The Protest of Hawaii.

HOW THE AUSTRALIAN CONFERENCE RECEIVED IT.

The Hon. W. R. Giblin, Premier of Tasmania, submitted a communication from Mr. Audley Coote, Hawaiian Consul at Hobart, protesting against the annexation of the Pacific Islands.

The protest of the little kingdom of Hawaii against any of the Pacific Islands being annexed to a European Power would have been spirited and dignified, had the Sandwich Islanders had any claim to dictate in the matter, or had they shown any capacity for government. As things were, the protest looked rather ridiculous; but the Conference respectfully received it, and then acted as if they had never seen it.—Auckland Evening Star.

THE BANDMANN-BEAUDET COMPANY

Will commence a brief season at the Music Hall to-morrow night. They were passengers by the Zealandia from Australia to San Francisco and had no intention of remaining here, but, at the solicitation of several friends, were induced to try the experiment of a week in Honolulu. That the visit will be remunerative we have no doubt, and we trust that it will be so that Mr. Bandmann may be able to give a good account of us on the Coast and induce other companies to "go and do likewise." The season will commence with a Concise Version of Hamlet, in three acts, embracing the entire beauties of the play. Miss Beaudet will then sing, and the performance will conclude with Tyre Smith's Farce "The Happy Pair," which will send everybody home in an exceedingly good humor.

Place aux dames. Miss Louise Beaudet was born at Tours in France. She has been on the stage for seven years, commencing at the early age of fifteen. She has performed successfully in San Francisco and New York and has just concluded a tour, extending over three and a half years, throughout the Australian Colonies, India and the East. Of her rendering of Ophelia in Hamlet the Australasian says: "There has certainly been no Ophelia comparable to it in Melbourne. It is a kind of epoch in itself. The charm of Miss Beaudet's Ophelia is that she does not act. She is Ophelia. She thinks and speaks as Ophelia would think and speak. The presumption is that she possesses that gift which is born with some marvellously endowed beings, of instinctive perception. Her Ophelia stands on a level with the Hamlet of Herr Bandmann. It is the ideal Ophelia."

Herr Bandmann was born in Mecklenburg Strehlitz in 1839. He has performed in all the principal cities in the continent of Europe, for eight years in England, and for seven years throughout America, and has just completed his third visit to Australia and the East. He plays in two languages, German and English, and is almost as good in comedy as he is in tragedy. Mr. Bandmann was selected by Lord

Lytton to play "The Rightful Heir" at the Lyceum in London, when it was first produced. Speaking of Bandmann's Hamlet, an Australian paper says, "The race for supremacy in this most intellectual of all Shakespeare's characters has lain, the last forty years, between Macready, Charles Kean, Phelps, Fechter and, later on, with Herr Bandmann, who is generally considered by the theatrical world to have carried off the palm. He avoids Macready's mannerisms, Kean's mouthing, Phelps' jauntiness and Fechter's forced points and foreign accent. His conception of the part is that of a princely character beset on every side by suspicion and murder."

Mr. Charles Lobbett, of Drury Lane Theater, London, a good average actor, or he would not be with Herr Bandmann, completes the original company, which will be supplemented by the best local talent that is obtainable.

# SUPPLEMENT TO THE DAILY BULLETIN.

HONOLULU, H. I., TUESDAY, DECEMBER 25, 1883.

## AN ARCTIC WONDER.

The latest advices from Ounalaska, which arrived by the steamer *Dora*, just down from that island, contain an interesting description of wonderful volcanic disturbances, which are said to have occurred near there lately. The information is contained in part in a letter received by Dr. J. H. Hatch of this city from his daughter, Mrs. Frederick Smith, wife of the Deputy Customs Collector located there. No other written intelligence has yet been received, neither the Signal Service agent nor the Geographical Society's correspondent having been heard from in regard to the matter. The communication to Dr. Hatch bears date of October 16th, and says that on that day a most unusual sight was witnessed in the heavens to the north of Ounalaska and that soon afterward the sky grew very dark, a dense black cloud covering the whole horizon and hanging so low as to permit a close inspection of its composition, though this could not be made out at that time. This cloud and its general color and outline were so unlike anything the writer had ever seen before as to defy comparison. The light of the sun was completely excluded from that section, many ascribing this to a total eclipse, and others, seeing the cloud and experiencing a peculiar and very unusual element of heat in the atmosphere, thought the world was approaching its end. Mr. Applegate of the Signal station predicted a heavy gale on the appearance of this phenomenal cloud, but it was not until it broke, which occurred half an hour afterward, that its real nature was discovered. On collapsing the entire mass fell to the earth, enveloping everything to the depth of four or five inches in a sheet of dull, gray ashes. Its volcanic origin was soon apparent, but there being no active volcano on the island and the only mountain of any great extent, Makashin, 5474 feet in height, being close at hand and showing no disturbance, the eruption was thought to have taken place at the island of Bogoslov (God's land), thirty miles northwest from Ounalaska. Reports had been brought in from time to time during the summer by natives of the "angry mountain" of Bogoslov, and to this volcano it would seem to have been entirely attributable.

## A VOLCANO-FORMED ISLAND.

Wishing to ascertain if any of the northern voyagers had witnessed a phenomenon of this kind, Captain Hugs of the *Dora* was called on by a *CHRONICLE* reporter Thursday afternoon. He was found at an assay office, he being an experimentalist in this branch of science. Laying aside his blow-pipe and metal, the Captain said in answer to the first inquiry;

"Yes; I was at Bogoslov twice during the past season and I did see something most extraordinary. Sit down and I'll tell you all about it."

The reporter complied with the request and the Captain went on;

"When I say that I was at Bogoslov you must not take it for granted that I landed there."

"Is it not a habitable island?" asked the reporter.

"At certain seasons, perhaps, but at the time I saw it there was nothing visible there but a mass of flames and smoke, with pieces of red-hot rocks issuing from the great cone in the center of the mass and great quantities of lava running down to the sea."

"How near did you approach?" "I stood off about a mile and a half, not daring to venture nearer. It was the grandest scene I ever witnessed and I have been pretty nearly everywhere."

"How long did the eruption last?" "I can't exactly say as to that, as I found the cone in a disturbed condition and left it next day, still in a state of eruption. I have learned that it had been throwing out lava for several weeks and that it had still continued to do so up to the date of my departure from Ounalaska. But what was most remarkable and most singular to behold was a new feature which was then visible in the scene. A new island had sprung up not far distant from Bogoslov since my previous voyage to that spot. At first I could not believe my senses and thought I had made a miscalculation in taking my surrounding, but there it was, a new island, with a cone-shaped peak in the center 500 to 600 feet high and lying only a short distance from where we stood, that

portion of its irregular outline nearest to Bogoslov not being but a few miles away from the old island.

LOCALE OF THE WONDER.

"What would you consider a fair estimate of its area?" was next asked. "Well, its irregular proportions would hardly admit of anything but a rough guess. I should think it about three-fourths of a mile in length and probably about the same in width."

"In what latitude and longitude would you describe it to be?"

"Well, I will tell you about that," said the Captain. "You see, I made calculations, but not knowing what might have happened there since, I wouldn't like to have them published, as they would, perhaps, mislead other navigators."

"Did you meet any other sailors who had seen the land recently thrown up?" asked the reporter.

"Captain Anderson of the *Matthew Turner* said he had also observed it," replied the Captain. "His observation was made about the same time as mine, but the island was then a mass of fire and smoke, and not yet in a compact state. He said that he had sailed over the same spot now occupied by the island two or three times during the previous season."

"What do the natives have to say in regard to the phenomenon?"

"Their information," said the Captain, "cannot generally be depended upon, and their knowledge of time—days, weeks and months especially—seems to be sadly deficient. They say, though, that the eruptions began about half a year ago and have continued intermittently. This statement has been partly born out by reports of white men, but all is vague and unsatisfactory. One thing is certain, a new island has been formed, and navigators sailing those seas cannot be too particular about the manner in which they approach Bogoslov."

SINGED SEA-LIONS

The Captain went on to say that the island of Bogoslov had been uninhabited by natives and was barren of vegetation, the capture of the sea-lions being the only industry engaged in, and that wholly by natives. A remarkable assertion in this connection, and one which will probably not be credited by some, is in regard to the sea-lions. Many of them were reported as having been killed by the volcanic eruptions and the sea was said to be swarming with these animals. The greater portion of those still alive were hairless, the heat to which they had been subjected having removed their outer fur rendering those caught in this vicinity of no value to the hunter.

Some of the ashes which fell at Ounalaska were examined by the reporter. They were peculiar in their lightness and cottony appearance, and the statement of their having been borne thirty miles in the air by a light wind may be easily credited.

Mrs. F. Smith, the lady referred to as having sent the first information of the volcanic eruption to this city, is the only white lady residing at Ounalaska. She has consented to brave the privations of an Alaskan winter that she may be with her husband, whose duty requires his presence there. She cannot again communicate with her relatives in this city until next April, and is thus shut off entirely from the social world.

Captain Hogus has given his discovery the name of New Bogoslov. *S. F. Chronicle.*

Mrs. Anna M. L. Potts, M. D., of the Female College, Pennsylvania, has arrived in Sydney, and has commenced a course of lectures on "Physiology, Health, and Disease." The first was delivered in the Exhibition Building on Wednesday last. Mrs. Potts was introduced by Mr. Kahlo, Consul for the United States of America, and for nearly two hours secured the attention and frequent applause of nearly 2000 persons. The lecturer affirmed that the life of a prisoner was to be preferred to that of some invalids, and dwelt on the importance of a knowledge of physiology. She alluded to the different types of men, temperance diet, and longevity, briefly described some portions of the skeleton of a man which was exhibited, and finally explained some of the causes of deformity. *Federal Australian.*

The hammer and anvil of Powell, the "harmonious blacksmith" of Whitechurch, England, have been sold at auction. The anvil, when struck with this hammer, gives two notes—B and E. Its sound suggested the melody named after the blacksmith.
