## WHAT IS RAW MATERIAL?

HE Tariff experts make long disquisitions on the difference between manufactured articles and raw material. What is raw material? It is something in the production of which human labor has not been used. The steel of which the saw is made is not raw material, for it is made from iron smelted by human labor from ore. The ore is not raw material for human labor has been invoked to mine it. The leather of which your shoes are made is not raw material, for the tanner made it from a hide. The hide is not raw material, for labor killed and skinned the steer. And the steer was not raw material for it took labor to raise and feed him.

Cloth is the so-called raw material from which the tailor manufacturers a coat. Wool is the so-called raw material from which the spinner constructs the cloth, and human labor has been used to shear the sheep. Even the tree standing in the forest is not the raw material of lumber, for human labor was required to survey a road through the forest to reach the tree.—*Los Angeles Times*.
