### JOLLY HAWAIIANS ARRIVE.

Villagers for Greater America Come to Town.

With rippling laughter, greetings in a soft, musical tongue and sunny smiles, a happy crowd of twenty-eight native Hawaiians tumbled from their special car on the Union Pacific from the west yesterday afternoon, laden with Japanese hampers and valises and agreeably responded to everything the reception committee wanted done. It was the Hawaiian village for the exposition, the jolly crowd of musicians, hula-hula dancers, native fishermen, swimmers, divers, awa-drinkers, poi-eaters and representatives of Hawaiian primitive customs generally.

But they are not primitive natives of a barbarous land. Not much. At the head is John H. Wilson, civil engineer by profession, and the chipper one is Miss Leilehua, a Hawaiian lady of travel and culture. Five of the party have been twice before in America, and speak English fluently; while others have traveled extensively in foreign countries, and it may be said that the majority have seen more of the world and are better posted on its ins and outs than one in a hundred Americans.

After seven days ocean voyage to Vancouver, overhauls there by the Canadian customs authorities, and again at Seattle by the American health and customs authorities, and the long ride by rail without rest, the crowd laughed at the idea of being tired or nervous. They were lively as crickets when met at the train by W. W. Umsted, the commissioner of the exposition, who met them in Honolulu; Dan Logan, the Hawaiian commissioner to the exposition; Charles Fanning, Thomas H. Benton and others immediately interested in the village concession. They were hurried to a special Farnam street motor, decorated with banners and taken out Farnam street, and later to the exposition, serenading the World-Herald and other places en route.

The airs played by the native Hawaiians rose thrillingly from the open trolley, and only the view obtained of the surroundings prevented the enchantment of a southern scene possessing the delightful listeners to the too brief concert.

Hawaiian music evidently partakes of the nature of the climate of its composers. Its strains form a lulling, soothing melody, dreamy with a lingering sense of sadness, markedly swaying in motion like the roll of a summer sea, the beauty of tone is profoundly indicative to a sensuousness of feeling characteristic of the southern zones while its composition is even and contains nothing to antagonize the harmony required by the classical ear.

The advent of this class of music to the already excellent features afforded at the exposition cannot fail to add zest to the pleasure of the music loving element, while the novelty attendant upon the appearance of these people of far-off lands will undoubtedly attract and hold the attention of those whose tastes do not run toward the divine art of Apollo.

Returning down town the party was taken to the Arcade, where a rush was made for the bath rooms and the barber shops, and in a few hours, like people always are who know how to take care of themselves away from home, were at their ease.

They registered as Jim Shaw, wife, and two children; John Edwards, wife and one child, W. B. Jones, George P. Townsend, Mr. and Mrs. Kaai, Miss Mahailani, Miss Malie Kahuna, Miss Kallio, Mrs. Kelikahuna, Miss Mele Kaulana, Miss Leilehua, Sam Kama-lue and child, Keaha Inana, Mr.

and Mrs. Kualii, Thomas Hennessey, Mekia Kealakai, Thomas Silva, W. H. Sea, and John H. Wilson.

Of them, Jim Shaw, John Edwards, W. B. Jones, Thomas Hennessey, Mekia Kealakai, and W. H. Sea are musicians, and Mr. and Mrs. Kaai, Miss Mahailani, Miss Malie Kahuna, Miss Mele Kaulana, Sam Kama-lue, Keaha Inana, Mr. and Mrs. Kualii are dancers.

The freight of the party is delayed and is expected to arrive Friday. It consists of material for native huts, canoes, fishing outfits, material for an exhibition of poi eating, awa root for the manufacture of native drinks and other queer things.

The native quintette or rather four members constituting a quartet, were at the World's fair and again at the Midwinter exposition at San Francisco.—World-Herald, Omaha.

## THE LABOR QUESTION.

We really cannot understand why the all important labor problem should be treated in the columns of the Dole organ with a flippancy bordering upon idiocy. Nearly one column and a half is devoted this morning in humorously (?) suggesting the introduction of monkeys as plantation laborers, and the wisdom of such a solution of the grave question is demonstrated in a very facetious (!) manner. We presume that in advocating the introduction of apes the jovial editor of the Thurston-Dole organ is simply riding his hobby horse, heredity, which in this instance would bring him close to his other pet theme the Anglo-Saxons.

We will drop the monkey business of the Advertiser and urge that some serious steps be taken to introduce labor here which can do the work which must be done if the numerous new plantations are to become successful and able to accomplish what the promoters have promised to the subscribers of stocks.

At one time great efforts were made here in stirring up sympathy for the ill-treated Armenians, the poor people who suffered martyrdom because they were Christians. Subscriptions were asked for and the papers filled with letters enumerating the terrible atrocities committed on these faithful Christians. Now is the time to do a little practical good and at the same time help the planting interests along. Last month the Czar of Russia issued an ukase ordering 50,000 Armenians to leave his domains. He has done more in notifying the Sultan that the people must return at once to Turkey. The Sultan who has a wholesome fear of his hereditary enemy answered the Czar that he willingly will pay all the expenses connected with deporting the Armenians from Russia, if his beloved brother, the white Czar will only find some other place (Sheol preferable) than his Sultanic domains.

It has now been decided that the 50,000 Armenians will be sent to Crete at the expense of Turkey. If labor is needed here very badly why not negotiate with Czar and Sultan and get 5000 Armenians sent to Hawaii for our plantations. They must be good people, at least we were told so when the "hat" was passed around, and what a splendid chance for a trip for some favorite son of the soil to St. Petersburg and Constantinople. The men are obtainable and they are "cheap," the best quality in the eyes of our sugar barons.

Secretary of War Root believes that more troops are needed in the Philippines. When the campaign is resumed in the Fall General Lawton will have charge of the active military operations and be assisted by a very strong cavalry force.

Aguinaldo has actually established a Filipino junta under Gen. Otis' nose in Manila. Consul-General Wildman had driven it out of Hongkong. Foreign residents are disgusted at the weakness of the American authorities at Manila.

Insurgents at San Fernando, Philippines, have captured and burned the U. S. Steamer Saturnus.
