United States To Decide Ability Germany To Pay

New Proposal Looks To An Economic Commission from This Country To Settle Reparations Semi-officially

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) LONDON, Dec. 21.—It is understood that the United States at request of a commission of world leaders has begun negotiations with Great Britain and France looking toward the appointment of a commission of American businessmen for the fixing of a basis for reparations in a semi-official capacity. It is said that England will consent.

Hughes is quoted as having said that Herbert Hoover would probably head such a commission.

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—German overtures made through informal channels for securing intervention by the United States in securing a revision of the reparations program and schedules, reported from London, throw the first definite light on a method whereby American influence is being drawn into a new attempt to secure a final adjustment of the vexing problem of reparations.

Plans Are Ordered For New Building To Go Up On Market St.

Plans and specifications for a three store-room reinforced concrete building are to be prepared at once by William D'Esmond architect. The building is to be erected on the site between the Wailuku Hardware & Grocery Company Store and the store of the Maui Drug Company on the mauka side of Market street, Wailuku. The center store-room will be the office, and show rooms of the Maui Electric Company, the one nearest Maui Drug Company will be for the Wailuku Branch of the Baldwin Bank and the one nearest Main street for Maui Book Store.

Consideration of building plans was given by the directors of Maui Electric Company at their meeting yesterday and tentative drawings were presented by William D'Esmond which met with general approval. Definite decision was delayed on one important feature, as to whether the Electric Company and the Bank should erect the building at joint expense and rent one room to the Book Store, sharing equally in the rental for the third store-room. A majority of the directors appears to favor that plan.

Eight Millions In Russia Require Help

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) GENEVA, Dec. 21.—The international committee on Russian relief announced today an estimate that Russia will have a shortage of a million tons of cereals this winter and eight million persons will require help. It is believed the Soviets will not support more than 2,500,000. It is estimated it will be necessary to import a million head of livestock, especially horses.

NEW CONFERENCE SOUGHT

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Senator Borah offers an amendment to the Naval Appropriation Bill substituting for the house disarmament proposal one providing that the President shall call a world conference to reduce armaments and discuss possible agreements to make business conditions more stable.

Island Concerns Increase Capital

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) HONOLULU, Dec. 21.—Stockholders of C. Brewer & Co. yesterday voted to issue a stock dividend of 100 per cent, doubling the present capitalization of \$4,000,000, and pay a special dividend, December 29, on \$4,000,000 capitalization, making a total dividend of 17 per cent for the year.

The Schuman Carriage Company also petitioned the territorial treasurer for permission to increase the limit of its capital stock from \$100,000 to \$500,000. C. M. Cooke Ltd., has obtained authorization to increase its maximum capitalization from \$1,000,000 to \$10,000,000. The Haiku Fruit Co. Ltd., has increased from \$1,000,000 to \$5,000,000, and Von Hamm Young has increased from \$100,000 to \$500,000.

- Directors of twelve other Hawaiian corporations have voted since the first of the month to increase issues of capital stock in amounts aggregating \$7,365,000. Five of these corporations have further obtained permission from the territorial treasurer to increase their maximum capitalization in amounts which aggregate \$25,400,000. BOMB THROWN IN TRIESTE

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) LONDON, Dec. 21.—A dispatch to the Times from Milan says it is believed a member of the Fascisti threw a bomb which exploded in a group of Fascisti in the street of Trieste, badly hurting six persons and slightly injuring a score.

WAILUKU AND LAHAINA SELECTED TO MEET STRONG SAINT LOUIS GRID TEAM

Wailuku and Lahaina will be the Maui teams to meet the "Saints", the "team that came back" in the Honolulu interscholastic football season, the team that fell before the strong Kams and then in the post-series game waxed their former conquerors. The Honolulu boys will be over on the Kilauea Saturday morning, between 30 and 40 of them, it is expected, all the stars and a hard aggregation for any Maui team to stack up against. They may be outweighed but they have had a training and have shown a skill which goes far to overcome any disadvantage they may be under in that respect. And they are "lightning fast," say those who have seen them in action on the Honolulu grid.

Paia was given the first opportunity for the honor of meeting the visiting players but, after a meeting on Monday night, declined the offer on the terms upon which it was made. George Cummings, chairman of the football committee, says the reply was an offer to play for a guaranty of \$50 to the Paia team, the Maui champions.

Yesterday the matter of determining which teams should meet the Saint Louis College Boys was determined. Previously Lahaina had said its team would meet the visitors and expressed a preference for the Christmas Day game. Manager Spencer of the Kahului showed himself a game sport and, despite his team's defeat on Sunday by Lahaina expressed its readiness to meet the visitors if it could be strengthened by borrowing some of the Wailuku players or to step aside for Wailuku otherwise. Engle's Wailuku bunch then said they would step into the breach and so is selected to play in the opener. Its decision was reached after Engle had consulted Captain Kalua, Coach Ting and the players of the team.

Both games will be played on the Fair Ground gridiron. The Wailuku-St. Louis game on Sunday afternoon and the Lahaina-Saints struggle on Monday, Christmas Day. Both games are expected to be started at 3:30.

Advices from Honolulu said that the Inter-Island Company had been unable to secure permission from Washington to grant the reduction of fare that had been sought. How this will affect the coming of the St. Louis boys other than the team remains to be seen.

Lahaina has remained in practise and has had two games since the Wailuku boys met Paia and is continuing practise. The Wailuku eleven had not been practising but were hard at it again yesterday afternoon and will get their work in the best possible shape the time for further practice permits.

Both Lahaina and Wailuku will go on the field determined to make at least a strong showing against the visitors and the players of all Maui teams expect to get good points for next year from watching the tactics of the strong Honolulu school team.

Hawaiian Homes Commission Hit

Opinion Of Attorney General Matthewman Is Hard Blow To Plans Of Financing Territorial Undertaking

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) HONOLULU, Dec. 21.—Further complications in the financial status of the Hawaiian Homes Commission have developed from the decision handed down by Attorney General Matthewman on the subject of the lands from which the commission is entitled to revenue. The commission claims a revenue of \$28,000 from certain lands. Attorney General Matthewman holds that the commission is entitled only to the revenue from the lands of Lualualei on Oahu and Upper Waimaea, Anahola and Kamalo, Maui. He further holds that it is not entitled to the revenue from other available lands now not used by it.

It is expected that under this decision the commission may be compelled to return \$11,000 revenue it received from some of such other lands and also lose \$15,000 which the auditor has been holding pending the opinion of the Attorney General.

'Fatty' Arbuckle Will Return To The Screen

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) LOS ANGELES, Dec. 21.—"Fatty" Arbuckle is to be given a chance to return to the movies after January 1 it was announced in movie land here today. Joseph Shreck announces that Arbuckle will work for him. The official statement received from Will Hays says: "Arbuckle is to have another chance to go to work and make good if he can. After the first of the year he will be given this new opportunity. Arbuckle seems completely chastened; his conduct since he has been barred from the screen apparently has been exemplary."

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 21.—Mayor Lew Shank said today that he should bar the exhibition of Arbuckle films in this city, despite the lifting of the ban by Will Hays.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 21.—The district federation of Woman's Clubs met and endorsed its former action opposing the return of Roscoe Arbuckle to the screen.

Word received from a number of cities and towns in various part of the country said they would not permit the showing of Roscoe Arbuckle films in those communities.

BIG STEAMSHIP COMING

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) HONOLULU, Dec. 21.—The American steamship Resolute will arrive at Hilo January 1 with a world-touring party, according to advices received by Castle & Cooke today. The ship is longer than the Laconia, being 618 feet, and has a passenger capacity of 520.

Cape Town Departs On Voyage To Honolulu, Thence To San Pedro

Soon after six o'clock this morning the British light cruiser Cape Town cast off from her moorings and steamed out of Kahului Harbor, heading for Honolulu, her visit to Maui at an end. From Honolulu it is expected that she will sail for San Pedro and thence proceed south and through the canal to Atlantic waters. The Hawaiian Islands are on the outer edge of the sections of the seas to which she was assigned.

Yesterday was given over to sight seeing and auto trips for the officers, chiefly those who could not leave ship on Tuesday and to a railroad trip to Haiku and visit to the cannery for the members of the crew who had not had shore leave the previous day. In the afternoon there was a soccer game on the Wailuku grounds which was attended by numbers of the officers and crew and a scattering of civilians. Aboard ship there was an invitational "at home."

Several of the officers of the cruiser spoke of the cordiality and hospitality that had marked the reception tendered them on their visit to Kahului, which they said had been far greater than anything that they could have anticipated. They said they would always remember their visit to Maui with most pleasurable recollections.

Farmers Prove Their Economic Strength

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—The War Finance Corporation in its annual report issued today declares the American farmer has demonstrated that when properly financed he can weather the worst economic storm. The report says 41 per cent of the loans to farmers have been repaid when due or before.

Hawaii Admitted To Davis Cup Matches

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) LONDON, Dec. 21.—Representatives of the twelve nations figuring in the Davis Cup tennis competitions have decided to divide the contenders into two groups, American and European, the winners in each group meeting, and the final winner challenging for the cup. It was decided to admit Hawaii, the Philippines, New Zealand, Italy and Rumania to future competitions.

DeKay Declares British-Born To Be Law Violators

Former Kahului Preacher Says Numbers Of Them Break Law Almost Openly; Also Attacks Priest

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) HONOLULU, Dec. 20.—Rev. George H. DeKay, superintendent of the anti-Saloon League, in a signed statement which is published in the Star-Bulletin this afternoon says: "The tour of all five islands which I have made in the last three months had disclosed the facts that there are a serious disregard and common violations of the Prohibition Law in the Territory. "A considerable number of those who almost openly violate the law are either British subjects or naturalized American citizens of British birth, persons of whom we have a right to expect better things. "In one district there is a Roman Catholic priest, an alien, I believe, who scatters broadcast anti-prohibition literature."

Rev. George H. DeKay was minister in the Kahului Church before he became superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, coming to the Islands to assume that pastorate. Before coming to Hawaii he had been for many years actively associated with the prohibition movement on the mainland as a lecturer and worker. Since giving up his pastorate here he has paid two or three visits to the island in connection with the work of his new office.

New Department Of Nutrition Advocated For School System

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) HONOLULU, Dec. 21.—As a means of relieving what he declares to be "the alarming malnutrition situation of Hawaii," Dr. W. P. Emerson, here from the mainland, who has been conducting classes on the subject of nutrition, advocates the establishment of a "department of nutrition" as a separate unit of the public school system of the territory. He also recommends an appropriation by the legislature for the carrying out of such plan. He said that the condition of malnutrition among the "children may be eliminated if proper steps be taken."

In his early lectures to his class in Honolulu he said that the investigation which has been conducted since coming to the Islands showed him that there is a larger proportion of malnutrition among the children of Hawaii than among those of the mainland.

It is not lack of food in the family that is responsible for under nourishment of children, Dr. Emerson has shown, when he gave evidence that on the mainland there was a larger proportion of poorly nourished children among the well to do than among the poor and the middle classes.

Power Of Turk Courts Deadlocks Conference

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) LAUSANNE, Dec. 21.—The subcommittee on capitulations of the international conference in session here, is deadlocked on the question of Turkish courts trying foreigners. The conference dealing with the disposition of the Dardanelles adjourned yesterday after Ismet Pasha had made a conciliatory speech. The delegates are optimistic, and say there is no danger of the conference breaking down.

THEFTS FROM GOVERNMENT

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) SEATTLE, Dec. 21.—Federal agents have uncovered an alleged conspiracy to steal thousands of dollars of government property, it was announced today, following an indictment by the grand jury of Clifford Mekeel, a navy yard employe and Gerard Clark, a Bremerton merchant. They are charged with stealing government equipment from warehouses in the Bremerton navy yard.

### NEW EXCLUSION PLAN

In congress there has been introduced by Chairman Johnson of the House Immigration Committee a measure designed to exclude from admission as immigrants persons who are not eligible to citizenship in the United States and V. S. McClatchy of the Sacramento Bee is spreading propaganda in favor of the measure. A letter from him enclosing copies of resolutions passed by the American Legion, by the American Federation of Labor and reprints of many articles on the subjects of Japanese immigration and Japanese exclusion has been received by Maui News. He has been foremost in the fight for restriction of Japanese immigration and rights to land ownership for a long time and many of the articles from his pen have appeared in Islands newspapers.

There are still many persons in the United States who cherish the "old fashioned" ideas that were held by their ancestors that America should be the heaven for the oppressed of any and all countries. There are not nearly so many such persons in California and in the other states of the Pacific slope as will be found in the Eastern States. In the latter named states there are many who would not recognize that there is a "Japanese Problem" and others who say there should not be.

In seeking Japanese exclusion its advocates, under the Johnson Bill care not whom they hit so long as they hit Japan. They want the Japanese excluded and so would exclude other nations ineligible for citizenship as well.

Hawaii's experience with the Chinese and their descendants here has been such that there is not much sympathy with their further exclusion in the minds of many. They would prefer a limitation of such immigration rather than complete exclusion. It is the same with the views of some on Koreans. If the Filipinos should be granted complete independence their coming to Hawaii would be prohibited under such a measure as the Johnson Bill. Hawaii ever has its labor problem, more or less acute and recently it has been more so. For immigration for its agricultural industries it is dependent practically entirely on the peoples of the Pacific. Support of the Johnson Bill would be advocacy of plans to further curtail Hawaii's labor possibilities.

In various appropriation bills there appear the words, "This Act shall not affect the Territory of Hawaii." The writer has not had an opportunity to study the Johnson measure but the hope may be expressed that in this instance as in the Smith Tower Bill, the good roads legislation and other measures under which benefit the states, Congress may follow its custom and make its provisions inapplicable to the Territory of Hawaii.

### SURE TO ANTAGONIZE

Rev. George H. DeKay, formerly pastor of the Kahului church and now superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League in Honolulu is sure to have aroused a storm of protest and has certainly courted antagonism to himself and thus to the cause he espouses through his utterances in a report he gave out in Honolulu a report of which is published today, in which his utterances may be taken as an attack upon British subjects and American citizens of British birth. Also it will rouse antagonism on the part of some persons of the Roman Catholic faith.

If he is quoted correctly, Mr. DeKay must have spoken unguardedly. In any event the wisdom of his words is very doubtful. His British and ex-British neighbors will undoubtedly insist that they are as law abiding as other folk and Roman Catholics have an excuse to say that he has gone out of his way to attack a priest of their church.

Without going into the question of the truth of Mr. DeKay's reported statement, he might have said with equal truth that there is "a considerable number of persons of American parentage and birth who almost openly violate the prohibition law." Equally, also, he might have mentioned other nationalities for it is common knowledge that there are "large numbers" of all classes and of all races and nationalities who "almost openly violate" the prohibition law, if by his words he means purchase liquor for beverage purposes.

It is the very fact that such "large numbers" are not willing to acquiesce in prohibition law enforcement that give the opponents to strict enforcement of the Eighteenth Amendment their chief arguments in favor of permitting to use light wines and beers. Such charges as Mr. DeKay is quoted as making simply go to give them more ammunition to be used against the cause which he is being paid to promote.

Education goes much further than vituperation and achieves its purposes much more quickly. He is supposed to be trying to win friends to his cause and he seems to be going about that task in a strange way.

This paper holds no brief for persons of British birth whether American citizens or not. It holds no brief for persons of any religious faith, but it resents attacks made upon persons of any nation as a class and considers such attacks, no matter against what nation directed, as extremely ill advised.

Increases in the capitalization of corporations appears to have become epidemic in the Islands.

Dr. W. R. P. Emerson may be right in saying that the way to attack malnutrition is by creation of a new department in the public schools, but in the face of the opposition to the enormous school budget proposed his remedy will not get very far.

No. 67—Arrangement Of Furniture  
Having considered walls, floors, col-  
or schemes and furniture, a room will  
fail of charm and comfort unless  
much thought is bestowed upon ar-  
rangement.

The openings in the walls, that is,  
the doors and windows, and the neces-  
sities of usefulness, make the placing  
of furniture somewhat arbitrary, and  
that is the reason that the arrange-  
ment of a room becomes a problem de-  
manding serious consideration.

Remember that overcrowding is apt  
to be the greatest difficulty in most  
rooms. Remember also that the room  
is, primarily, for use—the use of the  
person or persons living in it. It  
should express their personality and  
be so arranged as to make living in  
it for them comfortable and pleasant.  
It will be neither if the large pieces  
of furniture are not so distributed as  
give a sense of balance, in weight and  
size. If, however, in achieving bal-  
ance, we thrust useful things into un-  
handy places, we have failed in meet-  
ing our prime necessity.

First, the proportions of the room  
must be considered. A group of fur-

niture on the floor must be for use.  
Against or on the wall, the group may  
be for decoration and use. In order  
to give a useful effect, the arrange-  
ment of rugs and large pieces of fur-  
niture must follow the structural lines  
of the room.

#### Christmas Crystals

The players ranged themselves in  
two lines a yard apart, the players in  
each line having their backs turned to  
the players in the other row. One side  
is Christmas, the other side are Cry-  
stals. When all are ready, the leader  
stands in front and draws slowly,  
"Cr-cr-cr" and then suddenly ends  
with either the suffix "mas" or "als,"  
according to which side he intends to  
designate. If he says "mas" the  
Christmas players rush forward about  
twenty-five feet across the safety-line  
(called the Old Year). Meantime, the  
Crystals, on the alert, turn around in-  
stantly, and each tries to capture the  
Christmas player opposite him before  
he can get to the safety-line.

If the leader ends with "als," the

Crystals run forward to their safety-  
line (called the New Year), each one  
pursued by the Christmas player op-  
posite to him in line. Whenever a  
player is tagged by his opponent, he  
must go to the other side. No player  
except the one immediately oppos-  
ite him in the double line formation is  
permitted to tag a running player.

As the uncertainty about which side  
is to chase, and which is to be chased  
adds zest to the game, the leader  
should prolong the suspense by draw-  
ing the first syllable as slowly as pos-  
sible and then uttering the final  
syllable swiftly. The side having the  
large number of players when time is  
called wins the game. The name  
"Christmas" or "Crystals" is not used  
in proclaiming the winner. Instead  
the leader declares, "Old Year wins,"  
or "New Year wins," as the case may  
be.

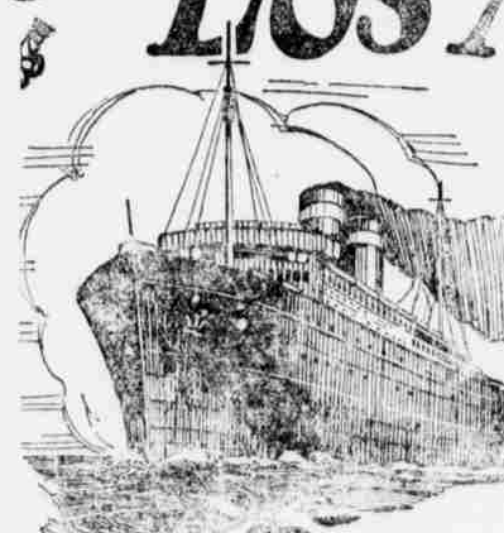

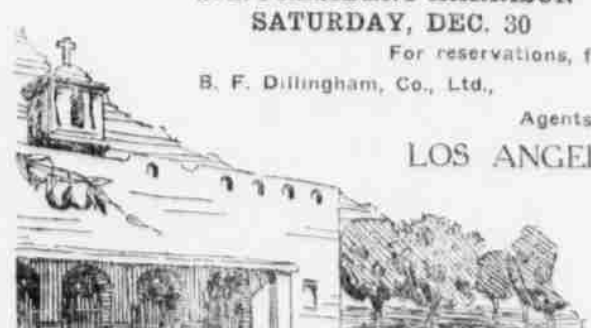
