WHERE ARE WE AT?

Judge Wilcox this morning threw out of Court the libel suit against the editor of the Republican, on a point of interpretation of the constitution.

Mr. Hankey who appeared for the defendant, held that any person charged with an infamous crime must be indicted by the Grand Jury, before he can be called upon to defend himself in open Court.

Mr. Hankey quoted numerous authorities in backing his opinion, and virtually took the wind out of the sails of the prosecution.

Eventually the case was dismissed, Judge Wilcox admitting that he has no jurisdiction under the laws, as interpreted by Mr. Hankey.

If the U. S. Constitution is to be construed as Mr. Hankey wishes it to be, we see no reason why every offense punishable by imprisonment should not be thrown out of the District Court. In fact that Court might as well close because even the "drunks" are liable to imprisonment and become objects for the Grand Jury to deal with.

The ruling of Judge Wilcox is undoubtedly correct but as His Honor said, it means virtually the throwing out of the whole penal code, with the exception perhaps of the law relating to the riding of a bicycle without a light which is punishable always with a fine of \$5.

The Magistrate asked Mr. Hankey blandly: "How about contempt of Court, which is punishable with imprisonment?"

And Mr. Hankey answered smilingly: "Oh, your Honor, the Supreme Court has held that contempt of Court is not a crime at all."

Under the circumstances, however, we may as well close our Courts and throw ourselves on the mercy of the Grand Jury.

What are we coming to indeed, since the great day of admission?

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Why don't the owners of yachts agree to race on regatta day without asking for the purses or consulting the Hui Aloha Aina committees?

We think it proper to mention in justification to the officers of the Aloha Aina Association that the luau given at Prince David's residence on Saturday, was not paid for out of the political funds belonging to the association. Nearly all the guests were haoles, who desired to go there and see a luau, as they do in the Zoological gardens of Europe when they wish to study the actions of the monkeys and the funny birds.

It is generally reported that the reason why the palace wall on the corner of Richard and King streets has been "rounded" is not out of regard to the small traffic in that quarter, but to obtain a site for the Charles Carter monument. All remember that the community objected to having a monument for the dead "hero" erected in any public place and the Dole crowd submitted to public opinion. Why then attempt now to awaken sleeping dogs and tear open the wound of '95? If a monument is to be erected for the

late "hero" let it be where his grave is in Nuuanu cemetery. Should Governor Dole arrogate to himself the power to place a memorial fountain for Carter in the grounds of the capitol we can assure him that it will be removed by the next Legislature. It is dangerous to wave a red rag in the face of a bull who knows his strength.

Labor Day is observed in thirty-eight States in the American Union and the District of Columbia as a holiday of one class or another. We believe that Governor Dole and Secretary of the Territory H. E. Cooper will see their way to morrow to recognize the day in so far as they legally can, and we feel almost confident that the next legislature will make the day a territorial holiday, for the workmen of brains and muscle control our destinies as much as do our millionaires.

The Sunday popular concert in the Capitol grounds yesterday was another marked success.

Punahou defeated E. O. Hall & Son's team at Baseball on Saturday by a score of 26 to 19.

The Government band plays at Emma Square this evening. Hawaiian songs will be sung.

To night Allan Dunn's new piece "Uncle Rufus' Christmas" will be presented at the Orpheum.

H. Hackfeld & Co. have presented Deputy Marshal Hendry with a splendid desk for his office.

The Honolulu Driving Association is at work now, and the first meeting took place on Saturday last.

Messrs. William A. Kinney and Harry A. Bigelow have been admitted by Judge Estee to practice in the U. S. District Court.

The City Carriage Co. is now in the livery business. It has buggies, surreys, wagons, etc., on hand at all hours of the day or night. Telephone 113.

The Honolulu driving association met at the Hawaiian hotel on Saturday evening but owing to the smallness of the attendance adjourned until tomorrow evening at 7:30.

Judge Estee, of the U. S. District Court, today granted American naturalization to the following persons: Robert F. Lange of Prussia, and M. A. Rego and J. P. Dias of Portugal.

Rev. Arthur Maxson Smith, D. D. has been selected as the new president of Oahu college, and is expected to arrive here in the early part of next month. He is a baptist, is married and has two children.

There was a "haole" luau at Prince David's residence on Saturday night. It was evidently not an Aloha Aia affair, as formally stated, in our paper as the guests were mostly imported haoles.

From a letter received by Henry Smith, Clerk of the Judiciary Department it appears that the condition of Judge Hardy's health is such that he may not be able to hold court for the September Term.

Another Japanese murder has been committed, this time at Olua, where the murder r killed his wife with a knife simply, according to his own statement, because she would not obey him in his desire to go to Olua. He surrendered to the police.

Incidents En Route During An Excursion.

The present sultry spell has rendered the O. R. & L. When the train reached Kawaihapai, she was informed in answer to one of her numerous questions that she was in a part of the district of Waialua, she immediately looked around and asked, "Where's the Waialua Hotel?"

The new Waialua mill has been running for a week, and judging by the vast fields of cane a casual observer will not hesitate to say that the mill will be fully engaged, if not more.

PRIMARIES.

Pursuant to a resolution passed at a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Territorial Central Committee of the Republican Party in the Territory of Hawaii, a call is now issued for a Primary Election to be held in the various precincts on Saturday, September 1, 1900, for the purpose of electing delegates to a District Convention. The polls will be open from 3 p. m. to 9 p. m.

These are the Rules and Regulations of the Republican Party in the Territory of Hawaii, governing Precinct Clubs:

ARTICLE I. PRECINCT CLUBS.

Section 1. The unit of organization shall be the precinct clubs.

Section 2. There shall be a precinct organization in every election precinct.

Section 3. Every person legally enrolled, in the various precinct clubs, shall be a member of the precinct club when permanently organized.

Section 4. The officers of each Precinct Club shall be a President, Secretary, three Judges of Election, and such other officers as the by-laws of said precinct may provide. No initiation fees or dues shall be charged the members of any precinct club. All officers shall serve for one year, or until their successors are elected. Any duly enrolled member of the club may be eligible to hold office.

Section 5. The duties of these officers shall be those usual to said officers and such as may be provided for in the by-laws of each Precinct Club. The three Judges of Election shall be sole judges at all primaries.

Section 6. The President and Secretary of each precinct club shall act as a revising board of the roll of the Precinct Club, and from time to time shall meet and revise said roll so that it shall consist of only such members as still reside in said precinct, but no member on the old roll shall be omitted if he still resides in said precinct.

Section 7. Each precinct shall at the primaries elect, besides the officers aforesaid, delegates to the District Committee.

Section 8. Each precinct shall be entitled to elect one delegate to said district committee for each 25 votes cast in said precinct for the Republican ticket at the preceding election. Whenever after dividing said Republican vote by 25 there is a remainder of 15 or more then the precinct is entitled to an additional delegate, but each precinct shall be entitled to at least one delegate to said district committee, although the Republican vote as aforesaid in said precinct shall be below 25.

Section 9. Any person who is a duly enrolled member of a precinct club shall be eligible as a delegate to the district committee.

The above Rules and Regulations of the Republican Party in the Territory of Hawaii are also published in accordance with a Resolution passed at the same meeting referred to above.

The Committee urge upon all the officers and members of all Precinct Clubs the importance of prompt and harmonious action in relation to the above call.

Court Notes.

Judge Silliman heard the petition
for valuation and appraisal of
the estate of Jas. Campbell, deceased,
on Saturday and referred the
matter to R. D. Mead as master.

and payment and the statute of
frauds. Kinney, Bailou & McClanahan
for defendant.

Exceptions have been filed in all
the Kaneohe cases appealed to the
Circuit Court, which were lately
dismissed and refused reinstatement.
The respective defendants except to
the ruling on the ground that it was
contrary to law and an abuse of dis-
cretion on the part of the Court.

jury all day. A verdict was rendered
for plaintiff for \$1. In a former
trial plaintiff received a verdict of
\$500, which was taken on appeal to
the Supreme Court and a new trial
