EUROPE'S LATEST MARVEL.

We have from time to time seen

despatches relative to the recently-

invented smokeless powder, and

the efforts that are being made to

introduce into it actual service, by

several of the great Powers of

Europe. It is only quite recently,

however, that a test has been made

with it, in a sham fight, which is

described in a despatch which we

copy from an exchange:

"A few days ago, after the visit

of the Emperor of Austria to Gross-

warden, in Hungary, some mili-

tary maneuvers took place near the

town, when smokeless powder was

for the first time used on an exten-

sive scale, the reports of which ap-

pear to be exciting great interest

in military circles throughout the

Austrian Empire. The effect of the

new powder is said to have been

well nigh bewildering. In the fight

were engaged 77 battalions of in-

fantry, 36 squadrons of cavalry

and 128 pieces of artillery, and al-

though heavy firing was going on

for more than four hours, not the

slightest trace of smoke became

visible. Commanding officers were

no longer able to judge the posi-

tion, movements and strength of

opposing forces by the density of

the smoke, and it took considerable

time to fix the position of firing

batteries, while infantry well under

cover could hardly be discovered.

There was the usual roar of can-

non and musketry, although some-

what subdued, but the landscape,

as far as eye could reach, remained

serene and motionless. The old

battle-field therefore, with its clouds

of smoke, is a thing of the past, and

modern tactics will have to be

adapted to the entirely changed

aspect of the fighting ground. Mil-

itary men lay the greatest stress on

the fact that the ascertaining of the

position of firing troops is made ex-

tremely difficult by the smokeless

powder. If the fear of these new

inventions will only keep their

rulers from going to war, it will be

a great gain for the people.

THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

One Hundred and Fiftieth Day.

WEDNESDAY, Oct. 29.

The House met at 10 A. M. Prayer

by chaplain. Minutes of preceding day

read and approved.

Rep. Nawahi read a first time an Act

to provide for the boundaries of the

Hawaiian Islands, and limit the jurisdiction

of the Hawaiian Kingdom. The bill

provides that all the territory, including

the bed of the ocean, between lat. 17

and 30 degrees N., and long 153 and 180 W.,

shall constitute the Hawaiian Kingdom.

The bill was read a second time by

title, and on motion of Rep. Brown

referred to the Committee on Foreign

Affairs.

Noble W. Y. Horner presented the

following: Resolved, that when the third

and fourth sections of the Appropriation

Bill are taken up on their third reading,

that this House will reduce every item

in said sections one third part, except

such items that may have become law

by bills passed by this assembly. In

support of the resolution the hon. noble

said the estimates in the first section

were \$2,780,200, but the House had ap-

propriated \$3,100,000, or raised the es-

timates \$100,000. The estimates in the

third section were \$1,541,000, and the

revenue was \$400,000 short. It seemed

about time to call a halt. We all know

the tariff has gone against us. That we

know for sure, and we must be prepared

to meet this blow. I move the resolution

be adopted.

Rep. Rickard said the intention of the

resolution was good. It would have been

better if it had been presented earlier.

We cannot adopt the resolution as a

whole. I move that it be laid on the

table, with all due respect to the intro-

ducer. There are many things in section

3 that are needed.

Noble J. M. Horner was sorry to hear

the remarks of Rep. Rickard. If we keep

Subsidy to ocean lines, \$48,000.

from the different ports of this Kingdom

and foreign ports, according to tonnage

of such steamships so running, provided

that no more than \$1,000 be paid any

steamship for a round trip.

Noble Cornwell moved the amendment

be indefinitely postponed.

Rep. W. W. Wilcox moved it pass.

Rep. Paehoele favored indefinite pos-

tponement. One reason was because the

bill for the Tahiti subsidy had passed the

House and become law. If the House

wants to give the San Diego line some-

thing, they should do it in a separate

item if they can.

Rep. Kahookano moved to strike out

the words in the amendment, "accord-

ing to tonnage of such steamships so run-

ning," and that the figures read "\$72,-

000."

Rep. Nawahi thought that if the House

was going to assist all these steamship

lines they would have to pass the item

at \$2,000. By the passage of the tariff

the plantations will not make so much

money. We must then encourage other

industries, send away more bananas,

pineapples, etc. A bunch of Hilo ba-

nanas is the size of those grown in

Honolulu. I believe in assisting steam-

ship lines; it is a hobby of mine.

Noble Widemann said this steamer

There was nothing in the paper to prove that the San Diego people took the slightest interest in the matter, nothing but the bare statement that they would duplicate the assistance from this Government.

Noble Muller was opposed to the amendment. He moved that the item read: Subsidy to Oceanic line to San Francisco, \$48,000; and subsidy to Oceanic line to Tahiti, \$15,000. The San Francisco steamer was a necessity. The hon. noble from Hanalei had said that the Oceanic steamer on last year's trip made \$15,000. That was not gross receipts? He doubted if the hon. noble knew which. Having been in the steamship business himself ten years, he could say that the Oceanic steamer on the Australia \$800 or \$1,000 a day for expenses. He did not believe that the Santa Fe Railway had anything to do with the steamer line.

Rep. Rickard wanted to discuss the feasibility of cutting down the item. He fully realized the benefits derived by the country from the Oceanic steamers, in our condition of being separated many thousands of miles from the rest of the civilized world. He should favor this item stand as it was for the benefit of the Oceanic company, and making a separate item for the benefit of any other steamship company by way of paying for carrying mails.

Noble Cornwell—I have listened with great interest to the remarks from the hon. noble from Honolulu, but they have failed in their remarks to convince me of the need of this item. Asiatic Cholera.

In view of the stringent sanitary precautions being enforced in various parts of Europe against the Asiatic cholera, and which were ordered in London and Vienna, the following opinions on the terrible epidemic are of the greatest interest, as given by Dr. F. F. Algernon, a London specialist, whose long experience with cholera gives a special weight to what he says, and will supplement the views of other physicians.

"Do you think, doctor," was my first question, "that England is in danger of a cholera epidemic?"
"I think," was the reply, "that we may, perhaps, have an epidemic of cholera this autumn, not only because what has happened in the past may occur in the future, but there is some analogy in the history and relation of cholera to la grippe or influenza, for the cholera, like the influenza, is essentially an epidemic disease and is largely due to atmospheric causes. The present dampness of the soil from the late severe rains would, I think, favor an epidemic of cholera, but I would expect that its stay would be brief and the cases light. Our water and sanitary arrangements are too good, I think and hope, for an epidemic to be either very serious or alarming."

"The Government charges the banks only 1 per cent. per annum interest for this money, when it should charge 3 per cent, which would be a more equitable interest. By its not doing so, the Government is wronged out of the 2 per cent. interest on the whole sum, which is a free gift to the National Banks of \$7,000,000 per annum"—a great wrong. But look further: "The National Banks loan these same notes which they get from the Government for 1 per cent, to the industries for 6 per cent. per annum, or more," which all must admit to be a great outrage against the rights of the industries that produces all of the progressive greatness of the country.

"The Government accepts only its own bonds as security for the money it loans, when it should also receive bullion and improved real estate, as these securities are as durable and reliable as Government bonds." Many of these so-called "national banks" fail, and thereby cause confusion and loss among their depositors; but their notes pass as freely after the bank fails as before, after the failure, the Government takes the note business in hand, sells the security, and redeems the notes at their face value in legal tender money.

If these banks were Government banks, such as my bill provides, there would be no broken banks, and no money lost by depositors.
