

The Protest of Hawaii. **HOW THE AUSTRALIAN CONFERENCE RECEIVED IT.**

The Hon. W. R. Giblin, Premier of Tasmania, submitted a communication from Mr. Audley Coote, Hawaiian Consul at Hobart, protesting against the annexation of the Pacific Islands.

The protest of the little kingdom of Hawaii against any of the Pacific Islands being annexed to a European Power would have been spirited and dignified, had the Sandwich Islanders had any claim to dictate in the matter, or had they shown any c pacity for government. As things were, the protest looked rather ridiculous; but the Conference respectfully received it, and then acted as if they had never seen it .- Auckland Evening Star.

THE BANDMANN-BEAUDET COMPANY Will commence a brief season at the Music Hall to-morrow night. They were passengers by the Zealandia from Australia to San Francisco and had no intention of remaining here, but, at the solicitation of several friends, were induced to try the experiment of a week in Hopolulu. That the visit will be remunerative we have no doubt, and we trust that it will be so that Mr. Bandmann may be able to give a good account of us on the Coast and induce other companies to "go and do likewise." The season will commence with a Concise Version of Hamlet, in three acts, embracing the entire beauties of the play. Miss Beaudet will then sing, and the performance will conclude with Tyre Smith's Farce "The Happy Pair," which will send everybody home in an exceedingly good humor. Place aux dames. Miss Louise Beaudet was born at Tours in France. She has been on the stage for seven years, commencing at the early age of fifteen. She has performed successfully in San Francisco and New York and has just concluded a tour, extending over three and a half years, throughout the Australian Colonies, India and the East. Of her rendering of Ophelia in Hamlet the Australasian says. "There has certainly been no Ophelia comparable to it in Melbourne. It is a kind of epoch in itself. The charm of Miss Beaudet's Ophelia is that she does not act. She is Ophelia. She thinks and speaks as Ophelia would think and speak. The presumption is that she possesses that gift which is born with some marvellously endowed beings, of instinctive perception. Her Ophelia stands on a level with the Hamlet of Herr Bandmann. It is the ideal Ophelia. Herr Bandmann was born in Mecklenberg Strehlitz in 1839. He has performed in all the principal cities in the continent of Europe, for eight years in England, and for seven years throughout America, and has just completed his third visit to Au alia and the East. He plays in tw languages, German and English, and is almost as good in comedy as he is in tragedy. Mr. A Bandmann was selected by Lord

Lytton to play "The Rightful Heir" at the Lyceum in London, when it was first produced. Speaking of Bandmann's Hamlet, an Australian paper says, "The race for supremacy in this most intellectual of all Shakespeare's characters has lain, the last forty years, between Macready, Charles Kenn, Phelps, Fechter and, later on, with Herr Bandmann, who is generally considered by the theatrical world to have carried off the palm. He avoids Macrendy's mannerisms, Kean's mouthing, Phelps jauntiness and Fechter's forced points and foreign accent. His conception of the part is that of a princely character beset on every side by suspicion and murder." Mr. Charles Lobbett, of Drury Lane Theater, London, a good aver-

age actor, or he would not be with Herr Bandmann, completes the original company, which will be supplemented by the best local talent that is obtainable.





AN ARCTIC WONDER.

The latest advices from Ounalaska, which arrived by the steamer Dora, just down from that island, contain an interesting description of wonderful volcanic disturbances, which are said to have occurred near there lately. The information is contained in part in a letter received by Dr. J. H. Hatch of this city from his daughter, Mrs. Frederick Smith, wife of the Deputy Customs Collector I)cated there. No other written in-telligence has yet been received, neither the Signal Service agent nor the Geographical Society's corres-pondent having been heard from in regard to the matter. The communication to Dr. Hatch bears date of October 16th, and says that on that day a most unusual sight was witnessed in the heavens to the north of Ounalaska and that soon afterward the sky grew very dark, a dense black cloud covering the whole horizon and hanging so low as to permit a close inspection of its com position, though this could not be made out at that time. This cloud and its general color and outline were so unlike anything the writer had ever seen before as to defy comparison. The light of the sun was completly excluded trom that section, many ascribing this to a total eclipse, and others, seeing the cloud and cx-periencing a peculiar and very un-usual element of heat in the atmosphere, thought the world was ap-proaching its end. Mr. Applegate of the Signal station predicted a heavy gale on the appearance of this phenomenal cloud, but it was not until it broke, which occurred half an hour afterward, that its real nature was discovered. On collapsing the entire mass fell to the earth, envelop-ing everything to the depth of four or five inches in a sheet of dull, gray ashes. Its volcanic origin was soon apparent, but there being no active volcano on the island and the only mountain of any great extent, Maka-shin, 5474 feet in height, being close at hand and showing no disturbance, the eruption was thought to have taken place at the island of Bogoslov (God's land), thirty miles northwest from Ounalaska. Reports had been brought in from time to time during the summer by natives of the "angry mountain" of Bogoslov, and to this volcano it would seem to have been entirely attributable ..

office, he being an experimentalist in this branch of science. Laying aside his blow-pipe and metal, the Captain said in answer to the first inquiry; "Yes; I was at Bogoslov twice

during the past season and I did see something most extraordinary. Sit down and I'll tell you all about it."

The reporter complied with the request and the Captain went on;

"When I say that I was at Bogoslov you mst not take it for granted that I landed there."

"Is it not a habitable island?" asked the reporter.

"At certain seasons, perhaps, but at the time I saw it there was nothing visible there but a mass of flames and smoke, with pieces of redhot rocks issuing from the great cone in the center of the mass and great quantities of lava running down to the sea."

"How near did you approach?" "I stood off about a mile and a half, not daring to venture nearer. It was the grandest scene i ever wit nessed and I have been pretty nearly everywhere."

"How long did the eruption last?" "I can't exactly say as to that, as I found the cone in a disturbed condition and left it next day, still in a state of eruption. I have learned that it had been throwing out lava for several weeks and that it had still continued to do so up to the date of my departure from Ounalaska. But what was most remarkable and most singular to behold was a new feature which was then visible in the scene. A new island had sprung up not far distant from Bogoslov since my previous voyage to that spot. At first I could not believe my senses and thought I had made a miscalculation in taking my surrounding, but there it was, a new island, with a cone-shaped peak in the center 500 to 600 feet high and lying only a short distance from where we stood, that Continued on next page.
