SHE KNEW HE'D COME HOME.

Neshanic is a desolate little settle-

Remarkable Story of the Beturn of a Rusaway Boy. a

ment in New Jersey, thirty-five miles from New York, thirty-five miles from Trenton, thirty-five miles from Perth Ambey, and ten miles from the nearest place that makes any pretence to civilization. To get there you must pass through a sort of Slough of Despond which tries a man's soul beyond endurance. All of William Ammerman's children were born here, and they all liked the place, except George. George was the second, and the handsomest and the strongest; but, somehow or other, he couldn't buckle down to Neshanic. He had peculiar notions about the size of the world, and although his father used to drum into his ears the saying, "There is no place like home," George wanted to make sure of it by seeing for himself. All this was in '76 or '77.

One hot August day fourteen years ago, when the flies were buzzing as hard as they could and all nature was droning in a listless, monotonous way, Mrs. Ammerman said to George: "Here, lazybones! Take a pail

"Hello, daddy." Mr. Ammerman was dumfounded for a moment, and then, to show his appreciation of what he thought was a joke, replied:

"Hello, sonny. What can I do for "Don't you know me, dad? Have

My dear boy-you-you-my! ain't you big. And you never wrotealive, alive, you, you—''

saved a little dust for you. Where's ma? I want to see her." "She's sick, Georgie. She's very sick, and she may die any minute. I-I can't get used to it, my dear, dear boy. How handsome you are, and won't your mother be surprised!

You wait here now till I call you."

Mr. Ammerman went into the house, stopped only to wipe his eyes, which took him a long time, and then entered his wife's room. "Ma, what would you like to see best in the whole, whole world?"

"George," was the prompt ans-

"He's here. Georgie, come inside. Hey, you rascal, don't upset your old father. There, there. Oh-h-h, don't cry, ma. It ain't a ghost. It's George, sure enough. D-h-don't

take on so." The parents and their son had a good, long cry, and then George sat down near his mother's bed and took her hand.

"It's a long story," he said, "and I can't tell it all at once. I got on a coal train and stole a ride as far as Harrisburg. I worked there doing chores for two months, and earned enough money to pay my way to Chicago. I worked a few days in a brick yard and then went to Iowa. I was in Iowa for two years working in lumber yards, and I learned all about the lumber trade and about timber. After that I worked at lumbering all through Montana and Colorado. But I was a big fool, and invested it all again and lost nearly all of it. After seven years of this kind of life I got tired of the whole thing and made up my mind to come back to Neshanic. I scraped together all the money I could and invested it and made about \$7,000 out of it. That's all I've got in the world, daddy, but it's yours, every cent of it.

"I always thought I'd make a million dollars some day, and then come home and be elected Senator or something like that. But I got a thinking that money wasn't everything in this world. I wasn't a bit happier when I had the \$25,000 than on the day I started. So I thought I'd come home and here I am." "To stay?" asked his mother.

"If you want me to." "William," said Mrs. Ammerman to her husband, with a proud look, "I knew he'd come home and I saved the jam. Remember the blackberries you left in the huckleberry patch, Georgie? Well, they're here yet. I made them into jam and you'll have

them for tea." Whereupon George kissed his mother, and, as he told it to the reporter:

"That's all there is about it, excepting that the jam was good and I was a fool."

PACIFIC COAST EVENTS. In the United States District Court at Los Angeles March 12th, Judge Rose oracred that the libellant in the case against the Itata and the two thousand cases of arms and ammunition taken from her hold be granted thirty days time from March 3rd within which to file exceptions to the rulings of the court and to appeal

therefrom. An attempt, which, had it been successful, would have resulted in a terrible holocaust, was made last Saturday morning to burn a lodging house on the south-west corner of Broadway and Dupont streets. It was occupied by one hundred sleeping men and women. Bernard Labez, a Portuguese seaman, is charged with the deed and is now languishing in the city prison on a charge of arson, although he stoutly denies his guilt.

The committee of the Starr King Monument Association and the Golden Gate Park Commissioners have chosen a site in the park for the erection of the Thomas Starr King monument. The pedestal is now on its way from Chicago.

At the annual election held in this city March 9th, James L. Flood succeeded to the control of Hale & Norcross. The news gave general satisfaction at Virginia, Nev.





JUDICIAL DECISION.

Bill in Equity to Declare a Trust in C. Atong's Affairs.

A decision has been filed by Justice Dole sitting in Chambers in the case of C. Along vs. Chun Hoy and the new band pavilion described the J. A. Hopper, bill in equity to deother day in the BULLETIN was in- clare a trust. The plaintiff left this country for China on October 17. 1890, having two days previously appointed the defendant Chun Hoy as his attorney in fact, by a letter of new lanai, also previously described attorney. On November 1st of the same year the defendant Chun Hoy delivered to the co-defendant a check on the bank of Bishop & Co., of Honolulu, for \$29,600.79 and endorsed by J. A. Hopper, per W. L. Hopper, the check being presented to the bank by Mr. Hopper on the same day it was given to him and cashed from the plaintiff's bank account, and applied to the settlement of a debt owed to him by Chun Hoy.

After this transaction the plaintiff revoked the power of attorney to stand. Col. Macfarlane with Messrs. | Chun Hoy and appointed S. M. Damon as his attorney in fact. Chun Hoy, one of the defendants, was indebted to Mr. Hopper in large amounts of money, and had mortgaged his rice plantation interest to the latter, to secure the payment of such debt and for future advances. a part of the debt being for the purchase price of the said planting interest. These statements are made by the bill of complaint and admitted in the answers of both defendants. but Hopper in his answer explains that he had no information sufficient its more than a bundred variegated to form a belief that the funds from which the check was paid were from the plaintiff's secount except that the added burden to the plant the check was drawn in the name of

The plaintiff alleged on information and belief that Chun Hoy had no money of his own at the time of bringing the action, Aug. 21, 1891, with which to pay plaintiff the amount of the check and interest, and no property except such as had been mortgaged to Hopper. Also that Hopper knew at the time the check was cashed that the money was not Chun Hoy's.

The plaintiff claimed that the payment of the check to Hopper by Chun Hoy was a misapplication of the funds of the plaintiff held in trust by Chun Hoy, and Hopper being aware of this is himself liable to plaintiff for such misapplication of funds. The payment of the money to Hopper by Chun Hoy was without authority from Afong.

The defendant Chun Hoy, defends the transaction by saying that his plantation was ample security for the repayment of the amount.





The total annual production is estimated at 150 million gal-The principle by which alcohol is produced, is the fermentation of certain substances containing sugar or starch that is converted into sugar, by which process the sugar is inverted into glucose, from which the alcohol is formed. This is known as alcoholic

mentation-alcoholic, acetous, lactic, and viscous. These are called the accidents of fermentation and have to be carefully guarded against. Pasteur in his classical memoir has proved that in viscous or alcoholic fermentation, "the balance sheet of the reaction is as follows. One hundred parts of cane sugar, in fermenting, pass into 105.4 parts of glu-

cose, which then breaksup yielding (approximately) of Alcohol 51.1 Carbonic acid..... 49.4 Succinic acid 0.7 Glycerine 3.2 Matter passing to the

105.4 In the alcoholic fermentation of glucose, five agents are necessary, and in the absence of any one of them fermentation cannot proceed. These are sugar, water, a ferment, heat and air. It is therefore necessary to have a knowledge of the component parts of the substance being fermented and the proper manipula-

tion of the five necessary agents. It is not within the scope of this article to give a detailed account of the methods of fermentation and distillation. It may be briefly stated, however, as follows: The apparatus necessary for the fermenting process are large vats with copper coils on the botttom for heating or cooling the contents when necessary. The operation of fermenting is completed in about 48 hours, leaving a liquor which possesses the characteristic

odor and taste of alcohol.

tained are composed essentially of volatile substances, such as water, alcohol, essential oils, and a little acetic acid, and of non-volatile substances, such as cellulose, dextrine, unaltered sugar and starch, mineral matters, lactic acid, etc. To obtain the alcohol the liquor has to be distilled. The apparatus employed in the process of distillation is called a still and is of almost infinite variety. The Cellier-Blumenthal apparatus with its modern improvements is considered the best and the most economical in its operation. In order to obtain pure or rectified
