to "handsome" Jack, but may this afternoon in the executive session of the councils when "I." can have a private say in company with "Sam." How Sam, did fool the League!

THE U. S. TARIFF BILL.

Some of the Important Changes.

Sugar has been placed on the dutiable list at from one cent to a cent and two-fifths per pound according to polariscope test.

Iron ore, including manganese iron ore, also the dross or residuum from burnt pyrites, forty cents per ton.

Coal is taken from the free list and made dutiable also at forty cents a ton and coke at fifteen cents.

Lead ore, which in the Wilson bill was fifteen per cent ad valorem; lead ore and lead dross, three-fourths of one cent per pound; provided that silver ore and all other ores containing lead shall pay a duty of three-fourths of one cent a pound on the lead contained therein, according to sample and assay at the port of entry.

The whiskey tax is raised to \$1.10 per gallon. The bonded period is extended five years, that is, from three to eight years.

Cigars \$5 a thousand, cigarettes in paper \$1 a thousand, cigarettes in tobacco fifty cents a thousand.

Lumber remains on the free list.

Barley and barley pearled, patent or luffed, is raised from twenty-five to thirty per cent ad valorem, and barley malt from thirty-five to forty per cent.

The income tax provision of two per cent remains in the bill, but the tax on non-residents is stricken out.

The additions to the free list are as follows:

Any cattle, horses, sheep or other domestic animals which have strayed across the border to any foreign country, or where such domestic animals have been or may be driven across such boundary by the owner for pasturage purposes, the same may be brought back to the United States free of duty, under treasury regulations.

Other items added are—Diamonds and other precious stones, rough or uncut, including miners diamonds.

Cod oil, not specifically provided for in the act; medals bestowed and accepted as honorary distinctions.

To the paragraph which admits free "spermacetti, whale and other fish oils of American fisheries," the committee adds, "And all fish and other products" of such fisheries. To the paragraph dealing with paintings, the word "painting" is defined as follows: "And the word painting as used in this act shall not be understood to include such as are made wholly or in part by stencilling or other mechanical process."

In defining professional books, tools of trade, etc., admitted free, the Senate adds a provision which declares that things admitted free under this head shall not be construed to include theatrical scenery, properties and apparel, but such articles brought

by proprietors or managers of theatrical exhibitions arriving from abroad for temporary use by them in such exhibitions, and not for any other person and not for sale, shall be admitted free of duty under such regulations as the secretary of the treasury may prescribe.

The free admission of raw silk is specifically stated to not apply to doubled, twisted nor advanced in manufacture in any way. To philosophical and scientific apparatus is added utensils, including bottles and boxes containing instruments and preparations, stained or painted window glass or stained or painted glass windows specially imported for the use of any society or institution established for religious, philosophical, educational, scientific or literary purposes, and not intended for sale, are added to the free list.

Ploughs and other agricultural implements, which the House bill made free, have a provision that all the articles mentioned when imported from any country which lays an import duty on like articles coming from the United States, shall be subject to duties under existing law.

Articles stricken from the free list are as follows:

Apples, green, ripe and dried, etc.

Beef, mutton and pork. Bone char, suitable for use in decolorizing sugars.

Bituminous and shale, and coal slack or culm. Coke.

Cocoa fibre; floor matting manufactured from round and split straw, including Chinese matting.

Dates, coconuts, Brazil nuts, cream nuts.

Gambier. Guts, salted. Horn strips and tips. Iron ore.

Olives, green or prepared. Orchids, lilies of the valley, azaleas, palms and other plants used for forcing under glass for cut flowers or decorative purposes.

Sausage skins. Sugars.

Stained or painted window glass or painted glass windows. Paintings and statuary in the paragraph referring to articles imported for exhibition by any association authorized by the United States or any State.

The sugar provision is as follows:

All sugars, tank bottoms, sirups of cane juice or of beet juice, melada, concentrated melada, concrete and concentrated molasses testing by the polariscope not above eighty degrees, shall pay a duty of one cent per pound and for every additional degree or fraction of a degree above eighty and not above ninety degrees, shown by the polariscope test, shall pay one one-hundredth of one cent per pound additional, and above ninety and not above ninety-six degrees for every additional degree or fraction of a degree shown by the polariscope test, shall pay a duty of two one-hundredths of a cent per pound additional, and above ninety-six degrees by polariscope test, shall pay a duty of one and four-tenths cents per pound; molasses testing not above fifty-six degrees by the polariscope, shall pay a duty of two cents per gallon; molasses testing above fifty-six degrees, shall pay a duty of four cents per gallon.

The date when the law goes into effect is changed from June 1st to June 30, 1894, and this date is made to affect not only articles imported, but articles withdrawn for consumption (except, of course, where otherwise specified in the bill).

London, Mar. 14. The Queen, accompanied by the Prince and Princess of Battenberg, left Sheerness for Flushing, Holland, on the royal yacht Victoria and Albert this morning. The royal yacht was conveyed by the war ship Australia. Her majesty is on the way to Florence, Italy, where she will stay some time.

Victoria (B. C.), Mar. 14. The Provincial Government offers a reward of \$1000 for the arrest of the perpetrators of the dynamite outrage at Nanaimo.

Whereas, the Provisional Government proposes to call a Constitutional Convention for the purpose of preparing a new Constitution for the Hawaiian Islands, allowing only 18 delegates to be elected to sit with the now elected members of the present Executive and Advisory Councils, which body consists of nineteen members which would constitute a majority of the proposed convention, and therefore able to defeat any wishes of the Hawaiian People. And whereas it is further proposed to allow all foreigners who were in the country on or before January 1st, '94, the right of franchise, and, whereas, each delegate and each voter will be obliged to take an oath derogatory to the dignity, traditions and autonomy of the Hawaiian Nation which is a clear violation of their Constitutional rights. Therefore, be it resolved that we earnestly recommend all members of the "Hui Aloha Aina" and all Hawaiian sympathizers to refrain from participating in the coming election for delegates to the proposed convention. And all members of the "Hui Aloha Aina" are especially cautioned against taking any of the prescribed oaths or taking any part whatever in the aforementioned elections, or joining any of the clubs started to prepare the same, and from joining in any acts whatever affecting the Hawaiian Nation or people's appeal now under consideration before the Executive and Legislative authority of the American Nation.

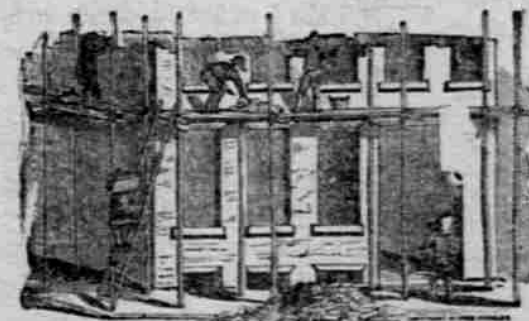
