The beef trust is to be backed by
Rockefeller's millions.

Hard coal is being sold at the rate
of \$32 per ton in New York city.

Mascagni has scored a great suc-
cess with Italian opera music in New
York.

A second fire has occurred in the
Texas coal fields causing loss of over
\$100,000.

Two tombs of great antiquity have
been discovered in the Necropolis in
the Forum at Rome.

Large and valuable deposits of
nitrate have been discovered and located
in Death Valley, California.

Russia proposes to build a new
railway to connect the Black Sea
with its Siberian railway system.

The British Miners' Federation
bitterly opposes the shipment of
English coal to the United States.

A general strike of coal miners in

the Philippines Islands.

An American fleet has been form-
ed in the Caribbean Sea with Ad-

Earl," with John in the title role.

Serious riots are reported in New

Japanese Woman Murdered.

Momono, a Japanese woman, was stabbed to death in the cane fields at Kihel on Thursday morning, by a Japanese man named Fugita.

The woman, who was married in Japan to one Ichi, had promised Fugita that she would desert her husband and marry him, and gave him a written promise that he might kill her if she did not keep her word.

The Japanese luna missed the woman when the gang came in at 11:30, and went to look for her. He found her dead, stabbed through the heart, with several other slashes about the throat.

Fugita, the murderer, started to Wailuku, presumably to give himself up to the authorities. He was followed by the Japanese watchman at Kihel, who overtook him on the road, and turned him over to a policeman at Waikapu.

A coroner's jury was held at Kihel last night, and they found substantially the above facts.

Souvenir "FRIEND" Edition.

Work is well under way for the publication of New Year Souvenir edition of the "FRIEND," the staunch old missionary periodical published since the time "when the man runneth not to the contrary," in Honolulu.

This edition is to celebrate the sixtieth anniversary of the establishment of the American Board in 1843, and is to be known as the "American Board Edition." The crucial dates to be emphasized are 1824, the establishment of the first Hawaiian mission; 1843, the founding of the American Board, and 1903. Under the able editorship of Theo. Richards, the ground will be well covered, both from a religious and secular standpoint, and it is a rich field for exploitations. Many valuable contributions from able and experienced writers will grace the columns of the Souvenir edition, which will be extended far beyond its normal size, to make room for them.

This edition, which will consist of many thousands of copies, will be elaborately illustrated, the cover page being in colors, designed by Allen Dunn of Honolulu, and representing a whaler, typical of the old-time fleets, casting an anchor in a land-locked harbor, in the light of the setting sun, typical of the trend of the missions. Tropical foliage shows the land to be one of the Islands of the Pacific seas.

The interior of the edition will contain many portraits and illustrations in black and white, and its appearance is dated for the New Year.

On last Monday, October 20, an attempt to burn Maunaloa Seminary was made by two girls, pupils who had entered the school at the beginning of the present year, never having attended the school before. The fire was discovered by one of the teachers and extinguished in time to prevent serious loss.

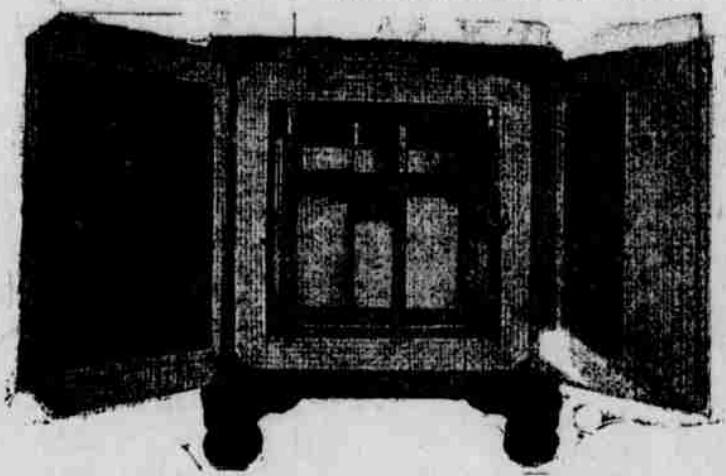

SHIPPING NEWS

Some lumber laden vessel has met with disaster in a storm that raged about a week ago a few hundred miles southeast of the islands.

The Italian ship Wallace town, which arrived on Saturday, reports that in latitude fifteen degrees north and longitude 136 degrees west, she encountered a large amount of floating lumber, which was new and looked as if it had just come from a vessel. The captain of the Wallace town says that he saw a sufficient amount of floating lumber to make up a deck load of a large schooner. At the time he encountered the lumber the skipper states there was a heavy sea running from west-north-west.—Advertiser

Among the large cargo brought by the steamer Nevada from San Francisco on Thursday were a number of miles of length of three-inch pipe, which will be used to encase the cable to be laid from the Waikiki cable landing to the Commercial Cable Company's office in the Young building. This is a heavy pipe and is so constructed that it will bear tight after the cable has been drawn through it. The land end of the cable will have to be well cared for as it is said that it runs more risk of damage than that which lies on the ocean's bottom. Encased in this pipe it will be next to impossible for any injury to affect the land portion of the cable.—Advertiser

The fifth conference of the International Maritime Committee, at Hamburg, adopted the draught of a treaty relative to a uniform law for collisions and maritime salvage in the proposed code. The distinction between "salvage" and "assistance" is abolished, and successful services rendered to a ship in peril give the right to equitable remuneration. The sum to be paid is for successful service only and cannot exceed the value of the salvaged property.

What is said to be the largest and heaviest anchor ever made was recently forged at the Charleston, Mass., navy yard. It weighs over eight tons, and cost nearly \$2,000. It is 15 feet long all over and 9 feet 6 inches over the points. The palms are 32 inches wide. The cable for this anchor in unique also, as regards weight, each link weighing 60 pounds; 380 fathoms (2,160 feet) of it are to be supplied.

The S. S. Nevada, Capt. Weedon, reached Kahului last Monday morning with 1200 tons of miscellaneous freight for Maui, and is expected to leave tomorrow, with 3000 tons of sugar. On Wednesday, Capt. Weedon went to Hana, to examine the harbor there, to see if it will be possible for the Nevada to enter for the purpose of loading sugar. He returns this morning.

The little steamer Tabula has been leased by Cotton Brothers and is now undergoing repairs preparatory to being sent down to the Pearl Harbor bar, where she will be used in the dredging operations there.
