CASE OF YOUNG LORENZO

DR. GREENFIELD SAYS HE DID ALL HE COULD.

Letter from the Doctor, Giving His Side of the Story—Lorenzo May Undergo an Operation.

If young Frank Lorenzo's system can be built up sufficiently to undergo the vital operation of amputating his left leg between the knee and thigh, Dr. Wood has decided that he will perform the operation.

At present the young man is lying in the Queen's Hospital. The bone is protruding at the knee, where the lower part of the limb fell off. The line of demarcation, separating the healthy portion of the leg from the dead part, has formed. Lorenzo is thin and extremely weak. He can eat very little. Dr. Wood states that his patient is in a very critical condition, indeed.

While the father of the young man places the blame of his son's unfortunate condition upon the shoulders of Dr. C. B. Greenfield, who is the Government and plantation physician at Panuilo, Hawaii, there is another side of the story.

Dr. Greenfield has written a letter to Dr. C. B. Cooper, which is now in the hands of Dr. Wood. The letter was written at Honolulu on May 15th, and the writer states that, owing to a lack of time, he was unable to give the full details touching upon young Lorenzo's case.

Dr. Greenfield says that the lad was injured in the artery inside of the pelvic cavity, just as it goes down to the leg. The leg immediately became cold, the artery refusing to feed the veins of the limb with blood.

He gives his reasons for not amputating the injured leg at the time. In the first place, there was no indication just at what point of the leg must necessarily be taken off. The line of demarcation was exceedingly slow in forming, and there was no way of telling just where the live and dead tissue joined. The dead part of the leg is easily distinguished from the live, because the former is black and cold, while the presence of life is told by the red and healthy flesh.

Dr. Greenfield says that the reason the demarcation line was so long in forming was because the main artery to the leg was injured and could not do its work. The upper portion of the leg was fed by the many little branches running down from the side of the body. The leg below the knee, receiving no blood, simply rotted away and sluffed off. Dr. Greenfield says he did everything possible for the lad.

LATEST NEWS FROM MAUI

SHIPS DALCARNIE DEPARTS FOR NEW YORK.

Planter and Lurline Racing to Kahului—Horsemen Preparing for Fourth of July Meet—Hand-Painted Horses

Maui, May 20.

The Maui Racing Association have commenced work on the new track at Kahului to get it in readiness for the Fourth of July meet. Horses are being put into training and a successful meeting is anticipated. Driver Decker, in charge of a string of horses belonging to Miss Dorcas Richardson of Waikapu, has moved his stable to the track and begun work there. The program of events has been prepared and will be published later. It is hoped that Honolulu horses may participate in the day's sport.

Considerable annoyance has been caused Hana residents lately by the numbers of cattle and horses that are allowed to roam at will on the public highways, making traveling on dark nights somewhat dangerous. Last Sunday night some unknown party or parties caught up two white horses on the road and proceeded to decorate them with black paint. Spectacles and zebra stripes were put on, and legends, such as "Wirth's Circus is Coming," "Use Ayer's Pills," "Consult Opium Brown," etc., showed in bold letters on their sides. It is reported that Deputy Sheriff Lindsay, who owned one of the animals, spent a whole day trying to remove the paint, but when last heard from the tantalizing name of Opium Brown still clings to the white coat.

Last Sunday morning Rev. J. Kalino was installed as minister of the Paia native church with much ceremony. The services, conducted by Rev. S. Kapu of Wailuku, and Rev. A. Pali of Lahaina, began at half past ten o'clock and lasted until noon. About one o'clock all present sat down to an elaborate luau. About three hundred Hawaiians were present from all parts of Maui. Rev. Kalino also has charge of the Haiku church.

During last Sunday a general rain-storm passed over Maui, but lasted only for the day. Makawao and a strip of Kula adjoining, were benefited to a considerable extent, about three inches of rain falling. Farther over in Kula the fall was much lighter, but still it was something. Hana, Wailuku and Lahaina districts also received their share, small though it was. This was the first rain in Kula for just 130 days.

A subscription has been started in Wailuku to get up a grand luau in Iao Valley to celebrate Kamehameha Day.

A social dancing party is to be held in Spreckelsville Hall on Saturday evening next.

Mr. Wm. Y. Saffery, for many years Foreman of Haleakala Ranch Company, has resigned his position.

Herbert W. Dickey is expected on the Planter, due any time now.

The barkentine Planter and the brig Lurline, are racing to Kahului, both sailing from San Francisco the same day. They are twelve days out today and are looked for at any moment now. Two vessels bound for Honolulu are also in the race, and the defeated captain is to entertain the other three skippers at a sumptuous feast when they meet again.

The full rigged ship Dalcarnie, Jones master, towed to sea Wednesday morning, bound for New York, with 48,000 bags of Paia and Haiku sugar on board.

NEW CHINESE SHIPS.

China has decided to keep pace with Japan's Navy and will order in the near future four more armored cruisers of about 8000 tons, two fast cruisers, or commerce-destroyers, and several torpedo-boat destroyers. The size of the larger vessels is limited by the absence of harbors and dry-docks in China to accommodate anything larger than 10,000 tons.

NEWS FROM KONA DISTRICT

MURDEROUS ATTACK MADE ON A NATIVE GIRL.

Rains Have Been Frequent—Mauna Kea Ascended—Road Work Progressing—New Steamer for Coast Service

Kona, May 19.

Rains have been frequent the last two weeks and from the beach to an elevation of 2000 feet the welcome information of "tanks full and overflowing" is vouchsafed by all. Higher up, at the dairies, the long drouth is unbroken and one butter factory has been closed, while other ranchers pray for fluid.

The registration of voters, now on, has caused the mention of Messrs. Scott and Kamaoha as candidates from Kona.

Tuesday evening a rival of "Jack the Ripper" began anatomical operations at Kahaula upon a native girl. This miscreant—a Lascar—was not arrested till next day, although the Sheriff was notified immediately after the butchery. The injured person may not recover.

Dr. Guppy, an English naturalist, who is now trying to reach the top of Mauna Kea, ascended Mauna Yoa in April. He started from near Honanau and the whole journey and return was made within four days. There was some snow in the crater, and smoke lazily issued from the cones; but rarefied cold air and mountain sickness played havoc with any desire to descend or investigate more fully.

Our roads are getting well along towards completion and bidders are busy sending in tenders for the remaining stretches. Figures range from \$2400 per mile as a financial datum line, and like the old trail, there are "ups and downs"—in price. Some difficulty has been encountered by the right of way men. The native owners putting obstacles in the way, although \$50 per acre, with fences and gates provided, has been offered them. Some folks can't see any advantage in a fine boulevard passing their property and think a trail the proper thing. They fail to see that the car of progress travels on highways only.

A number of property owners have talked of planting trees along the line of their holdings to make "the finest avenue on the island," as Bruner calls it, but sheep like, await for an example from their fellows, although trees galore are in a nursery. The seed was left by Mr. Marsden for this purpose.

R. H. Whitehouse, a hustler recently from Harvard, is assisting the Government engineer in surveying and staking the profile of projected roads in North and South Kona.

Houses for H. Lindsay and Thomas Hind are approaching completion. Mr. Hind will have, architecturally, the finest residence in Kona. O. G. Gilhus has the frame of his dwelling house erected on his plantation and hopes to move in before July. The health of this gentleman has greatly improved since his transfer from Maui.

A Gordon pulper with all necessary polishing machinery is being erected at Halakii by Davies & Son. They will run the whole works by the aid of the steam plant already in position and handle the crop of the immediate locality besides their own sixteen acres.

The Captain of the coasting steamer Iwa says that within a couple of months his owners will put on a much larger vessel. The trade between Kohala and this section seems to be growing.

High tides have been prevalent along the leeward coast.

James Boyd is having twenty acres of his tract at Kalama, Kowali, cleared preparatory to planting coffee thereon. Near this land there is a three-year old tree which will yield seven pounds of parchment. The same owner has ten-month trees planted at a 600-foot elevation, which are laden with fruit.

The Hilo paper talks of the import tax on vinegar. Hiloites should send to South Kona and get a No. 1 article made from honey. The maker, G. Glore, is a Kansas man who has established a flourishing apiary and laid out a model homestead with no other help than his own hands.

THE TENNIS TOURNAMENT

THE FINALS WILL TAKE PLACE THIS AFTERNOON.

Large Crowd Attend the Opening of the Ladies' Singles—Miss Carter Wins the First Match—Other Games

The opening of the ladies' singles in tennis on the courts of the Pacific Tennis Club yesterday afternoon was attended by a larger number of people than on any previous day during the tournament. Many carriages lined the courts on King and Richard streets and there were a sufficient number of bicycles about the grounds to stock a wholesale establishment.

Miss Sarah Carter, representing the Valley Tennis Club, and Mrs. Hugh Gunn, representing the Pacific Club, took possession of the courts at 4 o'clock. Miss Carter won the first set after a hard contest. The score was 9 to 7 games. Then Mrs. Gunn rallied and won the second set by 6 to 3 games. After a brief rest, the ladies started in to decide the contest. Miss Carter led off and won four games before her opponent had hardly time to get fairly started. Then Mrs. Gunn made a steady gain, but only managed to win four games, when Miss Carter had secured the requisite number to make the set, thus making her winner of the match.

The match was refereed by S. G. Wilder. Dr. Nichols was attendant upon Miss Carter and D. Howard Hitecock upon Mrs. Gunn. The linesmen were Harold Collingham and W. H. Coney.

Miss Carter and Miss Maud Willard will be pitted against each other this afternoon. The winner will try for championship honors with Miss May Hart on Wednesday next on the Pacific courts.

The semi-finals were played in the men's doubles yesterday. The contestants were all Pacific Club men. Hyde and Godfrey, who defeated Woods and Wadehouse, the strong Beretania team were favorites for the championship. But they met their Waterloo yesterday in the match against E. R. Adams and C. W. Dickey.

The first set was won easily by Hyde and Godfrey, by a score of 6 to 3. During the second game a little too much attention was given to the grand stand by the favorites, which allowed Adams and Dickey to step in and carry off the second match by 6 to 4.

Then all four went inside of the club house to eat water-melon, which the losers were to pay for. The water-melon proved disastrous to Hyde and Godfrey, for they could only score two games in the third and deciding set. After congratulating their opponents they hunted up the water-melon vendor and paid him his money.

Harry Waterhouse and W. H. Coney won over Albert Cunha and Willie Roth in two sets as follows: 6-4; 6-2. The finals will take place today. The honors of the tournament, as far as doubles are concerned, lie between Adams and Dickey and Waterhouse and Coney. No matter who wins, the championship will fall to the Pacific Tennis Club, the same as it did in the singles.

IN THE SHIPPING CIRCLES

SUGAR SHIPMENTS COMMENCE TO SLACKEN.

Season Will Close At End of June. Deserter from Ship Macy Caught Last Night—Island Vessels Arrive.

The Helene will sail Monday at 4 p. m. for Hawaii ports.

The Peru is expected from Yokohama today, although she is not due until tomorrow.

The Fresno has moved over to the coal wharf, where she is discharging heavy timber through her bow ports.

The dredger got into a hard bed of rock last night, and is laid up for repairs today. The injury to the cutter is not serious.

The W. G. Irwin has hauled over to Wilder's wharf and is receiving sugar from the Helene. She will sail early in the week.

The Mikahala and Waialeale arrived from Kauai this morning, the former with 4500 and the latter with 3200 bags of sugar.

The Iwalani will not make another trip to Hawaii soon. Just now she is laid up, preparing to take the Board of Health to Molokai next Friday.

The Wilder company steamers will have all they can do this month, and next, but the sugar season will probably be wound up for them by June 1st.

One of the deserters from the Macy was captured by Harry Evans at Moanalua last night. He is hot on the trail of the other three, and hopes to bring them to time before the ship sails Monday.

Harbor Officer Harry Evans returned from Molokai yesterday, and today the Mokoli brought down a horse for him, with which Harry expects to make a showing at the coming race meet.

The Mokoli arrived this morning from Molokai with 284 bags of sugar, 145 bags of taro, 63 bags of bone, 100 sheep and 4 horses. Fine weather prevailed during the trip. The little vessel will go on the Marine Railway for a scraping before going to sea again.

The James Makee cleaned out Kapa yesterday, bringing down 2432 bags of sugar this morning. The Makee plantation has turned out 110,000 bags thus far, and has about 40,000 more to grind. R. S. Spalding, Mr. von Hamm and Mrs. D. Davis were the only passengers.

LINE AND STAFF DISPUTECONTROVERSY MAY BE SETTLED
BY LEGISLATION.

Gossip in Naval Circles—Disinterested Investigation Will be of Value to the Service—Officers' Views.

An interesting piece of naval gossip is that Assistant Secretary Roosevelt has been formally called upon by Secretary Long to consider and report whether it is practicable to frame legislation, the effect of which will be to terminate the long standing dispute between line and staff as to rank, title and pay.

Several officers on duty at the Department are authority for the statement that it is the purpose of Secretary Long, says the Washington Star, to submit to Congress in the near future a naval reorganization scheme. In this, it is said, he desires to incorporate a provision on the long mooted matter of rank, title and pay which will be fair and just to all concerned and of the greatest possible advantage to the naval service. No publicity has been given to any directions which Secretary Long may have issued. Mr. Roosevelt speaks of the subject reluctantly, and when questions are put to him he replies that his principal object at present is to learn the duties of his office.

A number of officers, in discussing the probabilities recently, said that the idea of having Mr. Roosevelt go into the line and staff discussion was an excellent one, assuming the Assistant Secretary to be free from bias. Heretofore the difficulty has been that proposed legislation for the naval personnel was drawn up by interested persons, either in the line or the staff. To have a thoroughly disinterested and intelligent person investigate the matter would be of value to the service, officers say.

Patti's Cook.

Castle Used as a School.
The Rev. the Marquis of Normandy used his ancestral mansion as a school. As Lord Mulgrave he received great interest in educating and training boys. As a teacher he began with the care of private pupils during his winters on the Riviera. He continued the work at Mulgrave Cottage, and finally, since succeeding to the marquisate in 1890, has carried it on at his ancestral castle. In the spacious courtyard a schoolroom 60 feet long, 30 feet broad and 55 feet high has been built, and beyond this a chapel. Two old riding schools and other outbuildings have been transformed into a gymnasium, five court and carpenter's shop, while close at hand are playing fields and bathing ground. These latter are screened from the castle lawns by thick shrubberies, and in the distance are the deer park and endless stretches of grouse moors belonging to the estate. The number of pupils does not exceed the limits of a single house at Eton, and at meal-times Lord Normandy presides over his young charges and the members of his staff in the old dining hall.—London Correspondent.

Testing the Steel.
A French expert has a novel method of testing the quality of steel that enters into the construction of the bicycle, especially the frame, which shows up all defects, such as irregularities of structure, flaws, sand holes and also whether the steel is made up of one or two kinds of metal or more. Hydrochloric acid to the density of 1.062 is used, and the piece of steel to be examined is thrust into the acid after being first thoroughly polished. The steel when taken out is washed and repolished and left to dry after being rinsed in a bath of diluted ammonia. The composition of the steel is plainly shown, and if the piece tested it to be kept it is given a coating of transparent varnish, which, while not hiding the defects, will prevent rusting.—New York Telegram.

Against Long Distance Races.
A bill has been introduced into the Illinois state legislature to prohibit continuous long distance bicycle racing. The bill is short and to the point. It prohibits any one from engaging in a bicycle race without a rest of at least six hours following each 12 hours' racing. A penalty of a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$500, or from 30 days to a year in the county jail is provided. The bill is the result of the protests against the alleged brutality of the recent six day races.—American Cyclist.

Finnan Mince—Procure a good large smoked haddock, and remove the skin by holding that side of the fish toward the fire, when it will be found that it can be easily slipped off. "Take the fish from the bone, chop very finely, allowing to a half pound of the chopped fish an ounce and a half of salt butter, half a teaspoonful of milk, thickened with a little flour, half a teaspoonful of finely minced parsley, and pepper to taste. Put the mixture in a small pan and stir vigorously, until thoroughly hot with a wooden spoon. Pile the mixture high on a hot dish and ornament all around with neat slices of hot butter toast. Serve with a garnish of finely chopped parsley or hard boiled yolk of egg.—Home Notes.

THE COUNCIL OF STATE.

The action of the Council of State yesterday, should satisfy any one that we have capable and thoroughly conscientious men in that body.

Under the Constitution the Council is empowered to appropriate public money upon the request of the Executive Council, when, during the time intervening between the sessions of the Legislature, the "emergencies of war, invasion, rebellion, pestilence, or other great public necessity shall arise."

Yesterday the Executive summoned the Council of State and asked for an appropriation of \$6000 to cover expenses of the Board of Health for quarantining the 682 Japanese immigrants who had arrived by the Kinai Maru on April 19.

As to the necessity of the quarantine, there is no controversy. On the action of the Board of Health in the matter there is no controversy. The people had to be kept in quarantine; they could not be let loose upon the community.

In appropriating money, the last Legislature had set aside \$10,000 for the expenses of the Board of Health. This, during the sixteen months that had passed, had been well nigh exhausted, there being only \$2000 left for the ensuing eight months. When the Kinai Maru was here a bottomry bond had been taken upon her and she had been allowed to go; but, as far as can be learned, the bond is not due yet. As to the bond itself, there seems to be doubt in many minds whether it is worth the paper it is written upon; but that has nothing to do with the consideration of the matter by the Council of State; that is a matter which will have to be explained to the next Legislature. One is loth to believe that the Government would let a ship go upon a worthless bond, when it knew that small-pox had broken out among the passengers in quarantine and that this would entail a heavy expense, the full amount of which could not be fully estimated.

It is under these circumstances that the Executive went to the Council of State and asked them to appropriate the sum of \$6000.

The Council of State had at once to consider whether this was a case of emergency, and, if so, what kind of emergency. The Executive considered it an emergency of pestilence. This it certainly was not. It was in no form a pestilence among our people, and the Executive evidently forgot that not so very long ago the Judiciary had given its opinion that the people from the Japanese ship could not be considered as having landed here. The Executive might have, with almost as much justice, based their claim upon it being an emergency of invasion. For at the time we were certainly being invaded by hordes of Japanese.

The members of the Council of State at once decided that it was not a matter of emergency, within the meaning of the constitutional provision, and refused to grant the money asked for. Councillor P. C. Jones put the matter very clearly. He said that in spite of the arguments used he did not consider that the matter was of sufficient importance to call the Council together. By which he meant that it was never contemplated by the Constitution that the Government would run to the Council in cases of minor difficulty which might be otherwise arranged. And then he drew the difference between his duty as a Councillor and his duty as a private citizen. As a Councillor he would not vote public funds in a matter which he felt the Constitution did not contemplate that the body he belonged to should take action. As a private citizen he and others would be willing to advance the money without interest to the Government and take chances of being repaid by a vote of the next Legislature.

It is this careful looking after the duties of high office which makes it valuable. A body of men who were less imbued with a strict sense of duty might have voted this money and established a dangerous precedent. There is no doubt in the minds of the citizens of this State that the Council-

lors took a strong and perfectly definite position, and having made up their minds, they were quite right to refuse to put the matter in the hands of a committee for further discussion. The Council has vindicated a principle and proved that it has a mind of its own.

SUGAR CONSUMPTION.

Sugar is an article, the use of which, is growing rapidly. Years ago children used to use molasses instead of sugar; now, except among the very poorest classes, molasses is very seldom used. Indeed, in the early part of the century molasses was used in sweetening puddings, etc.

The consumption of sugar in the United States is 63 pounds per capita, and in this it exceeds the per capita average of Europe. But it does not exceed special countries of Europe, for Great Britain has a consumption of a little over 86 pounds per capita, which overtops even the sugar loving French. The lowest consumption of sugar is in Serbia, which consumes sugar at the rate of 4.01 pounds per head. Greece uses 6.26 pounds per head; Italy 45 pounds, and Russia 10.94 pounds.

The consumption of sugar depends upon the wealth of the lower classes. A nation of well-to-do mechanics and artisans consume far more sugar than an agricultural or pastoral people. The per capita consumption of sugar in cities is far greater than in country districts.

The demand for sugar, however, is ever increasing, and the question is whether in time the demand will not outstrip the supply. Calculations based upon the demand now, supposing that the demand will remain stationary, are based upon fallacious premises. An... much of the beet sugar calculation is based upon such figures. It is not only that the population will increase, but its sugar consuming capacity will increase even more rapidly, and it will soon reach that of England, and surpass it.



McKINLEY'S VIEWS.

President Opposed to the Senate's Sugar Revision.

NEW YORK, May 8.—A Herald dispatch from Washington says: President McKinley does not like the sugar schedule in the Senate revision of the Dingley Tariff bill. An attempt has been made to give the impression that the President approved the work of the Finance Committee in the main, and took exceptions to only a few of their amendments. I am able to say on unquestionable authority, however, that this misrepresents the President's views and that there are many features of the amended bill which he does not approve. As he is an advocate of extreme protection, it is necessary to say that he disapproves of the general policy of the committee in reducing rates below the Dingley figures, and he is especially displeased with the reductions on first and second class wools.

In the matter of the sugar schedule, however, Mr. McKinley believes the Senate committee has gone too far in the other direction and has given altogether too much protection to the Sugar Trust. In his opinion, the Dingley bill gave to the refiners of sugar ample protection to compensate them for the alleged differential duty and the added duty on sugars imported from bounty-paying countries made disastrous foreign competition possible.

RUDOLPH MUST PAY.

A Justice of the Peace at San Francisco recently gave judgment for the plaintiff in the suit of Webster Jones against Rudolph Spreckels. The defendant leased a house from Jones for the period of eighteen months and at the end of that time the plaintiff was compelled to spend several hundred dollars to repair damages to the carpets, curtains and other furniture. He sued for \$230, and judgment was given for the entire amount asked.

The Passing of "Boom Times."

During the 11 years between 1870 and 1880 this country ran an almost breathless race of eager and rapid development. Certainly those were not normal times. They were based upon conditions that will never be seen again upon the American continent. To long for their restoration is to indulge in the fascinating but profitless occupation of chasing rainbows. For what is there in our present condition or in our future prospects to justify the hope that those times will return? Our new west is already fairly well peopled, and its business conditions have conformed themselves to those of the rest of the country. Except in a few mining districts it no longer offers a field for adventure or speculation. Our great transcontinental railway systems are already constructed, and not one of them can earn interest on the money it cost. Our new towns and cities went rather beyond the capacity of the tributary country to support them under the stimulus of inflated real estate values and with the temporary opportunities they offered for employment of labor.

We shall not again have a flood of foreign money pouring in to loan upon anything or everything having the semblance of property. The foreigner has had his experience, and he now wants to be doubly sure that he is going to get his capital back and his regular interest payments before an American investment has any attraction for him. Is it not, on the whole, probable that we shall have to make up our minds to plod along in the slow going way of older nations and to be satisfied with moderate profits and a slow accumulation of wealth? If these be our reasonable expectations, would it not be sane and wholesome for people to cease dreaming of a golden age which is gone forever?—E. V. Stalley in Forum.



THE BICYCLE TAX.

Arguments Advanced by Both Sides on a
Question That Is Often Agitated.

FOR A TAX.

1. Cyclists use the roads and should therefore contribute to local expenditure.
2. A cycle is a luxury.
3. Cyclists constitute a class of traffic which sometimes inconveniences or endangers the timid pedestrian.
4. The possession of a bicycle implies means, which presents the prospect of getting the tax from the rider.
5. Money must be raised from one class or another for local purposes.
6. Some people think a tax would have the effect of suppressing the careless and oftentimes reckless rider.
7. A tax would render registration possible and thereby increase the cyclist's sense of responsibility for behavior on the road.
8. A majority of cyclists are young people who do not contribute to the lists of taxable property.
9. Some middle aged and old people regard the growth of the pastime with envy and jealousy, not being attuned to the age in which they live.
10. The permanence of cycling is not assured, and the taxation of bicycles offers a steady, increasing prospect of revenue.

AGAINST A TAX.

1. The cyclist does not wear out the roads or leave offensive tracks, as does the horse traffic. He does not block or impede traffic in any manner whatever.
2. A cycle, though frequently a luxury, is often a necessity to the workman and the business man as well.
3. The cyclist, although the careless person often casts his body before his wheel, always suffers with his victim in person, machine and sometimes purse.
4. Cycling is pursued by rich and poor alike, and a uniform tax on machines would press harshly on the poor rider.
5. A tax upon an instrument of locomotion not used solely for local purposes would be costly to enforce, and unless fixed at an oppressively high rate the expense of arranging its incidence and collection would seriously diminish the receipts.
6. The imposition of a tax on a pastime and the enforcement of the law by prosecutions and penalties are unpopular in a sport loving country.
7. Many persons keep a cycle for occasional use and to tax these equally with the constant riders would not be equitable.
8. A tax would invariably impose a check upon the pursuit of a healthy and beneficial pastime.—New York Journal.

How Tires Are Made.

An interesting sight is the pneumatic room of a rubber mill, the room in which rubber is cut into strips to be made into tires. Here, on clean, long tables of white pine, the sheets of rubber are cut into strips for the tires. First, the sheets are drawn over the tubes from the rolls at the end, and the men, brushes in hand, smooth out all the air swellings and dust the surface with flour or soapstone to prevent any stickiness. Then the head cutter twists his rapid compasses along the width at either end, making the points of division where the sheet will be divided into strips three or four inches wide, according to the size of the tires. At these points the helpers hold a chalk line, one at either end, and the head cutter snaps it at the middle, making seven, eight or nine parallel lines, running the length of the sheet.

Now each man grasps his rubber knife, specially ground so as to give a long cutting edge, and dipping its blade in the can of water at his side starts down one of the white lines, walking backward, his body bent, his eyes intent and cutting as he goes. Should his knife err from the line to right or left by so little as the sixteenth of an inch, the strip would be spoiled and the rubber for one tire tube at least would go into the scrap heap.—New York Advertiser.




