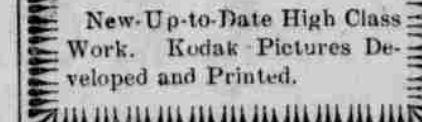

TELEGRAPHIC ITEMS

The Caribbean fleet has been order-
ed to Honduras.

There is a revolution in three pro-
vinces in Uruguay.

The Pennsylvania railroad has in-
creased its capital stock to \$150,000-
000.

Germany has received its first
payment, amounting to \$70,000, from
Venezuela.

Two thousand workmen in the
Brooklyn, New York shipyards are
out on a strike.

The jurisdiction of the department
of immigration has been extended to
include Hawaii.

President Roosevelt starts west
April 1, and will be in San Francisco,
May 12 and 14.

The Mississippi is pouring over the
levee in Arkansas, and immense dam-
age is expected.

The Panama Canal Treaty was rat-
ified by the Senate on Tuesday, by a
vote of 73 to 3.

Lipton's challenger was success-
fully launched March 17, and will be
named the Reliance.

There is a financial crisis in the
City of Mexico, and six leading firms
of importers have failed.

The famine is so severe in Dalmat-
ia that the people there are subsist-
ing on bark and herbs.

Crozier, editor of the American

McGREGOR'S

LANDING

Where New Wharf Should Be Built.

The question of abandoning the wharf at Maalaea Bay and building a new wharf at McGregor's Landing is under consideration, and there is no doubt but McGregor's Landing is for many reasons far preferable to Maalaea Bay as a landing point for passengers and freight. Wailukans who do not stop to consider, naturally feel a bias in favor of Maalaea Bay simply because it is nearer to Wailuku. But when the matter is analyzed, it is found that in actual point of time consumed McGregor's Landing is nearer to Wailuku than Maalaea Bay. It is a 15 minutes drive from McGregor Landing to the Maalaea wharf, but on the other hand a steamer will reach anchorage at McGregor Landing 15 minutes sooner than it could anchor at Maalaea Bay so no time is lost. The great gain however lies in the fact that a boat can anchor within less than 200 feet from the wharf at McGregor Landing, and but a few moments are required to land passengers and baggage, whereas at Maalaea Bay the anchorage ground is several hundred yards distant from the wharf.

Maalaea Bay is exposed to the full force of the winds, and when a trade wind is sweeping across the isthmus it takes the row boats from fifteen minutes to half an hour to reach the landing, and sometimes when the winds are very strong, boats cannot reach the wharf at all, and are sometimes blown out to sea and have to be followed and picked up by the steamers to which they belong. During a kona storm it is impossible to land at Maalaea Bay, which never happens at McGregor Landing, for no matter which way the wind is blowing, or how hard, the place is so sheltered that an easy and safe landing can be made.

Capt. Parker of the Claudine, who is one of the most experienced coast navigators in the inter-island service is authority for the statement that there is 48 feet of water within 100 feet of the shore at McGregor Landing. There are no improvements whatever at McGregor Landing at present, but it is authoritatively stated that the steamship companies will erect a comfortable waiting room for passengers if the government will put a wharf there, which by the way should not cost over \$2000, as only a small wharf is needed. The principal cost will be the construction of a road on an easy grade from the landing to connect with the pali road, and as only a short piece of road will be needed, its cost will not be disproportionate to the benefits.

McGregor's Landing would have been selected instead of Maalaea Bay in the first place, to build a wharf, if the pali road had then been built, and now that a new wharf is needed it should be built at McGregor's landing, and a road to connect with the pali road should be laid out on the best possible grade, and built.

Salvation Army Revival.

Major and Mrs. Harris, the Divisional Officers of the Salvation Army, came to Maui this week on the Claudine, bringing with them a Singing Brigade consisting of Captain Isabelle Hutchinson, Lieut. Katherine Hutchinson, Lieut. Adrina Gordon and Corps Cadet Bertha Pieler.

These Salvationists are good singers and assisted by the local corps held their first meeting at Waikapu on Wednesday night where a profitable and successful revival service was held. Their campaign is as follows:

The Base Ball Season.

The postponed meeting of the Maui Athletic Association was held last Monday evening at the Wailuku Court house, with Pres. Baldwin in the chair.

There were matters of importance for consideration but owing to the fact that there was barely a quorum present, nothing but appointing a League Committee was done.

This league Committee consists of Mr. Kirkland, L. R. Crook and G. B. Schrader and they are to arrange the schedule of games, length of season, ground rules etc. It was the sense of the meeting that all parties desiring to enter teams in this league notify the Committee of such intention, on or before March 31, 1903.

The season will start on Apr. 12 1903.

The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Lahaina team with a view of having them enter the league. Director Bai has had Wells Park cleaned, same will be rolled this week putting it in fine condition. Some needed repairs will be made on the grandstand.

The indications now are that there will be four teams in the league this season, one each from Wailuku, Kahului, Waikapu and Lahaina, each of which will be represented by a strong team. As an encouragement to the teams, it has been decided that the winning team shall have 35 per cent and the losing team 15 per cent of the gate receipts for the games they play. The next regular meeting of the Association will be held Apr. 6, and every member should be present.

Manager Gjerdrum Promoted.

Manager Gjerdrum, who succeeded the late David Center about ten years ago as Manager of the Hana Plantation, and who has since held that position, has been offered and has accepted the management of Honokaa Plantation on Hawaii, to succeed Manager Watt, resigned.

Mr. Gjerdrum has always stood high, not only in the estimation of his employers but also of his employees, and is one of Hawaii's typical successful plantation managers. His many friends on Maui will regret his departure, but Honokaa and Schaefer & Co. are to be congratulated on having secured his services.

It is reported that the management of Hana Plantation has been offered to Mr. Bull, now at the old Hamoa Plantation, and that he has accepted the position.

LAHAINA LINES.

The showers on Sunday prevented a large attendance at Church. Since the rain, high winds have prevailed. By the middle of the week, the streets were muddy and dusty at the same time, and the sprinkling cart resumed operations on Wednesday.

A capacious hydrant has been set in the grounds of the Lahaina Hotel, and the premises are well protected from fire. A hose company is needed in Lahaina as well as Wailuku.

There are no less than five Chinese restaurants on the waterfront. One of these concerns carries on a considerable trade in groceries and dry goods.

The long continued low temperature is quite a rarity in Lahaina.

Inspector King has been visiting the schools in Lahaina and vicinity. On Sunday morning the mail boat left for Lanai, with two men on board. Nothing has been heard from them since, and it is feared that the men and the mail are lost.

A road up Iao Valley and a cottage for tourists at the summit of Haleakala are two things which are immediately needed.

SHIPPING NEWS

Captain J. T. Smith of the Siberia was arrested yesterday by United States Marshal Hendry upon the arrival of the big liner in port.

Captain Smith is charged with larding three rejected immigrants from the City of Peking contrary to law sometime in April, 1901. At that time Collector Stackable refused clearance papers to the vessel, and \$900 was deposited as security to pay the fine for landing the Japs, and the steamer was permitted to depart.

Afterwards the steamship companies made an effort to secure the remission of the penalty, and the money has been ordered returned upon the recommendation of Mr. Breckons that the fine could not be imposed except by a court.

Captain Smith, entered a plea of not guilty before Judge Estee, and was released upon \$1,000 bonds, signed by J. F. Humburg and H. Schultze. He also waived trial by jury and the hearing will be had before Judge Estee on May 9.—Advertiser.

Nantucket, Mass., March 16.—The freight steamer Park Gate, loaded with Cuban sugar for Boston, is ashore on the Nantucket shoals.

San Francisco, March 6.—For the first time since being placed in commission the large oil-carrying barkentine Fullerton is to go to Ventura to load her usual cargo of 15,000 barrels for Hawaiian ports. The Fullerton has heretofore taken in her full cargo at Oleum, up the river, but on this occasion will be towed to the southern coast by the tug Rescue to load, sailing thence to Honolulu. The filling of her big tanks will be done by means of an eight-inch pipe 600 feet in length.

Glasgow, Scotland, March 17.—Sir Thomas Lipton's challenger Shamrock III was launched today. Only a small party of intimate friends witnessed the launching with Lipton, the usual care being taken to get the yacht into the water to prevent the public obtaining a knowledge of her lines. The launching was very successful and riggers will proceed immediately to get the boat in shape for sails and trial trips with the Shamrock I, which will be used this year to tune up the challenger.

The barkentine Fullerton cleared for Honolulu from San Francisco on March 8 with 210,000 gallons of crude oil valued at \$9,000. She also carried 7,500 pounds of asphaltum.
