SUBSIDIES FOR OCEAN STEAMERS.

The Minister of Finance in his Report to the Assembly states that the P.M.S.S. Company has been paid the subsidy of \$1000 per month granted by the last Legislature, and recommends that a similar grant be made at the present Session to "enable the Government to give aid to such steam lines as may be for the best interests of the country." We may infer that the idea is for the Legislature to appropriate a lump sum, and have it to the Cabinet to decide as to what line shall be subsidized, if any. One thousand dollars per month for carrying our foreign mails is a pretty high price—and that is about all that the P. M. Co. have done,—seeing that in addition to the \$75 charged for a passage to San Francisco by their steamers, the Honolulu passenger has to beg for the privilege of paying an additional sum of \$100 or upwards for a place to sleep in. What the country needs now, and could afford to pay a fair subsidy for, is an independent line of well-appointed steamers between Honolulu and San Francisco.

Kahului Notes.

The barkentine Emma Augusta sailed on the 4th inst. for Port Townsend, to return with a cargo of lumber for Capt. Hobron.

The schooner Anna, Capt. McCulloch, sailed on the 6th inst. for San Francisco with 5,394 bags of sugar, weighing 726,635 lbs., valued at \$16,540 11-100; and the following passengers: H. P. Baldwin and family, Rev. F. B. Rouse and wife, Miss Mary Rouse, Miss Mary Alexander, and C. H. Dickey.

Hilo Notes.

The bustle in our harbor for the last few days, is past. Our island steamer, the W. H. Reed, has discharged, and is now lying at anchor in our bay.

The schooner Emma Claudina, of San Francisco, has left us for Papai-kou, to take on board sugar from Messrs. Hitchcock & Co. From there she will return to Hilo, to finish loading for San Francisco.

Our quiet town is just becoming a bedlam, caused by the beer that is vended by the scores of beer-shops in our midst. A great majority of our native men and women spend their hard earned money for beer, it exciting them almost equal to whisky. There are no less than 12 beer shops in Hilo, and I have just learned that they are strung all along the road in Hilo district. Here is a chance for your solons to display their patriotism to save the people, I would not dare suggest the remedy to them. It requires immediate attention to save the evil that will otherwise follow.

LEGISLATIVE.

The Hon. Mr. Kalua read a bill, the tenor of which is to forbid any further sales of Government lands. The same gentleman introduced a resolution, (which was adopted without opposition) asking the Minister of the Interior for a detailed account of the Bureau of the General Post Office, from April 1, 1880, to July 20, 1881.

The Hon. Mr. Kaulukou offered a resolution, calling upon the Minister of the Interior to lay before the House all papers connected with the leasing of the Hawaiian Hotel to A. Herbert and to J. S. McGrew, and all accounts pertaining thereto of every description; also explanations why the lease of said Hotel has not been offered at auction. Carried.

The bill making Mahukona, Hawaii, a port of entry and departure for foreign vessels, passed its final reading.

There being no business on the President's table, the Assembly adjourned at a little past 11 o'clock.

During the lecture on "Moderate Drinking," at the Fort street Church on Sunday evening, the Reverend speaker threw out a challenge, to the effect that if any one would procure a bottle of wine from any dealer in the article in this city, which on analysis should be found to contain 3 per cent. of pure grape juice, then he, the speaker, would pay the cost of such analysis. Is this thusly, and if so, why? When, at the festive board the sparkling wine is passed, while the genial host informs his guests that this is the vintage of 18—, imported by the highly respectable firm of— & Co.,—is it true that we are not drinking wine at all, and that the nice label and delicious bouquet and all that is only a delusion and a snare?

The Steamers Like like for Windward ports and Kilauea Hou for Kahului, leave this afternoon at 4 o'clock.

The Bark Emerald which arrived last Saturday 38 days from Port Townsend, brought a cargo of lumber, consisting of 797,458 feet of Pine, 51,200 Laths, 1755 Pickets to Messrs. H. Hackfeld & Co.

The first Grand Loan Exhibition ever undertaken in Honolulu, was formally opened last evening, and we feel justified in pronouncing it, at the outset, a grand success. The only ceremony at the opening was an address by the Chairman of the Library Association Committee, S. B. Dole, Esq., who in a few well-chosen words thanked His Majesty the King and the ladies and gentlemen who had contributed so generously of their household treasures of art and nature, and congratulated the community upon the opportunity afforded of examining so rare and varied a collection of interesting objects. And we may add, the community are greatly indebted for the treat thus afforded to the untiring industry, taste and skill in arrangement of those who have had the Exhibition in hand. Whoever fails to pay at least one visit to this Exhibition, will have reason to regret it.

The mail by the Australia yesterday, dispatched by the Post-Office, comprised over 5000 letters besides newspapers, etc.

The large number of passengers from the Colonies by the mail steamer gave the city a lively appearance yesterday, as they strolled about inspecting things generally. 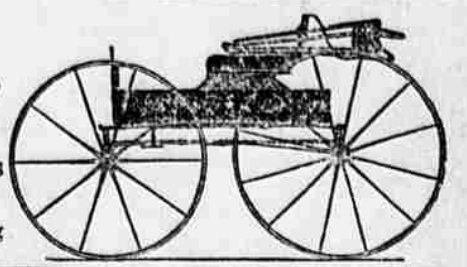

Comet A. 1892.

The first comet of the year has been picked up. C. S. Wells, the assistant at the Dudley Observatory at Albany, found the little stranger on Saturday morning, the 18th, in the constellation Hercules. It is called a bright comet, has a tail about five minutes in length and a nucleus near equal in size to a star of the eighth magnitude. It is now a telescopic comet, and too small to be visible to the naked eye, although it is increasing in size. It was seen the following Sunday night by Mr. Wendell, as Harvard College Observatory. It had a circular head about half a minute in diameter, a well-defined nucleus, and its tail was from eight to ten minutes long, a very rapid growth for two days, having nearly doubled its length since discovery. Its right ascension just before midnight was 17h. 54m., and its declination 38° 25' north. Right ascension and declination afford the best means for determining the position of the heavenly bodies, and those who have access to star maps or charts which accompany the best text books, can find the exact locality of the comet and be prepared for a view of it when it assumes larger dimensions.

The comet is travelling at a rate that almost takes one breath away to think of it. It was first found in the constellation Hercules, but it has now passed into the constellation Lyra, and is near the bright star Vega, its present right ascension being 18h. 12m. and its declination 39° 7' north. But as it travels about two million miles a day, it will soon leave the domain of Lyra, and by the middle of April it will be found in Draco. The comet does not reach perihelion until the 15th of June, and there is every prospect that it will greatly increase in size during April and May, will soon become visible to the naked eye, and will be a superb object in the heavens. Its specialty is its near approach to the sun at perihelion, one astronomer calculating the distance between the sun and comet as 100,000 miles, and another fixing it at 10,000,000 miles, while both agree in thinking the approach is a very near one. The comets of 1680, 1843 and 1880 resembled the present one in their near approach to the sun. As we safely passed through the danger attended upon their audacious invasion of the solar territory we need have no dread of any catastrophe from the perihelion of the new comet. Astronomers ask for no greater treat than to watch the effect of the near approach of this body of gossamer lightness to the mighty sphere that rules our system. There is, therefore, a pleasant prospect before us for months to come in following the course of the new comet, as its nucleus increases in brightness and its tail spans the heavens in magnificent proportions, and as, obeying the laws that regulate its erratic movements, it seems to plunge headlong toward the sun. —Providence Journal.
